Sgt Lloyd Martin



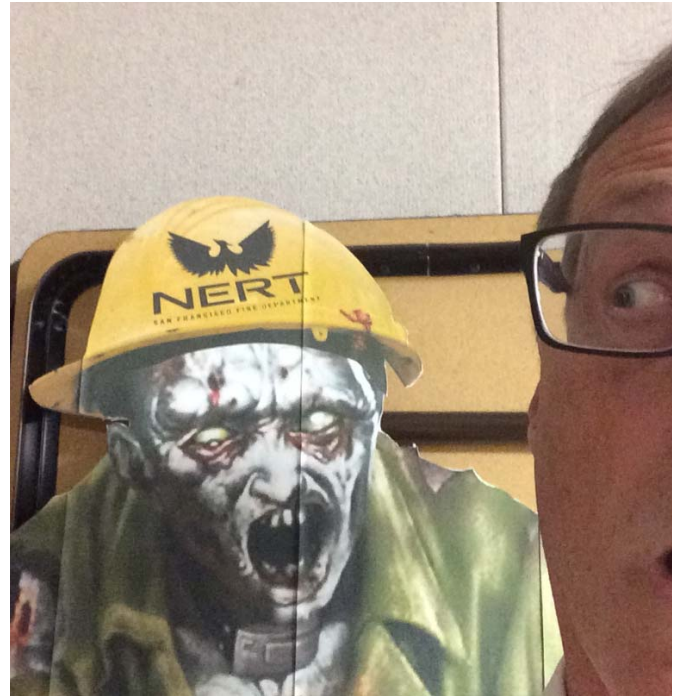
Featured Officer of the Month for December, 2018: Sgt. Lloyd Martin.

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.

San Francisco Police Department Opens Portsmouth Square “Drop-In” Center

*Location Will Help Connect More Chinatown Community Members
with Bilingual Police Officers*

The San Francisco Police Department today announced the opening of a new “drop-in” center in the City’s Chinatown neighborhood to address community members’ needs and safety issues. Bilingual foot patrol officers will be available to residents Wednesdays and Fridays from 4:30PM to 6:00PM in the Portsmouth Square clubhouse.

“When our police have strong ties to our diverse, multilingual communities, people are more likely to feel comfortable working with our officers to ensure public safety in San Francisco,” said Mayor London N. Breed. “The new drop-in center is an extension of our efforts to connect with people where they live and work, and to do so in a culturally competent way.”

The drop-in center is part of SFPD’s ongoing outreach to multilingual communities to identify and address specific safety concerns. SFPD currently has over 490 officers that speak more than 30 different languages. The department is encouraging all bilingual officers to become certified to provide Limited English Proficiency (LEP) services to community members.

“The more points of contact that we can provide our residents, the more we can work together to solve problems,” said SFPD Chief William Scott. “We want to increase officers’ presence and visibility in our neighborhoods, particularly where limited English-speaking communities may underreport crimes or feel hesitant to contact our officers through traditional reporting methods.”

Portsmouth Square is operated by the San Francisco Recreation and Parks Department. The clubhouse, located on Washington Street at Walter Lum Place, is managed by Self-Help for the Elderly, which began serving seniors in the Chinatown community in 1966.

“Our community has always underreported crimes,” said Anni Chung, Executive Director for Self-Help for the Elderly. “We worked very hard to get more bilingual officers to the Central Station so that there’s a chance of building a relationship and rapport with the people that live and work in the Chinatown community. The community will enjoy having the drop-in center.”

“Portsmouth Square was the first public square in San Francisco and is often referred to as Chinatown’s living room,” said San Francisco Recreation & Parks General Manager Phil Ginsburg. “Being able to access multilingual help in the heart of the community is essential. As Rec and Parks plans improvements to this historic plaza, seniors and families can feel confident in gathering safely while building relationships with neighborhood officers.”

District Supervisor Aaron Peskin also will hold monthly office hours at the clubhouse location. Specific dates and times will be determined and announced through his office.

“The Chinatown community has long prioritized a public safety strategy that consists of culturally competent foot patrols and direct relationships with neighborhood police,” said Supervisor Peskin. “The new drop-in center builds on the work that we have done over the years to cultivate these relationships in the community, in recognition of the vital role that peace officers have in addressing everything from safety concerns and youth mentorship to health services and wellness referrals.”

San Francisco Safety Awareness For Everyone (SF SAFE), a nonprofit dedicated to creating a safer San Francisco, will also be onsite during drop-in hours to assist community members with translation services, crime prevention strategies, educational information and other public safety-centric outreach.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Financial District Arson

On November 12, 2018 at approximately 10:20 PM, San Francisco police officers assigned to Central Police Station responded to a report of an arson fire at a business on the 100 block of Kearny Street. Upon arrival, officers met units from the San Francisco Fire Department who were on scene and had already extinguished two fires. Officers began an investigation and documented fire damage to the front door of a retail business and a nearby newsstand on the corner of Kearny and Sutter Streets.

Members of the San Francisco Arson Task Force continued the investigation and identified the suspect. A crime alert was issued and on November 20, 2018 at approximately 9:20 AM, officers from Central Station located the suspect on the 200 block of Grant Street and took him into custody. Ricard Anderson, a 77 year-old San Francisco resident, was booked into San Francisco County Jail on arson charges and for failing to register as a sex offender. His booking photo accompanies this news release.

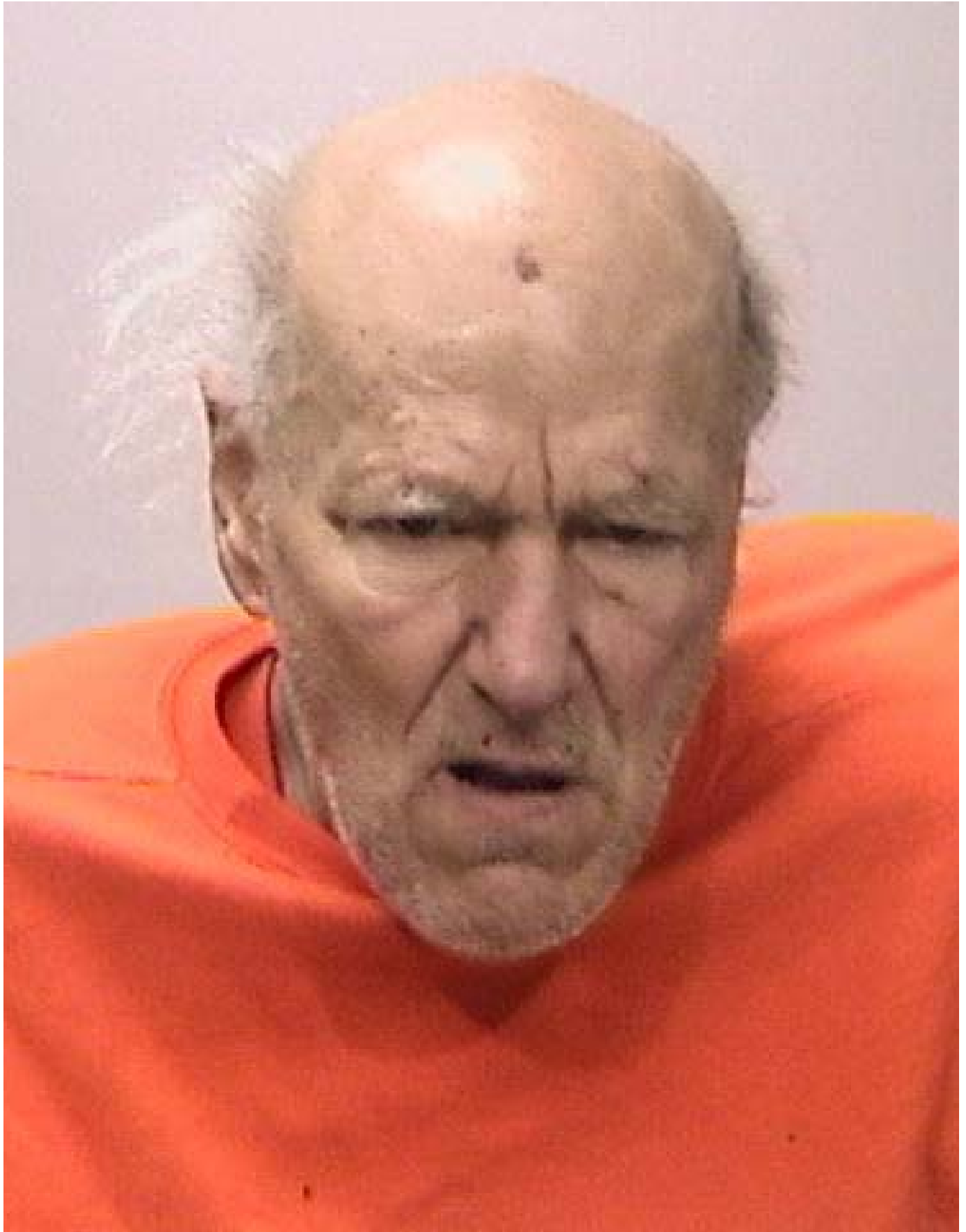

New Report Highlights Effectiveness Of SFPD Foot Patrols

Study Finds Foot Patrol Strategy Led to "Significant Decline" in Assaults and Thefts

A new study conducted by the California Policy Lab and researchers at the University of California, Berkeley reports a "significant" drop in assaults and thefts in San Francisco after the San Francisco Police Department doubled its foot patrols last year to address crime throughout the City.

"Having officers walking the streets helps prevent crime and allows the police to form relationships with the people they serve," said Mayor London Breed. "The data backs up the results we have seen on the ground, which is why I included funding in the budget so we can train more officers and why we continue to increase foot patrols."

In September 2017, the SFPD reassigned approximately 70 officers who had previously been working primarily in plainclothes investigative and special duty assignments to citywide uniformed foot patrol beats. The reassignments were in part a response to a rise in larceny theft (including vehicle break-ins) in San Francisco.

The California Policy Lab study found the increased SFPD foot patrol routes resulted in a significant reduction in larceny theft and assaults across the city and 10 police station districts:

- A 16.9 percent decline in larceny theft
- A 19.1 percent reduction in assaults
- The greatest reductions in larceny theft were in the Ingleside, Mission, Northern and Richmond police districts
- The greatest reductions in assault were in the Bayview, Central and Mission police districts

SFPD in November expanded foot patrols in the Mid-Market area by nearly 50 percent, assigning a total of 43 personnel to increase public safety in the heavily trafficked corridor.

“Our foot patrol strategy is based upon deterrence and engagement with the community and would-be criminals,” said Police Chief William Scott. “The data from this study supports our approach and shows that the greater number of visible, uniformed officers we are able to bring to our public spaces, the greater the benefit to public safety.”

The increased foot patrols are central to SFPD’s Strategic Plan 1.0. Key components of the plan include improving responsiveness to the public and measuring and communicating the effectiveness of safety strategies.

“The study suggests that a greater visible police presence helped reduce thefts and assaults in San Francisco in the two months following redeployment,” said Evan White, Executive Director of the California Policy Lab. “These improvements in public safety are distinct from trends in prior years, and suggest the Police’s redeployment made a difference.”

Findings from the report were presented November 30th at the *Policing Innovation and Reform: Making the Vision a Reality* conference in Los Angeles, California. San Francisco Police Arrest Suspect for Package Thefts

On Monday, October 22nd, 2018 at approximately 2:15 PM, a resident on the unit block of Natick Street in the Glen Park neighborhood reported to police that packages shipped to her home were stolen from the front door of her house. Video from the victim's home surveillance camera showed the suspect push open a metal exterior gate leading to an enclosed area, take the packages and then flee the scene. (Images from this surveillance video are attached to this news release.)

The victim logged onto a social media platform and discovered that a neighbor three blocks away on the 2600 block of Diamond Street had posted a photo of a suspect who stole a package from his porch minutes after the Natick Street theft. The Natick Street victim saw that the Diamond Street suspect matched the description of the suspect who stole her packages. In both thefts, the suspect wore a black T-shirt with distinct yellow cursive writing.

The Natick Street victim emailed her neighborhood group, requesting any video depicting the theft at her home. A neighbor on Chenery Street provided surveillance video, which captured images of the suspect and a vehicle.

Based on surveillance video provided by the victims and the neighborhood witness, Ingleside Station police officers were able to identify the suspect. On Tuesday, October 23, 2018 at approximately 12:33 PM in area of 2500 Aurelius Walker Drive, officers arrested 32 year-old San Francisco resident Antoinette Redus and recovered the stolen property.

Ingleside Station officers worked with the San Francisco District Attorney's Office neighborhood prosecutor in charging the case. On November 29, 2018 Redus pleaded guilty and was convicted of second degree burglary. Redus' booking photo accompanies this news release.

The officers' hard work and focus on a swift response to these crimes led to the arrest of the suspect in less than 24 hours. The successful conviction was enabled by the collaboration between police, prosecutors and the community, along with the victims' use of social media to communicate, and empower themselves.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Ingleside District Homicide

On December 1st, 2018 at approximately 9:45 PM, San Francisco Police officers responded to Geneva Avenue and Mission Street in the Ingleside district regarding a stabbing. The officers found two injured victims and located a witness who stated that a third victim was loaded into a vehicle and driven away. The victim, 16 year-old Josue David Mejia Sanchez, was dropped off at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital (ZSFGH) suffering from a stab wound to his neck. Unfortunately, Sanchez succumbed to his injuries.

San Francisco Police Department Homicide investigators commenced an investigation that led to the identity of the suspect. On December 3rd, 2018, at approximately 6:00 PM, Homicide Investigators located and arrested 38 year-old San Francisco resident, Sergio Rocha at ZSFGH while he was being treated for an injury. After being interviewed, Rocha was booked in absentia on the charge of homicide. Due to pending identification matters, the subject's booking photo will not be released at this time.

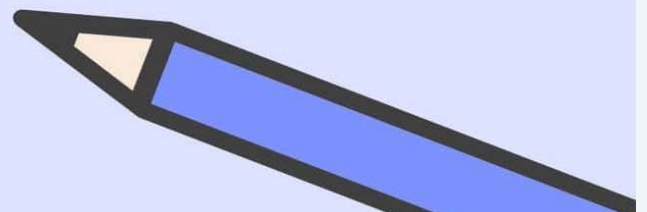
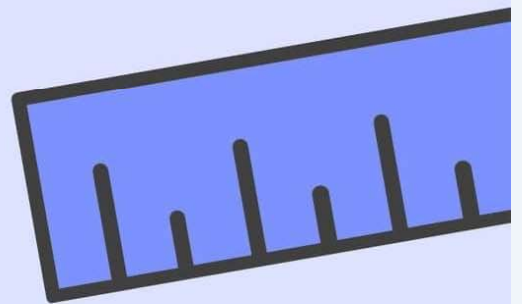



San Francisco Police Department Prompts Shoppers To Park Smart During The Holidays

Reminder Comes as Auto Burglaries Continue to Decrease, Arrests Rise

The San Francisco Police Department today reminded shoppers to take simple steps to protect their purchases this holiday season, while announcing a 16 percent year-to-date decrease in auto burglaries citywide.

The decrease comes after the SFPD took significant steps to address auto burglaries by increasing plainclothes teams and doubling uniformed foot patrols, expanding investigative resources at district stations, creating a General Crimes Unit to address serial auto burglars, identifying and focusing on burglary hot spots, and increasing training for fingerprinting.

"Addressing the spike in car break-ins has been one of my top priorities since my time on the Board of Supervisors," said Mayor London N. Breed. "I am excited that our targeted awareness and enforcement campaigns are steadily addressing this issue, and I want to thank Chief Scott and the SFPD for their continued efforts to keep our neighborhoods safe for residents and visitors."

In the first 10 months of 2018, San Francisco police officers booked or cited 331 people for auto burglaries, a 31 percent increase over total bookings and citations for 2017.

"We're seeing consistent and significant progress in our efforts to stop auto break-ins," said San Francisco Police Chief William Scott. "But we recognize that too many San Francisco residents, workers and visitors continue to be impacted by these crimes. Our officers will have increased visibility during the upcoming holidays to combat street crimes. By remembering to Park Smart this holiday season, shoppers can help us prevent auto burglaries."

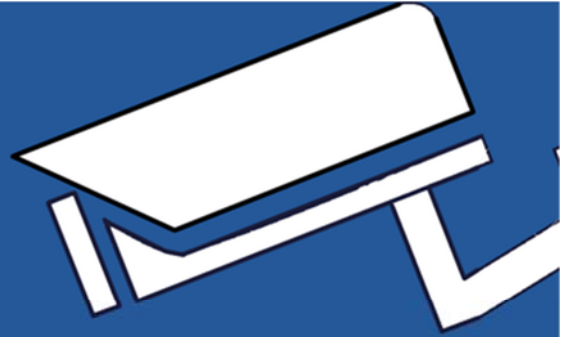
