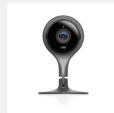

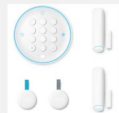

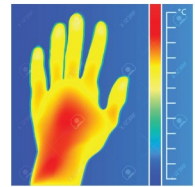

HIGH RESOLUTION

If you connect your camera to a DVR or other device, it will also need to be HD Compatible.



INFRARED (IR)

Built-in IR cut-switch that automatically enables/disables the infrared depending on the light conditions.

IN THE KNOW

The camera's viewing angle determines how much space the camera will cover. Wider angled lenses help cut down the # of cameras required for overall coverage. Video Surveillance should be utilized at your property with at least one camera facing towards the address street and camera should be registered with the District Attorney's office

Overview

Note: The following information is specific to commercial and retail establishments; however, can be applied to any location utilizing video surveillance.

Basic set up and maintenance problems can reduce the effectiveness of many systems.

- Resolution – is it good enough for facial recognition.
- Camera position – are they positioned for clear view of suspect.
- Lighting – is it adequate to capture clear images both day and night.
- Image detail – is the recorder set up for best image detail.
- Maintenance – are you maintaining your system properly so it can do its job when needed?

Set Up and Maintenance

- **Backlighting** – when sun is bright at doorway, images in front appear darker or even black. Use another light source inside to counteract back light.
- **Low Frame Rate** – saves on drive space and gives better image quality, but you may not get an image at all (now you see him; now you don't).
- **Obstructions** – displays and other objects blocking view **should be eliminated**.
- **Focus Problems** – must check system regularly to prevent.

Minimum camera resolution should be **480 horizontal lines**.

Good cameras have **faster lenses** (allows more lighting), larger maximum **aperture** opening (lets more light into the focal point of the camera) and controls image brightness (allows brighter images in dim lighting) – the more lighting, the more depth of field (greater depth of field; the more of the scene is in focus).

Focal Length – some cameras zoom in and out while others have a fixed focal length. The type of cameras used depends on what you needs are.

Transaction Areas – anything at a transaction point (cash register, toll booth, etc.), the subject's head should fill at least 15% of the total image in the frame, giving the detail you need.

Lines of Sight – lines of sight are always critical, make sure there are no obstructions.

Site Plan – the right site plan is crucial (retail store blueprint or **diagram**). Key camera spots are at transaction points (cash registers and entry/exit points) – the more cameras, the better.

You want good camera **overlap** (you want multiple chances to capture good images). Extra coverage is also needed for aisles, restrooms and other key points.

Camera Height – placement is very important, make sure it is as close to eye-level as possible. Otherwise, you might lose out to a baseball cap.

With a good site plan you can make sure you don't have any blind spots (you can toy around with camera positions, and do a test recording to see that you are getting what you want).

Interior Lighting – interior lighting can balance bright light from one direction (back lighting) by adding another light source from a different location (add a bank of lights).

Example: Artificial lighting (**inside store**) for cameras may be good in the morning, but by noon, the sun (through a doorway or window) can blow the entire frame out (add lighting to fill in for afternoon sunlight). Adding more light from a different direction balances lighting, giving better camera clarity (if sunlight is shining through large windows you can tent windows or add screens).

Exterior Lighting – if lights are on timers, you must adjust appropriate to seasonal changes (Fall/Winter: gets dark earlier. Spring/Summer: gets dark later).

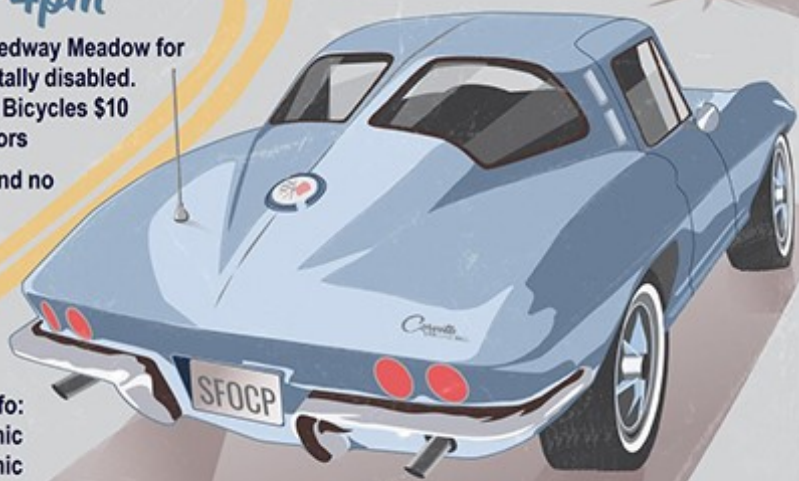

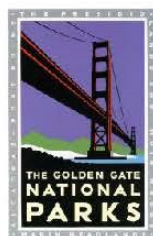

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is left unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME

Robbery– Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault– An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery- (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

****Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person. ****

Aggravated Assault– Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

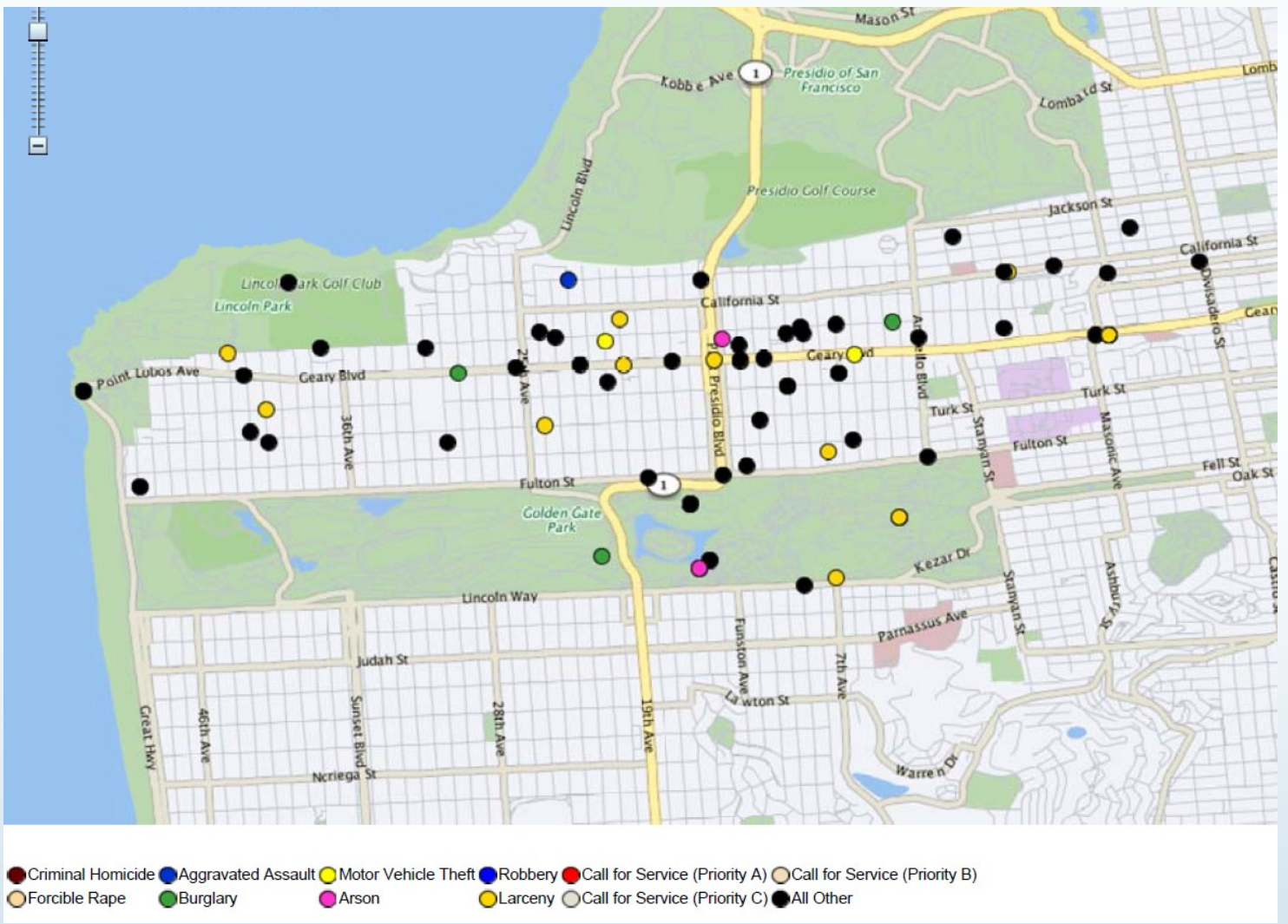
Burglary– The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

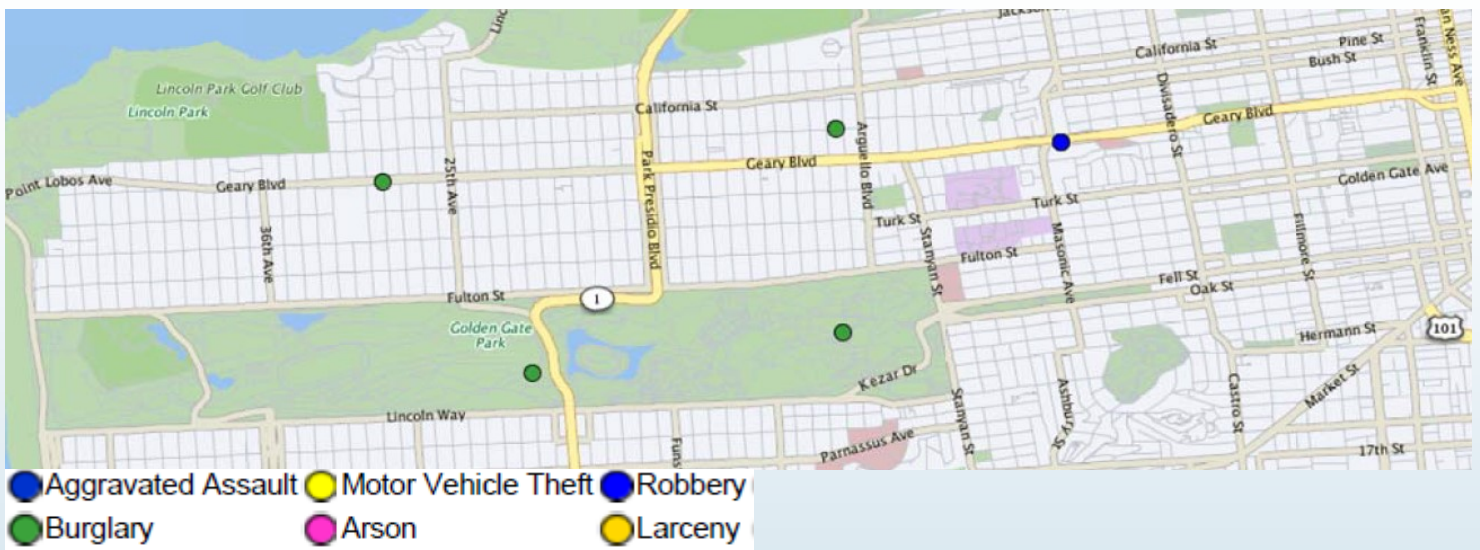

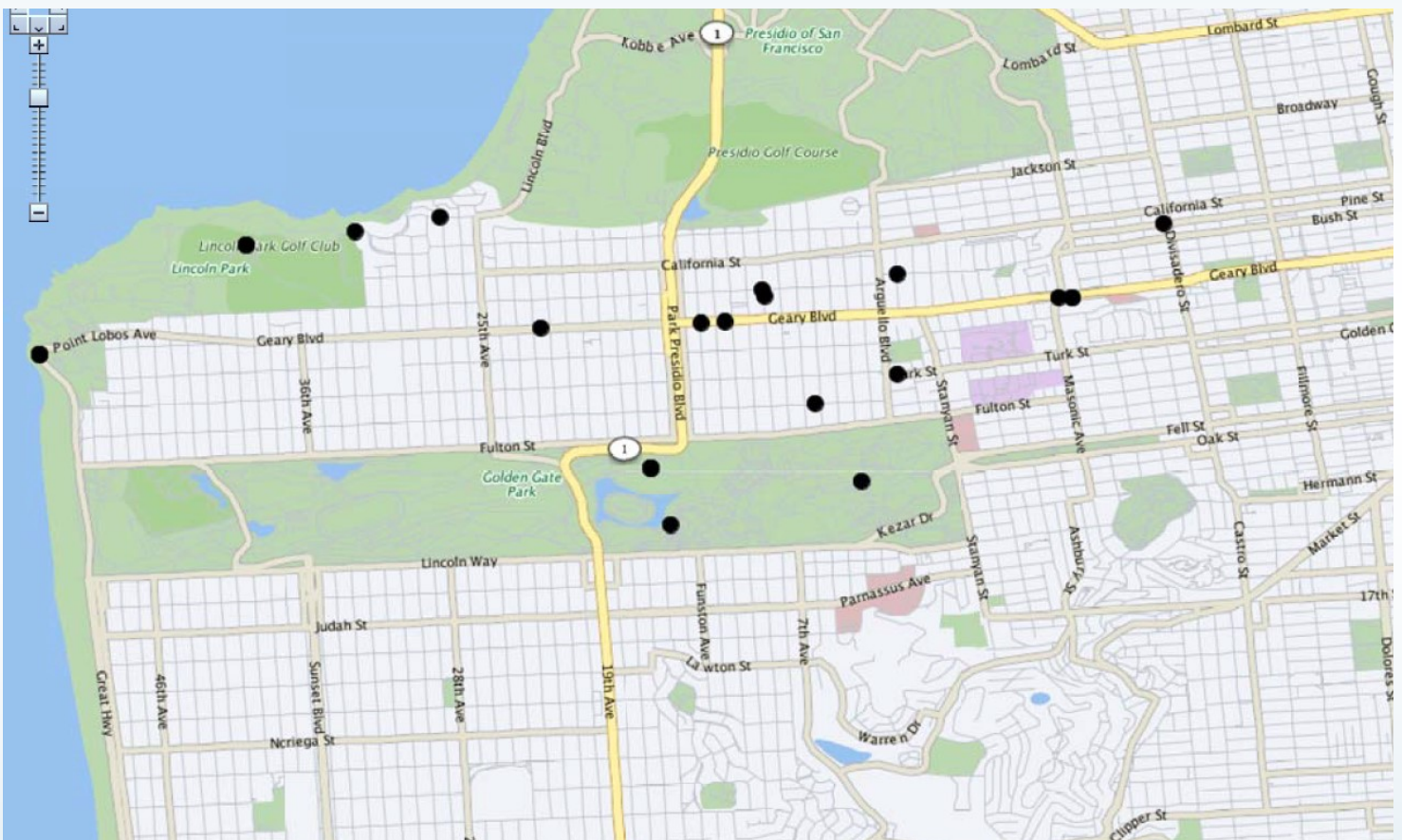

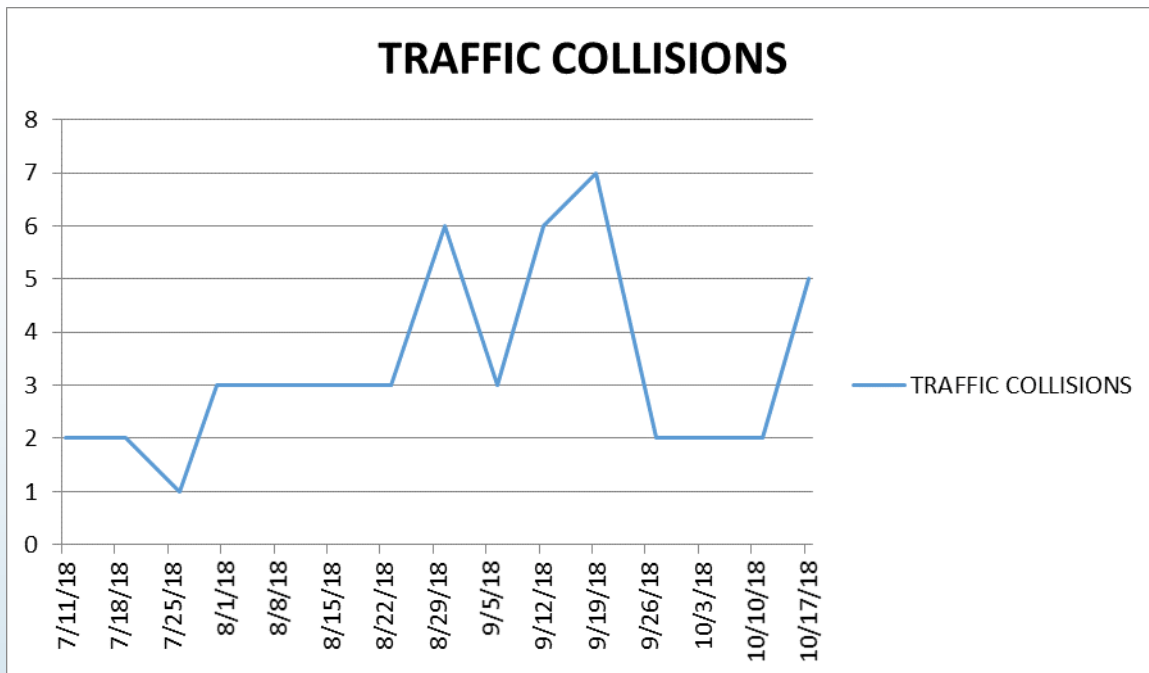

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Mission District Homicide

On Monday, October 8th 2018 at approximately 1:17 AM, San Francisco Police officers responded to 19th Street and Capp Street in the Mission district regarding a shooting. Officers arrived on scene and located the victim, 25 year-old San Francisco resident Anthony Patton, laying on the ground suffering from multiple gunshot wounds. San Francisco Fire Department paramedics responded and rendered aid, but unfortunately Patton succumbed to his injuries.

SFPD Homicide investigators commenced an investigation that led to the identity of the suspects. On October 11th 2018, Mission Station officers located and arrested 20 year-old Antioch resident Reno Ramos and 27 year-old San Francisco resident Joe Nunezdosangos for homicide.

Following interviews with Homicide investigators, Ramos and Nunezdosangos were charged with murder and booked into San Francisco County Jail. Due to pending identification matters, the subjects' photos will not be released at this time.

Although arrests have been made, investigators are asking anyone with information on this case to contact the 24 hour San Francisco Police Tip Line at 415-575-4444 or text-a-tip to TIP411 with SFPD at the start of the message. You may remain anonymous.

San Francisco Police Seek Public's Assistance in Locating Hit and Run Vehicle

On Tuesday, August 21, 2018 at approximately 5:40AM, a hit-and-run collision occurred at the intersection of Valencia Street and Hill Street in San Francisco's Mission District. The suspect vehicle, a maroon 4-door sedan, was traveling southbound on Valencia Street when it struck the victim who was operating a bicycle. The collision caused the victim to be ejected off his bike and fall to the ground.

The victim, a 33 year-old San Francisco resident, sustained non life-threatening injuries and was transported to a local hospital.

Photos of the suspect vehicle accompany this news release.

This incident occurred on a well-traveled thoroughfare. Investigators ask anyone who was in the area of Valencia Street and Hill Street on August 21, 2018 around 5:40AM to check cell phones, dash-cams and surveillance systems for photos or video of the collision and/or the suspect vehicle.
