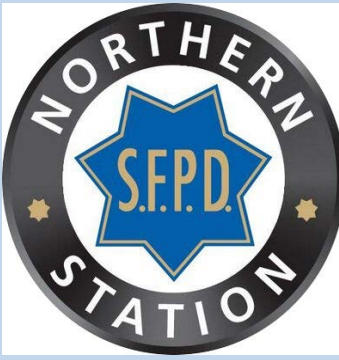

INCIDENT RECAPS

On 2/25/19 at about 0948 hours, officers responded to a call of a robbery near Octavia/Hayes. Initially, the subject was arrested for an outstanding warrant and misdemeanor resisting arrest charge. The subject complained of medical issues and was transported to SFGH. While in transit, the subject made comments to officers leading to him then being transferred to PES for evaluation. According to the victim, the subject entered the coffee shop and tried to steal their tip jar. The employees and a customer stopped the subject from leaving and detained him for police. When officers arrived, the subject attempted to flee and resisted arrest. The victim stated that he did not want to press charges, however, it was later determined that probable cause still existed for the subject to be arrested on the robbery charge.

On 2/21/19, a burglary occurred at the victim's residence near the area of Bay/ Webster. Upon reviewing video surveillance, the victim recognized the subject who entered his home as his neighbor. The victim filed a report and it was assigned to be investigated by a sergeant with Northern SIT. (190-131-400) On 3/2/19, another burglary occurred; the victim looked at the surveillance video, he recognized the subject as being his neighbor yet again, and called police. When officers arrived and began their investigation, they witnessed the subject exit her residence; at that time she was detained. After interviewing the victim and conferring with the Northern SIT sergeant, probable cause existed to arrest the subject for the burglaries.

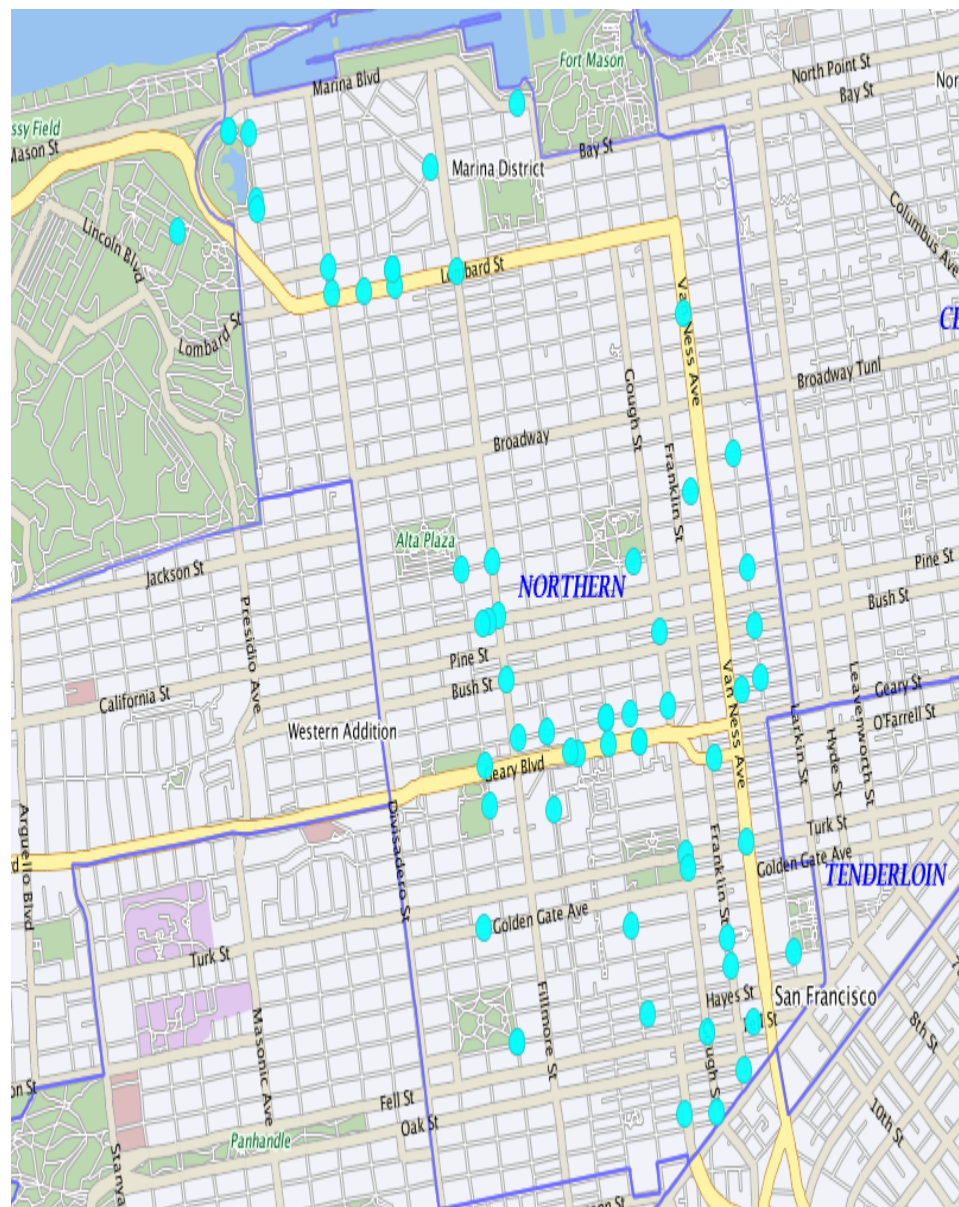

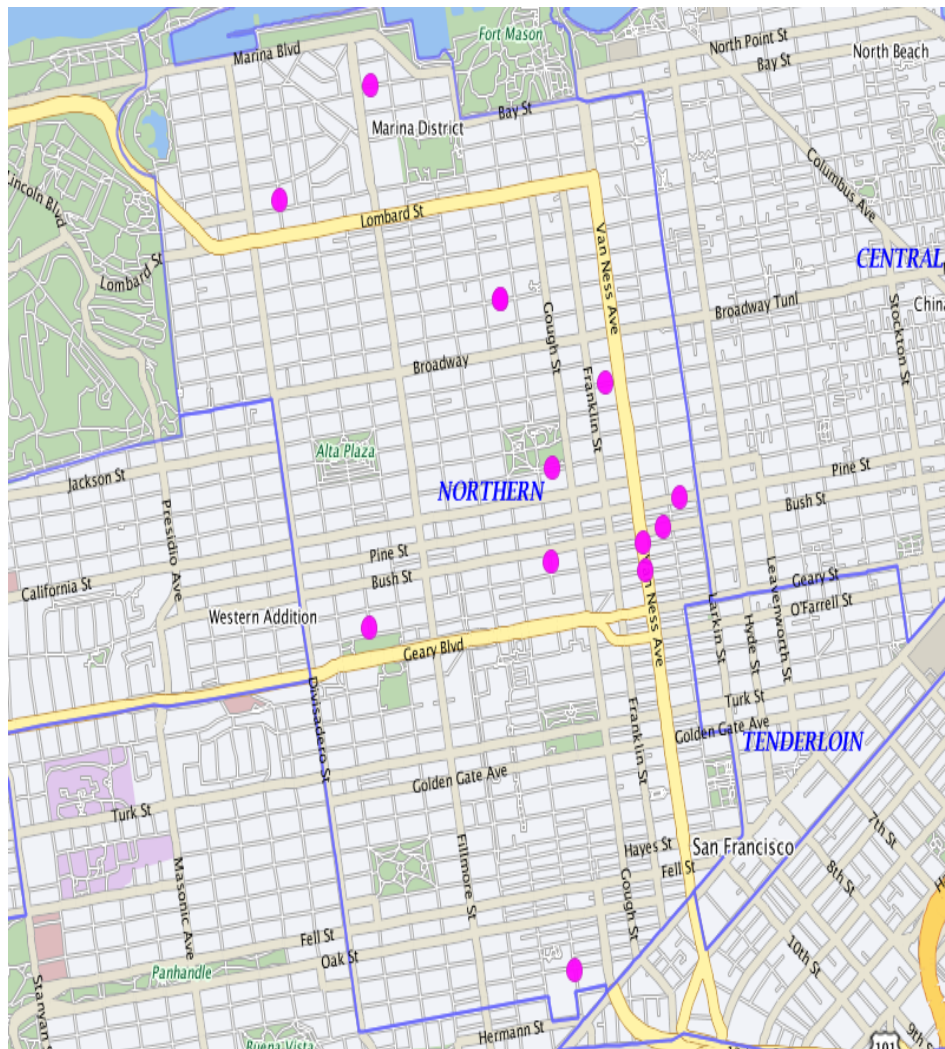

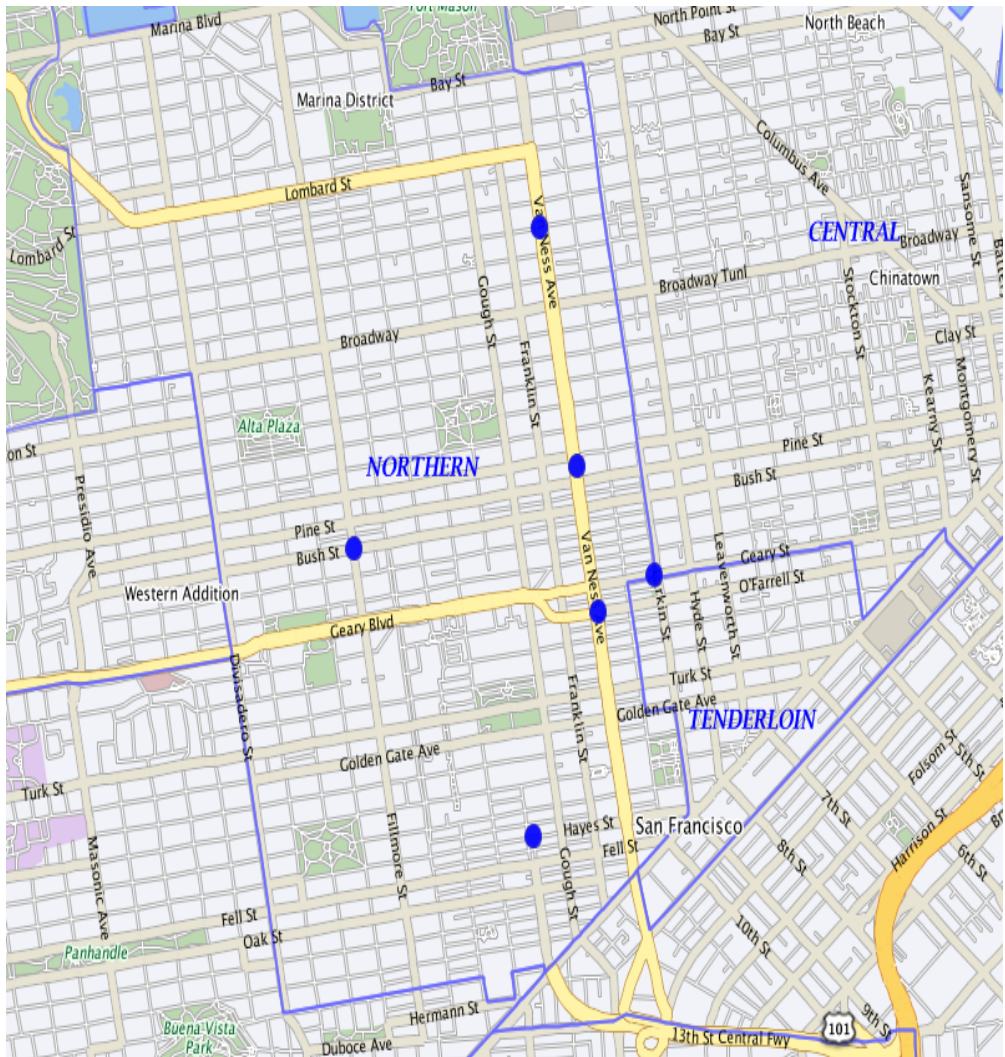

4. Schedule your exam.
5. You will receive an email confirming your exam date, time and location.
