Captain Jack Hart's Message

Gratitude, Gratitude, Gratitude for this month of Thanksgiving.

Take a minute right now and write a text message to express your gratitude to someone. (We'll wait.)

Congratulations! Not only did you give a dose of life-renewing DHEA/Oxytocin to the person you wrote, you gave one to yourself—you literally just extended your life and created goodness in the world. Well done!

Why is this so important?

Dr. Stephen R. Covey stated that there are four dimensions that, when properly nourished, create a "whole" person: physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual. In Habit 7 of The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People, we are reminded that we must constantly be in a state of renewal in these four dimensions. The greatest drain on us is when the emotional dimension is out of balance. We can run a marathon (physical), read a book (mental), or miss a goal (spiritual) and recover pretty quickly from the fatigue and loss, but emotional harm is quite different.

Place a check mark next to each time you experienced one of these emotions (from The HeartMath Institute's "Depletion to Renewal Grid") in the past week:

Anger	Excitement
Frustration	Courage
Anxiety	Passion
Impatience	Contentment
Withdrawal	Appreciation
Resentment	Dignity

According to the HeartMath Institute, these toxic emotions in the left column release specific stress hormones (like cortisol) which lead to reduced muscle mass, impaired mental function, diminished performance, brain cell death, impaired memory, and accelerated aging). Renewing emotions in the right-hand column facilitate energetic coordination of your sympathetic and parasympathetic systems which regenerate your system and offset drain.

In this month of Thanksgiving, let's be ambassadors of courage, nobility, love, and hope. Let's express our gratitude all month, so that we build resilience in ourselves and connection within our homes, our blocks, our neighborhood, our community, and our city.

Featured Ingleside Community Member of the Month

Glen Park Residents: Minji, John and Jeremy



On October 22nd, 2018, a package thief with an extensive theft-related criminal history decided to visit the 2600-block of Diamond and the unit-block of Natick. Unbeknownst to the suspect, there were high-resolution cameras facing these two doorways and captured the face, clothing, and description of the suspect. Two neighbors, separated by 3 blocks (which is like a lifetime away in most neighborhoods) connected on NextDoor and began to put the pieces together; they realized that the same suspect committed both crimes. They shared this information on NextDoor with their neighbors, and the collaboration began.

Minji activated the power of her connected neighborhood's email group, described the situation, and asked for the neighborhood to check their cameras. Jeremy, around the corner from Natick, located video footage of a suspicious vehicle seen on the block at the exact time that the crime occurred. He submitted this information to Minji who added it to the NextDoor post. The resolution of the camera was so clear, that we were able to obtain the license plate number. John and Minji, at the urging of other neighbors, made sure that Captain Hart was "in the know," by emailing him the details from next-door and links to the camera footage.

Captain Hart then ran a computer check, which led the police to the suspect's address in the Bayview/Hunter's Point. Ingleside officers from the Ingleside Property Crimes Unit responded, located the suspect's vehicle depicted in the video, observed Minji's stolen Pokemon Pikachu halloween costume in plain view on the back seat of the car, and arrested the driver (and suspect from the videos). During the search, Minji's additional stolen property was later located in the car. Based upon the foregoing, Captain Hart and his team obtained a search warrant. During a search of the suspect's residence, we located John's stolen property (with the Nordstrom Rack tags still attached) and the clothes that the suspect wore during the commission of these crimes.

These members of the Glen Park neighborhood represent the best of what San Francisco has to offer: collaborative, connected, empowered, and resilient neighbors who look out for each other, care deeply about their neighborhood, and then are willing to do what they can to help each other out during times of stress.

I want to take a moment and commend Minji, John and Jeremy for being amazing neighbors. You all served your families, your neighbors, your community, and your city very well

Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.

San Francisco Police Department Prompts Shoppers To Park Smart During The Holidays

Reminder Comes as Auto Burglaries Continue to Decrease, Arrests Rise

The San Francisco Police Department today reminded shoppers to take simple steps to protect their purchases this holiday season, while announcing a 16 percent year-to-date decrease in auto burglaries citywide.

The decrease comes after the SFPD took significant steps to address auto burglaries by increasing plainclothes teams and doubling uniformed foot patrols, expanding investigative resources at district stations, creating a General Crimes Unit to address serial auto burglars, identifying and focusing on burglary hot spots, and increasing training for fingerprinting.

"Addressing the spike in car break-ins has been one of my top priorities since my time on the Board of Supervisors," said Mayor London N. Breed. "I am excited that our targeted awareness and enforcement campaigns are steadily addressing this issue, and I want to thank Chief Scott and the SFPD for their continued efforts to keep our neighborhoods safe for residents and visitors."

In the first 10 months of 2018, San Francisco police officers booked or cited 331 people for auto burglaries, a 31 percent increase over total bookings and citations for 2017.

"We're seeing consistent and significant progress in our efforts to stop auto break-ins," said San Francisco Police Chief William Scott. "But we recognize that too many San Francisco residents, workers and visitors continue to be impacted by these crimes. Our officers will have increased visibility during the upcoming holidays to combat street crimes. By remembering to Park Smart this holiday season, shoppers can help us prevent auto burglaries."

The Park Smart campaign is a collaboration between SFPD, the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency, the Department of Emergency Management, SF Safe, community benefit districts and local tourism and travel partners. The campaign includes signage, posters and other messaging materials placed in garages and on street signs and buses; postcards distributed by police cadets; and social media messages circulated online to raise public awareness about auto burglary prevention.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Tenderloin District Homicide

On November 14, 2018, at 10:24 PM San Francisco Police officers responded to a second floor office on the 1000 block of Market Street regarding a possible deceased person. Upon arrival, the officers found the victim, 52 year-old San Francisco resident, Bart Kylstra laying on the ground suffering from multiple injuries to his head. San Francisco Fire Department paramedics responded and rendered aid, but unfortunately Kylstra succumbed to his injuries.

Investigators from the San Francisco Police Department Homicide detail began an investigation that quickly led to the identity of the suspect. On November 15, 2018 at approximately 5:45 AM, SFPD investigators responded to Richmond, California where they arrested 28 year-old Richmond resident, Kuk Kim.

Following an interview, Kim was booked into San Francisco County Jail for the following charges: homicide, robbery, burglary, possession of stolen property and assault with deadly weapon. Due to pending identification matters, the subject's photo will not be released at this time.

Although there has been an arrest made, investigators are asking anyone with information on this case to contact the San Francisco Police anonymously at (415) 575-4444 or text-a-tip to TIP411 and begin the text message with SFPD.

For example, they patrol districts to prevent and detect crime; respond to calls for assistance; conduct criminal investigations; interact with the community to build cooperation and support; pursue and arrest suspects; enforce traffic and parking laws; write reports and maintain records; work with superiors, peers, and others as a team; prepare for and participate in planned events; prepare for court and give testimony; and fulfill other administrative duties when required. This is much more than a job; it is an opportunity to build a career of which you can be proud.
