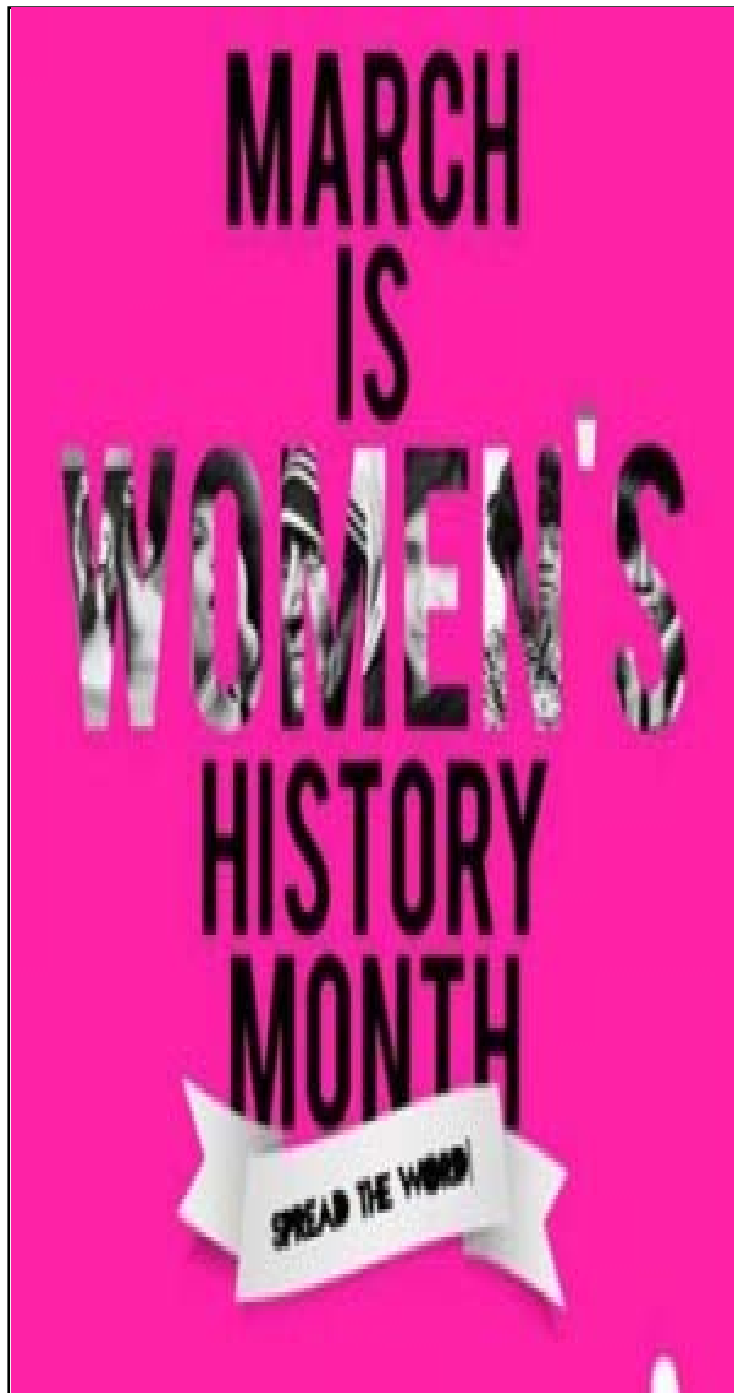

Burglary

A couple, asleep, woke up to the sounds of unusual noises and conversations emanating from the downstairs workshop below their home. They called police and Ingleside Officers Zandanel, Andeson, and Billings responded to the scene. The officers entered the downstairs portion of the home and found two men hiding in the bathroom. Privacy Invasion

A couple were working on the upper floors of their home when they spotted smoke coming from the downstairs portion of the home. The woman yelled for her husband to exit their residence and they both quickly got to the street to call the fire department. The husband grabbed a garden hose in a failed attempt to put out the flames. Several SFFD units arrived within minutes and extinguished the fire which investigators suspect started in car being repaired in the garage. Robbery

A woman Muni passenger had her cellphone stolen by another passenger. The victim told Ingleside Officers Zandanel, Quinlan, and Ducharme that she chased the suspect into the nearby Bank of America parking lot where the suspect confronted her and threatened to shoot her if she didn't stop the chase. While the victim was talking to the officers she suddenly stopped the interview and pointed out the suspect who was walking nearby. Evading a Police Officer

Ingleside Officers Naser, Chew, and Mora were on routine patrol when they spotted a suspect driving a vehicle after he had evaded arrest after being pursued by Daly City officers a short time before. He also had numerous arrest warrants out of San Francisco and San Mateo County on a variety of charges and had an extensive criminal history. The officers attempted to stop the suspect but he, again evaded arrest, by driving recklessly through the district and onto the freeway reaching speeds in excess of 75mph. Robbery

A man traveling to the bus stop from his home noticed a white Honda following slowly behind him. He told Ingleside Officers Sharron and Pfeiffer that the Honda suddenly stopped and a woman exited holding a fire-arm pointed at his head. She asked for his wallet and cellphone which the victim quickly surrendered. Then she asked for his gold ring which was difficult to remove. Now, fearing for his life, the victim decided to resist and fight the suspect. The combatants tumbled to the ground during the battle and the suspect lost control of her gun which flew from her grasp. The victim, now emboldened, took a picture of the suspect and her vehicle and quickly ran home carrying a fully loaded magazine which had dislodged from the gun. The fire-arm was abandoned at the scene by the suspect. Meanwhile, Brisbane Police officers, hearing a broadcast of the robbery apprehended the suspect and her car at Sunnydale and Sawyer Streets. Ingleside Officer Billings and Anderson traveled to the scene and recovered most of the victim's property. They also arrested the suspect after the victim positively identified her as the woman who robbed him of his possessions. She was transported to the County Jail for booking. Report number: 190170555

Shooting Into Building

A report of gunfire inside a bar prompted dispatch to send Ingleside Officers Billings and Anderson to investigate. Family issues boiled over resulting in a possibly mentally compromised woman attacking another woman with a knife. Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

1. Graduate the SFFD NERT course (<http://sf-fire.org/neighborhood-emergency-response-team-nert>), or,
2. Graduate the SFPD Community Police Academy course (<https://sanfranciscopolice.org/community-police-academy>)
3. Pass a basic DOJ/FBI Background check.
4. Sign up for the next 8 hour ALERT new volunteer training class.

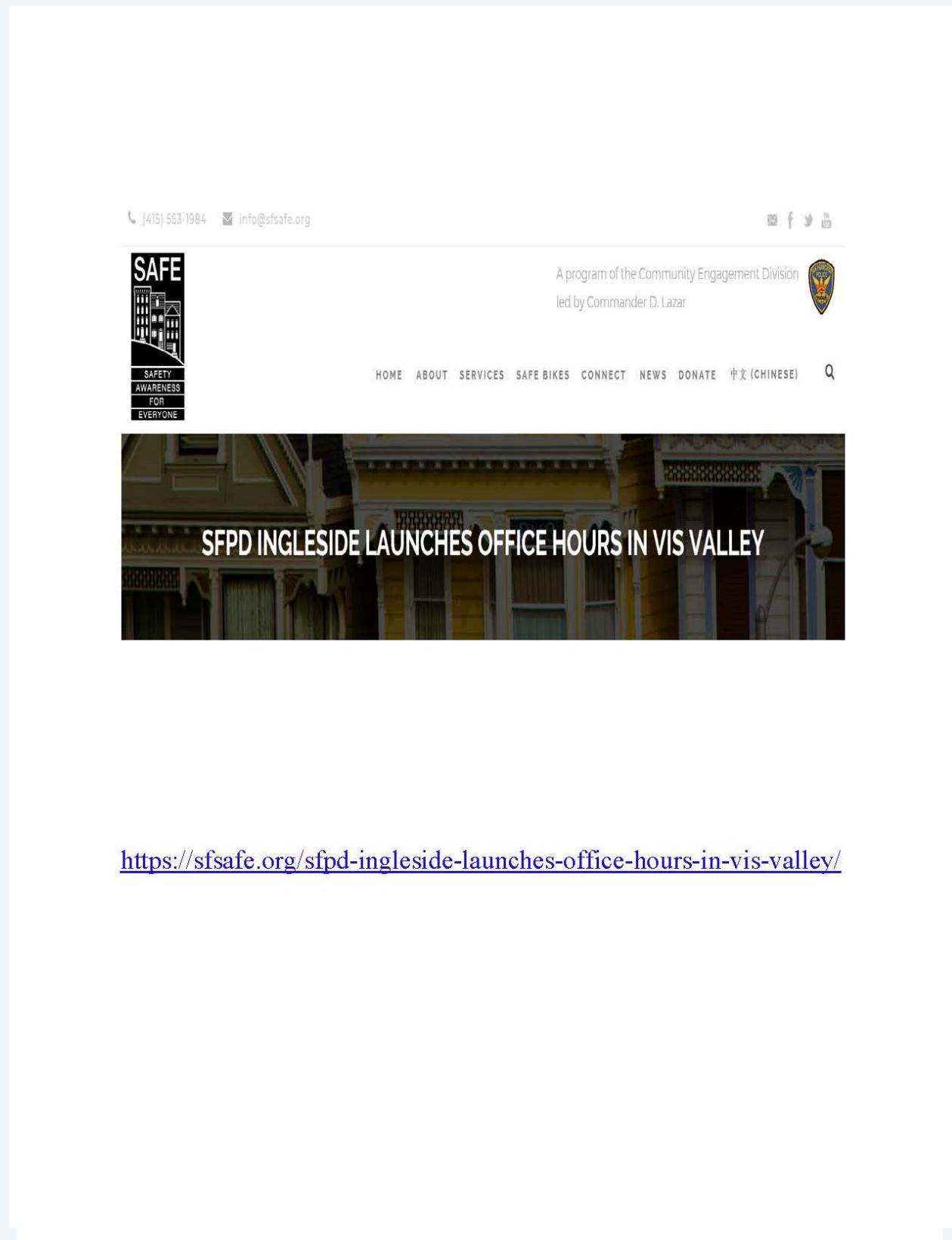

Funded by the 2008 and 2012 Clean and Safe Neighborhood Parks bonds, the renovated McLaren Community Garden includes a welcoming entrance into the garden with communal planter beds for herbs and trailing vegetables, sheltered gathering spaces for groups, and ornamental gates and fencing, while also creating a utilitarian garden designed to accommodate raised garden plots.

Located just north of the community gardens, the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission has constructed new rain gardens as part of the Visitacion Valley Green Nodes Project. The project develops two distinct green infrastructure locations at Sunnysdale Avenue and McLaren Park that improves community spaces and accessibility while helping manage stormwater. The terraced rain gardens in McLaren Park will manage 600,000 gallons of stormwater each year from 1.5 acres of impervious surface and provide a pedestrian connection to McLaren Park from Leland Avenue.

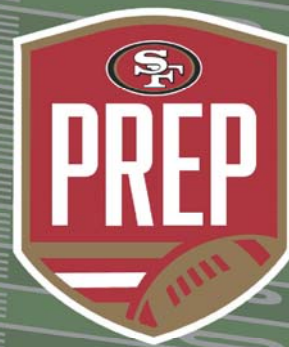

Quick Acting Tenderloin Officers Save Injured Victim

On Sunday March 3rd, 2019 Tenderloin Station officers responded to the corner of Eddy Street and Leavenworth Street regarding a call on a possible stabbing. Officers observed a male lying in the middle of the street bleeding uncontrollably from his arm.

The officers immediately rendered aid and placed a department issued tourniquet to the victim's right arm to control the bleeding.

The victim stated that he was inside of his apartment on Eddy Street when he became angry and punched his window, cutting his arm. The victim then ran outside looking for help.

The victim was transported to a hospital in life threatening condition, which stabilized shortly afterwards.

San Francisco Plainclothes Officers Make Arrests In Taraval District Auto Burglaries

On Monday February 18, 2019 at approximately 3:10PM, plainclothes officers from San Francisco Police Department's Taraval Station were in the area of 34th Avenue and El Camino Del Mar. Officers observed two subjects in a vehicle. Both were known to police for having prior auto burglary arrests.

Officers observed the vehicle park and one of the subjects exit. The subject walked through the parking lot, looking into the windows of parked vehicles. While the subject was behind a minivan, officers heard the sounds of glass shattering and observed the subject walking away with a black backpack. When officers identified themselves as police, the subject attempted to flee on foot. Officers were able to apprehend him, though two officers sustained minor injuries as a result of the arrest.

The two subjects were identified as 18 year-old Bryan Rosas-Zaragoza and 19 year-old Michael Alvarado, both of South San Francisco. Rosas-Zaragoza was charged with second-degree burglary, conspiracy, resisting arrest and committing a felony while on supervised release. Alvarado was charged with second-degree burglary and conspiracy. Both subjects were booked at San Francisco County Jail.

As a result of the arrest, officers obtained a search warrant for the home of Rosas-Zaragoza. On Tuesday, February 19, 2019, SFPD officers served the search warrant at Rosas-Zaragoza's home in South San Francisco.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on March 4th, 12th, 15th, 20th and 28th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past three years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these non-motorized means of transportation. In 2016, California witnessed 867 pedestrians and 147 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

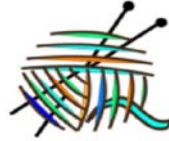

HOW TO REPORT GRAFFITI VANDALISM



The SFPD has learned that there are 5 major categories of graffiti which include:

- Communicative graffiti; Written to convey one's point of view. Often political.
- Hate crime graffiti. Written to instill fear with in real or perceived protected classes of people.
- Artistic graffiti. A character or nonverbal symbol often written repeatedly by an individual.
- Tagger graffiti. A written name or moniker repeatedly written by the same person or tagger. These pieces of graffiti are referred to as tags or graffiti tags.
- Gang graffiti. Written to mark gang territory. Written to create fear and intimidation toward rival gang members. Written to promote a gang or set of a gang.

Of these five different types of graffiti we know that the main source of graffiti vandalism in San Francisco is tagger graffiti. Exposing a graffiti taggers graffiti tag or moniker is a key to stopping them from committing more graffiti crimes.

The following steps should be taken when reporting graffiti crimes in progress:

- Call 911
- Pay particular attention to the Suspect's description and where they wrote their graffiti
- Follow up with the Officers and be ready to provide a statement and identify any detained person(s)
- If applicable provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

The following steps should be made when reporting cold graffiti cases with supporting evidence:

- Call (415)553-0123
- Provide full Suspect description or any other key details
- If applicable provide surveillance video
- Provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

The following steps should be made when reporting cases with less supporting evidence:

- Report online at <http://sanfranciscopolice.org/reportS>
- Include photos of the graffiti which can be uploaded through the report writing system
- Provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

To report graffiti on public property us the SF311 app.

The following Steps should be made to deter graffiti vandalism:

- Paint over graffiti quickly. If taggers know that their work won't last they are more likely to move to another location
- Use ample lighting. Taggers often use the cover of darkness to keep from being detected
- Set up surveillance cameras. Their presence act as a deterrent and they are useful in helping to identify taggers with prior arrests
