Captain Joe Engler's Message

Residents, Merchants, and Visitors

Memorial Day is an American holiday observed every year on the last Monday of May. This federal holiday, which also coincides with the end of the traditional school year and the start of summer, was instituted to honor the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. Military. The significance and importance of this holiday was amplified in the simple and honest words of Northern Station Officer Brian Donahue.

Officer Donahue is a six year veteran of the San Francisco Police Department. He is assigned the Lower Polk Street foot-beat along with his partner, Officer Calvinn Wang. These talented officers are well known in the corridor which abuts City Hall and extends to Geary Street. Narcotics sales and usage, homelessness, severe mental health issues and heavily traveled streets and sidewalks create daily policing challenges for Officers Donahue and Wang. These challenges are met with empathy, even-handedness and the highest level of professionalism by the two beat officers.

Having introduced the work performed by Officers Wang and Donahue, I would now like to go behind the uniform and star to discuss the talent, ability and character of these men. Officer Wang was raised in San Francisco's Bayview and Richmond districts and went on to receive a Biomedical Engineering degree from UC Irvine. Prior to his calling to serve with the SFPD, Officer Wang worked in the South Bay for Genentech. His partner, Officer Donahue, is equally impressive. A Naval Academy graduate with a degree in History, Officer Donahue served our country for ten years, with six of those being on active duty and a deployment to the Abraham Lincoln Battle Group assigned to the Northern Arabian Gulf. Officer Donahue continued his studies at the University of San Diego where he received a Master's degree in Global Leadership.

Yesterday, in aniticpation of the three day weekend, I asked Officer Donahue how he will spend his time. His reply says it all.

"Captain, I will be catching up on projects around my home, spending some time outdoors with my wife and kids and, on Monday, we will all go to the Presidio to honor those soldiers who gave their lives for us."



On 5/17/19 at 1138 hours, officers responded to a call of a fight in the area of the 1700 block of Union Street. The victim informed the officers that she is a therapist and that the subject has been a client of hers for the past three years. Over the past two months the subject started to obsess over the victim, at which point the victim started to limit her contact with the subject. For the last two weeks, the subject continued to harass the victim via text message and emails. The subject also obtained contact information for the victim's family and tied to contact her through them. The subject continued to threaten to harm herself, however she was never 5150'ed due to her not meeting criteria upon police officer's arrival. On 5/17/19 at 1125 hours, the victim was in her office on a phone consultation with a different client when the subject barged into her office, yelling at the victim, and when the victim attempted to call the police, the subject stole the phone from the victim. The victim then tackled the subject in order to retrieve her cell phone, with success. When the victim yelled for help, the subject then fled the office. At approximately 2328 hours, Taraval station officers attempted to locate the subject at her residence, to no avail. Officers were able to obtain the subject's phone number from her roommate, and called her on the phone. The subject agreed to meet with officers in the Northern District. Officers met with the subject and successfully arrested her without incident.

On 5/17/19 at approximately 1910 hours, Northern Station Street Crimes Unit were conducting auto burglary surveillance in the area of Japan Town. Officers witnessed the subjects driving in a vehicle, casing various vehicles parked in the area. Officers saw the first subject exit the passenger side of the vehicle, approach the rear side of the victims' vehicle and then the subject re-entered his vehicle caring various bags that he did not have earlier. Officers began to follow the subjects' vehicle and broadcasted the description over the air. Officers from the Park District notified Northern Officers of the vehicle's location. The Northern Street Crimes Unit then responded to the area and successfully found the vehicle and approached it. The first subject was in the passenger seat with stolen property on his lap and the second subject was in the driver's seat. The subjects complied with officers' orders exit the vehicle. Officers conducted a patch search of the first subject and located broken glass on his person. Officers successfully located and recovered stolen property from two vehicles that were boosted. The subjects were then arrested without incident.







To most effectively reduce crime, neighbors must work together to make their neighborhood safe. The SAFE agency manages the Neighborhood Watch Program for the City & County of San Francisco. SAFE, with support from SFPD and DPW, will get Neighborhood Watch signs installed on individual blocks. Groups are able to apply for Neighborhood Watch signs after forming active groups. Signs are a way to publicize the efforts of your group, letting others know that yours is a SAFE neighborhood and one in which crime will not be tolerated.


