DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is left unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME

Robbery– Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault– An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery- (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

****Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person. ****

Aggravated Assault– Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

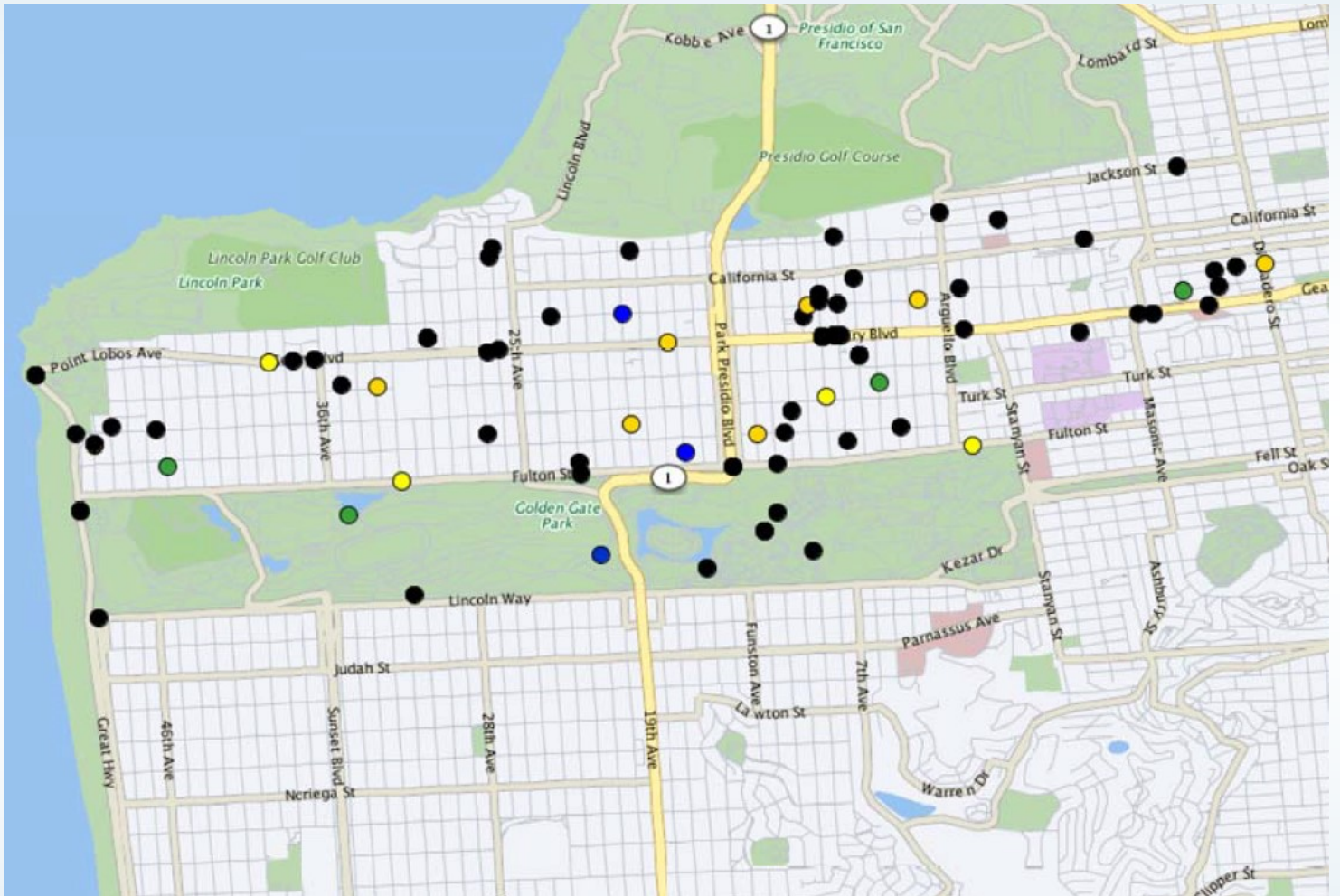
Burglary– The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

The victims were asleep when they awoke to see the suspect in their bedroom. One of the victims chased the suspect, who fled, while the other called the police. Officers arrived, conducted their investigation, and were unable to locate the suspect at that time. A few hours later, the victim saw the suspect outside his residence again. The victim chased the suspect, caught him and got into a physical altercation with the suspect. Officers arrived and placed the suspect under arrest.

The suspect was positively identified by the victims and was in possession of several of their stolen items.

The suspect was arrested and booked at County Jail on the following charges: Burglary, Robbery, Possession of Stolen Property, Battery.

On 12/1/18, the Suspect chased the Victim with a chainsaw and threatened to later shoot the Victim with a gun. On 12/3, Richmond Station Investigation Team obtained a search warrant and located two firearms belonging to the suspect. The firearms were seized and booked into evidence.

The suspect was originally arrested on 12/1 and booked at County Jail on the following charges: Terrorist Threats, Disturbing the Peace.

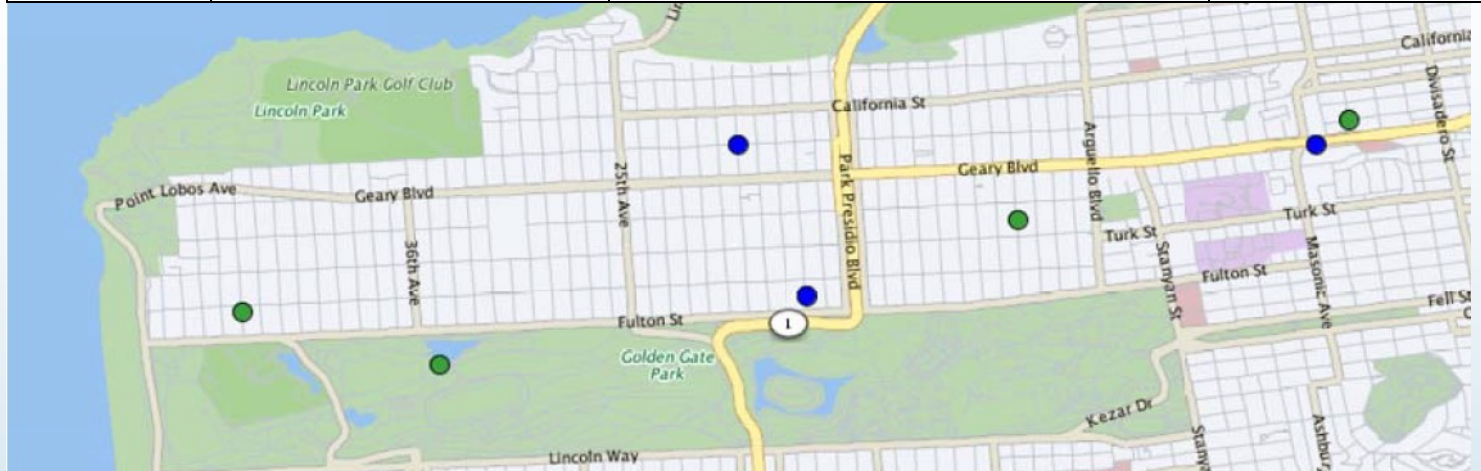

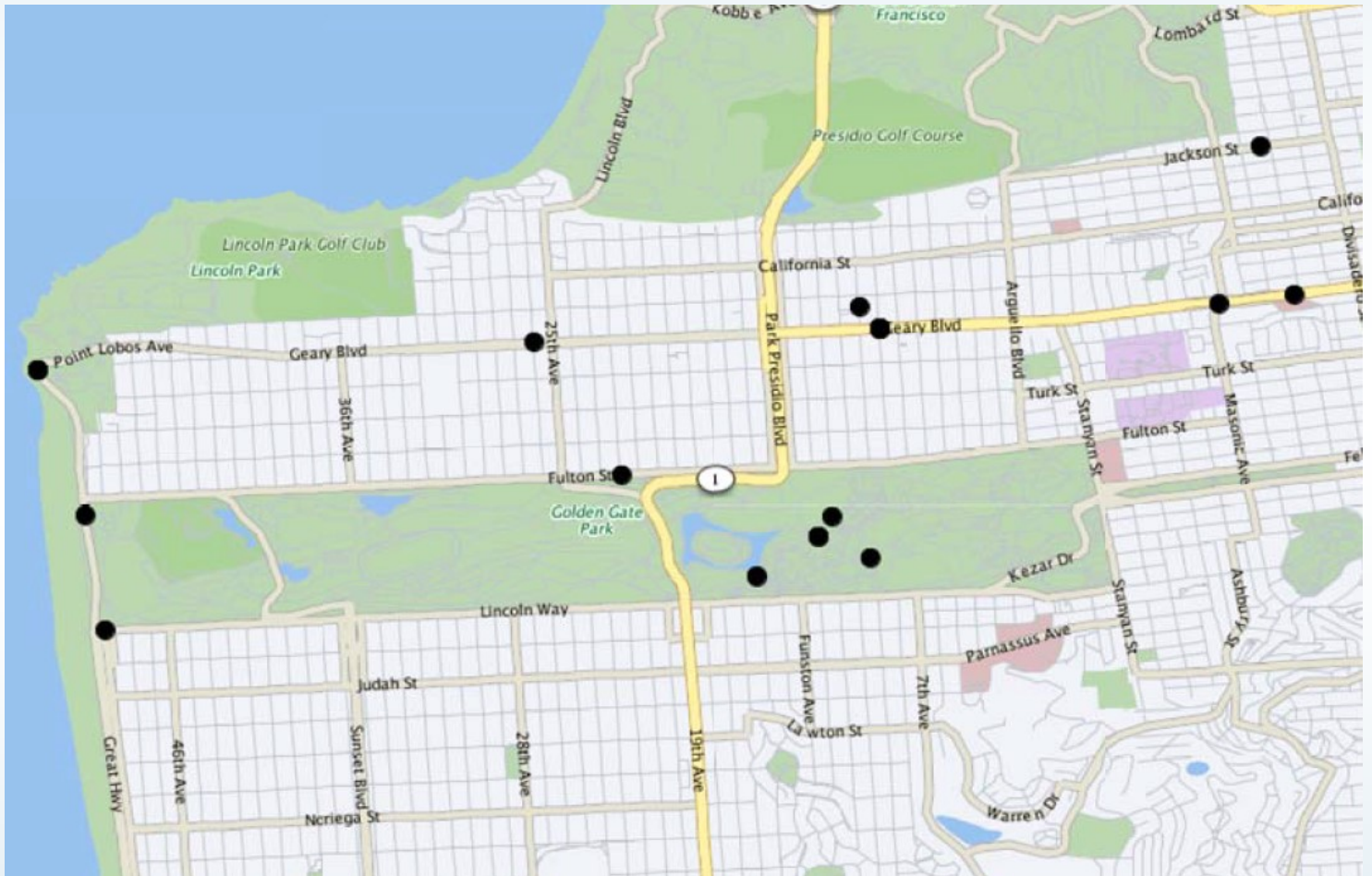

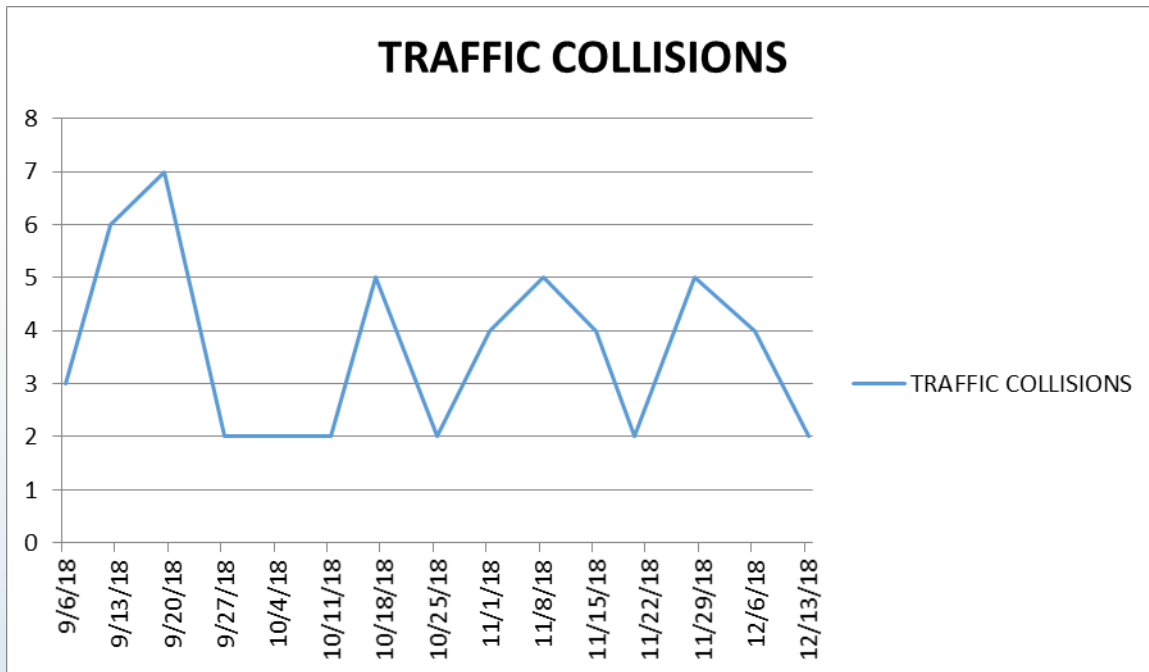

BE AN ALERT SHOPPER!

Tips for personal safety, property safety, pick-pocketing prevention, identity theft, and identifying suspicious activities



Be alert and aware of your surroundings at all times. Alert security if you notice any of the following in any public space:

- Unattended packages
- Persons exhibiting
- Suspicious chemical smells or pungent odors erratic or nervous behavior
- Anyone tampering with surveillance cameras
- People wearing bulky or inappropriate clothing which may be used to conceal threatening devices or objects

PICK-POCKETS & THEFT

- Bring only the cash and credit cards you need
- Do not carry your social security card/passport
- Don't let others distract you in crowded areas
- Limit the use of your cellphone in public

- If you are traveling, ask a neighbor to watch the house
- Put timers on various lights around interior/exterior of the house
- Have newspapers, mail, and deliveries held or picked up by someone you trust to avoid package theft.

HOME BURGLARY PREVENTION



AUTO BREAK-INS

- Leave nothing visible in the car; if you love it, don't leave it!
- Keep doors & trunk of vehicles locked
- Avoid placing packages in vehicle/trunk then returning to shopping without moving vehicle to another location
- Never leave a GPS system or mount visible

- Shop only at secure websites
- Do not respond to emails asking for personal/credit card information
- Check your credit card & bank statements regularly for fraudulent use
