Whether it be in our schools, in the workplace or on the Internet, the damage done through creating an atmosphere of hate, fear, and intimidation is the impetus behind many police calls for service. In light of recent gun violence that has occurred within some of our nation's schools, I believe that it is all of our responsibility to have a conversation about the importance of inclusion and communication for all

When looking for a hometown hero leading the campaign to stop bullying within our schools, comedian Michael Pritchard stands out as a champion. Mr. Pritchard has taken the life lessons learned in his early career as a San Francisco Juvenile Probation Officer and has infused compassion, empathy, kindness and laughter into many bay area classrooms where he conducts anti-bullying presentations. Emphasizing communications skills, diversity, and conflict resolution, Mr. Pritchard looks to bring youth together on common ground with an understanding that we all share common hopes, fears, struggles and needs. It is in bringing diverse communities together and sharing common ground that significant breakthroughs can be realized.

In the Northern Police District of San Francisco, your police officers are carrying the message of inclusion, accessibility and kindness to new heights. School Resource Officers Frank Chinawah and Eureka Monroe spend all of their working days within our several district schools, speaking at assemblies, meeting with students, and advising parents on ways to keep the schools safe and free from violence and negativity. Chestnut Street Foot-beat Officer Jabari Jackson, a former Oakland Raider, inspires the next generation of San Francisco youth as a Police Activity League Football Coach. Midnight Officer Jonathan Cairo has taken on the role of mentor, role model and academic advisor for a 15 year old high school student being raised by his mother in a single parent household.

These are but a few of many acts of kindness exhibited by your Northern Station police officers on a daily basis. Always staying positive, looking for the good in people, reaching higher to find ways to improve both individually and collectively; these are core themes that I emphasize in the Northern Police Station workplace. Like any other profession, there are results driven challenges and pressures that come with being a police officer. A critical characteristic of ethical policing is to never allow the ends to justify the means in getting to a result.





Officer Stephen Hom








INCIDENT RECAPS

On 4/20/19, a burglary occurred at 958 Buchanan Street. The video surveillance officer of Northern SIT obtained video showing the subject gaining entry into a gated area of the victim's home and breaking a window in an attempt to gain entry inside the home. On 5/9/19, a crime alert was distributed with an image of the subject in an attempt to identify him. Once the subject was identified, and alert was distributed with a want for that subject.

On 5/10/19, Bayview Station Officers who have had numerous contacts with the subject made contact with him while on patrol, and placed him under arrest for the burglary in the Northern District.

On 5/10/19 at about 1200 hours, Officers witnessed a subject driving a vehicle and committing numerous traffic violations. The Officers then effected a traffic stop on the subject and his vehicle in the area of Steiner/Green. The driver of the vehicle then admitted to never having a driver's license, which officers and then verified using their vehicles computer. After performing a computer check on the subject, it was revealed that the subject had been convicted out of San Francisco on an unrelated concealed firearm case. The subject then complied with officer's instructions to exit the vehicle, at which point they performed a vehicle tow search. As officers were searching the vehicle, the subject informed them that there was a firearm inside the vehicle. Officers then located a loaded pistol with high-capacity magazine and seized it. Officers also located marijuana inside the vehicle. The subject stated that his passenger had no knowledge of the firearm and was then only cited for not wearing a seatbelt. The subject was arrested for the above listed charges. The make of the firearm is unknown. It had a polymer frame and metal both, both with not words or insignias. There was a serial number plate on the underside of the frame but it was blank; it contained no serial number. The extended magazine was labeled with "9mm" and 33RD," indicating it holds 33 rounds.







Distracted Driving

Distracted driving is anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road. In the smartphone age, distracted driving is the most dangerous when drivers are using their cell phone behind the wheel.

Whether it is talking, emailing, texting, plugging in directions, using an app or scrolling through social media feeds, using a cell phone is not only dangerous, but also illegal.

In 2017, 3,166 people were killed in distracted driving related crashes across the country, or nearly 10 percent of all traffic deaths.

Using a phone to dial, talk or text triples the risk of a driver getting into a crash. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field with your eyes closed.

Other serious driver distractions such as eating, grooming, reaching for objects on the floor, changing clothes or talking with passengers are just as dangerous. The safest thing drivers can do is put down the phone, focus on the road and just drive.







Cell Phone Law



Holding a phone while driving is illegal. Any electronic device must be used in a hands-free manner, such as speaker or voice commands. The law applies when at a stop sign or signal.



To use a phone while driving, it must be mounted on the dashboard, windshield (seveninch square in lower right corner or five-inch square in lower left corner), or center console.



When the phone is mounted, drivers can swipe or tap the screen once to activate or deactivate a feature. It is illegal to swipe multiple times, enter information or text.



A first offense ticket is \$162, with additional offenses costing even more.



You may use your phone while holding it for true emergencies, like calling 911.
