Robbery

May 27th, 2019 – 12:25 pm- 800 Blk. of Jamestown Ave. (SFPD 190379337)

On 05/27/2019, Officers responded to Candle Stick park for a Robbery call. The officers found the victim who stated that he was robbed. The victim was approached by the suspects and suspect (1) told him, "give that to me". The suspect punched the victim and he fell to the ground. The suspects took his camera from around his neck and fled the scene.

Robbery W/ Gun

May 27th, 2019 – 5:00 pm- 900 Block of Barnevald Ave. (SFPD 190380118)

On 05/27/2019, Officers responded to 57 S weeny St. to attempt to locate a crime scene. CHP notified units that they had a victim of an incident that occurred at the address. Officers located a crime scene. Officers talked to the victim who stated that suspect (1) blocked his car in the parking spot, got out of his vehicle and entered the victim's vehicle. The suspect pulled out a handgun and pointed it at the victim. The victim struggled with the suspect. During the struggle, the victim was hit in the face with the gun. The suspect fired one round inside the vehicle. The victim gave the suspect his money because he feared for his life. A physical fight happened between the victim and suspect (1) outside the car. Suspect (2) got out of a car and started hitting the victim. All the suspects got into a car. During the incident the victim was hit by the suspect vehicle. The suspects fled the scene.

Robbery

May 27th, 2019 – 5:45 pm- Commer Ct. and Garlington Ct. (SFPD 190380174)

On 05/27/2019, Officers met with a victim of a robbery at Bayview station. The victim stated that she was walking when a vehicle stopped and the suspect got out. The victim and the suspect got into a verbal argument. The suspect started punching the victim and took the necklace off her neck. During the incident, the victim sustained injuries to her face and was bit on her hand. The victim lost consciousness during the incident. The suspect fled the scene.

Aggravated Assault Arrest

May 27th, 2019- 6:47 pm-**3801 3rd St.** (SFPD 190279000)

On 05/05/2019, Officers were notified via a department bulletin of two suspects wanted for an aggravated assault and battery. Officers saw the suspects on Revere St. and detained the suspects. The suspects were placed under arrest.

Robbery, W/Gun

May 27th, 2019 – 7:50 pm- 1100 Thomas Ave. (SFPD 190380356)

On 05/27/2019, Officers responded to a call of a man with a gun. Officers talked to the victims at the scene. Victim (2) told the officers that he was sitting in a car when the suspects walked up to the car. One of the suspects pulled out a gun and pointed it at him. The suspect (1) reached over him and took the cell phone and car keys. Victim (1) corroborated the incident detailed by Victim (2).

Warrant Arrest

May 29th, 2019 – 10:35 am- 500 Blk of Flood Ave. (SFPD 190384580)

During the 3 months prior to the listed date a plain-clothes officer at Bayview station started an investigation into the location of the suspect. The suspect had a warrant out of Alaska for murder. The suspect is known to the plain-clothes team for past contacts. The suspect has eluded capture for the past 3 years. During a lengthy investigation, it was determined that the suspect had returned to the bay area. Through the investigation, the officers confirmed the location of the suspect and obtained a search warrant for the location. The suspect was detained and placed under arrest coming out of a backyard on the same block as the above address. Officers talked to witnesses to establish the path that the suspect walked. The officers found a Firearm on the path that the suspect took.

Robbery, W/Gun

May 29th, 2019 – 1:00 pm- Unit block of Wheat St. (SFPD 190363722)

On 05/22/2019, There was an incident that involved a suspect that had a verbal argument with the victim over money. During the incident the suspect stole a battery from the victims trailer. The victim confronted the suspect and the suspect pointed a gun at him and fired one time to the side of the victim. The Robbery unit took over the investigation of the case. During the investigation the suspect was identified. During the investigation it was determined that the suspect frequents the address on Wheat St. At the address the suspect was detained and placed under arrest.


Attempted Robbery

May 31st, 2019 – 6:10 am- 1500 Blk of Innes St. (SFPD 190389922)

On 05/31/2019, Officers responded to the address for a robbery with a firearm call. The victim stated that he was outside of his house when Suspect (1) walked up to him and asked a question. Suspect (2) walked up from behind him while Suspect (1) pulled out a gun and pointed at him. The suspects attempted to take the victims phone out of his pocket. The victim and suspects struggled over the phone as while the victim was being dragged down the street. The victim held onto his property and the suspects fled in a waiting vehicle.

Crime Definition

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

*<u>Assault</u> is when a person swings their arm and <u>battery</u> is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.





Definition of Suspicious activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.

- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.

- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



Department News

SFPD Makes Arrest in Ingleside Homicide



On May 20, 2019 a missing person report was generated by Ingleside Station for 73 year-old San Francisco resident Benedict Ching.

A co-worker contacted a family member of Mr. Ching to advise her that he did not show up for work on May 18, 2019. On May 20, 2019 at approximately 11:40 AM police officers from Ingleside Station accompanied Mr.Ching's family member to his home to conduct a well-being check. Police made entry into the home and discovered a body, believed to be Mr. Ching. Investigators determined that his disappearance and death was a result of foul play.

The SFPD Homicide Detail began an investigation that led to the identification of two possible suspects: 44 year-old Douglas Lomas and 35 year-old Stephanie Ching, both of San Francisco. Homicide investigators received information that Lomas and Ching were on enroute to China. With the assistance of the federal Homeland Security Investigations SFPD was able to locate, identify, and detain the subjects who landed in Beijing, China. The subjects were flown to Virginia and are currently being housed in the Loudoun Adult Detention Center in Leesburg, VA where they were arrested and booked for homicide.

Investigators are currently working on the extradition process to bring the subjects back to San Francisco. Booking photos of the subjects are not available at this time.

The arrest of the suspects comes via collaboration with Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) San Francisco. HSI was instrumental in locating and coordinating this arrest without incident.

Although arrests have been made, anyone with information is asked to call the SFPD 24-hour tip line at 1-415-575-4444 or Text a Tip to TIP411 and begin the message with SFPD. You may remain anonymous.




Police Reserve Program

The Police Reserve Officer Program is comprised of community members, such as yourself, and retired police officers who wish to volunteer as a Reserve Police Officer. These officers supplement the full-time officers in a variety of duties throughout the Department. This program is ideal for individuals who have an established career but always wanted to experience being a Police Officer. Reserve Officers can enjoy the best of both worlds, maintain their chosen career while helping to police an internationally known city. There will be a Level III Reserve Police Academy starting on September 23, 2019 and it will conclude on December 4th. The Reserve Academy takes place on Mondays and Wednesdays from 6pm to 10pm and all day on Saturdays from 8am to 5pm. The cost for the Academy is 1765.00. This is the minimum requirement to be a Level III Reserve in the state of California. This is a volunteer position with great training opportunities and experiences seldom seen. Volunteer to serve on the San Francisco Civil Grand Jury

San Francisco Superior Court is seeking volunteers for the Civil Grand Jury. The Civil Grand Jury is the "watchdog" for the City and County of San Francisco. The Civil Grand Jury investigates the operations of City government, including officials, departments, and agencies. Each year, the Civil Grand Jury issues reports based on its findings. Those reports are heard before the Board of Supervisors.

The Civil Grand Jury will serve from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020. The application deadline is May 17, 2019.

Eligibility Requirements:

- 18 years of age or older and a United States citizen.
- San Francisco resident for at least the past 12 months.
- Able to commit time consistently throughout the term.
- Desire to work together with other committed San Franciscans.

What is the Civil Grand Jury?

• As required by the California Constitution, the Civil Grand Jury is a "watchdog" that investigates the operations of the City and County government, including its officers, departments, and agencies.

• The Civil Grand Jury is 19 members randomly drawn from a pool of applicants who volunteer to serve for a one year term.

How does it Work?

• Each Civil Grand Jury determines, by majority vote, which issues related to the government of the City and County of San Francisco to investigate. Typically, the Jury divides itself into committees, which carry out the investigations and write the reports.

• To do the investigations and write its reports, Civil Grand Jurors review records and financial documents; interview City and County department heads, elected officials, and staff; and visit government facilities. The entire Jury must vote to approve reports.

• After the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court reviews the reports to ensure they meet legal requirements, the reports are issued. The affected departments are required by law to respond to each finding and recommendation contained in the reports.

• The Board of Supervisors holds a public hearing on each report. The Civil Grand Jury presents the report, and each affected department responds. The Board of Supervisors then issues its own response. **When?**

• The entire Civil Grand Jury meets once per week, generally in the late afternoon. Subcommittees meet as needed. Most of the Jury's work takes place during regular business hours.

• Jurors must be able to serve the entire term, from July 1 through June 30. Jurors must be able to commit time consistently throughout the term.

Who is Eligible?

• In order to volunteer to be considered for the Civil Grand Jury, you must be a United States citizen; at least 18 years of age; have lived in San Francisco for at least the past one year; have no felony convictions; and have the ability to communicate in English.

How do I Apply?

• Applications may be downloaded from http://civilgrandjury.sfgov.org/join.html, or you may pick one up at San Francisco Superior Court, 400 McAllister Street, Room 007. The application deadline is on May 17, 2019.

• The most qualified applicants will be invited to attend a mandatory informational session on May 21 or May 30, 2019.

• Selection by a panel of Superior Court Judges will be held on June 7, 2019.

- The 2019 2020 Civil Grand Jury will be trained on June 10, 17, 18, and 24, 2019.
- The 2019 2020 Civil Grand Jury takes office on July 1, 2019.

- Hold bags in your lap or under your arm 3
- Thieves may "snatch and grab" by a door 2 when you approach a stop

With over 2,300 different telephone numbers listed to access local government services, many people did not know what number to dial to reach the appropriate department. Now you can connect to city services with only two numbers to remember: 911 for emergencies and 3-1-1 for everything else.

Before 311, over 50% of calls to the 911 center were not emergency related. 311 relieves 911 operators from these non-emergency calls. If a catastrophic emergency such as an earthquake occurs, 311 operators will be able to provide accurate information to assist during the recovery. In the unlikely event the 911 facilities becomes inoperative, the 311 call center will function as a back-up.

Dispose of Unwanted and Expired Medication at Bayview Station

There is a new secured bin at Bayview Station where you can dispose of unwanted and expired medication at any time of the day or night.

The bin will accept any type of prescription and off the shelf medication except for:

Herbal Remedies Vitamins **Supplements** Cosmetics Other personal care products **Compressed Cylinders** Aerosols Inhalers **Medical Devices** Sharps **Illicit drugs**



lodine containing medication.

When disposing the medication, please leave it in the original container with your personal information crossed out or removed. You can also place the medication into a clear plastic zip top baggies. Contact the front desk officer and inform them that you want your medication dispose of. The officer will assist you.

Please note that once an item that had been disposed of inside the bin, we cannot retrieve it. So make sure your ring, cell phone or anything of value is not accidentally disposed of.
