Ensure nothing is visible in your parked car and remember not to leave your garage door opener in your car as we are seeing home burglaries where access is gained via the garage door opener stolen from the vehicle.

We are also finally getting some much needed rain, however with that comes concerns for pedestrians and drivers alike. Pedestrians please wear reflective gear when out at night as this will help with visibility. So often pedestrians are wearing dark clothing and are very difficult to see in the dark evenings. 

SUPERVISOR OF THE MONTH

<u>Captain Bailey has named</u> <u>Sergeant Joseph Salazar as the Supervisor Of</u> <u>The Month for December.</u>

Sergeant Joseph Salazar has been with the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) for 24 years. In the beginning of Sergeant Salazar career, he was sent to Central Station for Field Training, then transferred to Ingleside Station, where he completed his probationary period, and remained at Ingleside Station for his permanent assignment. During his time as an officer, Sergeant Salazar also worked at the following Units: Mission Station, Southern Station, Narcotics, and Violence Reduction Team (VRT).

In 2013, Sergeant Salazar was promoted to the rank of Sergeant, and completed his probation year at Taraval Station. For his permanent assignment, Sergeant Salazar was transferred to Park Station, where he supervised the plainclothes/ undercover unit. Sergeant Salazar is currently working Park Patrol.

During Sergeant Salazar's career, he has been awarded two (2) Silver Medals of Valor, along with numerous Captains' Commendations, and Police Commission Awards.

In 1989, Sergeant Salazar joined the Marine Corp, where he was stationed at the Marine Base in Yuma, Arizona. Sergeant Salazar did a tour of duty during Desert Storm. Sergeant Salazar ranked at Corporal, and was a Marine Corp Reserve in the Bay Area.

Before becoming a Police Officer, Sergeant Salazar always was interested in Criminal Justice, and while attending San Jose State University (SJSU) major in Administrative Justice. In 1995, Sergeant Salazar graduated from SJSU, where he earned his Bachelor's Degree of Science.

Sergeant Salazar enjoys sports, especially baseball. Sergeant Salazar has been a member of the San Francisco Baseball Club for over 15 years. Sergeant Salazar, and his wife are lifelong San Francisco bay area residence.

Officer Jeremy Cummings and Officer Kamakana Alvaro were awarded the Bronze Medal of Valor for an incident that involved a man, who had shot his mother, and barricaded himself in a house. While the male subject was still armed with a firearm, several Officers, including Officer Cummings and Officer Kamakana, ran up the stairs of the house and rescued the mother, so she could get immediate medical treatment. After a 15 hour stand-off, the male subject eventually surrendered.

Officer Cummings has been with the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) for 12 years. Officer Cummings began his career at Tenderloin Station for Field Training, completed his probationary period at Central Station, and was assigned to Mission Station. After 7 years at Mission Station, Officer Cummings transferred to Park Station, where he has worked for the past 4 years. Officer Cummings has chosen to spend most of his career working the midnight shift at each station.

Before becoming a Police Officer, Officer Cummings was the Director of a college IT/ Computer Department, while earning his Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice. Officer Cummings knew he did not want an office job, and an internship with the New Hampshire State Police convinced him to enter into Law Enforcement and join SFPD. Officer Cummings said, "I have loved every minute and have not looked back at that office job since joining the Police Department".

Besides working and patrolling the Haight Street area, Officer Cummings spends his time being a family man to his 3 children as well as riding motorcycles. Officer Cummings looks forward to one day being assigned as a motorcycle officer, and riding around the hills of San Francisco.


THANKSGIVING DELIVERY IN THE CENTRAL DISTRICT


Driving, No license Issued/ Area of Twin Peaks Blvd. -12/10/18 19:41


TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT

Set Up and Maintenance

 - Low Frame Rate saves on drive space and gives better image quality, but you may not get an image at all (now you see him; now you don't)

SAFE VIDEO SURVEILLANCE RECOMENDATIONS

- Obstructions displays and other objects blocking view should be eliminated.
 - Focus Problems must check system regularly to prevent.

Minimum camera resolution should be 480 horizontal lines.

Good cameras have faster lenses (allows more lighting), larger maximum aperture opening (lets more light into the focal point of the camera) and controls image brightness allows brighter images in dim lighting) – the more lighting, the more depth of field (greater depth of field; the more of the scene is in focus)

Focal Length – some cameras zoom in and out while others have a fixed focal length. The type of cameras used depends on what your needs are.

Transaction Areas - anything at a transaction point (cash register, toll booth, etc.), the subject's head should fill at least 15% of the total image in the frame, giving the detail you need.

Lines of Sight - lines of sight are always critical, make sure there are no obstructions

Site Plan - the right site plan is crucial (retail store blueprint or diagram). Key camera spots are at transaction points (cash registers and entry/exit points) - the more cameras, the better.

You want good camera overlap (you want multiple chances to capture good images). Extra coverage is also needed for aisles, restrooms and other key points

Camera Height - placement is very important, make sure it is as close to eve-level as possible. Otherwise, you might lose out to a baseball cap.

With a good site plan you can make sure you don't have any blind spots (you can toy around with camera positions, and do a test recording to see that you are getting what you want). interior Lighting - interior lighting can balance bright from one direction (back lighting) by adding another light source from a different location (add a bank of lights).

strait (if sunlight). Adding more light from a different direction balances lighting, giving better camera clarity (if sunlight is shining through large windows you can tent windows or add screens. Example: Artificial lighting (inside store) for cameras may be good in the morning, but by noon, the sun (through a doorway or window) can blow the entire frame out (add lighting to fill in for

Exterior Lighting – if lights are on timers, you must adjust appropriate to seasonal changes (Fall/Winter: gets dark earlier. Spring/Summer: gets dark later).

Park Police Station

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Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.



- Garage: When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- O Car: Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- 8 Spare Key: Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- O Door Buzzer: When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- 6 Security Cameras & Alarm Systems: Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- 6 Light Timers: Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows: Always keep doors and windows locked.

Keep property in good repair. Maintain visibility to your neighbors for increased safety.



Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- · Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- · Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- · Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- · Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- · Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Pease call the non- emergency dispatch line (415-553-0123) when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an <u>immediate</u> police response.

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1**.
