Dear Residents and Community Members,

Warm is upon us!

And with warm weather comes an increase in pedestrian traffic throughout our district. Our largest area for pedestrian traffic is Union Square, but Fisherman's Wharf and the surrounding side streets are flooded with bicycles, tuk-tuk's, GoCar tour cars and pedestrian traffic.

As always, we want to keep our residents and visitors safe and up to date with the latest public safety tips:

Always walk on the sidewalk; if there is no sidewalk, walk facing traffic, as far from the roadway as you can.

Look for cars and motorized vehicles in all directions, including those turning before crossing the street. Never assume a driver sees you or will stop. Make eye contact with drivers before crossing to make sure they see you.

Use crosswalks whenever possible. Cross the street where you have the best view of traffic. Don't cross midblock or diagonally. If there's no crosswalk nearby, cross in a well-lit area where you have the best view of traffic. Look left, right, and left again.

No crosswalk? Yield to traffic. Pedestrians walking outside of crosswalks must yield to all other traffic.

Be careful crossing multiple lanes of traffic. Make sure each lane of traffic is clear before you cross. At bus stops, cross behind the bus or at the nearest crosswalk.

Obey all pedestrian traffic signals. Be predictable to drivers and follow the rules of the road.

Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles to locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Central Station officers coordinate with city
 agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on
 illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and
 support.
- <u>Foot Patrols</u>: Central Station have beat officers assigned to Union Square, Fisherman's Wharf, Chinatown, North Beach and Market/Drumm area.
- <u>Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings</u>: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- <u>Email Updates</u>: Central Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.

Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team

(ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

- 1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
- If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
- If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.


