CITIZEN OF THE MONTH CRAIG SANO



DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is left unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME

Robbery– Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault– An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery- (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily in jury.

** Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person. **

Aggravated Assault—Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.


Burglary– The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Robbery, Warrant (Arrest) 06/06/2018 2330 Hours 7th Ave/ Cabrillo St

The suspect was seen placing items in his bag and then leaving the store passing all manned registers and not paying. The victim, store security, confronted the suspect regarding the stolen goods. The suspect then shoved the victim several times and was able to flee the store. Police arrived and located the suspect a few blocks away from the store. The stolen merchandise was recovered. The suspect was positively identified by a witness. A records check revealed the suspect had an outstanding warrant. The suspect was also in possession of several burglary tools.

The suspect was arrested and booked at County Jail One on the following charges: Robbery, Possession of Burglary Tools, Outstanding Warrant

A witness saw two suspects enter the back yard of the property and attempt to gain entry into the house by trying several doors and windows. Police arrived and detained the suspects to conduct their investigation. The suspects where positively identified by the witness.







San Francisco Police Address Safety During for Pride Week 2018

The San Francisco Police Department is dedicated to making this year's Pride Week safe and enjoyable.

San Francisco's Pride Week is the largest LGBTQ celebration in the country and one of San Francisco's most popular and well-attended events. With huge crowds expected, including guests from around the world, providing safety with respect for all is our number one priority.

There will be a significant police presence during Pride activities, with both uniformed and plainclothes officers on duty to monitor public events. As with any large event, there are always safety concerns. Safety is everyone's responsibility, including participants, organizers, security staff and law enforcement.

We want to remind the public that while the Castro District is open for business, there is no organized event taking place Saturday in the Castro District. There will be no street closures. Laws prohibiting possession of open containers of alcoholic beverages and drinking in public will be strictly enforced. San Francisco and the Castro District offer a wide variety of restaurants and entertainment venues and we encourage celebrants to patronize local businesses and to celebrate responsibly.

Security measures for the Pride Festival include:

 Celebrants attending the Pride festival in Civic Center will be screened by either walk-through metal detectors or handheld "wands," and are subject to additional searches of their person and possessions. Please allow extra time to pass though security checkpoints. You can help reduce delays at checkpoints by leaving unnecessary items at home.

- For more information on security screening, check out the San Francisco Pride website http://www.sfpride.org/celebration/
- Bags are discouraged. If you must bring a bag, it can be no larger than 18 inches x 18 inches. Bags are subject to search and there are no lockers for storage of oversize bags.
- Alcoholic beverages will be available for purchase inside the Civic Center venue and Pride organizers have a 100% ID check policy. No outside alcohol will be allowed into the venue and possession of open containers or consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on City streets.
- The public should expect to see a significant police presence including members
 of the Special Operations Bureau, who will be mobile in the parade and festival
 areas. The Department is also working closely with our local, state and federal
 law enforcement partners to make the events as safe as possible.

Pride participants can help avoid becoming a victim of a crime by keeping in mind the following safety tips:

- Pride is about community. Look out for each other and report any suspicious persons or activity to event staff or a police officer. A good adage is, "If you see something, say something." In an emergency, call 9-1-1. To provide an anonymous tip, call the SFPD Anonymous Tip Line at (415) 575-4444.
- Stay informed of emergencies or significant events by signing up for emergency text message alerts by texting the word PRIDESF to 888-777. AlertSF allows us to notify you of emergencies in San Francisco.

- Keep your friends close and your drinks closer. Don't accept drinks from strangers. Drink responsibly and don't drink and drive- always use a designated driver.
- The San Francisco Bay Area has a host of public transit options that will get you to, from and around Pride events.
- If you drive to the festivities, remember to "Park Smart!" Take your valuables with you, don't leave them inside your car.
- Maintain possession of your cell phone, wallet and other valuables.
- There is safety in numbers. Stay with a group when on the street or leaving bars and clubs. Be cautious about leaving a bar or club with a stranger. A rule of thumb is that if you feel "unsure" about someone, rely on that instinct and do not go with that person.

"Whether you're a Bay Area native or visiting from around the world, everyone should feel safe and welcome while enjoying San Francisco's Pride events," said Police Chief William Scott. "SFPD is working closely with Pride organizers and our partner agencies to provide safety with respect for everyone joining us for this joyous celebration."
