

CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE:

Hello Richmond District Residents,

Wednesday was certainly an eventful day in the district. One of my Officers was driving past the construction site on Geary Blvd when this pipeline fire exploded. Another off-duty Officer was walking past the Hong Kong Lounge with her daughter at the time! Every Officer in the district



responded to the scene to evacuate neighboring houses, re-route vehicular and pedestrian traffic and assist in coordinating the emergency response teams. The lack of casualties from this incident was amazing but gratifying.

A number of displaced residents expressed concern about their pets, as they were unable to return to their houses to get them, for safety reasons, while it was a working fire scene. Animals are prone to respiratory injuries caused by smoke inhalation during a fire. The San Francisco Fire Department has partnered with the San Francisco SPCA in the "WAG-N- O2 fur Life" program, which enables a wide range of animals, but in particular canines, to receive immediate and life-saving care in the aftermath of a fire. The "WAG-N- O2 fur Life" kits contain snout-shaped oxygen masks to fit small, medium, and large-sized animals and are placed on all of the Department's ambulances.

This was also a reminder to me that we can never be too prepared—The SFFD <u>Fire</u> <u>Safety Tips</u> brochure contains guidelines for creating an Emergency Supplies Kit, in the event that evacuating your home is required and you have minimal time to pack.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is left unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME

Disturbing the Peace

Crimes Against the Public Peace (Penal Code section 415)

Any of the following persons shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not more than 90 days, a fine of not more than four hundred dollars (\$400), or both such imprisonment and fine, i.e. it is a misdemeanor.

- (1) Any person who unlawfully fights in a public place or challenges another person in a public place to fight.
- (2) Any person who maliciously and willfully disturbs another person by loud and unreasonable noise.
- (3) Any person who uses offensive words in a public place which are inherently likely to provoke an immediate violent reaction.

When residents complain about neighbors or contractors disturbing the peace, it is unlikely to fall under the definition of 415 PC, unless it can be shown to be malicious, willful and unreasonable.

SF Police Code <u>Article 29</u>, Regulation of Noise Guidelines for Noise Control Ordinance Monitoring and Enforcement states: "Many noises and sounds are not covered by the noise control laws in San Francisco. These include wind chimes, the unamplified human voice, leaf blowers, and other sounds (see <u>Appendix C</u>)." It goes on to try and promote a good neighbor policy: "If you are disturbed by a sound, first try to discuss the issue directly with whoever is producing the sound, to find a mutually agreeable solution"

When it comes to construction noise, noise between 7am to 8pm, 7 days a week, including holidays is generally permitted. Noise must not exceed a noise level of five decibels at the nearest lot line, without a special permit. Five decibels is similar to the sound of a screw gun installing screws in drywall.

Noise problems created by neighbors, such as barking dogs, loud music, parties, loud television or sound system, loud voices, or work projects between 10pm and 7am. Call Police Non-Emergency (415-553-0123) if the problem is IN PROGRESS.

INCIDENTS IN THE RICHMOND DISTRICT THIS WEEK

Second Degree Burglary, Conspiracy, Identity Theft, Receive Stolen Property, Probation Violation Arrest 2/8/19 13:51 1090 Point Lobos Ave

An off-duty officer advised dispatch that he witnessed an auto burglary at the Cliff House Restaurant. A responding plain clothes officer located the suspect vehicle in the Beach Chalet parking lot and took the driver and passenger into custody. The passenger was in possession of property that the victim identified as having been taken from her vehicle. The passenger was found to be on probation out of San Francisco for burglary.

Station Investigations Team, working with the arresting officers, matched the passenger to a prior auto burglary, where store surveillance video showed him using the victim's credit card less than 2 hours after the burglary.

The suspects were arrested and booked at County Jail on the following charges: Burglary of a Vehicle, Conspiracy and, additionally for the passenger, Probation Violation, Identity Theft and Receiving Stolen Property.

Felony Hit & Run Arrest 2/10/2019 15:55 Cabrillo St & Park Presidio Blvd

Officers responded to Cabrillo St & Park Presidio on a report of a traffic collision with injuries. Numerous witnesses observed a silver Mercedes C240, turning left from Cabrillo St to Park Presidio Blvd, hit a pedestrian in the crosswalk, who rolled up and over the hood of the car, and then fell to the ground, screaming. A Mercedes hood ornament was located at the scene. A witness to the collision followed the suspect vehicle and pulled his car in front of it, on Park Presidio between Fulton St & Crossover Dr, while another car prevented the suspect vehicle from backing up. The driver of the Mercedes (missing a hood ornament) stated that, since other people were helping the pedestrian, she didn't think she needed to stop.

The suspect was arrested and booked at County Jail on the following charges: Felony Hit & Run. A DMV priority retest request for the driver was submitted, based on her lack of skill and knowledge.

INCIDENTS IN THE RICHMOND DISTRICT THIS WEEK

Vehicle Burglary, Conspiracy, Possession of Stolen Property, Possession of Burglary Tools Arrest 2/9/19 19:00 Geary Blvd & 18th Ave

A plain clothes officer observed a vehicle double parked next to a dumpster, with the passenger throwing objects out of the window into the dumpster. Based on his experience, he knew that auto burglars will often discard unwanted property shortly after acquiring it, so he started to follow the vehicle. As he got close enough to read the license plate, Dispatch broadcast a call for service for an auto burglary, where the witness gave the same license plate as the car he was following.

The plain clothes team followed the suspect vehicle and observed the occupants casing vehicles on Clement St and Geary Blvd. When the vehicle stopped and two of the occupants got out, the team moved in and arrested the driver, but the passengers evaded the inevitable foot and vehicle pursuit. The witnesses positively identified the vehicle, and the victim identified property that had been taken from her vehicle.

The driver was found to be on out on bail, for an arrest on 8/19/2018 for assault with a deadly weapon and felony vandalism.

The driver was arrested and booked at County Jail on the following charges: Burglary of a Vehicle, Conspiracy, Possession of Stolen Property, and Possession of Burglary Tools.







Traffic Update: Geary Blvd Bus & Taxi Lane

If you are observant, you will have noticed that the #3 (rightmost) lane of Geary Blvd, approaching Stanyan St, is now a right turn only lane, unless your vehicle is a bus or a taxi.



The subsequent seven blocks are marked BUS TAXI ONLY on the street.

There are also posted signs reading BUSES TAXIS & RIGHT TURNS ONLY AT ALL TIMES on every block





Traffic Update: Geary Blvd Bus & Taxi Lane

The questions I get asked most are:

- 1) Why did they do this? Geary Blvd is congested enough already!
- 2) Where do I make my right turn from? The lane to the left of the BUS/TAXI lane? If from the BUS/TAXI lane, when should I get into the BUS/TAXI lane?
- 1) The San Francisco Board of Supervisors, via the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA), has a <u>Transit-First Policy</u>. Buses reduce traffic and air pollution because they are more space and fuel efficient. Transit-only lanes keep buses from getting stuck in traffic. SFMTA have estimated that over 50,000 people ride the 38 Geary MUNI bus daily, so they are prioritizing the "needs of the many" over the "needs of the few".
- 2) When making a right turn, safely enter the transit-only lane as you approach the intersection. You will notice that the solid white line separating the transit-only lane turns dashed approximately half a block prior to the intersection. This is where you should enter the transit-only lane. If you drive seven blocks in the transit-only lane and then tell me you were going to turn right on Masonic, you're probably getting a ticket. Similarly, if you drive past seven blocks of stationary traffic in the transit-only lane, with your left turn signal on, and then tell me, "No one would let me in!", you're probably getting a ticket.

Transit-only lanes: Did you know?

In a Transit-Only Lane...

You CAN:

- Make a right turn at intersections and driveways. Safely enter the transit-only lane as you approach the intersection or driveway.
- Access parking. People driving may enter a transit-only lane to pull in or out of a curbside parking space or loading zone.

You CANNOT:

- Pick up, drop off or double park. Like any active traffic lane, pick-ups, drop-offs and double parking are not allowed in transit-only lanes.
- **Drive.** People driving and bicycling are only allowed to enter a transit-only lane when necessary to turn, park or reach the curb.



Red transit lanes are often dashed approaching intersections to make it easier to know where to enter the lane before making a turn.



SFPD Academy's 261st Basic Class Graduates

The San Francisco Police Department held a graduation ceremony for the 261st Basic Academy Class, on Friday, February 8, 2018. There were 37 recruits graduating (34 men and 3 women).

Two members have earned Master's degrees, 15 have earned Bachelor's degrees and seven have earned Associate's degrees. Four graduates served in the military as members of the US Army and US Marine Corps. Members of the class have previously served as SFPD Cadets, Emergency Medical Technicians, Loss Prevention/Security, TSA Screeners, and were employed in the fields of Construction and Customer Service.

Several Graduates are bilingual, fluent in Spanish, Tagalog, Mandarin, Cantonese, Vietnamese and American Sign Language.

The academy class has completed 34 weeks of training. Following the graduation, the newly sworn SFPD officers will begin a 16-week field-training program at various district stations.
