We often equate the term “resilience” with the ability to bounce-back after a traumatic incident occurs. This leads many to believe that our greatest moments of testing will be whether or not we can pick ourselves “up off of the mat” when knocked down by the heavyweight title holder (or in the lens of Bay Area disaster management “The 10.0 magnitude ‘Haywired’ earthquake.” The Institute of Heartmath, the neuroscientists at the forefront of developing resilience in the systems of the human body that sustain life when in energetic coordination, defines “resilience” as: “The capacity to prepare for, adapt to, and recover from stress, adversity, or challenge.” This definition broadens the lens in which we view resilience, specifically that we can invest our energy, time, willingness, and commitment now, so that we are all more prepared today than we were yesterday when the unthinkable happens. Ingleside Station is working hard to be resilience partners with all of our neighbors and neighborhoods and looks forward to promoting NEN’s Neighborfest and other initiatives in support of Neighborhood Watch, NERT, ALERT, and other community-building programs already in progress.

## Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Ingleside Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Ingleside Station has foot beat officers assigned to the Geneva and Cortland corridors.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Station personnel also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Ingleside Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



## Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

The following are some examples of Suspicious Activity that are “In progress” crimes, which demand an immediate call to 9-1-1:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or

## Crime Definition

**Robbery** – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

**Assault** – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

**Battery - (Misdemeanor battery)** is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

**(Felony battery)** is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

\***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person.

**Aggravated Assault** – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

**Burglary** – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

**Grand Theft** – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

**Petty Theft** – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

**11:25am      100 Blk. Tucker                      Burglary**

An alert neighbor spotted a strange man, wearing a yellow reflective vest, walking through a neighbor's backyard. The suspect walked up to a bottom floor window, broke the window, and climbed into the home. She dialed "911" and Ingleside Officers Fazli and Mora were the first to arrive. Soon, several other Ingleside units arrived and searched the ransacked home. They found the suspect hiding under a sofa in the living room. The homeowner arrived home and said cash was missing but was unsure if anything else was taken by the suspect. The officers searched the suspect's vehicle parked in front of the home and found ID's and driver's licenses belonging to other individuals. The suspect was an active parole for burglary. Ingleside Officers Seavey and Sgt. Lau were on routine patrol when they spotted three men they had arrested before. All three were on parole with a search provision for various violent crimes. When the officers exited their patrol car one of the three men took off running. Officer Seavey ran after the suspect and during the pursuit the suspect dropped a firearm on the ground. Seavey caught up and arrested the suspect and recovered the firearm. He was charged with illegal possession of a firearm and for possession of "ecstasy" narcotics. He told the officers that a patron at the bar was causing problems and as he escorted him outside, the patron punched the guard in the face. The officers found the suspect a short distance away and placed him in custody. At Ingleside Station a search of his clothing revealed a significant quantity of cocaine. Three men in a newer Honda with a cracked windshield and a broken tail light caught the attention of Ingleside Officers Burke and Downs. ### Possession of Firearm

Officers will tell you sometimes the most innocuous violations turn out to be the most dangerous. On this morning, that maxim proved true. Ingleside Officers Clayton and Jensen were on routine patrol in an area where many stolen and abandoned vehicles have been found. The officers noticed a newer Ford van with the rear window missing. It also didn't have a front license plate. When the officers pulled up behind the van the driver of the van started to pull away without turning on the vehicle's lights. The officers turned on the patrol vehicle's emergency lights and the driver stopped and tried to exit the van. The officers ordered her back into the van. Clayton and Jensen obtained identification on all three occupants. The front seat passenger was wanted on a \$750 thousand warrant out of Solano County for attempted murder and failure to appear. The woman driver was wanted on a \$50 thousand warrant from the same jurisdiction for evading police. The other passenger was not wanted. The woman suspect was placed in custody. The male passenger didn't cooperate. He violently fought the officers until finally being subdued. Officer Clayton suffered several cuts and bruises during the struggle. The wanted male suspect complained of pain in one of his legs and was transported to San Francisco General for treatment. But that wasn't the end of the encounter. While getting x-rays at the hospital, he suddenly bolted out of the x-ray room and tried to escape wearing only boxer shorts. He was quickly apprehended by officers and deputies. A search of the van turned up a loaded firearm and ammunition hidden between the seats. The female suspect and the male passenger were booked at the County Jail for various felonies. The other passenger was released at the scene. Report number: 180302398

### Robbery

A report of a strong arm robbery sent Ingleside Officers King and Buckner to investigate. When they arrived on scene they found the victim holding an ice pack to his face and missing two front teeth. 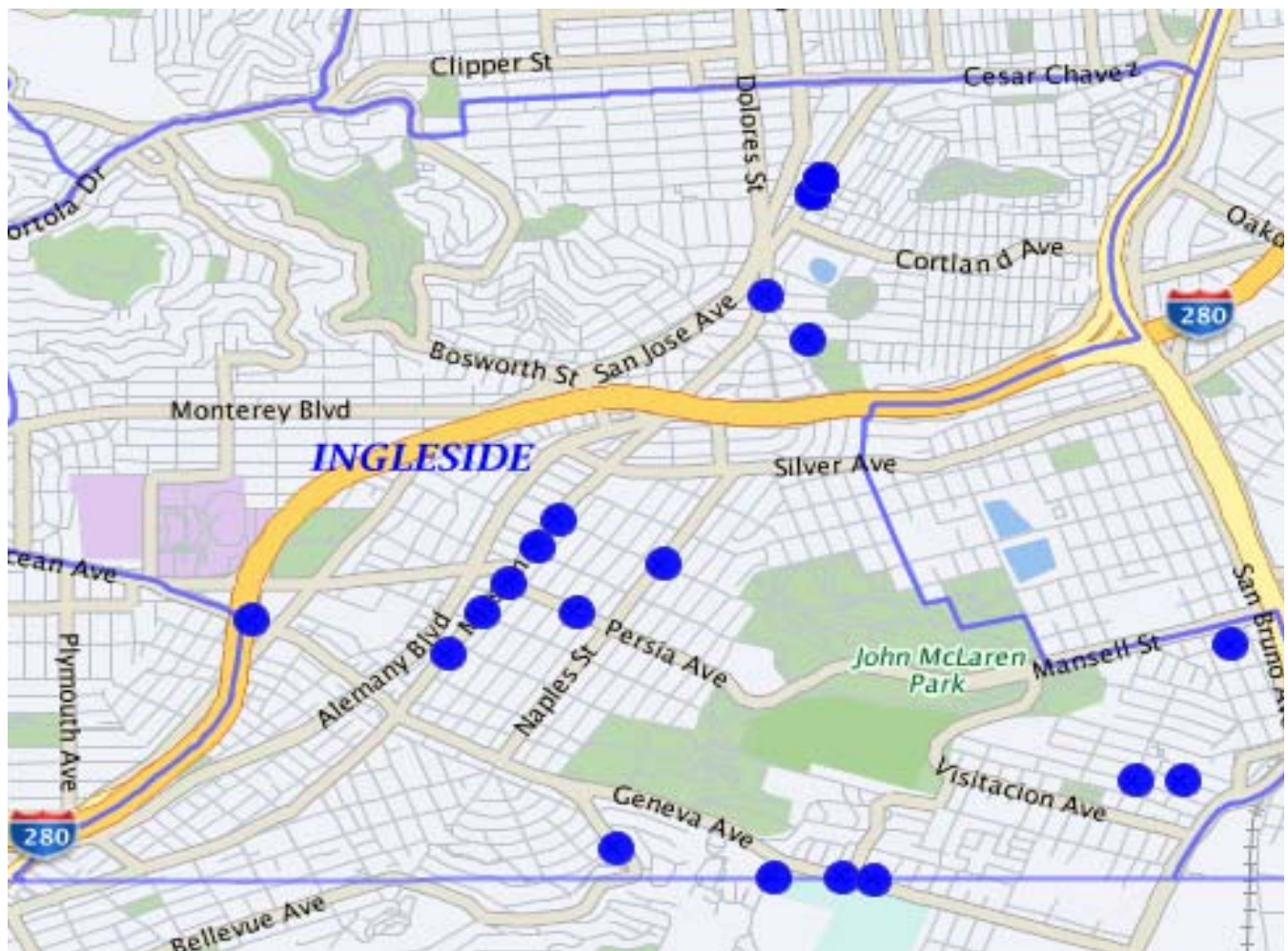
#### **Dog Bite**

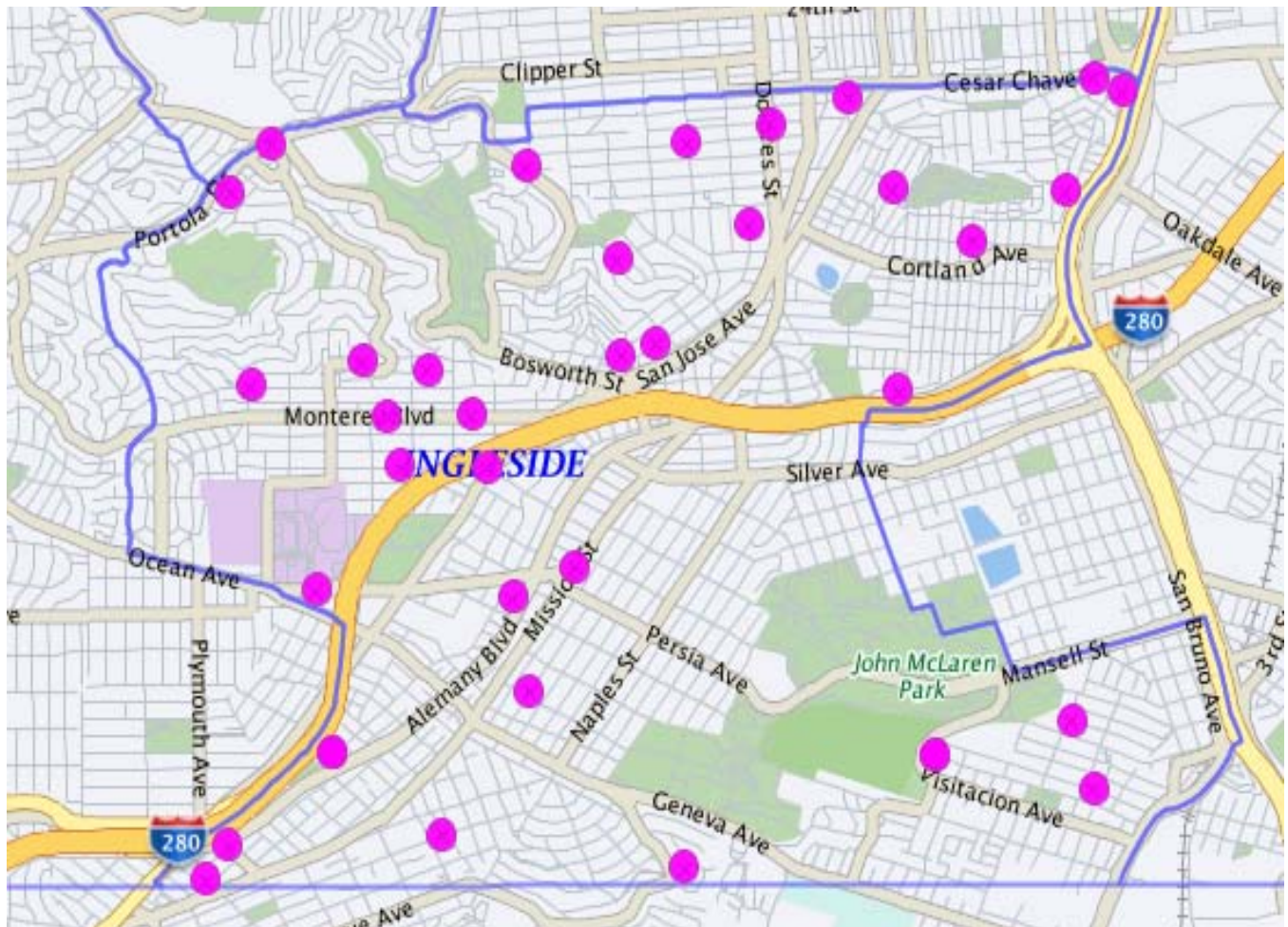

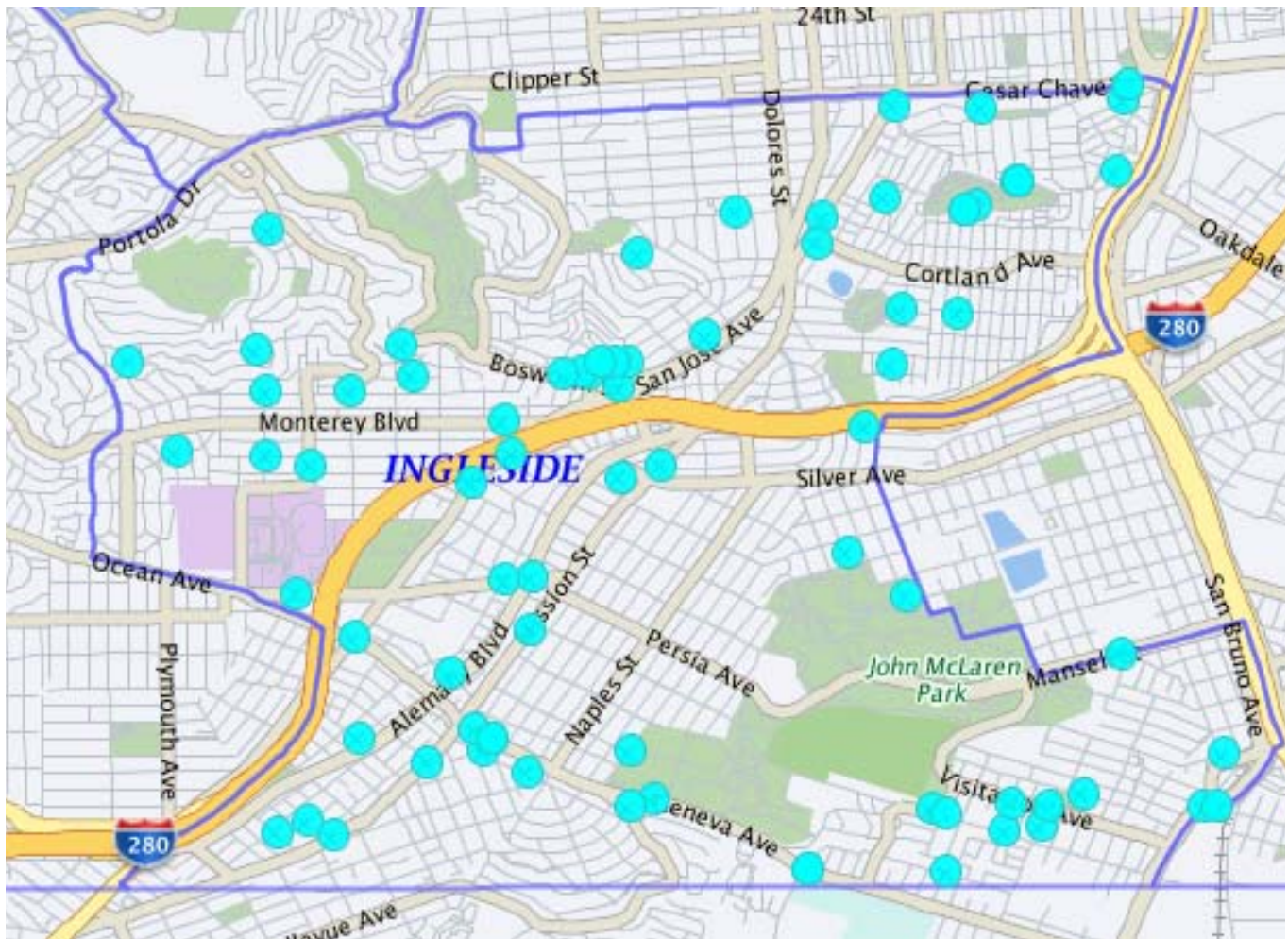

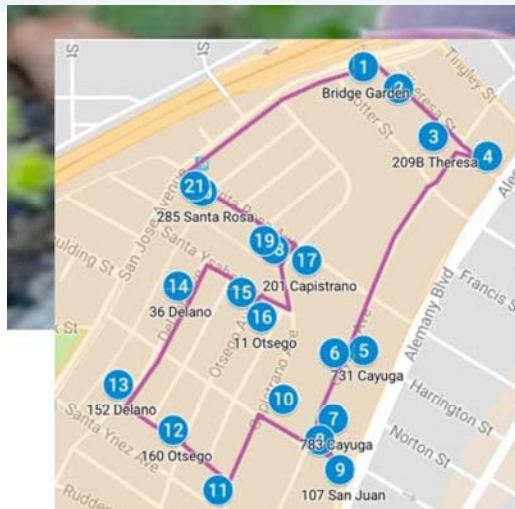

- 4 **122 Theresa** Roses, succulents and a variety of green plants are surrounded by recycled décor and a bit of whimsy.
- 5 **731 Cayuga** It's demo(lition) time
- 6 **734 Cayuga** Zen-like garden with whimsical features (horse tank with fish and glass balls) and a grey water system.
- 7 **783 Cayuga** A tiny labyrinth hides on a terrace in this part-shade backyard
- 8 **156 San Juan** Fragrant corner garden of CA natives and courtyard w/olive tree and berries (open from 2-4pm).
- 9 **107 San Juan** The garden design is inspired by Spanish colonial courtyards, and the planting is a collection of exotic species from comparable climates around the world.
- 10 **373 Capistrano** Lovely sunny garden retreat with flagstone path and patio
- 11 **498 Capistrano** In-progress renovation of sweeping front lawn into lovely landscape
- 12 **160 Otsego** Backyard oasis with glass-mulch pathway and garden studio
- 13 **152 Delano** Colorful front yard flowerbed, a garden collaboration among neighbors
- 14 **36 Delano** Beautiful tree-landscaped front yard
- 15 **2 Otsego** Sidewalk garden featuring colorful drought-tolerant California native plants
- 16 **11 Otsego** Elegant and environmentally friendly lawn replacement (ask about how to apply for funds to do this!)
- 17 **201 Capistrano** Verdant vegetable garden, delicate Japanese maples and a towering Ash

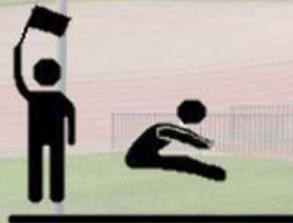

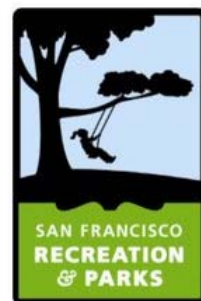

### **SFPD Makes Several Auto Burglary Arrest Throughout the City**

On Monday April 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2018 at 1:45 AM, Central District police officers were dispatched to the area of Grant Street and Filbert Street regarding subjects breaking into vehicles. Dispatch advised that the subjects had fled the area and gave a description of their vehicle. While enroute to the call, a victim contacted dispatch and said that he located the suspect vehicle at Montgomery Street and Francisco Street. Officers responded to the scene and witnessed one of the suspects burglarizing another vehicle on the 1800 block of Kearny Street. Officers determined that four suspects were involved in the burglaries and were able to take them into custody.

Tyler McKinney, a 26 year-old Berkeley resident, Christopher Wise, a 28 year-old Sacramento resident, Robert Warren a 23 year-old San Francisco resident and a 16 year-old juvenile male suspect were all booked on two counts of burglary and one count of conspiracy each.

On Tuesday April 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2018 at 11:05 PM, Mission Station officers were patrolling the area of Church Street and 20<sup>th</sup> Street when they observed a vehicle driving with dealer plates only. When the officers attempted to make a traffic stop, the vehicle sped off. Officers did not pursue the vehicle but the suspect's car was involved in a traffic collision at the corner of 25<sup>th</sup> Street and Church Street. Officers searched for the suspect and spoke to a witness who said that he heard someone jump over his backyard fence on the 3800 block of 25<sup>th</sup> Street. Officers responded to the backyard and arrested Dominic Spears, an 18 year-old transient.

Spears was booked at the San Francisco County Jail on one count of theft of vehicle, one count of possession of stolen property, one count reckless evading, one count failing to stop and exchange information at an accident, one count of failure to have a valid driving license while driving, one count of resisting arrest and one count of driving without a license plate.

On Wednesday April 4<sup>th</sup>, 2018 at approximately 8:24 PM, Southern District plainclothes officers were conducting surveillance on the area of the 1700 block of Alameda Street. The officers witnessed a car double park near another vehicle. A male who was later identified as Troy Savoy, a 20 year-old San Francisco resident, exited the car and began casing another vehicle. Savoy then returned to the driver's seat of his car and left the scene. Moments later Savoy returned in the vehicle, exited and approached the vehicle that he was casing. Savoy broke the window and grabbed a backpack from inside the victim's vehicle. Officers moved in to arrest Savoy. Savoy attempted to flee and crashed his vehicle into a parked car. Savoy and another passenger, who was later identified as Earl Jihad, an 18 year-old Pleasant Hill resident attempted to flee on foot but were quickly taken into custody.

Savoy was booked at San Francisco County Jail on one count of 2<sup>nd</sup> degree burglary, two counts of possession of stolen property, one count of conspiracy, one count of resisting arrest, as well as several vehicle code violations.

Jihad was booked at San Francisco County Jail on one count of 2<sup>nd</sup> degree burglary, one count of conspiracy, two counts of possession of stolen property and resisting arrest.

On Thursday April 5<sup>th</sup>, 2018 at 9:32 PM, plainclothes officers observed a suspect who was later identified as Manuel Mills, a 30 year-old Richmond resident, casing vehicles near the corner of 10<sup>th</sup> Street and Harrison Street. The suspect entered the front passenger seat of a car and drove away. Mills exited the vehicle again and changed seats with the driver who was later identified as Taj Williams, a 41 year-old Alameda resident. Mills drove the car to Division Street just west of King Street. Williams exited the vehicle and broke the rear window of a parked car. 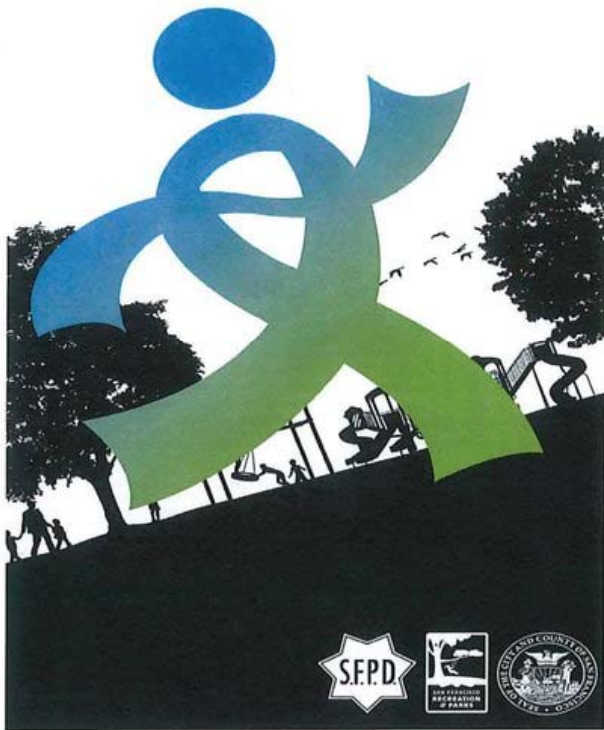

## What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

### Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.
