#### Captain Joe Engler's Message

#### Residents, Merchants, and Visitor

Every year, in communities big and small, there are heartbreaking stories of fatal car collisions involving newly graduated high school students who made the deadly choice to drink and drive. Elation is replaced by tragedy and communities and families are left to plan funerals rather than the new chapter of a young persons life.

National statistics show that graduating teenagers are particularly atrisk during graduation week to the perils associated with driving while impaired by alcohol and or drugs. The common recurring theme of these tragedies is that the students were excited to begin the next chapter of their life; that the youth had so much promise and potential; and that the new graduate was not known to be a "drinker" to their parents, friends, and peers.

Parents are left with a broken-heart and sense of loss that can never be healed. Teachers are burdened with a sense of failure in not imparting the final lesson of safety and sobriety. Communities are torn apart as the tragedy leads to finger pointing and blame for senseless deaths that should not have occurred.

As we celebrate the end of the school year with the graduation and promotion of all of our community's students, our officers have been instructed to be on the lookout for any person behind the wheel of an automobile under the influence of spirits or narcotics. With the lives of our youth at stake, there will be nothing casual about our officers' enforcement of laws for driving while under the influence.

Your Northern Station officers know that our several neighborhoods and commercial corridors will be the host of many family gatherings and social events in celebration of graduations and promotions. Our general practice of partnering with stakeholders like the SF Unified School District and our district's several private schools will pay dividends as we emphasize the importance of students making responsible choices during graduation week.

School Resource Officers Frank Chinawah and Eureka Monroe have been sharing this message with our district's several school teachers and administrators for the past several weeks. The positive response from their efforts is the inspiration behind this week's message.

This weekend, aside from the several school graduations, there are community events which will bring out large numbers of community members and visitors alike. The African American Art and Culture Complex is hosting a two night comedy show on Friday and Saturday evenings. The Annual Union Street Fair will occur on Saturday and Sunday in Cow Hollow.

As you enjoy the weekend, please make good choices and be safe.




## Officer Jonathan Cairo

#### **INCIDENT RECAPS**

On 5/20/19 at 1907 hours, officers responded to a call of an auto boost in progress in the area of Fulton/Octavia. Witnesses on the scene flagged down the attention of a security guard regarding a subject who had just broken into a vehicle. The security guard approached the subject

who had the victim's property in his possession, and successfully placed the subject in handcuffs pending officers' arrival. Once officers arrived on scene, they took custody of the subject and confirmed the property in his possession did in fact belong to the victim and that it had been taken out of the vehicle. The subject was successfully booked for the auto boost

On 5/26/19 at 0725 hours, the victim heard noises coming from her balcony outside her bedroom window in the area of Fell/Webster. The victim witnessed the subject outside her window, got scared, and ran out of her apartment to find the building manager. When the victim returned to her apartment, she noticed that her front door had been closed even though she left it open when she ran out. The victim then called 911 and waited for police to arrive. Once officers arrived on scene, the subject was still barricaded in the victim's apartment, at which time, officers gave the victim numerous orders to exit, but when she did not comply, they deemed it necessary to force entry into the apartment. Officers gave the subject multiple commands to raise her hands and surrender, however she refused. After several minutes of commands, the subject eventually complied and was successfully placed into handcuffs and arrested for burglary.







# **Safety-San Francisco**






To most effectively reduce crime, neighbors must work together to make their neighborhood safe. The SAFE agency manages the Neighborhood Watch Program for the City & County of San Francisco. SAFE, with support from SFPD and DPW, will get Neighborhood Watch signs installed on individual blocks. Groups are able to apply for Neighborhood Watch signs after forming active groups. Signs are a way to publicize the efforts of your group, letting others know that yours is a SAFE neighborhood and one in which crime will not be tolerated.

- 1. Apply with the City and County of San Francisco at www.jobaps.com/sf (Entry Level (Q-2) Police Officer)
- 2. Go to <a href="https://www.nationaltestingnetwork.com">www.nationaltestingnetwork.com</a>, choose law enforcement and register to take the San Francisco Police Department's Written Examination\*.

\*As part of this process, you will need to establish an account with NTN. A fee is required to take the written examination. Candidates with demonstrated financial hardship may submit a request to have the fee waived prior to test registration.
