

Ingleside Captain's Message

Every year, March is designated as Women's History Month. What started as a local celebration in Santa Rosa, evolved into a national month-long celebration of women's contributions to history, culture, and society. President Jimmy Carter remarked in March of 1980: "From the first settlers who came to our shores, from the first American Indian families who befriended them, men and women have worked together to build this nation. Too often the women were unsung and sometimes their contributions went unnoticed. But the achievements, leadership, courage, strength, and love of the women who built America were as vital as that of the men whose names we know so well." Arizona Senator Martha McSally is one such woman of great significance that we should honor this month.

Sen. Martha McSally spent 26 years in the military embodying Carter's virtues of leadership, courage, and strength by becoming the first female Air Force fighter pilot to fly in combat and the first woman to command a fighter squadron. On March 6th, 2019, at a Senate hearing on the military's efforts to prevent sexual assaults and improve the response (from failed leadership) when they occur, Senator Martha McSally spoke of her experiences in leadership this way: "Command is the most impactful duty one can have directly on the lives of service men and women and their families. I was greatly privileged to prepare and then lead my amazing airmen in combat, which is the apex responsibility of any warrior/leader. Military commanders...are not like CEO's, or managers, or any other supervisor; they have a moral responsibility which includes readiness and war-fighting skills, but demands that they cultivate, protect, and enrich a culture of teamwork, respect, and honor." These remarks make clear that not only did she break through many glass ceilings in her career, but she spent a lifetime embodying these virtues in the service of mentoring and leading others protecting and defending this Nation.

Then, in an ultimate display of leadership, courage, and strength, Sen. McSally revealed that she was preyed upon and raped by a superior officer, and that she, too, was a survivor both of sexual assault and failed leadership that should have protected and listened to her. Instead of justifiably quitting the Air Force from a place of despair, hurt and suffering, she courageously journeyed on. She said, "...but I didn't quit. I decided to stay and continue to serve, and fight, and lead...to be a voice from within the ranks for women and then in the House and now in the Senate." I am grateful to now know Sen. McSally's story and am in awe of her grace.

Honoring women is something we ought to be doing every day of the year. In addition, during this special month, let us particularly take time to reflect on the many women of significance in our lives, in our service professions, in our city, country, and around the world who have achieved so much, in spite of so much.

Featured Ingleside Officers of the Month **Officer Matthew Seavey**



Officer Matthew Seavey has been at Ingleside Station for approximately 10 years. In the course of his duties in patrol and in plainclothes, Officer Seavey has seized several illegal firearms, made stolen car arrests, seized a multitude of assorted narcotics and has arrested countless criminals.

Officer Seavey worked as an Ingleside plainclothes Officer for over three years. His hard work was recognized by the San Francisco Police Narcotics Division where he was asked to join their team for approximately two years. Officer Seavey authored several Search Warrants that resulted in a multitude of arrests and seizures of guns and narcotics.

Officer Seavey's most recent arrest involved a stolen car. Officer Seavey made a traffic stop on the stolen car. During the inventory of the vehicle, Officer Seavey located several false California identification cards, false checks, embossing equipment, false social security cards, and false vehicle titles. He then located other stolen vehicles in the immediate area. After investigation, it was determined that this person was not only stealing cars, but then selling the vehicle to others with fraudulent ownership paperwork.

These type of fraud crimes victimize the most vulnerable of society, most often immigrants and the elderly. Officer Seavey's hard work, dedication, and the thoroughness of his investigations deserves recognition. For this reason, Officer Seavey is Ingleside's Featured Officer of the Month.

Featured Ingleside Community Members of the Month

Christine Weibel



Christine Weibel is a long time Sunnyside resident who has dedicated herself to make neighborhood public safety issues a priority through the District 7 Participatory Budgeting process. Last year, Christine spearheaded the proposal and collaborative promotion effort for traffic calming measures on Judson Avenue. This year, she continued her great advocacy work. She scanned the neighborhood for problems, analyzed the root cause that contributed to disorder and fear of crime, and authored a proposal for the Havelock pedestrian bridge. This bridge, which abuts City College, Balboa Park, CalTrans' freeway, and is used to connect Sunnyside to Mission Terrace had issues which Christine brought to light: homeless issues on CalTrans property, a lack of lighting on the bridge, and trash. Not only did she recognize this issue, but then she mobilized a walking tour for representatives of the SF Bicycle Coalition, SF Department of Public Works, the New Mission Terrace Improvement Association, and others. Due to her efforts, her proposal has reached the ballot for this year's D7 Participatory Budgeting process.

Regardless of outcome of the upcoming community vote, it is noteworthy that Christine recognized the issue and mobilized a coordinated community response, knowing that these other agencies and representatives are put on notice to find a solution to this and other issues. We are grateful to have community members like this and encourage everyone to champion a cause in your neighborhood, as Christine has. For this, she is our featured community member of the month.

Stolen License Plate

Attempted Homicide

A report of gunshots in the area of 700 block of Lisbon prompted dispatch to send Ingleside Officers Ahern, Shaheed, Billings, and Anderson to investigate. Witnesses reported a man chased another man while firing a weapon at the victim. Witnesses also gave officers descriptions of two vehicles involved a Jeep and a pickup. Ingleside Officers Billings and Anderson spotted the Jeep, with three occupants, and pulled it over nearby. Inside was a pistol and ammunition used in the incident. The victim identified one of the occupants as the man who exited the Jeep, chased him, and shot at him. One bullet hit the victim in the jacket and through a can of beer in his pocket. Besides the weapon, the officers also found a quantity of cocaine in the Jeep. All three occupants were arrested and booked for Attempted Homicide, illegal possession of a firearm, and other charges. Burglary

A citizen called police after spotting an unknown man who had jumped a fence into her backyard. The suspect admitted that he jumped into the backyard but he said, "Because he was looking for a lost drone". The officers found no evidence that he owned or used a drone. Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.



San Francisco Police Are Seeking Public Assistance in Locating Fatal Hit and Run Suspect Vehicle

*Suspect Driving a Silver or Gray Sedan Struck a 64 Year-old Pedestrian
Before Fleeing the Scene*

On February 26, 2019 at approximately 8:07pm, San Francisco police officers responded to California Street and 18th Avenue regarding a hit and run collision.

Preliminary information indicates that the victim, a 64 year-old female San Francisco resident was crossing California Street at 18th Avenue when she was struck by a motor vehicle. The driver of the suspect vehicle failed to stop and fled the scene. The suspect vehicle was last seen traveling northbound on 19th Avenue then eastbound on Lake Street. The victim was transported to Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital (ZSFGH) where she later died.

Investigators from the SFPD Traffic Collision Investigation Unit (TCIU) are searching for a silver or gray sedan with possible front end and windshield damage.

Residents and business owners in the area are asked to check their surveillance camera systems for possible images of the suspect vehicle.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Homicide Investigation

On February 20, 2019 San Francisco Police were contacted by Sacramento Police regarding an individual in their jurisdiction who claimed to have participated in a murder in San Francisco. San Francisco Police investigators contacted the San Francisco Office of the Chief Medical Examiner (OCME) and determined that the body of the deceased, 23 year-old George Randall-Saldivar, had been recovered from San Francisco Bay waters on February 18, 2019 at approximately 4:40pm near 1600 The Embarcadero.

San Francisco Police homicide investigators responded to Sacramento and interviewed the subject who admitted to involvement in the murder and dumping the body in San Francisco Bay.

Through the course of an investigation, SFPD investigators determined that the location of the homicide was an apartment on the 1200 block of Market Street. Investigators also identified the second suspect in the homicide. On February 21, 2019 SFPD homicide investigators took Gerald W. Rowe, age 47 into custody at his apartment on the 1200 block of Market Street. Rowe was booked into San Francisco County Jail on the charges of murder, conspiracy, false imprisonment and kidnapping.

On February 27, 2019 Angel Anderson (aka David Anderson) age 36, of San Francisco was transported from the Sacramento County Jail to San Francisco and was booked into San Francisco County jail on the charges of murder, conspiracy, false imprisonment and kidnapping. Booking photos of Rowe and Anderson accompany this news release.

San Francisco Police Recover a \$15,000 Flute for a Vehicle Break-in Victim

On Thursday February 14th, 2019 at approximately 10:00PM a San Francisco resident parked his vehicle on the 800 block of 35th Avenue. When he returned to his vehicle around 8:00 AM on February 15th, he discovered that his vehicle had been unlocked and a case containing his wife's flute was missing. The flute was valued at \$ 15,000. The victim filed a Police report regarding the incident.

On Friday, February 15th at approximately 7:07AM, Tenderloin officers patrolling the 800 block of Eddy Street observed a subject whom they recognized from a department email stating that subject had probable cause for arrest for burglary.

Officers contacted the subject, 33 year-old transient Sean Gagnon and placed him under arrest without incident. Gagnon was booked at San Francisco County Jail for burglary and possession of stolen property.

The stolen flute was found in Gagnon's property and was returned to its owner. A photo of the owner being reunited with the flute accompanies this news release.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on March 4th, 12th, 15th, 20th and 28th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past three years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these non-motorized means of transportation. In 2016, California witnessed 867 pedestrians and 147 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

HOW TO REPORT GRAFFITI VANDALISM



The SFPD has learned that there are 5 major categories of graffiti which include:

- Communicative graffiti; Written to convey one's point of view. Often political.
- Hate crime graffiti. Written to instill fear with in real or perceived protected classes of people.
- Artistic graffiti. A character or nonverbal symbol often written repeatedly by an individual.
- Tagger graffiti. A written name or moniker repeatedly written by the same person or tagger. These pieces of graffiti are referred to as tags or graffiti tags.
- Gang graffiti. Written to mark gang territory. Written to create fear and intimidation toward rival gang members. Written to promote a gang or set of a gang.

Of these five different types of graffiti we know that the main source of graffiti vandalism in San Francisco is tagger graffiti. Exposing a graffiti taggers graffiti tag or moniker is a key to stopping them from committing more graffiti crimes.

The following steps should be taken when reporting graffiti crimes in progress:

- Call 911
- Pay particular attention to the Suspect's description and where they wrote their graffiti
- Follow up with the Officers and be ready to provide a statement and identify any detained person(s)
- If applicable provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

The following steps should be made when reporting cold graffiti cases with supporting evidence:

- Call (415)553-0123
- Provide full Suspect description or any other key details
- If applicable provide surveillance video
- Provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

The following steps should be made when reporting cases with less supporting evidence:

- Report online at <http://sanfranciscopolice.org/reportS>
- Include photos of the graffiti which can be uploaded through the report writing system
- Provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

To report graffiti on public property us the SF311 app.

The following Steps should be made to deter graffiti vandalism:

- Paint over graffiti quickly. If taggers know that their work won't last they are more likely to move to another location
- Use ample lighting. Taggers often use the cover of darkness to keep from being detected
- Set up surveillance cameras. Their presence act as a deterrent and they are useful in helping to identify taggers with prior arrests


