

CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE:

Hello Richmond District Residents,

Recently a family visiting San Francisco on a "Make a Wish" trip with their son had their car burglarized. A concerned citizen called the police and was able to take a photo of the get away vehicle. Officers arrived and assisted the family with the police report and detailing the items stolen. The one item the family wanted back was their son's Beats by Dre Headphones, that he had saved up for and bought during his time in cancer treatment.

The Officers told the family that the burglars often discard items they deem not valuable near the scene and they may locate their stolen items soon. The family gave them their information but didn't have high hopes. Officers located most of the stolen items shortly after and alerted the family to come to Richmond Station to retrieve the items.



DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is left unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME

Robbery– Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault– An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery- (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily in jury.

** Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person. **

Aggravated Assault—Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.


Burglary– The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

INCIDENTS IN THE RICHMOND DISTRICT THIS WEEK

DUI Arrest 08/08/18 2200 Hours Fulton St./25th Ave

The victim was driving west on Fulton St. when the suspect suddenly veered across the double yellow line and entered the opposing lane of traffic striking the victim vehicle head on. Officers arrived and conducted Field Sobriety Tests and determined the suspect was driving under the influence. Further investigation revealed several open containers of alcohol in the vehicle and the suspect was already on probation for a prior DUI. The victim and the suspect where transported to the hospital with injuries sustained in the collision.

The suspect was placed under arrest and booked at County Jail on the following charges (once released from the hospital): Driving Under the Influence Causing Injury, Driving Under the Influence while on DUI Probation, Driving Across a Double Yellow Line, Unsafe Speed.

Controlled Substance Possession for Sale, Warrant Arrest 08/12/18 1610 Hours 31st Ave/ Fulton St

Officers responded to a call regarding persons smoking Marijuana in a vehicle. A records check of the suspect in the drivers seat revealed he had an outstanding warrant for his arrest. A subsequent search of the vehicle revealed a scale, baggies, assorted pills, a white powder, and large amounts of cash.

The suspect was placed under arrest and booked at County Jail on the following charges: Controlled Substance Possession for Sale, Warrant.







The San Francisco Police Department Marks its 169th Birthday

Today, August 13th, marks the one-hundred sixty-ninth birthday of the San Francisco Police Department.

At its founding in 1849, the SFPD consisted of a small force of 35 members. The chief, an assistant, three sergeants and 30 officers comprised the first regular metropolitan police department in San Francisco.

Today, the SFPD has grown to a modern urban police force consisting of five bureaus, including the San Francisco International Airport, whose sworn and civilian members are dedicated to providing safety with respect to all.

The shoulder patch on the SFPD uniform bears the motto, "Oro en Paz, Fierro en Guerra," "Gold in peace, Iron in war." This motto reflects what it means to be a San Francisco police officer.

Gold in peace; a public servant, shinning brilliantly as members of the communities we serve.

Iron in war; resilient Guardians possessing the skills and courage, putting others' wellbeing above our own.

As we celebrate the 169th birthday of our Department, we pay tribute to those who serve today, to those who came before us and we remember our fallen heroes whose names are inscribed on the perpetual wall of honor. We take great pride in our legacy and in the fine men and women who will carry our mission, be it yesterday, today, and well into the future.

San Francisco Police Seek Public's Help to Solve 2006 Cold Case Homicide

San Francisco Police Homicide Inspectors are seeking assistance in solving the 2006 murder of Aubrey Abrakasa.

On August 14, 2006 at 3:14 PM, the 17 year-old student was shot multiple times and killed at the intersection of Grove and Baker Streets.

Aubrey's mother Paulette Brown has been a tireless advocate for her son and for the families of other murder victims. On **Tuesday, August 14, 2018 at 3 PM**, Ms. Brown will be at **Grove and Baker Streets** handing out fliers and available to speak to the media. A member of the SFPD Homicide Detail and Media Relations staff will be available to the press as well.

San Francisco Police Investigators Seek the Public's Assistance in Solving Bayview District Shooting

On Monday, August 13, 2018 at approximately 12:17 PM, San Francisco police officers from Bayview Station responded to a shooting on the 100 block of Kiska Road. Upon arrival they located the victim, a 43 year-old San Francisco resident, just across the street from a youth center. The victim was suffering from gunshot wounds and officers rendered aid until relieved by SFFD paramedics.

The victim, who is an employee of the City's Street Violence Intervention Program (SVIP), was transported to the hospital where he is listed in life-threatening condition.

The SVIP focuses on outreach and crisis response for youth-related street violence.


