It has been 9 years since the establishment of the Taraval Community Police Advisory Board (CPAB), which is comprised of civilian volunteers from their respective residential and commercial communities and a representative from San Francisco SAFE. The role of each CPAB member is to advise the District Captain about crime and quality of life issues that affect the community and help problem solve and brainstorm creative solutions to recurring problems.



Protect Your Vehicle Against Catalytic Converter Theft



Thieves are looking for fuel-powered vehicles manufactured after 1974 that have catalytic converters. Thieves often target taller vehicles (such as pickup trucks or SUVs) because they can easily fit under the vehicle to access the catalytic converter. Also targeted are 2000's model Toyota's and Hondas. The location of your car may also be a factor like regularly parking in one area for a long period of time. When possible, park in well-lit areas and close to building entrances. If you have a garage at your house, park your vehicle inside and keep the garage door close.

Have the catalytic converter welded to your car's frame, which may make it harder to steal.

Consider engraving your vehicle identification number (VIN) on the catalytic converter — this may help alert a scrap dealer that it was stolen and make it easier to identify the owner.

Calibrate your car's alarm to set off when it detects vibration.



Taraval Community Members, We are seeing an increase in burglaries targeting homes that are under construction. In these incidents, suspects would break into the building or construction sites and steal numerous high end construction equipment. Currently, if your home is under construction and no one is at that location after work hours, please call Taraval Station at 415-759-3100 and provide your name and the address of the construction site and phone number. We can have our officers conduct passing calls.

Burglary Awareness & Prevention Tips for Construction Sites



Securing & Preventing

- 1. Secure all equipment and vehicles at all times.
- 2. Take effort to reduce the visibility of tools and equipment secured in vehicles or on job sites.
- 3. Make use of adequate lighting in conjunction with open chain-link fencing on the perimeter to allow for high visibility to the job site.
- 4. Strongly consider the use of security systems such as alarms and video surveillance. Ensure signage for such is clearly visible.

Precautionary Measures

- 1. Photograph all tools. Ensure photographs clearly show the associated serial number and/or distinctive markings.
- 2. Ensure job site keys are marked "Do Not Duplicate" and are controlled at all times.
- 3. Attempt to park employee vehicles within visual range of the job

Should a Burglary Occur

Immediately contact 911. Be prepared to provide the following information:

- a) Time of incident.
- b) Video (if available).
- c) Items taken (include make, model, description, location taken from, value, photos and serial numbers).
- d) Insurance information.
- e) Owner's information.

Officers responded to a report of a robbery. The victim reported that she had just finished visiting with an acquaintance when the suspect suddenly exited their vehicle and stole her property after punching and kicking her. The suspect then fled the area. The victim stated that the suspect was known to the acquaintance she had just visited and that the victim only knew of the suspect through social media.

Officers responded to a report of a battery. The victim reported that he was suddenly attacked by a group of kids while near the food court in a mall. The victim entered a nearby store to escape and notify security. The suspects had already left the area when security arrived.

Officers responded to a report of a shoplifter. The witness reported that the suspect, known from previous incidents of shoplifting, was observed stealing two headphones and was detained. Officers responded to a report of a possible incident of burglary. Responding officers made contact with the witness, a security employee, who reported that the suspect had been trespassing. The officers located the suspect and approached him. Before the officers reached the suspect, the suspect reached into his pocket and threw something on to the floor. The suspect was detained and the item that was thrown on the floor was determined to be methamphetamine hidden inside a candy wrapper. After further investigation, the suspect was arrested.

Officers were on patrol in the area. A computer check on one vehicle revealed that it had been reported stolen. The officers made contact with the suspect, who was inside the vehicle and detained him. The suspect stated that his friend had asked him to move the vehicle and that he had been sleeping in the vehicle. Further investigation determined that the key cylinder had been tampered with. The suspect was arrested.

Officers responded to a report of a suspicious person. The witness told the officers that he heard someone kicking the main front door to his apartment complex. The witness went out to check and then hear glass break in one of the apartment and saw a suspect crawling in from the broken window. Officers went to the apartment and convinced the suspect to exit. The suspect complied and upon further investigation. The suspect was arrested for burglary.

Notable Incidents (Cont.)

Daily Crime Report :: Sat – April 27, 2019

Battery 2:37 pm 4600 Irving St

Officers responded to a report of an incident of road rage. The victim stated that a vehicle had pulled up next to him while he was driving and the driver of the second vehicle, the suspect, began yelling at the victim for honking at him. The victim drove away from the suspect and continued driving home. When the victim arrived home and exited his car, the suspect drove up and stopped nearby. The suspect exited his vehicle, and along with a passenger in the suspect's vehicle, began to verbally threaten the victim's wife before punching and kicking the victim. The suspects fled the area shortly afterwards, after realizing the neighbors were watching the incident.

<u>Vandalism to MUNI – Probation Violation – Arrested</u>

<u>6:40 pm</u>

00 Broad St

Officers responded to a report of an incident of vandalism. The victim, a MUNI LRV driver, reported that the suspect had entered through the LRV's back doors and pulled the emergency lever, which caused the train to stop moving. The suspect then demanded that the victim drive the LRV despite the emergency lever being engaged and started yelling at the victim. The suspect continued to yell at the victim and attempted to follow the victim when he entered the conducting room and locked the door. The suspect then started pounding and kicking the closed door, which caused it to shatter. Responding officers detained the suspect and a computer check revealed that the suspect was on probation for vandalism. Further investigation, it was discovered that the suspect had damaged a fence in the area before getting on to the LRV. The suspect was arrested.







Beware of Scams

Fake Check Scams

Consumers paid with phony checks for work or for items they're trying to sell, instructed to wire money back to buyer

Prizes/Sweepstakes/Free Gifts

Requests for payment to claim fictitious prizes, lottery winnings, or gifts

Recovery/Refund Companies

Scammers contact victims and claim the consumer owes money on a fictitious debt or to help recover money lost in a previous scam

Advance Fee Loans, Credit Arrangers

False promises of business or personal loans, even if credit is bad, for a fee upfront

Phishing/Spoofing

Emails pretending to be from a well-known source ask consumers to enter or confirm personal information

Computers: Equipment and Software

Scammers claim to offer "technical support" for computer problems and charge a fee to fix a nonexistent problem

Scholarships/Grants

For a fee, a "search company" offers to conduct customized search for scholarships or grants for students. Scammers take money and run or provide a worthless list

Friendship & Sweetheart Swindles

Con artist nurtures an online relationship, builds trust, and convinces victim to send money

Charitable Solicitations

Scammers contact victims claiming to represent non-existent charities (or real charities they don't actually work for) and ask for donations.

Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.



Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users:

Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.

Foot Patrols:

Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.

Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings:

Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving. These meeting will be on the third Tuesday of each month.

Email Updates:

Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.


