

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach: Richmond Station Officers coordinate with city agencies to provide assistance and offer City services as needed. The Officers handle quality of life issues and find programs for willing individuals.

Foot Patrol: Richmond Station has dedicated foot patrols on Clement St., Geary Blvd, Golden Gate Park as well as the Cliff House.

Richmond Station Community Meetings: Community Meetings are held once a month for the public and residents of the Richmond District to attend. People can voice their comments or concerns about issues in the Richmond District.







Definitions

Robbery– Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault— An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery- (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

**<u>Assault</u> is when a person swings their arm and <u>battery</u> is when that arm makes contact with another person. **

Aggravated Assault—Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary– The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft– Grand Theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

INCIDENTS IN THE RICHMOND DISTRICT THIS WEEK

Assault, Aggravated, with Other Weapon 01/20/2018 1732 hrs 5300 Block of Geary Blvd.

On 01/12/2018 at 1732 hrs Officers responded to 14th Ave. & California St., regarding an aggravated assault. The victim stated he was sitting in his parked vehicle when he noticed a vehicle pull up and park behind him. The victim stated he saw an older white male exit the vehicle and go to the rear of the victim's vehicle. The victim stated he exited his vehicle and noticed the male was attempting to remove

his rear license plate. The victim took several pictures of the suspect as he was fleeing the scene. As the suspect pulled his vehicle away from the curb, he revved his engine and attempted to hit the victim. The victim jumped out of the way of the fleeing vehicle, narrowly avoiding getting hit by the suspect. The suspect hit the back of the victim's vehicle, damaging the rear end.

The suspect in this case was positively identified and through further investigation, it was determined he fre-

quented the area of Geary and Park Presidio.

On 01/20/2018 Officers responded to the above listed area to search for the suspect with negative results. As Officers were leaving the area they observed a male that matched the suspects description walking on Geary Blvd. Officers stopped and detained the male, which they positively identified as the suspect. The suspect was subsequently booked into County Jail for several felony charges.

Robbery W/ Force 01/20/2018 2253 hrs 22ND Ave. & Clement St.

Officers were flagged down at the intersection of Geary & Park Presidio, regarding a robbery that had just occurred.

The victim advised Officers he was on a bus and was being followed by two males. The victim stated he got off of the bus and noticed the two suspects were still following him. The two suspects followed the victim

and cornered him at 22nd Ave. & Clement St.

The suspects threatened the victim and demanded the victims phone. In fear for his safety, the victim handed his Samsung phone to the two male suspects.

The suspects fled S/B on 22^{nd} Ave. towards Geary Blvd. Both suspects are still outstanding.

The suspects were described as two black males, 18-25 yrs old.

Both suspects are still outstanding in this case and the investigation is still ongoing.

INCIDENTS IN THE RICHMOND DISTRICT THIS WEEK

Felony DUI; Driving on a Suspended License; Warrant Arrest 01/20/2018 0735 hrs 600 Block of 19th Ave.

Officers responded to a rollover accident at the intersection of 19th Ave. & Balboa St. Officers on scene determined there was one vehicle involved in the accident and it had hit five parked vehicles.

Both the driver and the passenger of the vehicle involved in the accident were on-scene. The passenger in the vehicle had a complaint

of pain to her right hip and right shoulder, and was transported to SFGH for further treatment.

Per witness' statements, the male at the scene was the driver of the roll-over vehicle. The male suspect admitted to using "crystal meth" that morning and he had a distinct smell of alcohol emanating from his person.

The male was taken to SFGH for treatment. A computer check of the male suspect revealed a felony want out of San Francisco and a misdemeanor warrant out of San Mateo County. The male suspect was booked for both warrants, as well as suspicion of driving under the influence of alcohol.










The above pie chart represents the time of day auto boosts occur.



Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team

(ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

- 1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
- 2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
- 3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.

Good Samaritans Come to Aid of Victim Being Strangled by Assailant

On January 14, 2018 at approximately 9:21 AM, officers from Northern Station responded to a reported battery taking place at a business on the 800 block of Turk Street. 911 dispatchers at the Department of Emergency Management advised officers that the male suspect had a female store clerk in a choke hold and then fled the scene to a building on Franklin near Eddy Street.

Upon arrival, officers were flagged down by witnesses who pointed to the suspect who was sitting on the stairs of a building on the 800 block of Franklin Street. The officers took the suspect into custody without incident. Through the course of an investigation, the officers learned that the suspect, Brian Keith Holste, age 30 of Stockton, had entered the store and grabbed the 29 year-old, female victim around the neck and began to choke her. The victim told officers that Holste had purchased an item about twenty minutes earlier and that upon returning to the store he immediately attacked her without provocation.

Witnesses told investigating officers that they saw Holste laying on the floor with the victim in a, "choke hold" as the victim was attempting to get free. The witnesses were able to get Holste to release his grip and end the attack.

Holste was booked into San Francisco County Jail on charges of aggravated assault and burglary. His booking photo and video accompanies this news release: https://vimeo.com/252245370

The SFPD commends the good Samaritans who intervened and came to the aid of the victim. Their efforts likely saved the victim from greater harm.

Types of Crime Reports That Can Be Filed Online:

- Harassing Phone Calls: When you are experiencing annoying calls with no known suspects; for example, hang-ups or heavy breathing.
- Lost Property: When property has disappeared and not stolen. If you think it could
 have been taken but you have no idea by who, you may enter the report online.
- Theft: When property is stolen but there has been no illegal entry or contact by the thief.
- Vandalism/Graffiti: The act of changing, modifying or defacing public or private property, including graffiti.
- Vehicle Burglary: When property was stolen from a vehicle.
- Vehicle Tampering: Tampering with a motor vehicle, including vandalism/graffiti of the vehicle.

Calling the Police:

Dispatchers ask questions in a particular order for a reason. It is best to stay calm and answer all questions to the best of your ability.

Complaint: Location, Hazards (ie. weapons at scene), Victim info (sex, age, condition)

Suspect Description: Gender, Race, Age, Clothing, distinguishing features

Vehicle Description: Color, Make, Model, License Plate, distinguishing features
