Hello all,

Park Station's officers continue to do great work to ensure the safety of our community, and to increase everyone's sense of security and safety. We continue to pay special attention to the community's concerns within the Panhandle, and its surrounding areas. We hope that our efforts in the Park District are making a difference, because it's our main goal to ensure everyone in our community feels safe.

I want to review with everyone how you can best avoid being a victim of a burglary. Please ensure that you are taking basic security measures i.e. locking and securing all doors and windows. Be mindful of this security even when at home do not leave a window or door open that is easily accessible from the ground floor. Always remember to keep your garage doors closed and secured. Do not leave a hide-a key. Suspects are very in tune with where people leave spare keys. Do not leave your garage door opener in your car or at least keep it out of view. Please think about installing a security camera and motion activated lights. Of course a big deterrent of burglaries is having a dog but I know not all of us can be lucky enough to have our furry friends on guard each day and night. Please immediately call 911 if you think you see a crime in progress or a suspicious person in your neighborhood. Just this week we had three individual arrests of suspects caught breaking into vehicles and all because citizens called 911 to report the crime in progress. Our officers responded quickly and were able to take these suspects into custody. This just goes to show how we can work together to make our community safer just by calling 911 when you see a crime in progress.

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- 1 **Garage:** When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- 2 **Car:** Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- 3 **Spare Key:** Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- 4 **Door Buzzer:** When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- 5 **Security Cameras & Alarm Systems:** Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- 6 **Light Timers:** Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- 7 **Doors/Windows:** Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

ALERT Volunteer Acknowledged for Local Leadership Role

SFPD Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) volunteer, David A. Bolaffi, was chosen as the recipient of the 2017 Neighborhood Empowerment Network (N.E.N.) award for Exemplary ALERT Leadership. David received that award on January 26, 2018, in a ceremony held in the Rotunda at City Hall. The N.E.N. awards celebrate outstanding community leaders and organizations in San Francisco's neighborhoods. The winners are nominated and selected by the community.

David was born in New York City and grew up mostly in Newton, Massachusetts (a suburb 5 miles west of Boston). He is an avid Boston Red Sox, Boston Celtics, Golden State Warriors, and New England Patriots (in that order!) sports "aficionado" fan. He is a graduate of Newton South High School and Boston College. He earned his bachelor's degree from Boston College while working full time in the banking industry. After starting in the "coin room," he worked his way up to the vice-presidency of national and international banks. He received numerous awards and commendations for his excellent innovations and contributions to that industry.

One of David's rarest professional attributes is his insistence on undertaking any and all tasks with a strong sense of ownership and pride. His exemplary work never requires completion or an overhaul from others. This valuable trait continues in his volunteer efforts with the SFPD ALERT program.

David's volunteer work and service



to the public is not limited to his efforts supporting the SFPD ALERT program. For more than 20 years, David has devoted copious time and energy at his synagogue, Sherith Israel. Starting as an usher helper, David now oversees the entire usher staff, supervises security details during the high holidays, and assists in various capacities during all of the synagogue's major events. On numerous occasions, the Rabbi and Cantor have recognized and honored David for his outstanding work.

David is one of the original members of the ALERT program, having graduated from the first training class on April 13th, 2013. Since its inception, David has been and continues to be a unique and creative force in effectively guiding the development and implementation of the ALERT program. In addition to being a member of ALERT's Advisory & Recruitment Committee, David's contributions and leadership to ALERT have earned him the title and responsibility of

ALERT Senior Team Leader. He is one of only six ALERT volunteers to hold this prestigious title and its associated responsibilities. Since joining ALERT in 2013, David has given countless hours of his time to the success and growth of the ALERT program (currently with 134 members). The projects David has spearheaded to better ALERT, the SFPD, and our city are too numerous to be adequately listed. Some of his most notable contributions include:

- As an ALERT Senior Team Leader (ASTL) and member of ALERT's Advisory and Recruitment Committee, David has been highly instrumental in developing and leading many events for ALERT volunteers, including: "420 Day" in Golden Gate Park, Loma Prieta earthquake's 25th anniversary, the Fillmore Street Fairs, the Italian Heritage Day Parade, SF Delta's soccer matches, and the Parade honoring SFPD Officer Robert Fung, of Park Station. In addition, since ALERT's 2013 inception, David has assisted its program coordinator, Mark Hernandez, with fourteen of the sixteen classes for new members.
- David's strong leadership and visionary approach to ALERT's role in both

He participates in SFPD ALERT activities with unrivaled gusto and enthusiasm. He loves law enforcement, the police mission, and the police family."

MEET LIEUTENANT DAVID MARON**Meet Park Station Night Lieutenant, David Maron (and your chef)**

Lieutenant Maron is a 22 year veteran of the SFPD, who started his career with Field Training at Mission Station, followed by his probationary period at Northern Station and then his first permanent assignment at Southern Station at 850 Bryant St (aka The Hall of Justice for you old timers out there). After 4 years at Southern Station, Lt. Maron transferred to the Special Operations Group where after being there for 10 years, he was promoted to Sergeant and was assigned to Ingleside Station where his duties for 5 years involved a mix of patrol and investigations. Lt. Maron was then promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and assigned to Park Station as one of the 2 night Lieutenants.

Lt. Maron, like all police officers finds his job challenging and rewarding, but what he enjoys the most about being a police officer is the interaction with the public where he is in a position to make a positive impact. DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Weekly Email Updates: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES*Definitions*

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony battery**) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

PARK STATION—ARREST**Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—500 block of Stanyan St.—03/15/2018 5:10 am**

Officers on patrol at the above location approached an encampment that had been set up in the area. Officers made contact with two subjects and informed them that they were in violation of camping in the park. It was discovered that one of the subjects had an outstanding narcotics warrant for her arrest, and she was transported to Park Station. The other subject was cited and released at the scene.

Resisting Peace Officer Duties/False Identification/Under Influence of Alcohol in Public—400 block of Stanyan St.—03/17/2018 6:45 am

Officers responded to the area regarding an intoxicated female subject causing a disturbance. Upon arrival, officers made contact with the female subject, who was being treated at a local hospital for alcohol intoxication. When she was discharged she became belligerent and caused a disturbance. The subject was issued a citation for resisting an officer, providing false identity to a peace officer and public intoxication. She was transported to Kaiser Hospital for further treatment.

Warrant Arrest/Resisting, Delaying, or Obstructing Peace Officer Duties/Liquor Law Violation—700 block of 14TH St.—03/18/18 11:43 am

Officers made contact with a subject that was in violation of having an open container of alcohol and giving officers a false name. A computer search revealed that the subject had a domestic violence warrant out of Fresno County. Officers placed him in handcuffs and transported him to County Jail.

Vehicle Tampering/Probation Violation/ Methamphetamine Offense—1400 block of Masonic Ave.—03/18/2018 10:17 pm

Officers were dispatched to the above listed address regarding a possible auto burglary in progress. Officers contacted the victim of the auto burglary who stated that he was moving items from his vehicle into his home. When he returned there was a male subject sitting in the front passenger seat of his vehicle, rummaging through the center console. Officers detained the subject that matched the description dispatch had provided. It was discovered that the subject was on probation for auto burglary in the City and County of San Francisco. While conducting a probation search on the subject, officers located a small baggie with a white crystalline substance suspected to be methamphetamine in his pocket. The subject was booked at Park Station.

Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—1600 block of Haight St.—03/19/2018 3:27 pm

Officers observed a known subject who had a stay away order from the area. Officers detained the subject, and a records check revealed that the subject had outstanding narcotics warrants for his arrest and a stay away order from the above listed area. The officers placed the subject in handcuffs and he was transported to Park Station.

Municipal Code Violation (General)—Area of Buena Vista Ave. /Haight St.—03/20/2018 4:29 am

Two officers in the area observed a male subject asleep in a legally parked vehicle with windows obstructed with towels and shirts to block out light. Officers made contact with the subject and advised him that he was in violation of illegal human habitation, and he was issued a citation.

Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—800 block of Stanyan St.—03/20/2018 10:37 am

An officer responded to the above location and searched for a homeless female subject that was living in the bushes in the area. Upon arrival, the officer located the subject, and it was discovered that she had an outstanding warrant for an assault with a deadly weapon. Additional officers responded to the scene to assist in arresting, and later transporting the subject to County Jail.

LIST OF CRIMES**Incidents:****Mental Health Detention—Area of McAllister St. /Lyon St.—03/15/2018 10:05 am**

Two officers were dispatched to the area regarding USF campus police that were in contact with a mentally ill female who was combative and resistive. Upon arrival, the officers assisted in detaining the subject until medics arrived. Officers spoke with the campus police who stated that they got a call in regards to a subject that was acting strange. She was uncooperative and ran through traffic in an attempt to escape. It was determined that the subject was a danger to herself and others, and was transported to SFGH for a mental health detention.

Theft from Building—1300 block of Fell St.—03/19/2018 8:14 am

Officers responded to the area regarding a report of a burglary. The officers contacted the victim who stated that two of his bicycles were stolen from his apartment garage. Officers canvassed the area for any surveillance cameras to no avail.

Aggravated Assault with Knife/Terrorist Threats—1700 block of Fulton St.—03/19/2018 7:15 pm

Officers responded to a call regarding a person with a knife. Upon arrival, officers were flagged down by the victim who stated that a suspect inside of a unit building had threatened her with a knife five inches from her face. The victim was not injured from the incident and refused medical services. Officers searched the area for the suspect with negative results.

Arson of Vehicle—Area of Fell St. /Baker St.—03/20/2018 11:10 am

Officers responded to the above listed area on a call of a bomb inside of a vehicle. Upon arrival, the officers made contact with the victim who stated that he noticed his vehicles front windshield was smashed and that there was what appeared to be burn marks on the top portion and hood of the vehicle. The incident was under further investigation.

Officers responded to the above listed area regarding a burglary report. Upon arrival, officers spoke with the victim, who stated that he saw the front gate of his apartment and garage door open. He discovered that an unknown suspect had stolen multiple items from inside of the garage. There was also a blanket that he did not own or recognize and no signs of damage to the front gate or garage door.

Officer responded to the above area regarding a burglary. Upon arrival, the officer met with the victim, who noticed that there were multiple items missing from the area. There were no witnesses or surveillance cameras in the area that may have captured the incident.

Burglary/Forcible Entry—500 block of Stanyan St.—03/21/2018 1:41 pm

Officers responded to the area on a report of a burglary that occurred by an unknown suspect. Upon arrival, officers met with the victim, who stated that his garage was broken into, and his bicycle, floor jack, and belt sander were stolen from inside. There was a video surveillance camera above the garage door that may have captured the incident.

Burglary/Unlawful Entry—400 block of Buena Vista Ave.—03/21/2018 7:44 am

Officer responded to the area regarding a residential burglary by an unknown suspect. Upon arrival, the officer made contact with the victim who stated that she discovered the front door to her residence was ajar, and her bicycle was missing from her closet. There were no signs of forced entry.

A victim walked into Park Station to report that her vehicle was broken into. The front passenger window was shattered, and her credit cards and sister's drivers' license had been stolen.

Officer responded to the above address regarding a burglary call. Upon arrival, the officer met with the victim who stated that his vehicle was broken into by an unknown suspect. Nothing appeared to be stolen.

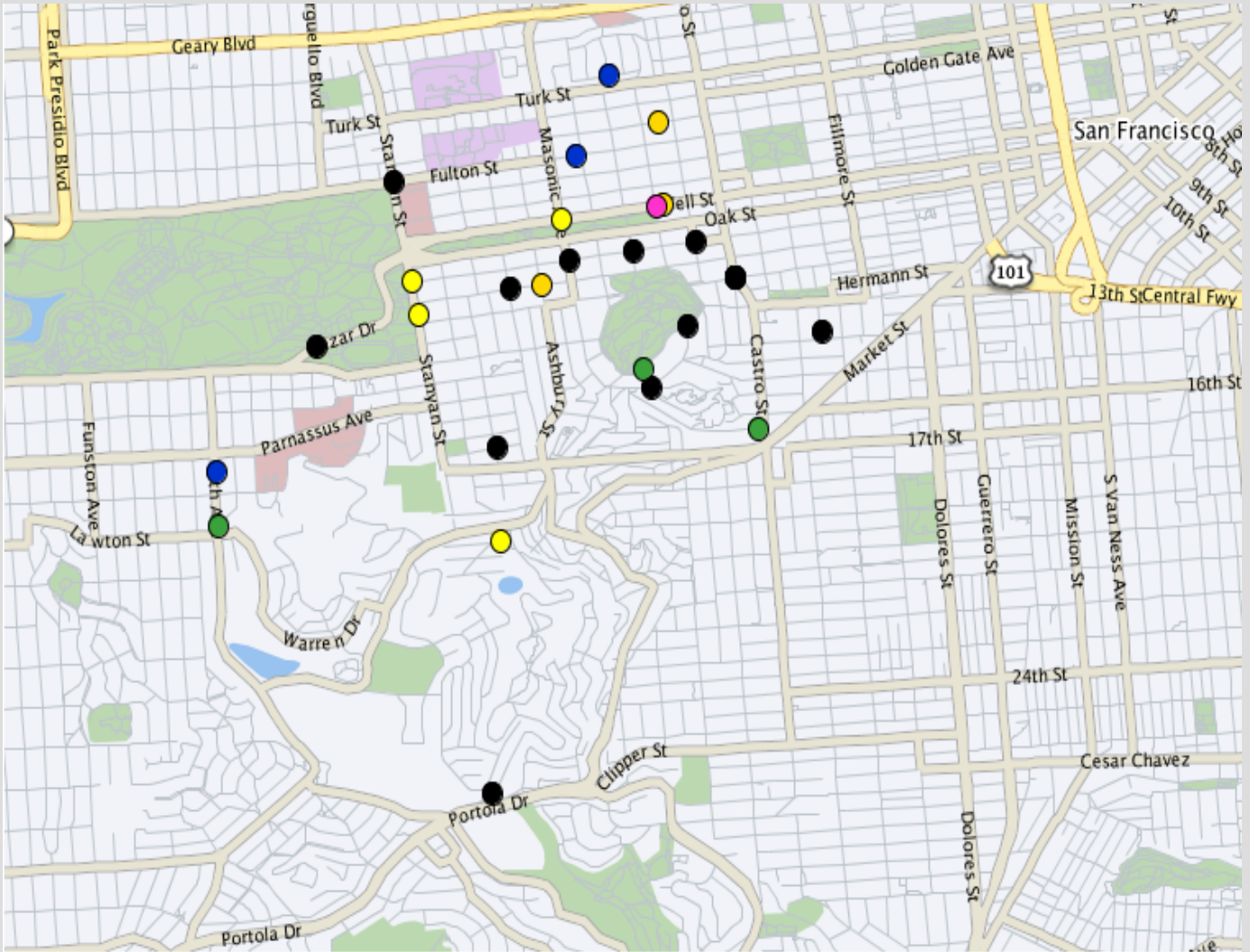
Theft from Locked Vehicle—3100 block of Geary Blvd.—03/21/2018 3:01 pm

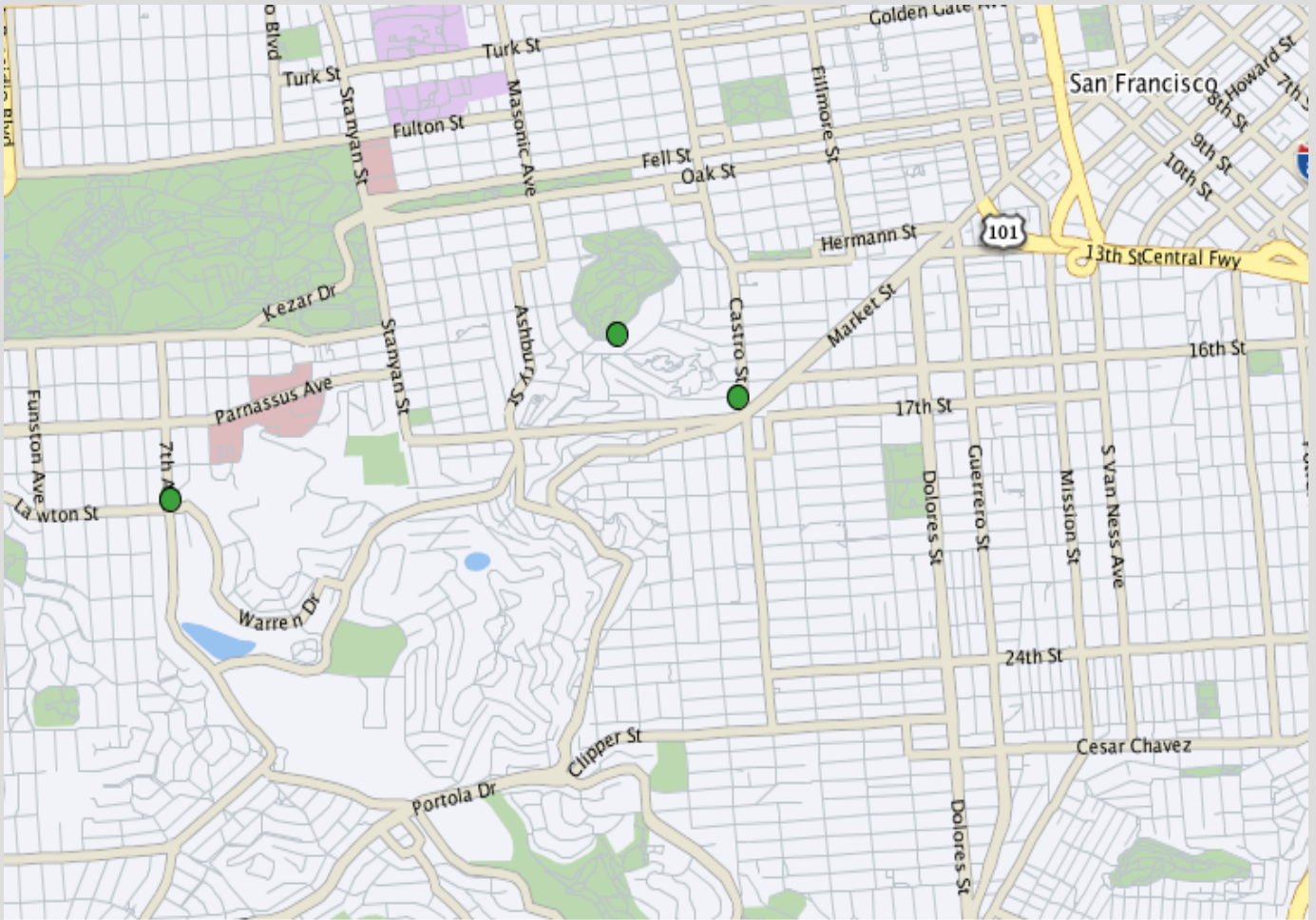

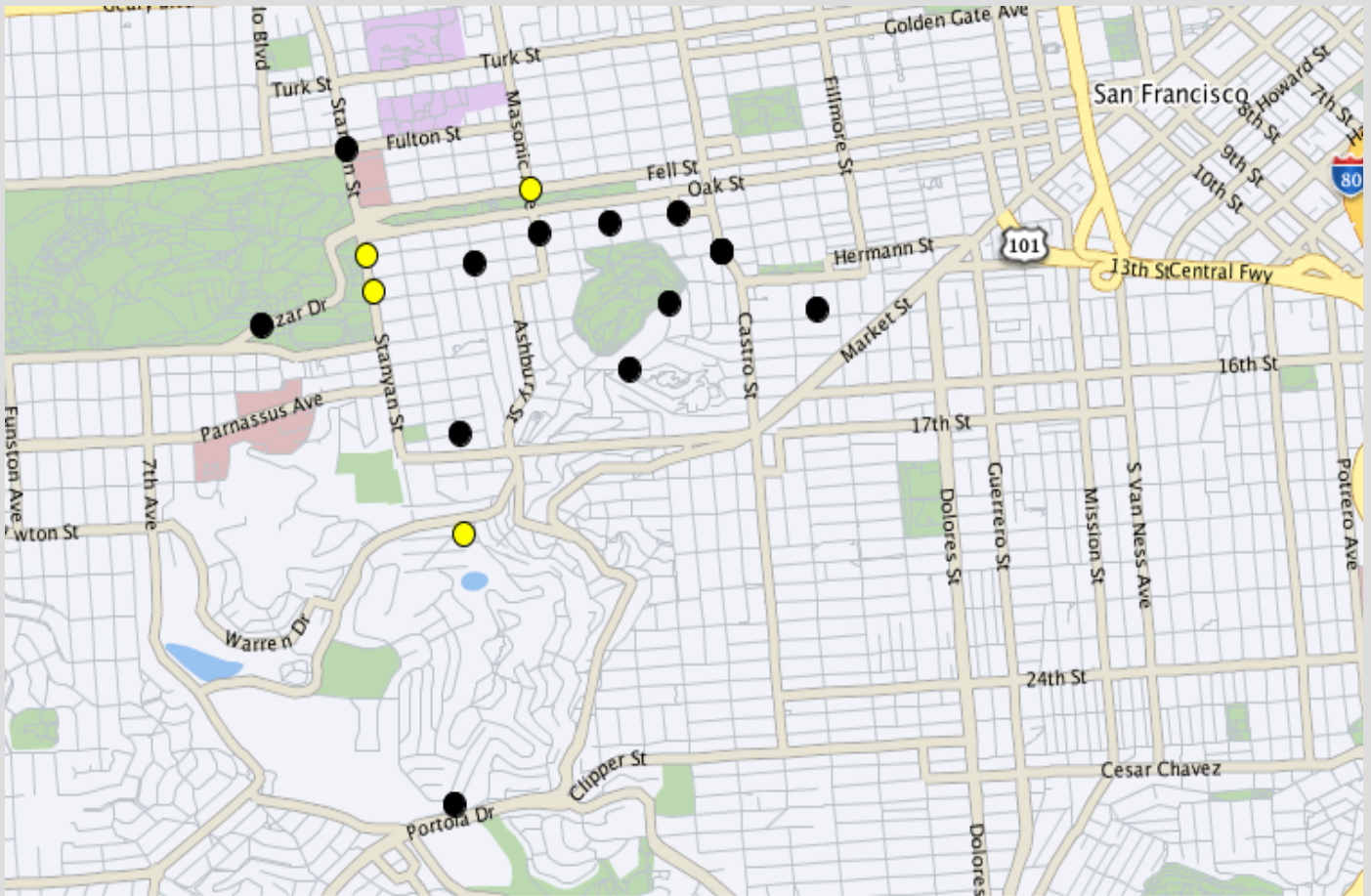

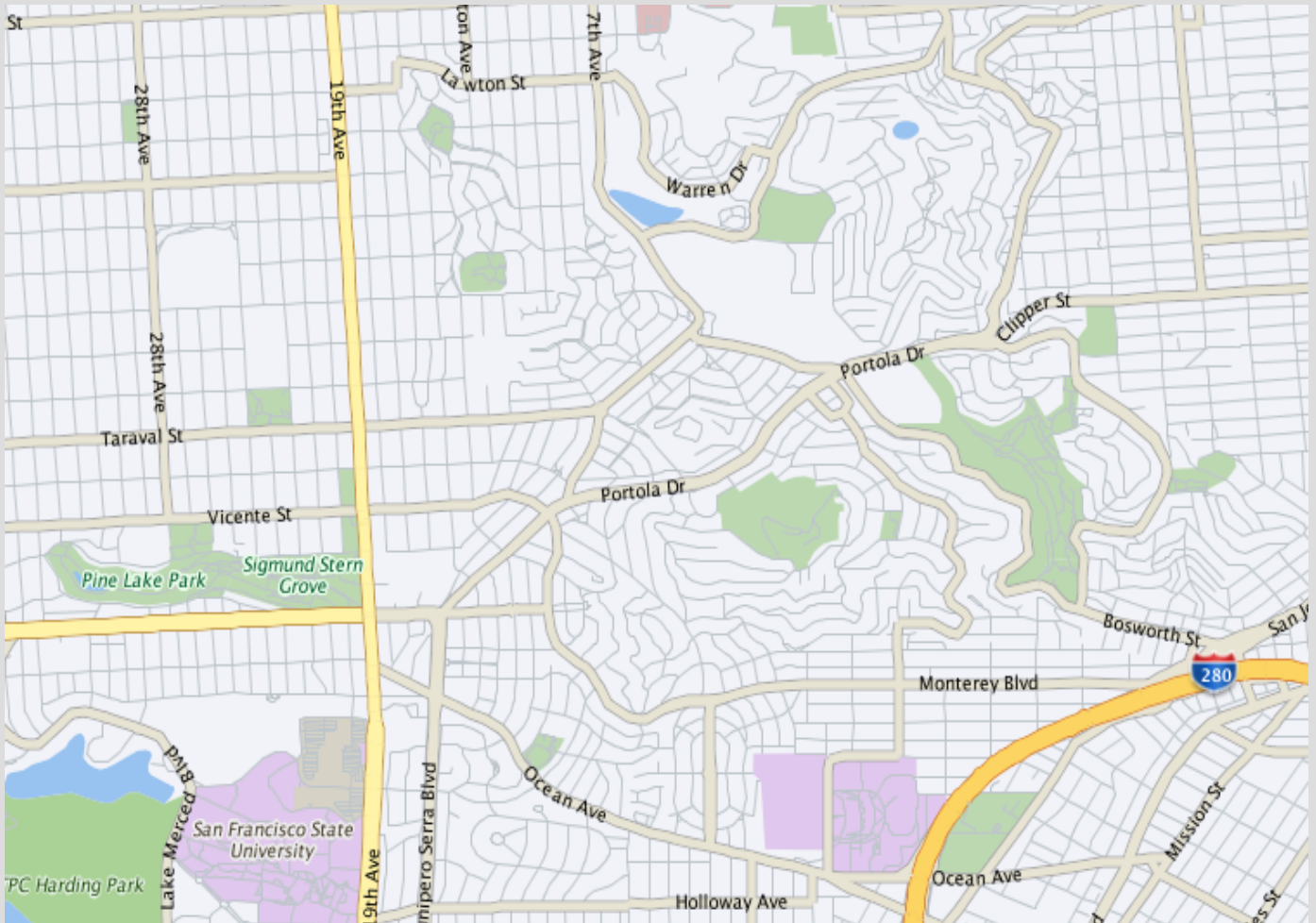

HELPFUL TIPS**DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!**

1. When placing an online or phone order, **request signed confirmation upon delivery**
2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
9. **Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep**; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

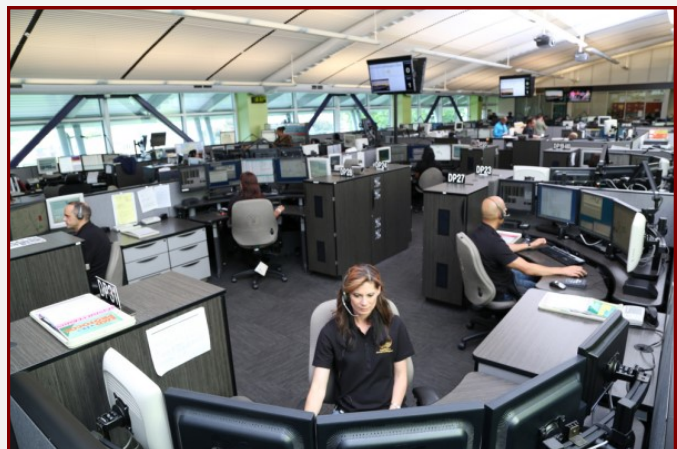
3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Please call the non- emergency dispatch line **(415-553-0123)** when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. **The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.**

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1.**

**Auto Burglaries in San Francisco Drop 31% Between
January and February 2018**

SFPD Report Shows Double-Digit Decreases in All 10 Police Districts

Data from the San Francisco Police Department's newly released February, 2018 CompStat Profile indicates significant progress in police efforts to curb vehicle burglaries in the city. The report shows that:

- Thefts from vehicles citywide decreased 31 percent in February, compared to January, 2018
- The city's ten police districts saw a decrease in auto burglaries ranging from 11 to 44 percent
- Year-to-date thefts from vehicles are down 15 percent

"The increased visibility of our officers and our efforts to educate the public through our Park Smart program are paying off," said San Francisco Police Chief William Scott. "While these numbers are encouraging, these crimes continue to impact too many residents and visitors to our city. There is still much work ahead. We will continue to use data to evaluate and adjust our strategies in order to effectively prevent and investigate auto burglaries."

San Francisco last year saw a 24 percent increase in thefts from vehicles compared to 2016. In response, the San Francisco Police Department doubled its citywide uniformed foot patrols to deter street crime and focus on neighborhood quality of life issues. Last November, the department created a General Crimes Unit to address serial residential and commercial burglaries, auto break-ins, bicycle thefts and other neighborhood property crimes. In January, 2018, SFPD command staff assigned district station officers to work directly with community members on crime trends, education and prevention strategies. Last year, San Francisco police officers booked or cited 790 people for thefts from vehicles.

What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.
