Captain Ed Del Carlo's Message

Greetings Southern District Members,

During the month of January members of Southern Station focused on traffic and pedestrian safety. In addition to the daily focus on traffic violations by patrol officers, Southern Station had several operations focused on enforcement and education.

One operation focused on two main corridors, Mission Street and Bryant Street. These two streets serve as main pathways through our district, and are heavily traveled with all forms of transportation. The main focus was speed, or driving too fast for the prevailing conditions. The intersection of Ninth and Mission and Tenth and Bryant are two areas that we continue to focus our enforcement efforts. Over thirty citations were issued.

Another operation was district wide and focused on speed and other Vehicle Code violations. Pedestrian safety is also a top priority. Members of Southern Station partnered with our Traffic Company to conduct an operation focused on issuing citations to drivers who do not yield to pedestrians in a clearly marked cross walk. Southern Station Officers dressed in plain clothes acted as pedestrians on a busy portion of Second Street. Officers riding motorcycles then observed the violation and took appropriate action. During this operation officers were able to engage members of the community that were watching the operation on pedestrian safety, and to inform the public to be aware of their surroundings on our heavily traveled streets.

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on the police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Southern Station officers coordinate with city
 agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on
 illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and
 support.
- <u>Foot Patrols</u>: Southern Station has beat officers assigned to the Mission Street corridor from 4th St to 9th St and on 6th St between Mission St and Howard St.
- <u>Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings</u>: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- <u>Email Updates</u>: Southern Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the district that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the district station.




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Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

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Crime Definition

Robbery - Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony battery**) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.





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BURGLARIES / TREASURE ISLAND & YBI January 3 - January 31, 2019









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In an effort to improve vehicular and pedestrian safety Citywide, the San Francisco Police Department has identified the five most dangerous intersections in the Southern District. We have implemented the "Focus on the Five" traffic safety initiative. Southern Station Officers will be engaging in increased traffic enforcement at these intersections.

Focus on the Five Dangerous Intersections

3rd St@Brannan St

Market St @ Octavia St

10th St @ Harrison St

7th St @ Mission St

22450(a) CVC: The driver of any vehicle approaching a stop sign at the entrance to, or within, an intersection shall stop at a limit line, if marked, otherwise before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection

21453 (a) CVC: A driver facing a steady circular red signal alone shall stop at a marked limit line, but if none, before entering the crosswalk on the near side of the intersection, and shall remain stopped until an indication to proceed is shown.

22350 CVC: No person shall drive a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than is reasonable or prudent having due regard for weather, visibility, the traffic on, and the surface and width of, the highway, and in no event at a speed which endangers the safety of persons or property.

21950(a) CVC: The driver of a vehicle shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within any marked crosswalk or within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except as otherwise provided in this chapter.

22107 CVC: No person shall turn a vehicle from a direct course or move right or left upon a roadway until such movement can be made with reasonable safety and then only after the giving of an appropriate signal in the manner provided in this chapter in the event any other vehicle may be affected by the movement.

Volunteer to serve on the San Francisco Civil Grand Jury

San Francisco Superior Court is seeking volunteers for the Civil Grand Jury. The Civil Grand Jury is the "watchdog" for the City and County of San Francisco. The Civil Grand Jury investigates the operations of City government, including officials, departments, and agencies. Each year, the Civil Grand Jury issues reports based on its findings. Those reports are heard before the Board of Supervisors.

The Civil Grand Jury will serve from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020. The application deadline is May 17, 2019.

Eligibility Requirements:

- · 18 years of age or older and a United States citizen.
- San Francisco resident for at least the past 12 months.
- Able to commit time consistently throughout the term.
- Desire to work together with other committed San Franciscans.

SAN FRANCISCO CIVIL GRAND JURY FACT SHEET AND SELECTION TIMELINE

What is the Civil Grand Jury?

- As required by the California Constitution, the Civil Grand Jury is a "watchdog" that investigates the
 operations of the City and County government, including its officers, departments, and agencies.
- The Civil Grand Jury is 19 members randomly drawn from a pool of applicants who volunteer to serve for a one year term.

How does it Work?

- Each Civil Grand Jury determines, by majority vote, which issues related to the government of the City
 and County of San Francisco to investigate. Typically, the Jury divides itself into committees, which carry
 out the investigations and write the reports.
- To do the investigations and write its reports, Civil Grand Jurors review records and financial documents; interview City and County department heads, elected officials, and staff; and visit government facilities.
 The entire Jury must vote to approve reports.
- After the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court reviews the reports to ensure they meet legal requirements, the reports are issued. The affected departments are required by law to respond to each finding and recommendation contained in the reports.
- The Board of Supervisors holds a public hearing on each report. The Civil Grand Jury presents the report,
 and each affected department responds. The Board of Supervisors then issues its own response.

When?

- The entire Civil Grand Jury meets once per week, generally in the late afternoon. Subcommittees meet as needed. Most of the Jury's work takes place during regular business hours.
- Jurors must be able to serve the entire term, from July 1 through June 30. Jurors must be able to commit
 time consistently throughout the term.

Who is Eligible?

 In order to volunteer to be considered for the Civil Grand Jury, you must be a United States citizen; at least 18 years of age; have lived in San Francisco for at least the past one year; have no felony convictions; and have the ability to communicate in English.

How do I Apply?

- Applications may be downloaded from http://civilgrandjury.sfgov.org/join.html, or you may pick one up at San Francisco Superior Court, 400 McAllister Street, Room 007. The application deadline is on May 17, 2019.
- The most qualified applicants will be invited to attend a mandatory informational session on May 21 or May 30, 2019.
- Selection by a panel of Superior Court Judges will be held on June 7, 2019.
- The 2019 2020 Civil Grand Jury will be trained on June 10, 17, 18, and 24, 2019.
- The 2019 2020 Civil Grand Jury takes office on July 1, 2019.
