Hello all,

As you all know the 420 event is happening on Friday 4/20. The event itself takes place in Golden Gate Park in the Robin Williams Meadow. There will be a number of Street closures as a result of this event. Anyone who is in and around this area on Friday 4/20/18 between the hours of 10am and 9pm can expect traffic delays. My advice is to avoid the area and pick an alternate route to get to your destination. If you are coming to the event it would be best to use public transport.

SFPD will have an increased presence in the area in an effort to ensure the safety of all, both the residents and the attendees. The 420 event itself will happen in the park and typically when most people leave the event they go to Haight Street. There will be no open containers of alcohol allowed on Haight Street and this law will be enforced. Essentially we will be doing everything we can to ensure the safety of all.

Each year we have seen tens of thousands of people attend this event and for the most part the event is peaceful. We do not anticipate anything different happening this year. We will as always be prepared for any eventuality.

If you plan on attending the event we are providing information in this newsletter about the event including road closures, muni reroutes and what you can and cannot bring into the venue.

We are also providing information regarding the 420 hotline we will be operating between the hours of 11am and 8pm to field concerns from residents, merchants and the community pertaining to the event.

- Weapons of any kind

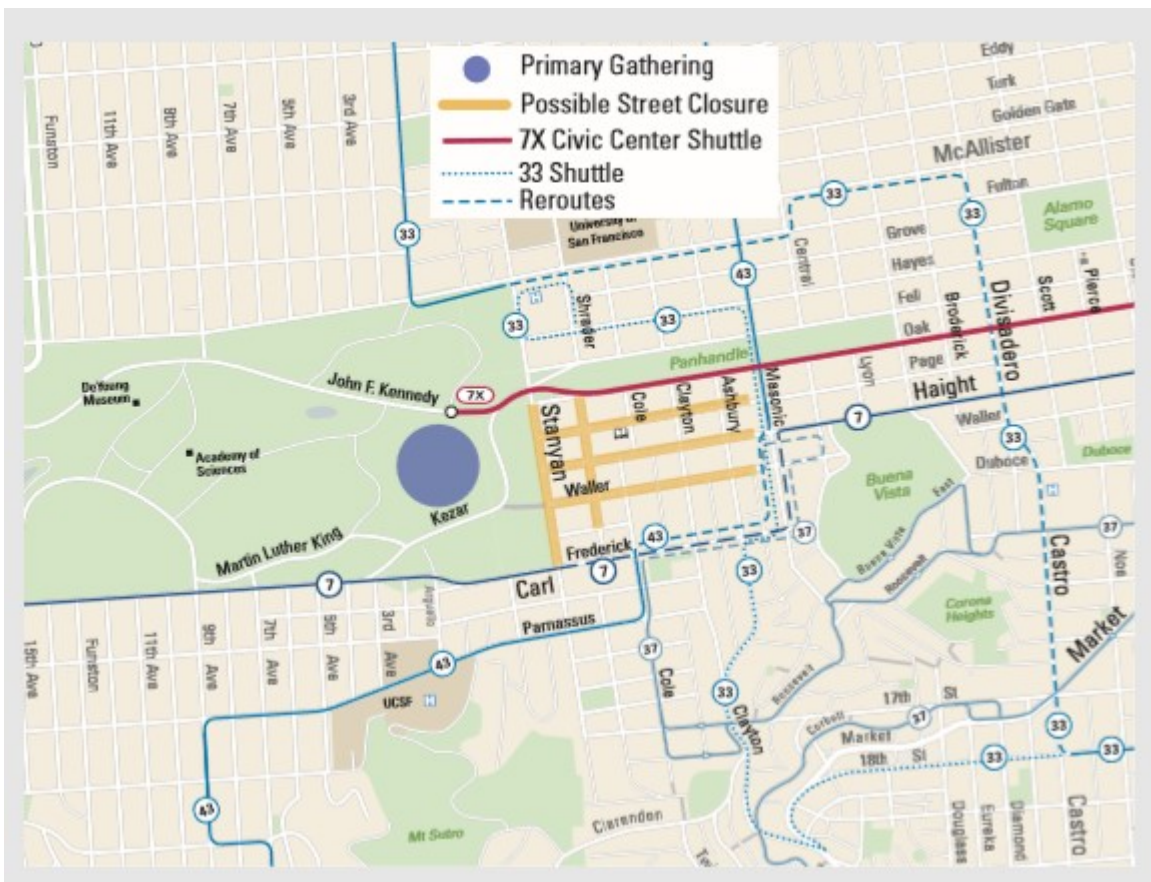

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Weekly Email Updates: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES*Definitions*

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony battery**) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

At the above location officers observed a subject sitting on the sidewalk in violation of the Sit and Lie Ordinance. A computer query check revealed that the subject had an outstanding misdemeanor warrant for driving without a license, traffic tickets, driving while under the influence, and possession of an open container while driving. Officers transported the subject to be booked at County Jail.

Malicious Mischief/Vandalism to Vehicle—1400 block of Oak St.—04/06/2018 1:28 pm

Officers responded to the area regarding an unknown female who vandalized a vehicle. Upon arrival, officers met with the victim who stated that she observed the subject walking in the area when she hit the bottom portion of the trunk door of her vehicle with a metal stick. Officers detained the female subject, recognizing her from multiple previous police contacts. Officers placed the subject into handcuffs, and she began to act erratic and bang her head against the sidewalk. Officers summoned medical aide and the subject was transported to SFGH for evaluation. The subject was cited and released for vandalism.

Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant/Trespassing—1400 block of Haight St.—04/07/2018 1:10 pm

Officers responded to the area regarding a trespasser. Upon arrival, officers entered the building and observed a female subject yell incoherent statements. Due to the subject's erratic behavior and her refusal to identify herself, officers placed her in handcuffs and detained her. Medics arrived on scene to medically assist the subject. A computer query revealed that the subject had an active misdemeanor warrant out of San Francisco for vandalism, and she was booked at San Francisco County Jail.

Driving while Under the Influence/Traffic Violation Arrest—800 block of Stanyan St.—04/09/2018 3:00 am

Officers responded to the area regarding a drunk driving vehicle collision. Upon arrival, officers conducted a Standardized Field Sobriety Test on a subject who appeared to be inebriated with an unsteady gait, bloodshot eyes, and slurred speech. Officers observed the subject perform the SFSTs unsatisfactorily, and placed him under arrest for driving while under the influence. A computer query revealed the subject to be unlicensed to operate a motor vehicle, and he was booked into County Jail for his violations.

Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant/Methamphetamine Offense/Heroin Offense—600 block of Stanyan St.—04/09/2018 4:56 pm

Officers observed a male subject riding a bicycle westbound on a southbound sidewalk. Officers detained the subject because he was in violation of riding his bicycle on the sidewalk. He was transported to Park Station for positive identification. A transport search on the subject revealed suspected marijuana located in his front pocket. A computer check revealed that the subject had an active No Bail Warrant for assault with a deadly weapon and resisting arrest by means of force or violence. An arrest search revealed a heroin pipe, marijuana pipe, and rubber ball inside of a glasses case. The subject was booked into County Jail for the violations and his active warrant.

Officers were on patrol in the area to conduct homeless outreach and perform welfare checks on homeless individuals. Both subjects declined all resources and left the area on foot without further incident.

Driving License Suspended or Revoked/Traffic Violation—04/11/2018 11:02 pm

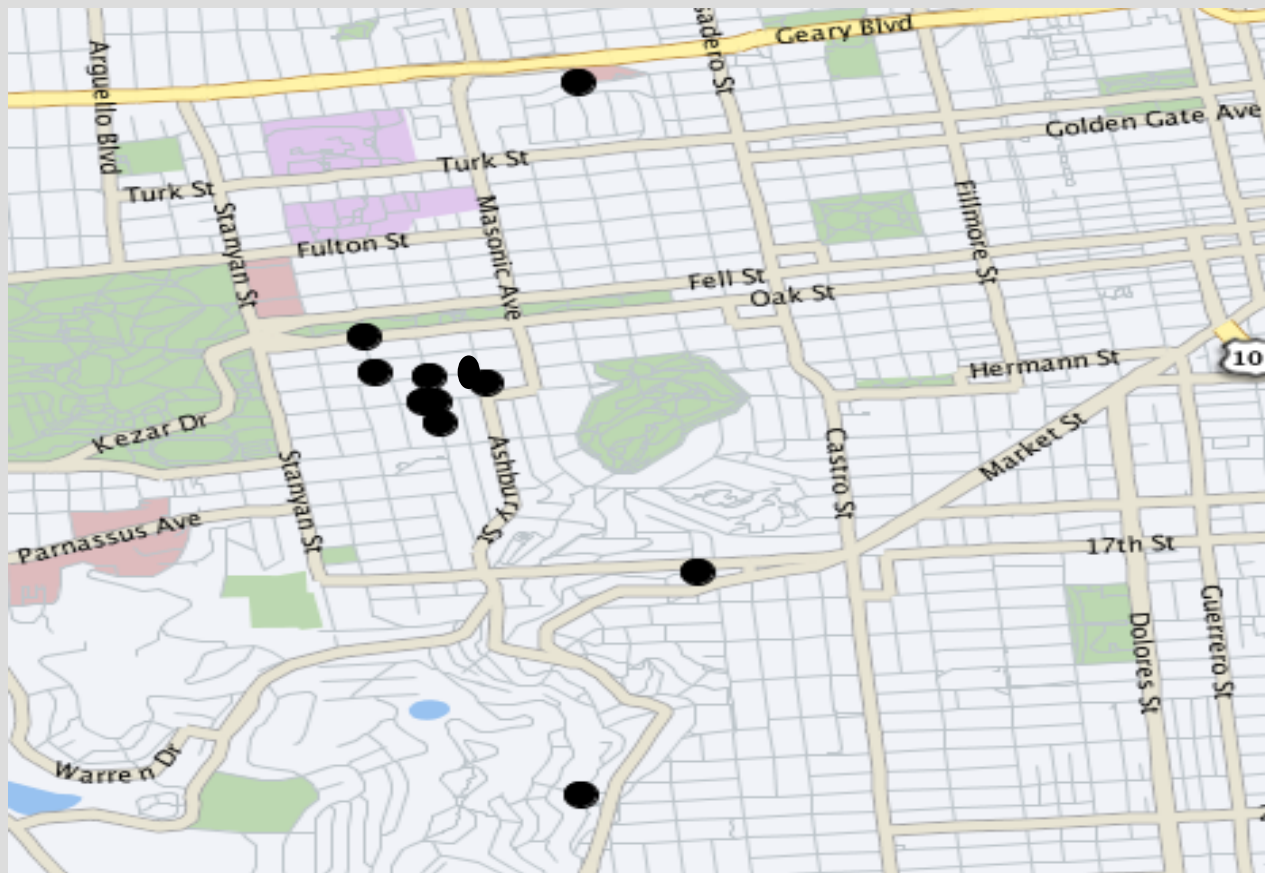

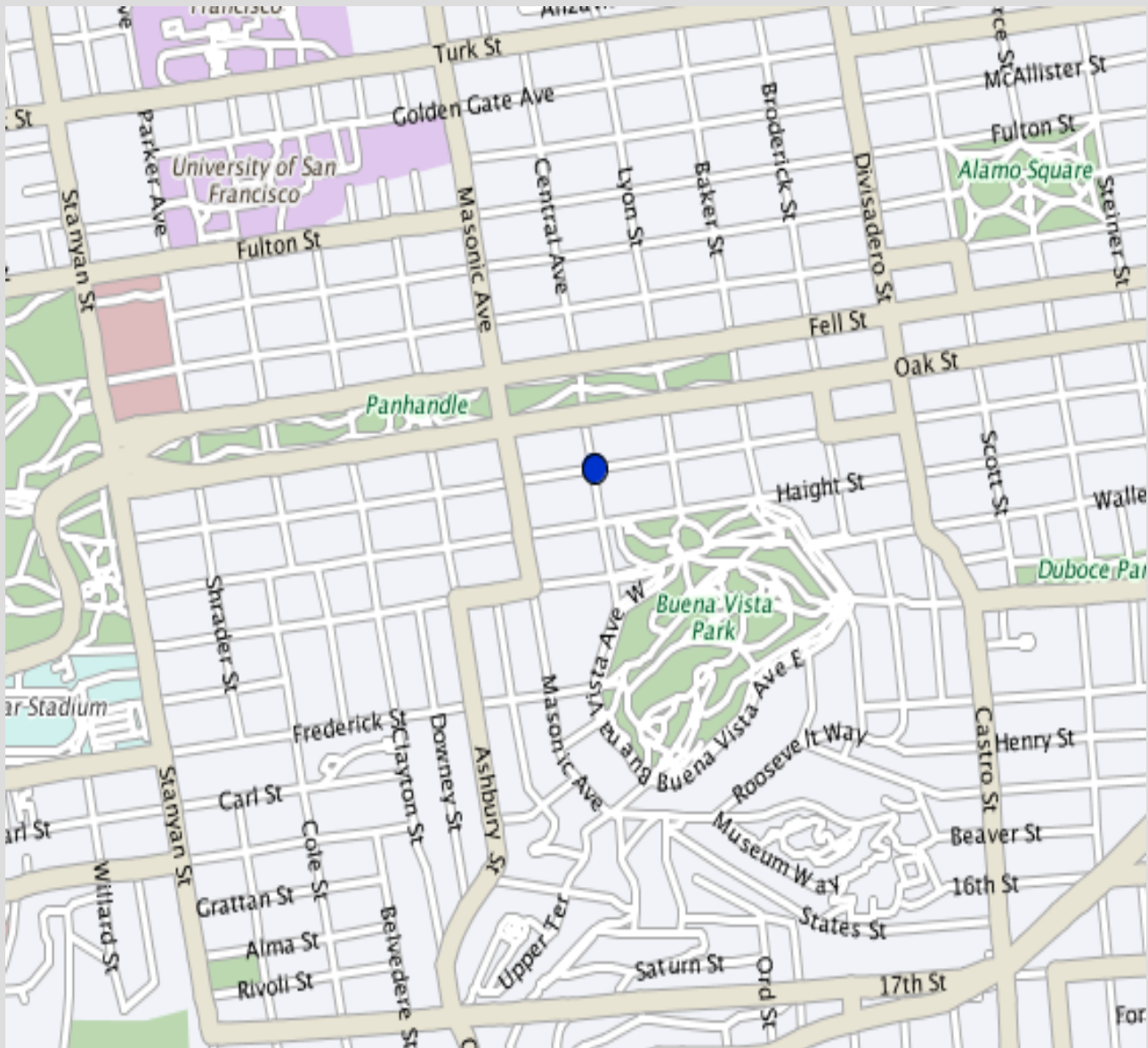


MAP OF CRIMES

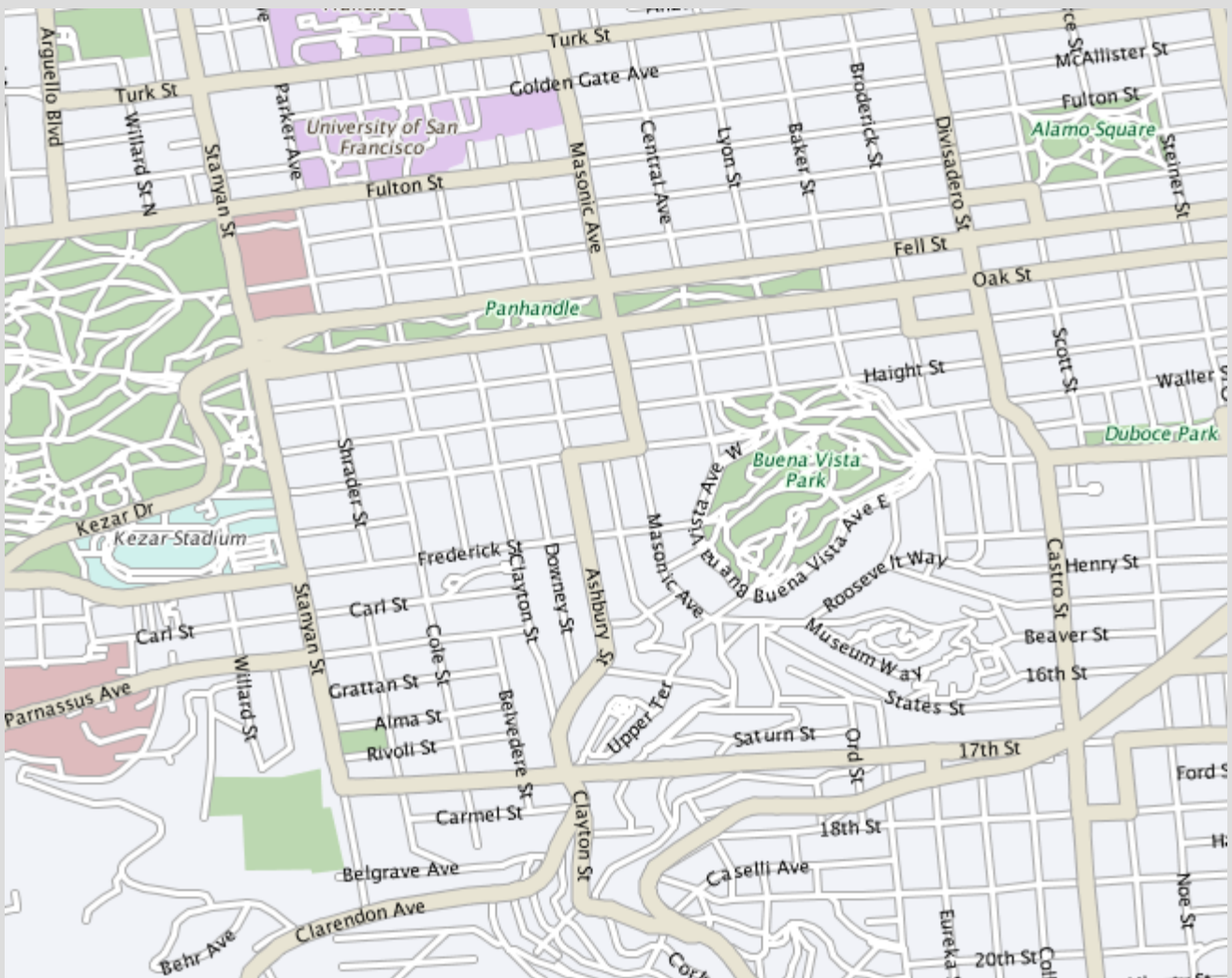

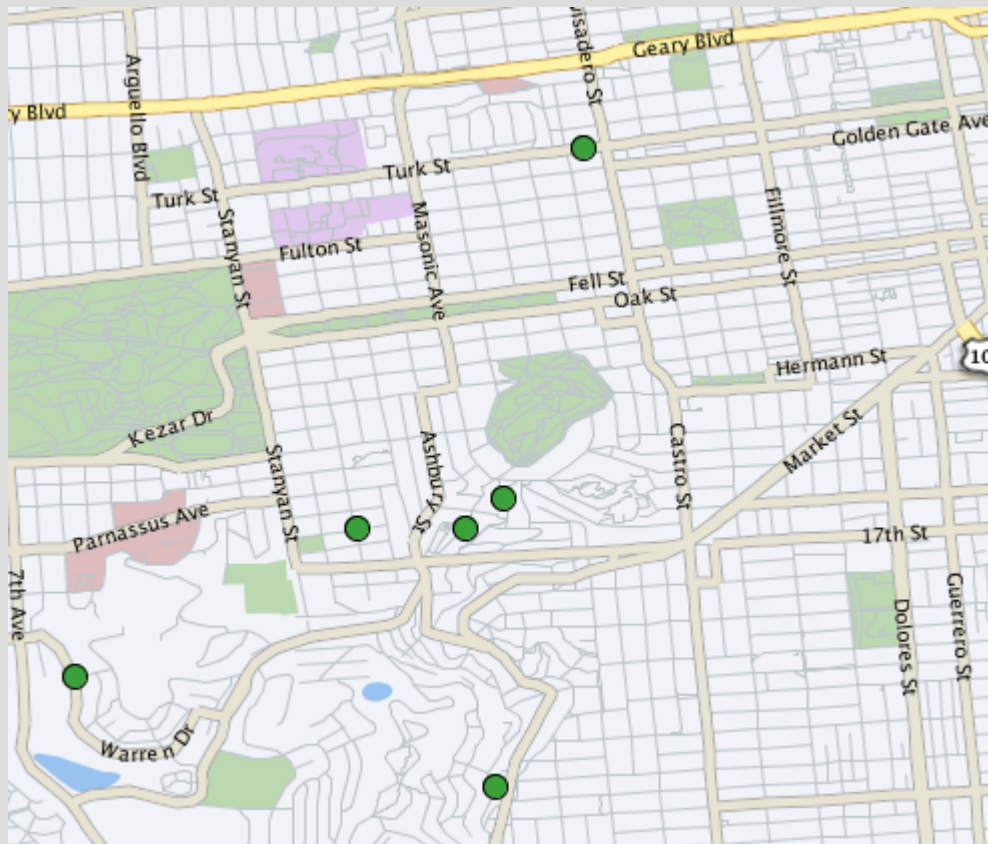

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- 1 **Garage:** When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- 2 **Car:** Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- 3 **Spare Key:** Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- 4 **Door Buzzer:** When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- 5 **Security Cameras & Alarm Systems:** Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- 6 **Light Timers:** Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- 7 **Doors/Windows:** Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

SAFETY TIP FROM S.F. SAFE



Safety tip for your home:

Help first responders by making sure your address numbers are mounted on a high-contrast background, and that they're illuminated when it's dark.

HELPFUL TIPS**DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!**

1. When placing an online or phone order, **request signed confirmation upon delivery**
2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
9. **Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep**; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

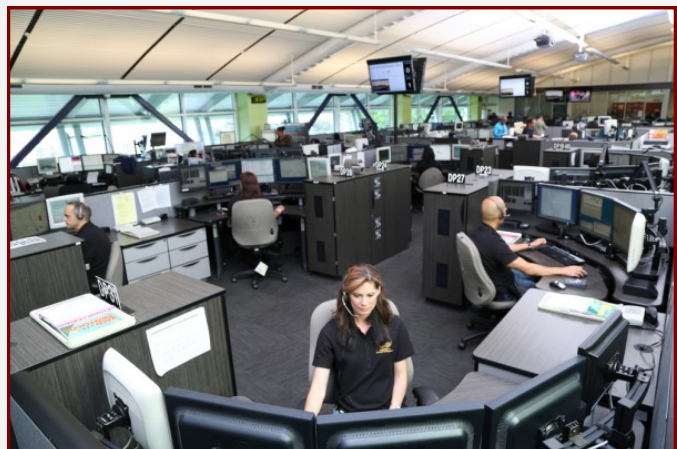
3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Please call the non- emergency dispatch line **(415-553-0123)** when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. **The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.**

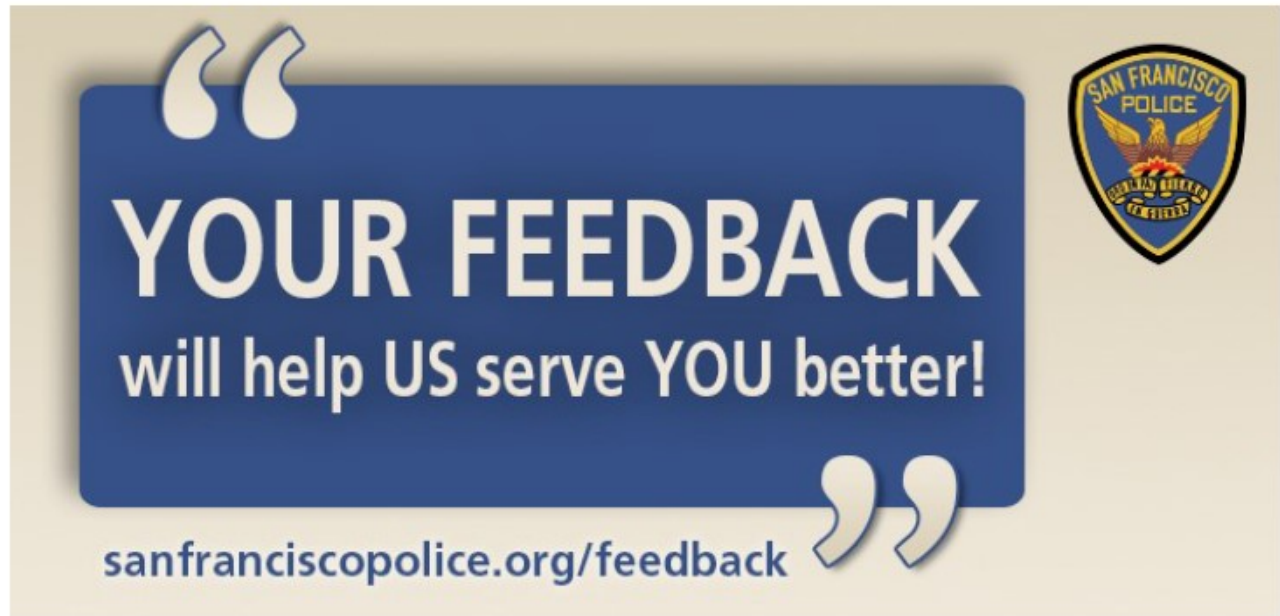
9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1.**

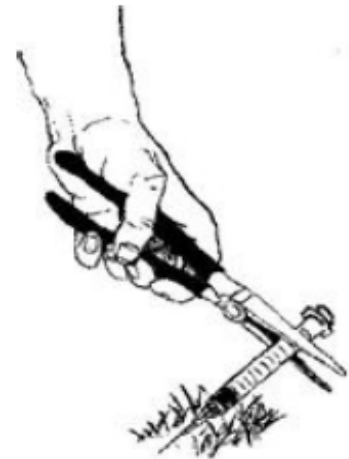

SFPD Announces Arrests in Home Burglary Series
Suspects Allegedly Stole Nearly \$3 Million in Currency, Credit Cards and Jewelry

In November of 2017, the San Francisco Police Department's newly established Burglary Unit identified a pattern of residential burglaries occurring frequently in the Bayview, Ingleside and Taraval districts. Over the course of the investigation, members of the Burglary Unit determined that as many as sixty of the residential burglaries were being committed by serial burglary crews.

During the commission of the burglaries, the crews used multiple vehicles with paper license plates and attempted to disguise their identities. The suspects gained entry to the burglarized homes by forcing their way through locked gates and breaking front and rear doors of the residences. The burglaries occurred in occupied and unoccupied homes.

Burglary Unit investigators determined that eleven firearms, hundreds of pieces of jewelry, US and foreign currency, credit cards, passports, vehicle titles and vehicle keys were stolen, valued at nearly \$3,000,000.00.

Assisted by numerous local, regional, out-of-state, and federal agencies, SFPD was able to identify nearly thirty individuals responsible for or accomplices in the burglaries. As a result, the department authored and served several search and arrest warrants over the last ninety days in San Francisco, Oakland, Antioch, Brentwood and Las Vegas.

During the serving of these warrants, nine of eleven known stolen firearms were recovered. In the search warrant served in Brentwood last week, four more firearms were recovered, including two that were stolen in separate burglaries in Fremont, CA and Reno, NV.

Investigators also recovered multiple pieces of stolen property including jewelry, passports, US and foreign currency and eight vehicles used in the burglaries.

Of the thirty individuals identified in the investigation, ten have been apprehended along with two additional individuals arrested during the search warrant served in Brentwood. SFPD continues to investigate the remaining individuals for their involvement in the burglaries.

"With these arrests, there has been a marked decrease in burglaries in the Bayview, Ingleside and Taraval districts," said San Francisco Police Chief William Scott. "Our establishment of a General Crimes Unit to focus on serial residential and commercial burglaries, auto break-ins, bicycle thefts and other neighborhood property crimes is bearing results. We will continue to pursue crime prevention and investigation strategies that will increase safety for all and help bring justice for victims of serial criminals."

The ten individuals arrested to date in this burglary series are:

- 23 year-old Demarria Conley of Antioch, charged with conspiracy, burglary, possession of stolen property, and resisting arrest
- 64 year-old Steve Levy of Oakland, charged with firearms violations
- 44 year-old Jabari Jackson of San Francisco, charged with multiple counts of possession of stolen property and vehicle theft
- 25 year-old Kelvon Watts of San Francisco, charged with assault with great bodily injury and elder abuse
- 33 year-old Marshay Goodspeed of Antioch, charged with burglary and reckless evasion

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.
