






41TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE HAIGHT - ASHBURY STREET FAIR

Throughout the day, Haight Street held approximately 80,000 people that arrived in full force to celebrate the 41th Anniversary of the Haight-Ashbury Street Fair. 

CHINESE IMMERSION SCHOOL'S WALK TO GOLDEN GATE PARK

The Chinese Immersion School (CIS) has an annual field trip for the entire school, to walk to, picnic in, and play games at Golden Gate Park. The principal of the Chinese Immersion School, Wendy Cheong, notified Captain Bailey about the annual field trip at Golden Gate Park, and requested Park Station officers to assist with an escort to and from Golden Gate Park.

On Friday, 6/1/18, Park Station officers assisted in escorting the entire student body of CIS, including staff, and guardians, one their journey originating on Waller St, from Masonic Avenue to Stanyan St., where the student body entered Golden Gate Park. At approximately 9:30 am, Park Station officers meet at CIS, and assisted the student body to Golden Gate Park. The officers returned at approximately 1:30pm, to escort the student body back to CIS. The entire escort of approximately 400 attendees, and went off without a hitch.

PARK STATION—ARREST / CITATIONS

Driving While Under the Influence/ Hit and Run—Willard St. / Frederick St.—06/07/2018 8:00 pm

Officers responded to the area for a report of a drunk driver, who was involved in several hit and run collisions. Upon arrival, officers were flagged down by several citizens, who pointed towards two individuals, who were trying to flee on foot. Officers detained both subjects and placed them under arrest for hit and run, and suspicion of driving while intoxicated. Medics arrived on scene and transported one of the subjects to SFGH. Officers later transported the driver to county jail for booking.

Vehicle Stolen and Recovered/ Vehicle Burglary—600 block of Broderick St.—06/08/2018 6:43 pm

Officers responded to the above area regarding a vehicle burglary. Officers were flagged down by the victim, who was pointing towards a subject that was fleeing the scene. Officers detained the subject and placed him under arrest for vehicle theft, tampering with a vehicle, and petty theft. The subject was later transported to County Jail, where he was booked for the above charges.

Warrant Arrest/ Local SF Warrant—Unit block of Ord Ct.—06/09/2018 9:55 am

Officers responded to the area regarding an argument between a homeless couple. Upon arrival, officers observed a male subject in a verbal argument with a female subject. Officers placed the male subject in handcuffs for safety and it was discovered that he had an active San Francisco warrant for a failure to appear. The subject was transported and booked at Park Station.

Burglary/ Unlawful Entry/ Warrant Arrest/—600 block of Parker Ave.—06/09/2018 2:15 pm

Officers were dispatched to the area regarding a subject, who was already detained by USF police for a theft from donation boxes. It was discovered that the subject had an active felony warrant for a probation violation. Officers transported the subject to Park Station.

Officers observed a vehicle with expired registration tabs, and effected a traffic stop on the vehicle. Officers made contact with the driver, who was unable to provide proof of insurance for the vehicle. It was discovered that his California driver's license was suspended. 

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- Garage: When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- Car: Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- Spare Key: Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- Open Buzzer: When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- Security Cameras & Alarm Systems: Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- Light Timers: Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows: Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- . Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?


3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Pease call the non- emergency dispatch line (415-553-0123) when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1**.

San Francisco Police Address Safety During for Pride Week 2018

The San Francisco Police Department is dedicated to making this year's Pride Week safe and enjoyable.

San Francisco's Pride Week is the largest LGBTQ celebration in the country and one of San Francisco's most popular and well-attended events. With huge crowds expected, including guests from around the world, providing safety with respect for all is our number one priority.

There will be a significant police presence during Pride activities, with both uniformed and plainclothes officers on duty to monitor public events. As with any large event, there are always safety concerns. Safety is everyone's responsibility, including participants, organizers, security staff and law enforcement.

We want to remind the public that while the Castro District is open for business, there is no organized event taking place Saturday in the Castro District. There will be no street closures. Laws prohibiting possession of open containers of alcoholic beverages and drinking in public will be strictly enforced. San Francisco and the Castro District offer a wide variety of restaurants and entertainment venues and we encourage celebrants to patronize local businesses and to celebrate responsibly.

Security measures for the Pride Festival include:

Celebrants attending the Pride festival in Civic Center will be screened by either
walk-through metal detectors or handheld "wands," and are subject to additional
searches of their person and possessions. Please allow extra time to pass
though security checkpoints. You can help reduce delays at checkpoints by
leaving unnecessary items at home.

- For more information on security screening, check out the San Francisco Pride website http://www.sfpride.org/celebration/
- Bags are discouraged. If you must bring a bag, it can be no larger than 18 inches x 18 inches. Bags are subject to search and there are no lockers for storage of oversize bags.
- Alcoholic beverages will be available for purchase inside the Civic Center venue and Pride organizers have a 100% ID check policy. No outside alcohol will be allowed into the venue and possession of open containers or consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on City streets.
- The public should expect to see a significant police presence including members
 of the Special Operations Bureau, who will be mobile in the parade and festival
 areas. The Department is also working closely with our local, state and federal
 law enforcement partners to make the events as safe as possible.

Pride participants can help avoid becoming a victim of a crime by keeping in mind the following safety tips:

- Pride is about community. Look out for each other and report any suspicious persons or activity to event staff or a police officer. A good adage is, "If you see something, say something." In an emergency, call 9-1-1. To provide an anonymous tip, call the SFPD Anonymous Tip Line at (415) 575-4444.
- Stay informed of emergencies or significant events by signing up for emergency text message alerts by texting the word PRIDESF to 888-777. AlertSF allows us to notify you of emergencies in San Francisco.

- Keep your friends close and your drinks closer. Don't accept drinks from strangers.
 Drink responsibly and don't drink and drive- always use a designated driver.
- The San Francisco Bay Area has a host of public transit options that will get you to, from and around Pride events.
- If you drive to the festivities, remember to "Park Smart!" Take your valuables with you, don't leave them inside your car.
- · Maintain possession of your cell phone, wallet and other valuables.
- There is safety in numbers. Stay with a group when on the street or leaving bars and clubs. Be cautious about leaving a bar or club with a stranger. A rule of thumb is that if you feel "unsure" about someone, rely on that instinct and do not go with that person.

"Whether you're a Bay Area native or visiting from around the world, everyone should feel safe and welcome while enjoying San Francisco's Pride events," said Police Chief William Scott. "SFPD is working closely with Pride organizers and our partner agencies to provide safety with respect for everyone joining us for this joyous celebration."
