Most homes can be secured by methods that are cost-effective and aesthetically acceptable













NOISE







Increase chances of the burglar being seen by a neighbor or passerby by improving lighting, trimming shrubbery and putting up properly designed fencing around your home.

Time is of the essence for most burglars. The more time a burglar must take to get into your home, the more likely s/he will be seen or heard. Also, the better the locks you have on your doors and windows, the longer it will take a criminal to break in.

The sounds made by forcing entry into a building may be enough to alert a neighbor, especially if the break-in also causes the burglar alarm. If your doors and windows are of sound construction and properly locked, the only way inside without a key is via a somewhat conspicuous breakin. Many burglars won't take that chance.

CITIZEN OF THE MONTH ALICE AND SEAN KIM


Both Alice an Sean are originally from Seoul, Korea and immigrated to the US in 2007.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is left unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME

Robbery- Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault– An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery- (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

**<u>Assault</u> is when a person swings their arm and <u>battery</u> is when that arm makes contact with another person. **

Aggravated Assault— Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary— The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft– Grand Theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Vehicle Burglary 5/2/19 08:59 300 Block 3rd Ave

The Victim looked out his apartment window and saw the Suspect inside his parked vehicle and called the police.

Units quickly arrived and detained the Suspect who was still inside the vehicle. The Victim told Officers he did not know the Suspect and he did not have permission to be inside the vehicle.

A search of the Suspect revealed narcotics paraphernalia and stolen property.

The Suspect was arrested and booked at County Jail on the following charges: Burglary, Possession of Stolen Property, Narcotics Offense

The Victim tracked his stolen car and located it near the soccer fields in Golden Gate Park. The Victim viewed the car and the Suspect in the vehicle from a distance and gave updates to dispatch until units arrived on scene.

Officers located the occupied stolen vehicle and conducted a felony stop. Officers took the Suspect into custody.

A search of the Suspect revealed the key of the vehicle and suspected Methamphetamine in his possession.

The suspect was arrested and booked at County Jail on the following charges: Possession of Stolen Vehicle, Narcotics Offense




