Join the San Francisco Police Reserves



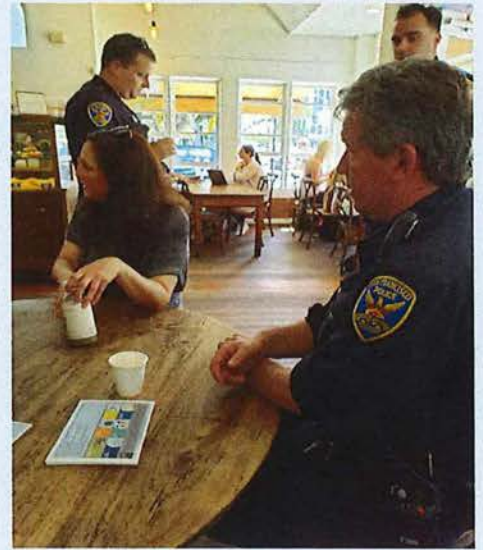
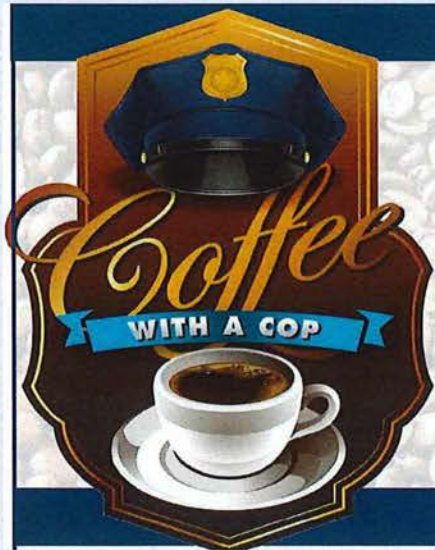
The Police Reserve Officer Program is comprised of community members, such as yourself, and retired police officers who wish to volunteer as a Reserve Police Officer. These officers supplement the full-time officers in a variety of duties throughout the Department. This program is ideal for individuals who have an established career but always wanted to experience being Police Officer. Reserve Officers can enjoy the best of both worlds, maintain their chosen career while helping to police an internationally known city. There will be a Level III Reserve Police Academy starting on September 23, 2019 and it will conclude on December 4th. The Reserve Academy takes place on Mondays and Wednesdays from 6pm to 10pm and all day on Saturdays from 8am to 5pm. The cost for the Academy is \$1765.00. This is the minimum requirement to be a Level III Reserve in the state of California. This is a volunteer position with great training opportunities and experiences seldom seen. The Level III Academy is 168 hours long.

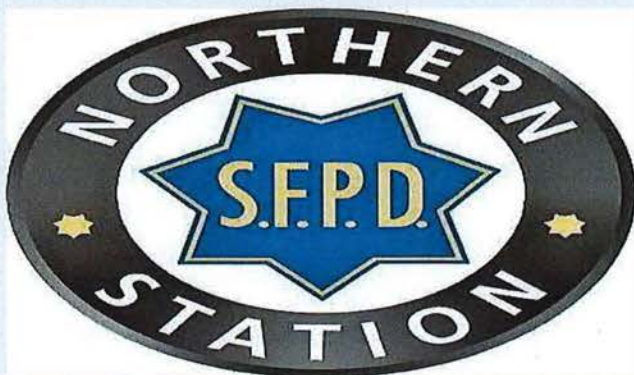

INCIDENT RECAPS

Between 5/8/19 and 6/6/19, Northern Station Street Crimes Unit has been investigating various auto burglaries with a black Lexus suspect vehicle committing the crimes. Through video surveillance and investigation, the subjects were identified in the incidents and were also connected with the Eddy Rock Street gang. With the help of SFPD's GTF unit, the subjects were identified and surveillance of the subjects, and the vehicle, ensued. Officers successfully attached an electronic tracking device to the wanted vehicle, which was located at the registered owner's house in Oakland. Various units and officers obtained numerous search warrants for the subjects' homes and the vehicle. On 6/6/19, officers located the Lexus and one subject in the Southern District, and successfully arrested the subject and took the vehicle into custody. Later that day, officers located the second subject and placed him under arrest without incident. Officers later returned to the Oakland residence to execute a search warrant of one of the subject's bedroom. In the bedroom, officers located a pistol (Silver pistol, Taurus PT140 Millennium, 40 caliber Serial# SA043617) from his dresser drawer. Due to the subject being a convicted felon, officers seized the firearm since it was prohibited for him to own. Officers then responded to the San Francisco residence, and seized commonly used auto burglary tools. Both subjects were successfully booked at Northern Station.

On 5/21/19, the victim contacted police regarding her vehicle being stolen as well as her car keys, pink slip, and credit cards as stolen from her residence in the area of the 1400 block of Eddy St. The victim reviewed her video surveillance and recognized the subject as being a contractor she had hired to do some minor housework as well as someone she went on two dates with approximately five years ago. After performing a DMV search, officers discovered that the subject was attempting to do a title change into his own name. The victim stated that the subject neither had permission to take her vehicle nor to use her credit cards. On 6/3/19, a SIT Sergeant and Officer, Northern Street Crimes Sergeant, and GTF Sergeant were acting in a plain clothes capacity and driving SFPD unmarked vehicles; they were conducting a surveillance to effect an arrest of the subject. At approximately 2156 hours, we observed a truck double parked facing south bound Webster St just east of Eddy St. From previous investigation, it was determined to be the subject's vehicle. I observed the victim speaking to the subject through his passenger side window. They traveled east bound Eddy St to southbound Webster St and maneuvered their unmarked vehicle around the front end of the vehicle. They approached the subject's driver side door and identified themselves loudly as, "San Francisco Police!" and ordered the subject to exit the driver side of his vehicle. He was placed into handcuffs without incident and was transported to Northern Police Station by Northern uniformed officers. During a Mirandized interview of the subject, he denied stealing the victim's vehicle but agreed to give it back to the victim. Officers obtained the victim's keys and pink slip; they then provided them back to the victim and gave her a courtesy ride to retrieve her vehicle. Officers successfully obtained an EPO for the victim. The subject was booked without incident.

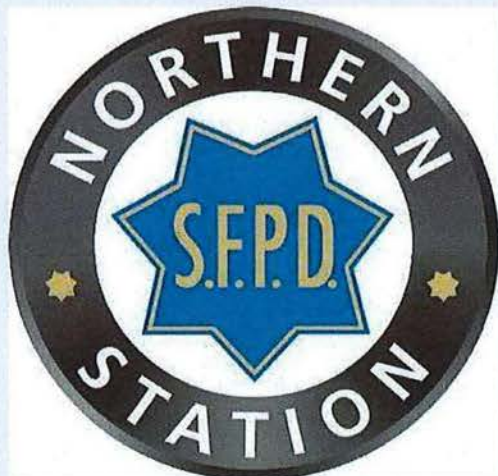

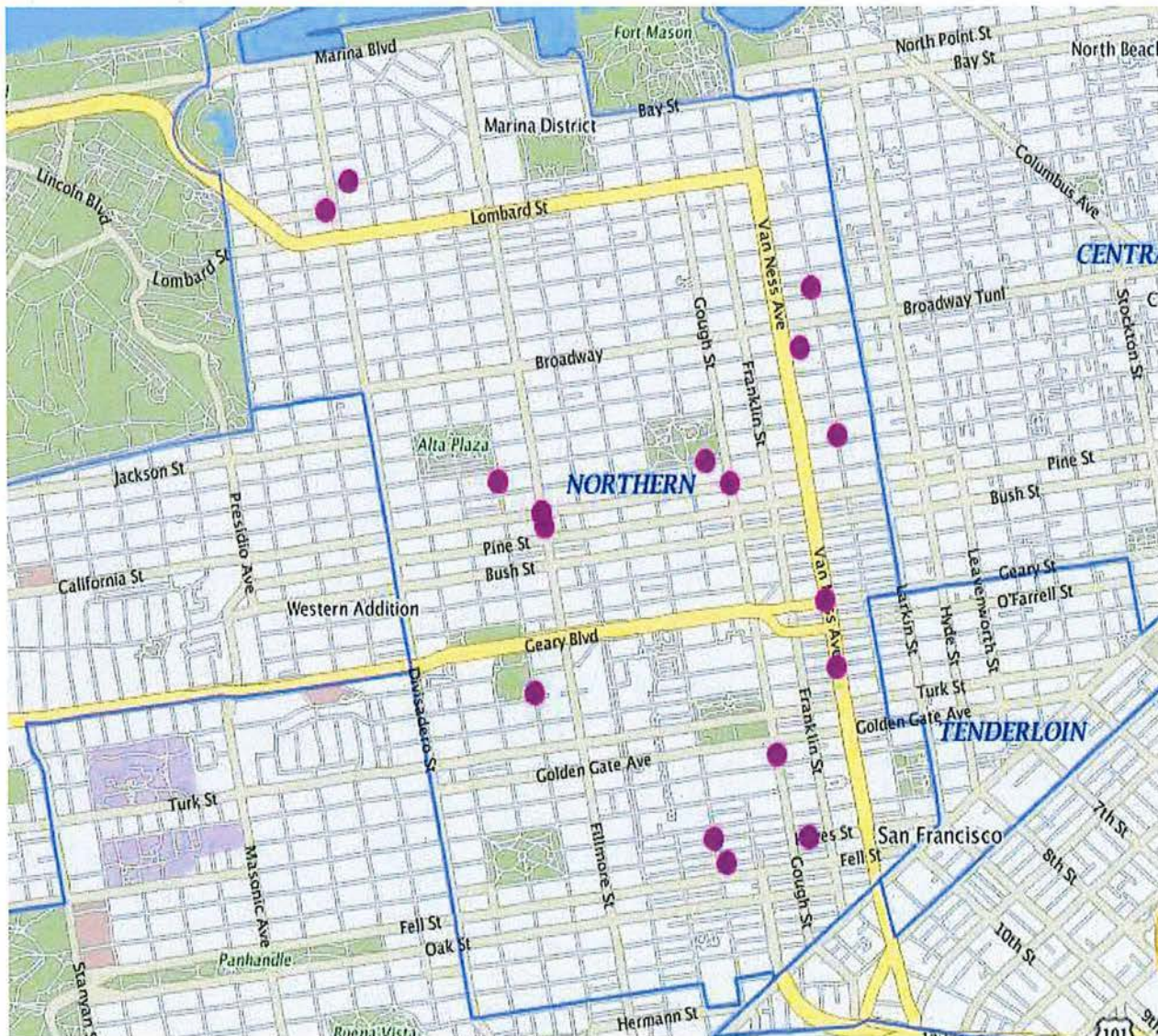

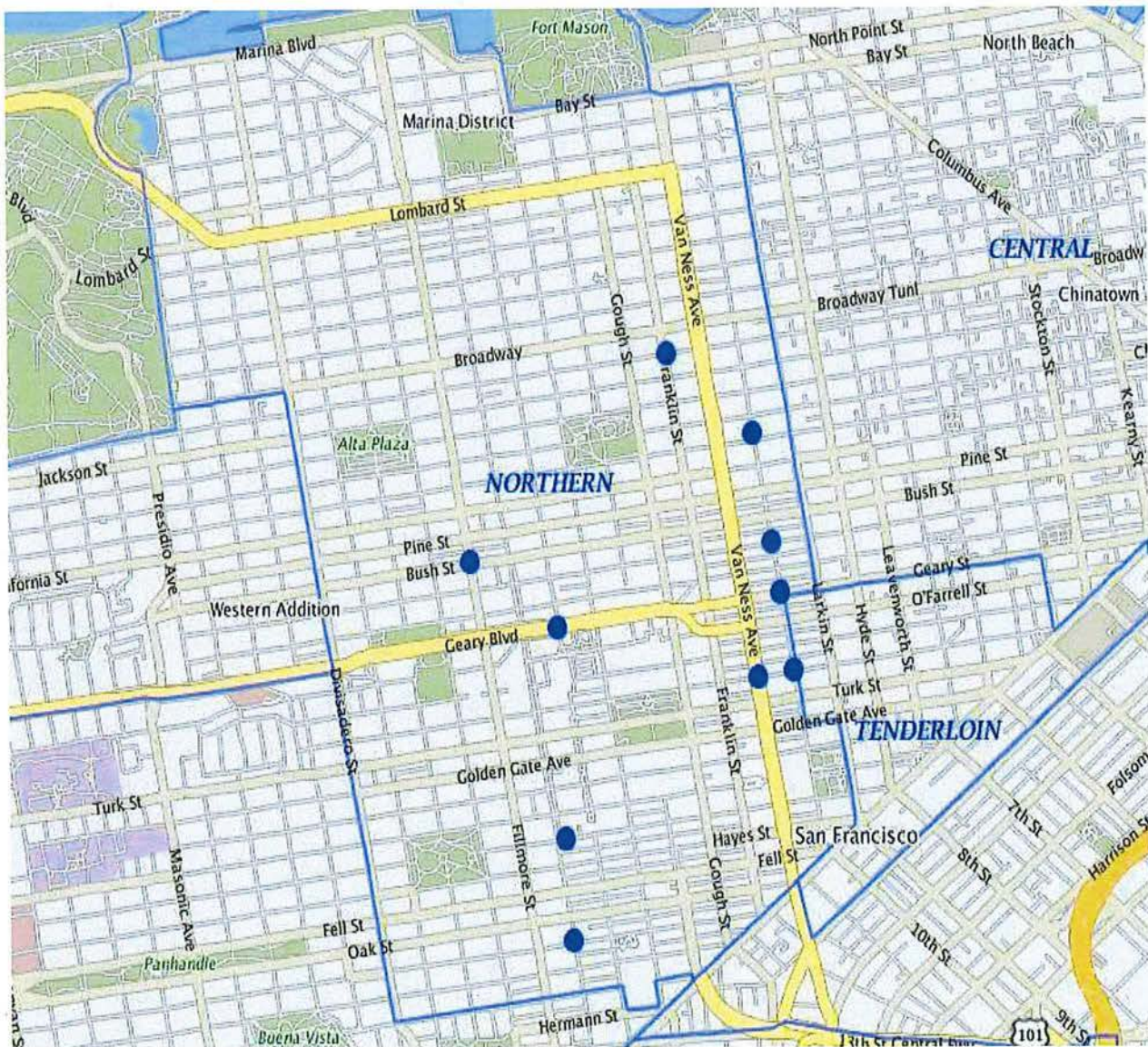

1. Apply with the City and County of San Francisco at www.jobaps.com/sf (Entry Level (Q-2) Police Officer)
2. Go to www.nationaltestingnetwork.com, choose law enforcement and register to take the San Francisco Police Department's Written Examination*.

*As part of this process, you will need to establish an account with NTN. A fee is required to take the written examination. Candidates with demonstrated financial hardship may submit a request to have the fee waived prior to test registration.
