Robbery

Convenience store clerks called police after noticing three men, who had previously shoplifted items from the store, entering the facility. The three proceeded to take several items from the shelves and attempt to leave. Dog Bite

Ingleside Officer Ramirez responded to a report of a dog bite. Both owners who had their dogs leashed at the time of the attack told Officer Ramirez that the dogs greeted each other normally on the sidewalk and when they started separating one dog suddenly attacked the other dog biting it several times. What's more, when the officers approached her vehicle, she was drinking from a bottle of Hennessy liquor. Out of the car, she was unable to perform even the simplest sobriety tests. Stolen Auto

Neighbors called police about two suspicious men, carrying a gas can and ringing doorbells on several homes in the area. Citizens relayed the description of the car along with its license plate. Ingleside Officers George and Scott were first to arrive just as dispatch notified them that the suspect's vehicle, an Infinity, had been reported stolen earlier. The officers found the Infinity nearby and, along with Lt. McEachern, attempted to stop the car. But instead of stopping, the Infinity's driver took off at a high rate of speed only to crash head-on into a power pole at Harvard and Bacon Streets. Lt. McEachern positioned his car at the back of the stolen car preventing his escape. The officers ordered the suspect out of the car but he wouldn't comply. Instead, he placed the car in reverse and pushed the accelerator pedal to the floor spinning the wheels while producing clouds of tire smoke. The officers ordered the suspect to stop and exit the car numerous times and he refused each request. The suspect was pepper sprayed, which didn't faze him enough to stop resisting. Finally, after using non-lethal weapons, the suspect was removed from the vehicle and arrested. He was unlicensed and had a long record of numerous arrests and convictions for car theft and other crimes. Report number: 190133252

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.

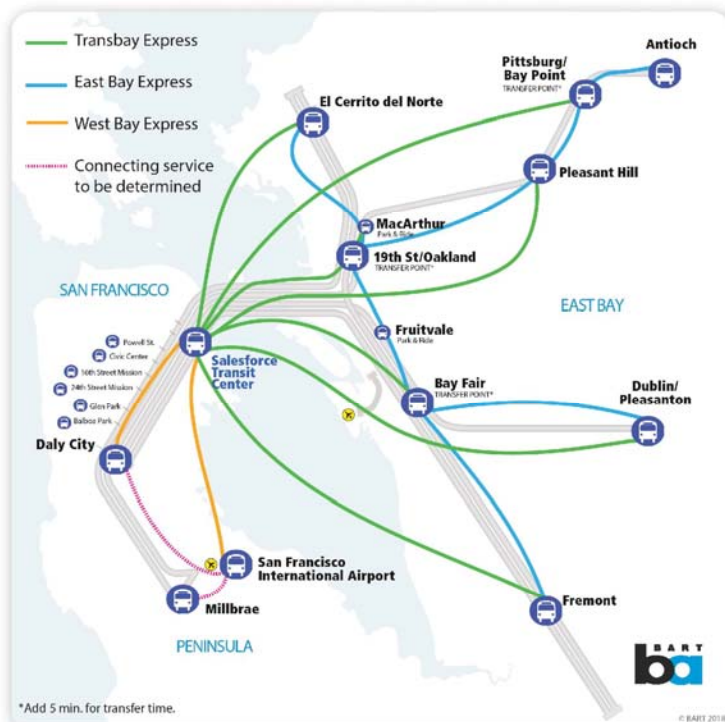
Early Bird EXPRESS

Starting on February 11, 2019, morning weekday BART trains will start one hour later for vital repairs and critical earthquake safety work. Alternative bus service will run between 3:45 am and 6:00 am.

Roughly 2,900 passengers enter the BART system during that first hour of service. Over 2,400 of those riders begin their trips in the East Bay with 64% disembarking at downtown San Francisco stations.

First hour BART riders surveyed during extensive outreach in the Spring of 2018 guided the development of a robust alternative bus service plan between the 4:00 am - 5:00 am window.

The alternative service plan creates 14 new express bus lines that will run from 3:45 am until 6:00 am. This includes 7 Transbay bus routes, 5 East Bay routes and 2 San Francisco/Peninsula routes. BART is partnering with 8 Bay Area bus agencies to operate this network. All fares between express bus stops will be the same as, or less than, current BART fares for the same trips. Train service will start at approximately 5 am. Check the schedule at www.bart.gov.



BART trains will start running an hour later each weekday at 5:00 am, beginning on February 11, 2019, so that a vital retrofit of the Transbay Tube and other necessary system upgrades can be performed.

To install the steel lining and make other systemwide upgrades, our crews will need extra time to be in the trackway overnight. Opening an hour later will speed up these projects by at least 25% and provide a minimum 12% cost savings.

Parking Options

Because BART stations won't open until 5 am, current parking payment methods will not be available for Early Bird Express riders. There will be two options to allow these riders to continue to pay for parking. The first is the Pay by Smart Phone App. BART will launch the new single sign-on app this fall with the parking payment feature expected to be available for early morning parkers only between 3:45 am and 5:15 am beginning February 2019.

For those who prefer to pay by cash, day passes will be available for advance purchase by mail or at the Lake Merritt and Embarcadero Clipper Card Office customer service centers.

What Work is Being Done?

The Transbay Tube is made up of a giant concrete liner and an outer steel shell. To address concerns of flooding in the Tube, BART crews will install an inner steel lining designed to minimize leakage in the event of a very large earthquake on the Hayward or San Andreas faults. Workers will also upgrade the water pumping system to allow more time to safely evacuate riders and make necessary repairs if a large quake causes damage. Upgrades to other vital parts of the system will also be made to ensure safe and reliable service.



How Long will the Later Weekday Start Time Last?

We anticipate the Transbay Tube retrofit work will last approximately 3.5 years.

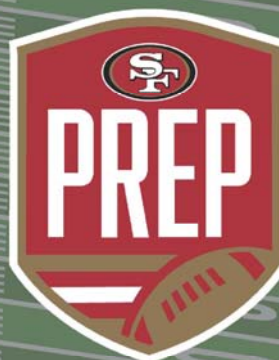

SFPD Tenderloin Station Arrests Fifty Individuals In Fugitive Recovery Operation

On February 20, 2019 San Francisco Police Department's Tenderloin Station conducted a five-hour fugitive recovery operation that led to the arrest of 50 individuals wanted on warrants for crimes including burglary, aggravated assault and drug dealing.

The operation is a component of SFPD's ongoing strategy to make San Francisco's Tenderloin and downtown districts safer and improve the quality of life for people who live and work in these neighborhoods. That strategy includes increased foot beats and undercover operations to address criminal activity.

In Wednesday's operation,

- 38 of the 50 individuals arrested are fugitives
- 12 individuals are wanted in outside jurisdictions that include Petaluma, San Mateo County, Berkeley, Colma and Walnut Creek
- 12 individuals received new charges as a result of the operation, including violating court orders and possession of weapons
- 8 individuals are parolees arrested for either having warrants or violating the conditions of their parole

"The officers of Tenderloin Station are committed to strategic enforcement designed to decrease crime and the fear of crime in the neighborhoods we serve," said Tenderloin Station Captain Carl Fabbri. "We are grateful for the close relationship we share with our Tenderloin community. Their trust and support for our officers make it possible to carry out these successful operations."

San Francisco Police Make Arrests in Ingleside and Bayview Robberies

On Friday, February 8, 2019 at approximately 9:20AM San Francisco police officers from Ingleside District responded to the 200 block of Russia Street for a report of a robbery. Officers met with the female victim who told police that a male suspect took her bag, which had been slung over her shoulder. The victim said that the suspect fled in a red vehicle.

On Friday, February 8, 2019 at approximately 9:24AM officers from Bayview District responded to the intersection of Princeton Street and Silver Avenue for a report of a robbery. Officers met with the female victim who told officers that a male suspect took her purse, which had been slung over her shoulder.

Later that day at approximately 12:19PM officers from Ingleside District responded to 500 Raymond Avenue for a report of a robbery that occurred on the 200 block of Sawyer Street. The female victim told officers that a suspect ran up behind her and pulled her backpack off her back, causing her to fall to the ground. She was treated and released at the scene for non-life threatening injuries.

While officers were interviewing the victim of the robbery from Sawyer Street, an off-duty San Francisco police officer was traveling behind a red vehicle. An occupant threw a backpack out of the vehicle. The backpack was later recovered by police. The off-duty officer contacted Ingleside Station by phone and requested assistance. Plain clothes officers from Ingleside Station located a vehicle that matched the description of the vehicle used in the robberies. The vehicle was also reported stolen out of Oakland. Officers made contact with the occupants of the vehicle in a parking lot on Rey Street and detained them without incident.

Through the course of the investigation officers located stolen items from all of the robberies in the suspects' possession.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Mission Bank Robbery

On Friday, February 22, 2019 at approximately 12:33PM San Francisco Police Officers responded to the 2000 block of Mission Street for a report of a bank robbery. Officers spoke with a bank teller who said that the suspect approached her window and demanded money. The suspect simulated a handgun. Fearing for her safety, the teller provided the suspect with U.S. currency. The suspect then fled the bank on foot.

Officers spoke with a security guard who said the suspect ran into a nearby business. The security guard walked the officers to that location and pointed out the suspect. 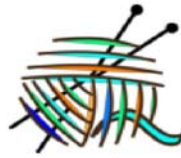

San Francisco Superior Court is seeking volunteers for the Civil Grand Jury. The Civil Grand Jury is the “watchdog” for the City and County of San Francisco. The Civil Grand Jury investigates the operations of City government, including officials, departments, and agencies. Each year, the Civil Grand Jury issues reports based on its findings. Those reports are heard before the Board of Supervisors.

The Civil Grand Jury will serve from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020. The application deadline is May 17, 2019.

Eligibility Requirements:

- 18 years of age or older and a United States citizen.
- San Francisco resident for at least the past 12 months.
- Able to commit time consistently throughout the term.
- Desire to work together with other committed San Franciscans.

SAN FRANCISCO CIVIL GRAND JURY FACT SHEET AND SELECTION TIMELINE

What is the Civil Grand Jury?

- As required by the California Constitution, the Civil Grand Jury is a “watchdog” that investigates the operations of the City and County government, including its officers, departments, and agencies.
- The Civil Grand Jury is 19 members randomly drawn from a pool of applicants who volunteer to serve for a one year term.

How does it Work?

- Each Civil Grand Jury determines, by majority vote, which issues related to the government of the City and County of San Francisco to investigate. Typically, the Jury divides itself into committees, which carry out the investigations and write the reports.
- To do the investigations and write its reports, Civil Grand Jurors review records and financial documents; interview City and County department heads, elected officials, and staff; and visit government facilities. The entire Jury must vote to approve reports.
- After the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court reviews the reports to ensure they meet legal requirements, the reports are issued. The affected departments are required by law to respond to each finding and recommendation contained in the reports.
- The Board of Supervisors holds a public hearing on each report. The Civil Grand Jury presents the report, and each affected department responds. The Board of Supervisors then issues its own response.

When?

- The entire Civil Grand Jury meets once per week, generally in the late afternoon. Subcommittees meet as needed. Most of the Jury’s work takes place during regular business hours.
- Jurors must be able to serve the entire term, from July 1 through June 30. Jurors must be able to commit time consistently throughout the term.

Who is Eligible?

- In order to volunteer to be considered for the Civil Grand Jury, you must be a United States citizen; at least 18 years of age; have lived in San Francisco for at least the past one year; have no felony convictions; and have the ability to communicate in English.

How do I Apply?

- Applications may be downloaded from <http://civilgrandjury.sfgov.org/join.html>, or you may pick one up at San Francisco Superior Court, 400 McAllister Street, Room 007. The application deadline is on May 17, 2019.
- The most qualified applicants will be invited to attend a mandatory informational session on May 21 or May 30, 2019.
- Selection by a panel of Superior Court Judges will be held on June 7, 2019.
- The 2019 – 2020 Civil Grand Jury will be trained on June 10, 17, 18, and 24, 2019.
- The 2019 – 2020 Civil Grand Jury takes office on July 1, 2019.

HOW TO REPORT GRAFFITI VANDALISM



The SFPD has learned that there are 5 major categories of graffiti which include:

- Communicative graffiti; Written to convey one's point of view. Often political.
- Hate crime graffiti. Written to instill fear with in real or perceived protected classes of people.
- Artistic graffiti. A character or nonverbal symbol often written repeatedly by an individual.
- Tagger graffiti. A written name or moniker repeatedly written by the same person or tagger. These pieces of graffiti are referred to as tags or graffiti tags.
- Gang graffiti. Written to mark gang territory. Written to create fear and intimidation toward rival gang members. Written to promote a gang or set of a gang.

Of these five different types of graffiti we know that the main source of graffiti vandalism in San Francisco is tagger graffiti. Exposing a graffiti taggers graffiti tag or moniker is a key to stopping them from committing more graffiti crimes.

The following steps should be taken when reporting graffiti crimes in progress:

- Call 911
- Pay particular attention to the Suspect's description and where they wrote their graffiti
- Follow up with the Officers and be ready to provide a statement and identify any detained person(s)
- If applicable provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

The following steps should be made when reporting cold graffiti cases with supporting evidence:

- Call (415)553-0123
- Provide full Suspect description or any other key details
- If applicable provide surveillance video
- Provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

The following steps should be made when reporting cases with less supporting evidence:

- Report online at <http://sanfranciscopolice.org/reportS>
- Include photos of the graffiti which can be uploaded through the report writing system
- Provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

To report graffiti on public property us the SF311 app.

The following Steps should be made to deter graffiti vandalism:

- Paint over graffiti quickly. If taggers know that their work won't last they are more likely to move to another location
- Use ample lighting. Taggers often use the cover of darkness to keep from being detected
- Set up surveillance cameras. Their presence act as a deterrent and they are useful in helping to identify taggers with prior arrests

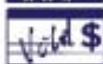

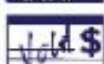

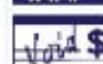
