Captain Bailey's Message

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Hello all,

Park Station's officers continue to do great work to ensure the safety of our community, and to increase everyone's sense of security and safety. We continue to pay special attention to the community's concerns within the Panhandle, and its surrounding areas. We hope that our efforts in the Park District are making a difference, because it's our main goal to ensure everyone in our community feels safe.

This week we saw an uptick in burglaries in the Park District, and the incidents are occurring mostly in the evening. Please ensure that you are taking basic security measures i.e. locking and securing all doors and windows. Be mindful of this security even when at home do not leave a window or door open that is easily accessible from the ground floor. Always remember to keep your garage doors closed and secured. Do not leave a hide-a key. Suspects are very in tune with where people leave spare keys. Do not leave your garage door opener in your car or at least keep it out of view. Please think about installing a security camera and motion activated lights. Of course a big deterrent of burglaries is having a dog but I know not all of us can be lucky enough to have our furry friends on guard each day and night. Finally please immediately call 911 if you think you see a crime in progress or a suspicious person in your neighborhood. A recent burglar was caught because he was caught on camera ringing the doorbell of one home after which he burglarized another home. Please take the time, and review the SF SAFE form on the next page (page 2) for helpful residential safety tips.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- 1 **Garage:** When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- 2 **Car:** Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- 3 **Spare Key:** Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- 4 **Door Buzzer:** When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- 5 **Security Cameras & Alarm Systems:** Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- 6 **Light Timers:** Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- 7 **Doors/Windows:** Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME**Tip: Video surveillance equipment installation:**

If possible all residents and business owners should install video surveillance equipment outside their home or business. Video evidence is probably the biggest investigative tool we have in the police department. It provides rock solid proof/evidence of what is happening. We have used video footage to get convictions on burglars, assaults, drug dealing, trespassing. As they say a picture paints a thousand words. Many times we can identify the suspect via video footage. Video on a house can not only monitor what is happening at that house but can be used to track the path taken by a suspect and or the vehicle used by the suspect. It also allows community members to monitor who comes to your door. We recently broke a burglary ring because of video cameras installed in and outside a home. Using the video camera the victim was able to surveil the suspect, call the police and relay to us every move the suspect was making in real time, including a description of the vehicle involved. The burglar in this case was arrested for numerous burglaries in addition to the one in our district. I cannot speak enough on what a great tool these surveillance cameras are.

MEET LIEUTENANT DAVID MARON**Meet Park Station Night Lieutenant, David Maron (and your chef)**

Lieutenant Maron is a 22 year veteran of the SFPD, who started his career with Field Training at Mission Station, followed by his probationary period at Northern Station and then his first permanent assignment at Southern Station at 850 Bryant St (aka The Hall of Justice for you old timers out there). After 4 years at Southern Station, Lt. Maron transferred to the Special Operations Group where after being there for 10 years, he was promoted to Sergeant and was assigned to Ingleside Station where his duties for 5 years involved a mix of patrol and investigations. Lt. Maron was then promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and assigned to Park Station as one of the 2 night Lieutenants.

Lt. Maron, like all police officers finds his job challenging and rewarding, but what he enjoys the most about being a police officer is the interaction with the public where he is in a position to make a positive impact. For Lt. Maron, the key for that impact is the initial first impression. Be professional always, and treat people with respect - whether they are a victim, a witness, or even a perpetrator as you gain more with honey than you do with vinegar.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Weekly Email Updates: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES*Definitions*

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony battery**) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

PARK STATION—ARREST**Warrant Arrest—4100 block of 17TH St.—03/01/2018 6:05 am**

Officers were dispatched to the above listed area regarding a detained male subject. A records check revealed that the subject was a parolee, and had a no bail parole warrant for his arrest. Officers arrested the subject for his warrant, and the subject was later booked at County Jail.

Aggravated Assault with Knife—Area of Haight St. /Ashbury St.—03/04/2018 7:25 pm

Officers responded to the above listed area regarding a fight with a knife. Upon arrival, the victim informed the officers that he was walking in the above location, when he was approached by a group of subjects, who asked him for drugs. The subjects were aggressive, and started yelling obscenities at the victim. When the victim began to walk away, an unknown suspect holding a knife grabbed the victim's shoulder. While the victim was trying to get away, he cut his finger on the knife causing a laceration. The suspect then fled the scene. While the officers were speaking with the victim, the suspect walked by, and the victim pointed him out. Officers order the suspect to stop, and observed the knife in a sheath attached to his belt. Officers removed the knife from the suspect, and placed him under arrest for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

On 3/8/18, at approximately 4am, on 1600 block of Fulton Street, two package thieves were taken into custody by our midnight units.

On 3/8/18, Haight Street Beat officers arrested an individual, who had warrants out of Mendocino county and Waterloo Michigan.

On 3/8/18, at approximately 11am, a Park outreach officer arrested a parolee on a felony warrant for burglary.

Officers were dispatched to the above listed area regarding a vandalism of a residence. Upon arrival, officers met with the owner, who showed them several burnt pieces of paper, and magazines underneath the alcove of his stairs. Officers searched the area, and did not locate any surveillance cameras.

Hot Prowl Burglary/Forcible Entry—Unit block of Alpine Ter.—03/06/2018 2:55 am

Officers responded to the above listed area regarding a burglary. Upon arrival, officers observed damage to the glass window on the first floor of the residence, and the entrance door was ajar. Officers conducted a walkthrough of the premise. The tenant advised police that his bicycle was missing from his living room. No video surveillance cameras were located within the vicinity of the residence.

Burglary/ Unlawful Entry—Unit block of Uranus Ter.—03/06/2018 4:02 pm

Two officers responded to the above listed area in regards to a cold burglary report. Upon arrival, the officers spoke with the owner of the residence, who stated that her house was vacant, and undergoing construction. The owner noticed the front door to her residence was open, and the lockbox affixed on her porch was broken into, and missing the house key. Multiple items were missing from inside the residence. There are no surveillance cameras on her property that may have captured the incident.

Burglary/Forcible Entry—Unit block of Clayton St.—03/08/2018 12:06 am

Officers responded to the above listed location regarding a burglary. Upon arrival, officers spoke with the victim, who entered her residence, and noticed a shoe box on her bed that was not there before. There were small pry marks on her door knob, and there were no surveillance cameras that could have captured the incident.

Burglary/Unlawful Entry—200 block of Noe St.—03/08/2018 5:55 am

Officers responded to the above listed area regarding a hot prowling burglary. Upon arrival, officers met with the victim, who stated that he was in the restroom when he noticed the hallway light turn on. When he entered the main entry way, he noticed an unknown male subject carrying a grocery bag. The victim informed the subject that he was calling the police, and the subject stated that he will return the key that he was holding in his hand. The subject then fled in an unknown direction. Multiple Park Station units searched the area to no avail.

A victim walked into Park Station to report that her rental vehicle was broken into, and an unknown suspect stole numerous belongings from inside the vehicle. The victim was able to retrieve video surveillance footage, and forward it to officers at Park Station.

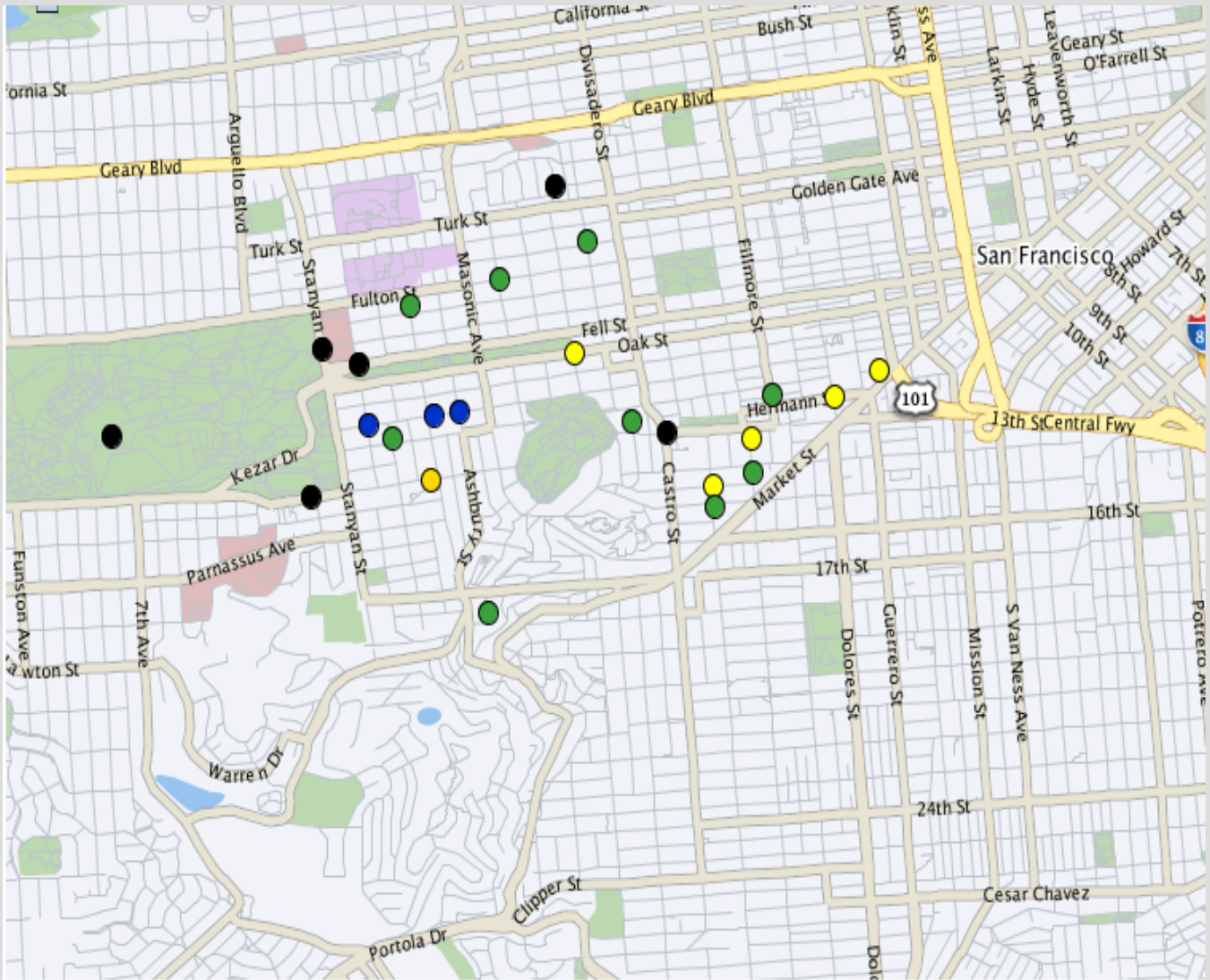
Traffic Violation Arrest—Area of Twin Peaks Blvd—03/08/2018 1:04 am

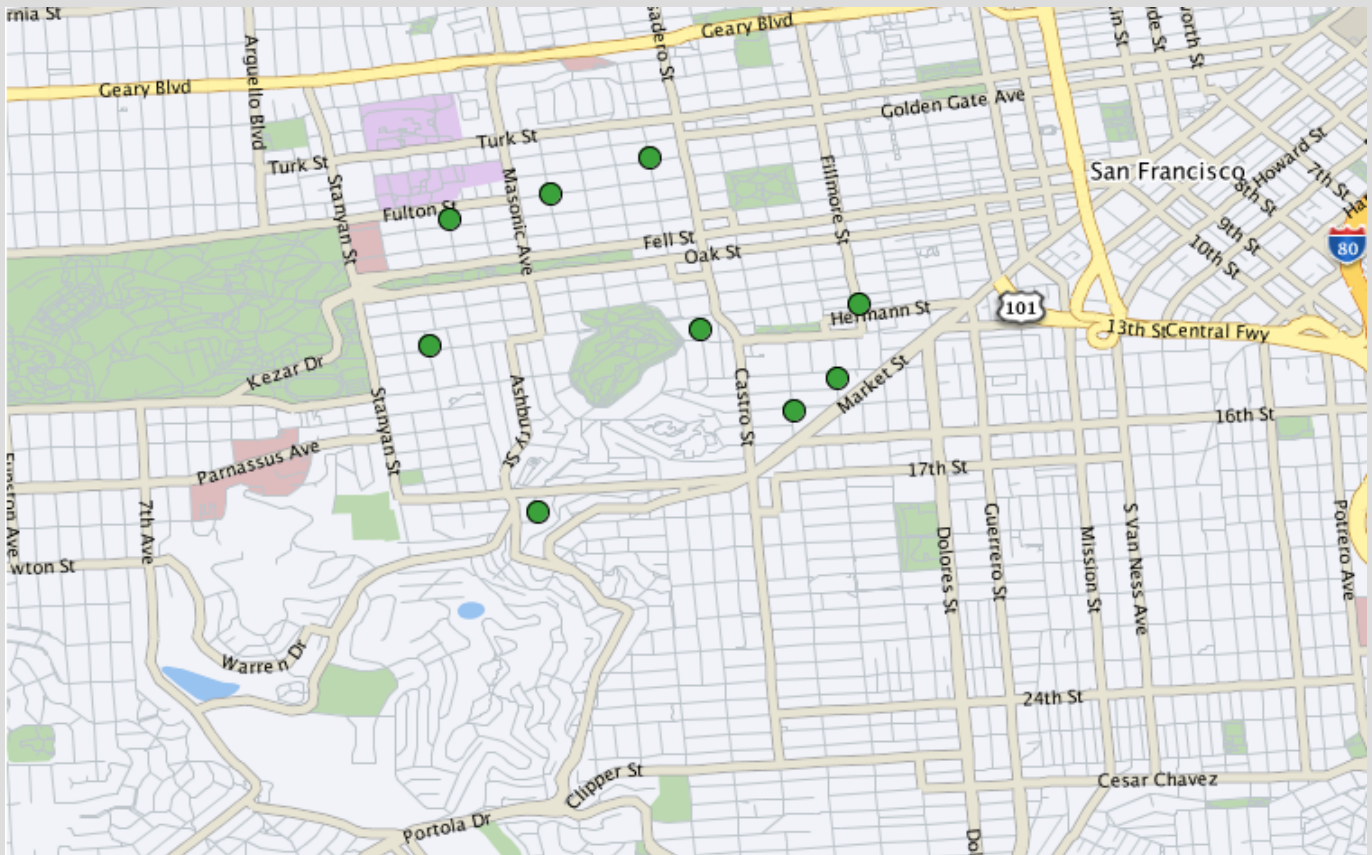

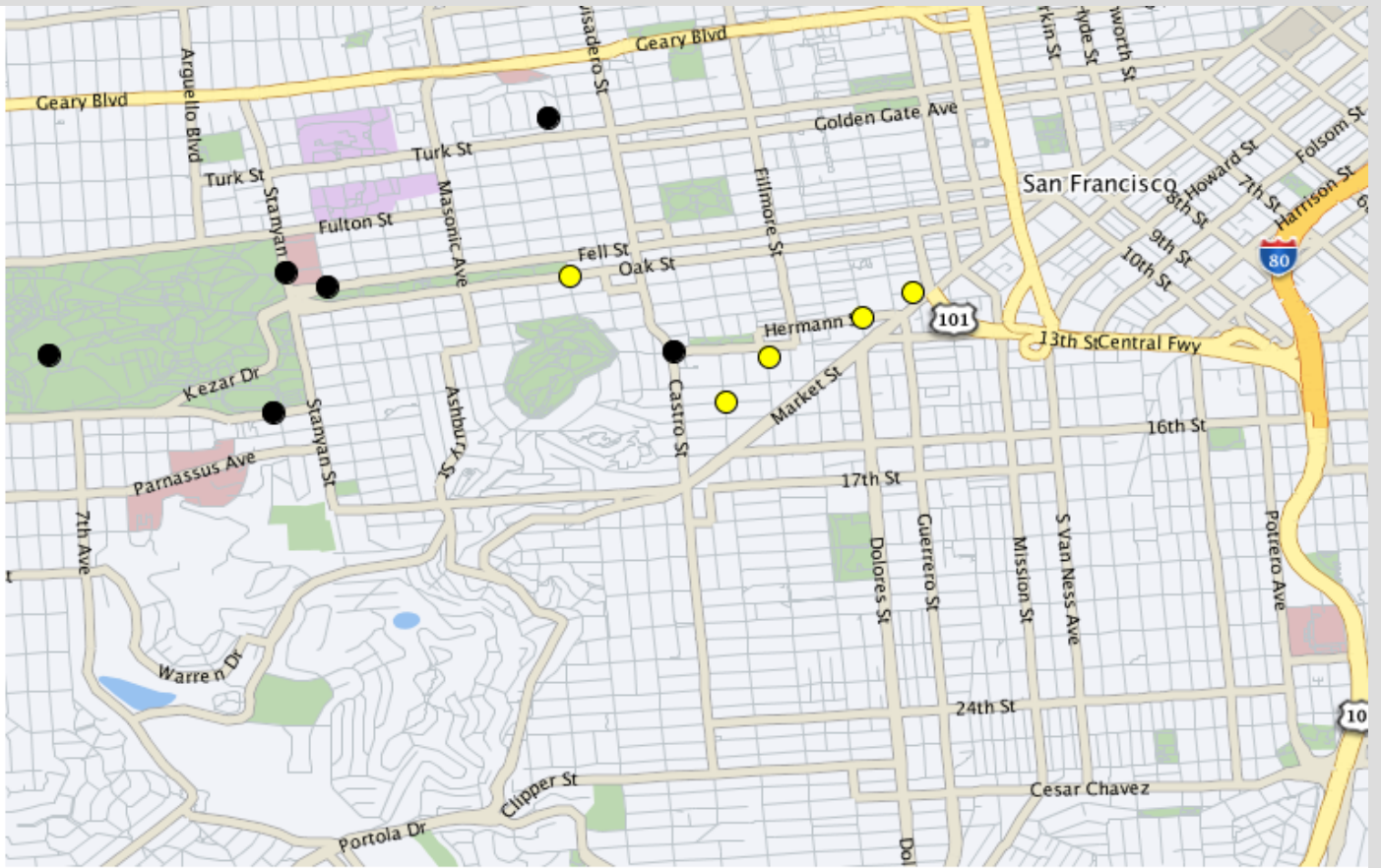

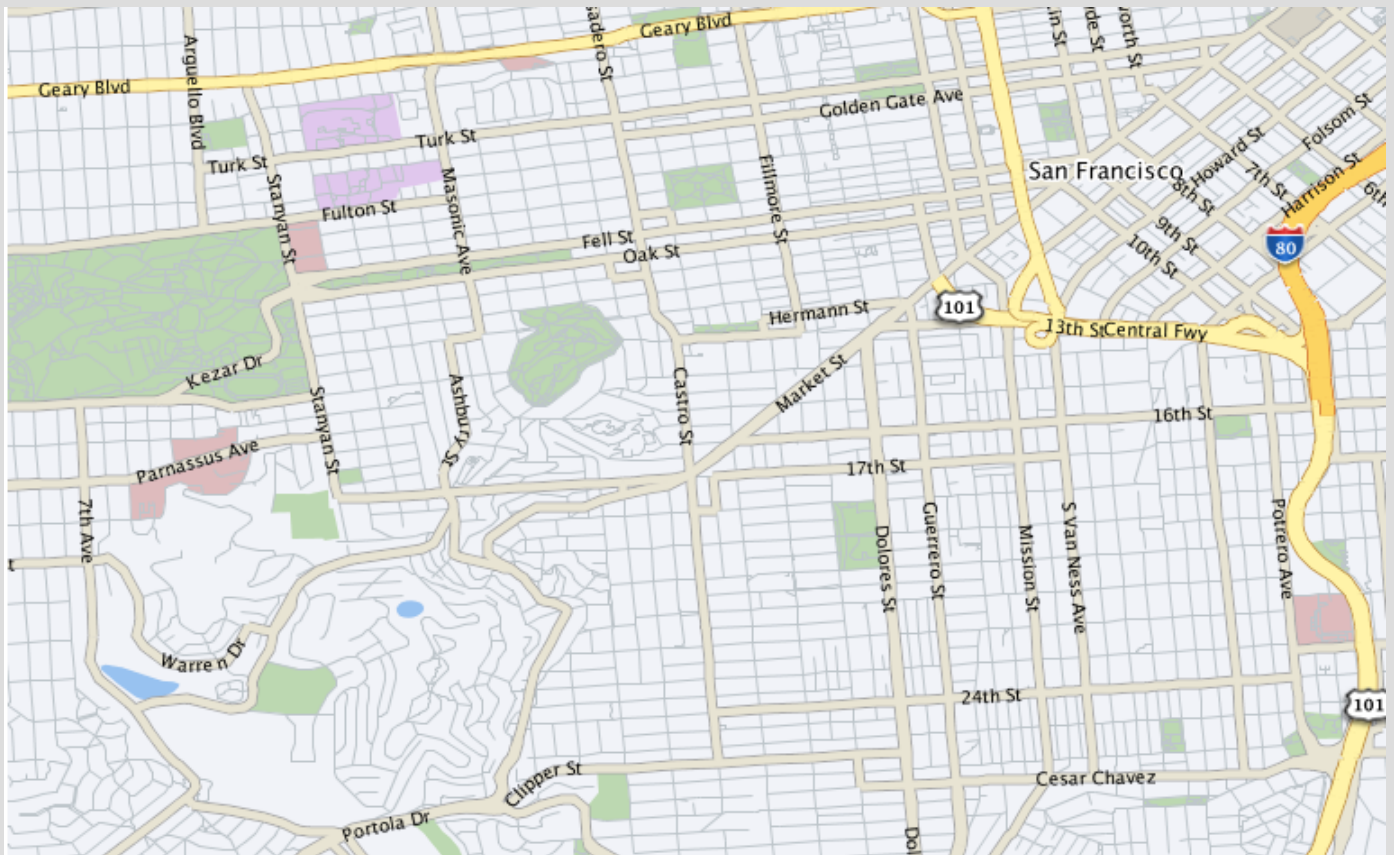

HELPFUL TIPS**DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!**

1. When placing an online or phone order, **request signed confirmation upon delivery**
2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
9. **Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep**; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

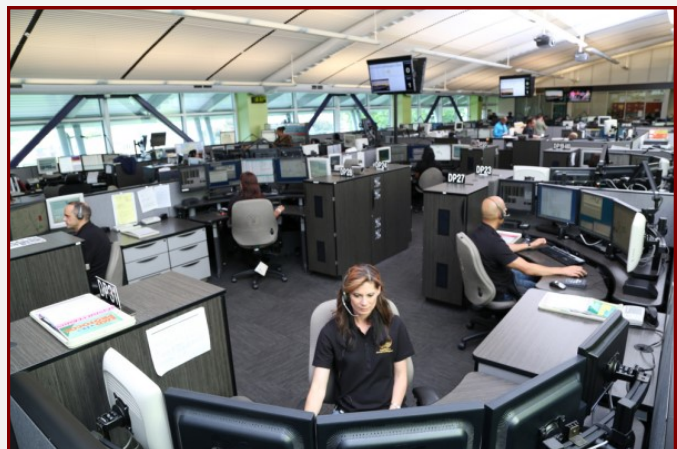
3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Please call the non- emergency dispatch line **(415-553-0123)** when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. **The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.**

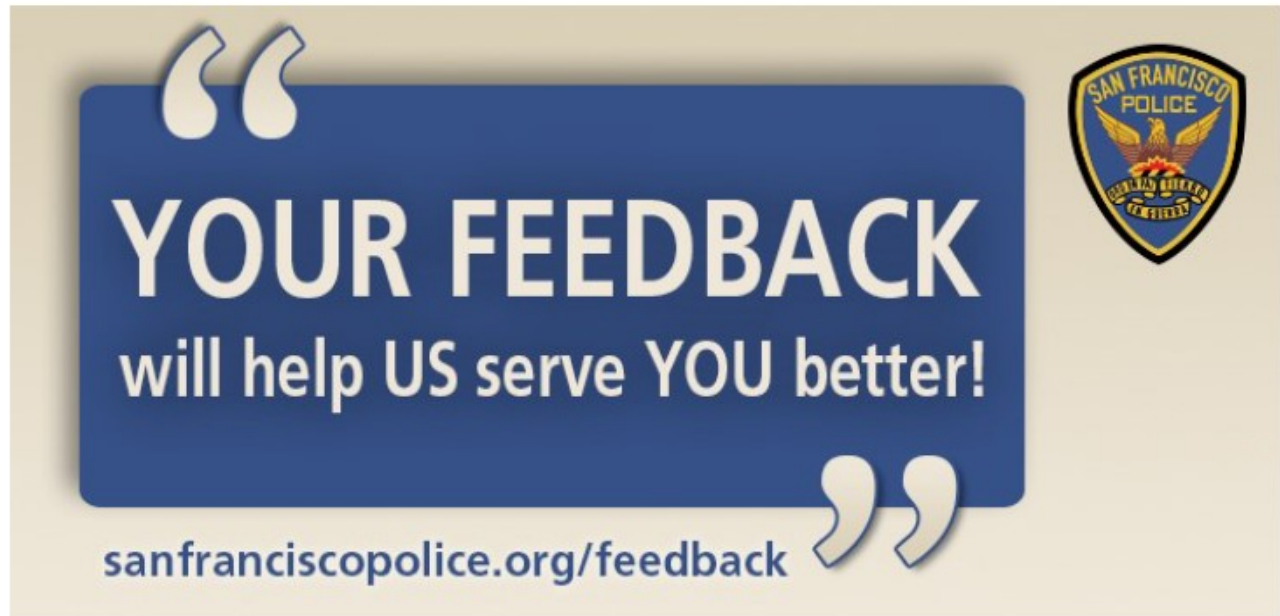
9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1.**

Mission District Armed Robbery Investigation Leads to Officer Involved Shooting

On March 6, 2018 at approximately 10:36 PM, uniformed San Francisco Police Department officers in a marked police car were flagged down at 20th and Capp Streets by two victims of an armed robbery. The victims provided the officers with a suspect vehicle description.

Shortly thereafter, officers located the suspect vehicle, a black Honda Civic, on Capp Street between 21st and 22nd Streets and ordered the suspects out of the car. The driver complied and was detained.

The officers noticed that the vehicle's trunk was ajar and saw a second suspect in the trunk. While attempting to detain the second suspect, an officer involved shooting occurred.

The officers ordered a third suspect from the vehicle and detained her. Officers removed the suspect from the trunk, administered medical aid and summoned an ambulance. Unfortunately, despite lifesaving efforts, the suspect was declared deceased on the scene.

A handgun was located in the trunk of the vehicle.

The two robbery victims were transported to Mission Station for interviews.

This is an active and ongoing investigation in the early stages. Several separate investigations are being conducted by the SFPD Homicide Detail, the San Francisco District Attorneys' Office Independent Investigation Bureau, the San Francisco Department of Police Accountability, the SFPD Internal Affairs Division and the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner.

(ALERT)


Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our quarterly ALERT training classes as follows:

1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
