1:30am 100 Blk of Elsie Hot Prowl Burglary

A couple woke up in the morning and found they had been victims' of a hot prowler burglary. The male victim said he was ready to leave to work and went out to the garage to get his bicycle. When he opened the door leading to the garage he noticed that the garage door was partially open. He also noticed that two of the three windows on the garage door had been shattered with dry blood on some of the broken glass. The victim looked around the garage and noticed that two of their bicycle had been stolen. They told Officers Kerlegan and De Leon Garcia that he heard noises at 1:30am in the morning but thought that it was one of their roommates and went back to sleep. The officers concluded that the suspect broke the garage windows and disengaged the garage door by pulling on the emergency latch and gained entry into the area by just opening the garage door by hand. 3:40pm London/Brazil Robbery

A road rage incident turned into a robbery for one of the two motorists. The victim told Officer Scott that she was driving along and had come to a stop at the intersection of London and Brazil. Another vehicle was driving in the opposite direction and couldn't go forward because of the cars in front of him were stopped, so he decided to squeeze himself between the other cars and the victim's vehicle. He came so close that his driver door mirror touched the victim's side mirror. He became angry and began hitting her mirror and at one point began hitting his driver door against her car causing a dent and scratches. He then started to flee but noticed that the victim had exited her car and began taking pictures of his car as he was driving away. He slammed on the brakes and made a U-turn and drove towards her as if he was trying to run her down. The victim said she had to get out of the way to avoid getting hit by the suspect's vehicle. The suspect then exited his car and slapped the victim's hand and ripped the phone from her hand. He took the phone and sped away again. Fortunately, two witnesses saw what was happening and took pictures of the suspect's vehicle and his license plate. The victim was shaken up by the whole ordeal but was not injured. Officers Lee, Barajas, Downs and Burke were on patrol when they spotted an occupied SUV without a front license plate. They stopped and spoke to the two occupants that were inside. They conducted computer inquiries on both subjects and found that the passenger was wanted on two outstanding warrants and the driver was on active probation. The passenger was immediately taken to Ingleside station on his warrants, but since the driver had a search and seizure, his residence was searched. The officers found methamphetamine, live ammunition and all sorts of narcotics paraphernalia. The driver was also taken to Ingleside station and booked on several felony charges. 5:30pm 400 Blk of Molimo Hot Prowl Burglary

Officer Ramirez was dispatched to the 400 block of Molimo Dive on a burglary call. When the officer arrived he spoke to the homeowner, who said he woke up early this morning to go to work and found that the first floor of his home had been ransacked. He then made his way into the garage and saw that his garage door was wide open. The homeowner noticed that his vehicle, which was parked outside in front of his home, had also been burglarized. The homeowner informed the officer that the suspect must have entered his parked car and found the garage door opener and used that to gain entry into his home. A number of things including clothes, tools and a bicycle were taken from the home. Luckily, surveillance cameras from a neighbor's home recoded the two suspects and their get-a-way vehicle that they used to burglarize the home. The case is still under investigation. A lady leaving work fell victim to a robbery. Instead of handing over the phone the victim dialed the phone number herself. The victim said she dialed the number several times before the suspect's accomplice ran up behind her and attempted to snatch her phone out of her hands. The victim said there was a slight struggle as she tried to hold onto her phone. A dispatch operator at City College of San Francisco received an anonymous phone call at 2:37pm from a suspect who said that a bomb would go off in three buildings located on the property. Due to the severity of the call, the dispatcher immediately notified City College Police as well as SFPD. Captain Hart along with Lieutenant McEahcarn and Sgt Inocencio and several Ingleside units responded and set up a command post and conducted an evacuation of all three buildings. Three SFPD K9 units arrived and did a systematic search of the buildings looking for the threat. After an exhausting search, the buildings were cleared of the threat and the campus was reopened. Officers Peregrina, Jimenez-Almanza and Conceicao responded to a vandalism call at the intersection of Bosworth and Diamond. Dispatched was advising that a young man had vandalized the MUNI bus shelter by shattering the glass panel and that he was still at the bus stop waiting for the bus. The officers arrived and in fact located the young man. A witness who was in the area and witnessed the vandalism told the officers that she saw the young man strike the glass with his fist which shattered the glass. The young man then walked across the street as he laughed and sat down and waited for the bus. The young man was transported to the CARC facility where he was cited for the felony vandalism. Attempted Burglary

A homeowner was at work when he started receiving alerts from his security system informing him that there was an activation. The homeowner watched a live feed using his phone and saw an unknown suspect at his front door whom he thought was trying to break into his home. The homeowner quickly called the police. Officer Kerligan soon arrived and searched the perimeter of the house and found a portion of the wooden fence damaged at the rear of the backyard. The homeowner arrived shortly, thereafter, and showed Officer Kerligan the recorded video. In the surveillance video the suspect was seen pulling on the wooden boards that surrounded the patio area. The suspect then stopped and jumped over the fence instead. The suspect then checked to see if any of the doors were unlocked, but luckily they weren't. He then got into the unlocked shed and took out some gardening items. The suspect then finished removing the wooden boards from inside the patio and fled the scene. Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

1. Graduate the SFPD NERT course (<http://sf-fire.org/neighborhood-emergency-response-team-nert>), or,
2. Graduate the SFPD Community Police Academy course (<https://sanfranciscopolice.org/community-police-academy>)
3. Pass a basic DOJ/FBI Background check.
4. Sign up for the next 8 hour ALERT new volunteer training class.





San Francisco Police Arrest Strong Arm Robbery Suspect

On July 15, 2019 at approximately 1:09PM, San Francisco Police officers assigned to Central Station responded to Stockton and Pacific Streets regarding a robbery. Upon arrival they found two victims who had been assaulted.

The officers determined that three suspects approached the first victim, a 56 year-old San Francisco resident, lifted him up off of his feet and threw him to the ground. The second victim, a 69 year-old San Francisco resident, attempted to intervene and was knocked unconscious. During the attack the suspects stole a watch from the wrist of the first victim. Both victims were transported to the hospital for head injuries and have since been treated and released.

Through the course of an investigation, SFPD Robbery Investigators identified one of the suspects involved in the robbery. On the morning of October 22, 2019 members of the San Francisco Police Department's Central District Police Station and members of the Investigations and Special Operations Bureaus served a search warrant in Oakland, CA and arrested 19 year-old Dashawn Pierson at his residence. Investigators found and seized evidence connecting Pierson to the robbery. His booking photo accompanies this news release.

The two additional suspects remain at large along with the victim's stolen Rolex watch.



Whether it is talking, emailing, texting, plugging in directions, using an app or scrolling through social media feeds, using a cell phone is not only dangerous, but also illegal.

In 2017, 3,166 people were killed in distracted driving related crashes across the country, or nearly 10 percent of all traffic deaths.

Using a phone to dial, talk or text triples the risk of a driver getting into a crash. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field with your eyes closed.

Other serious driver distractions such as eating, grooming, reaching for objects on the floor, changing clothes or talking with passengers are just as dangerous. The safest thing drivers can do is put down the phone, focus on the road and just drive.



Distracted Driving Prevention

- ✓ Never Text and Drive
- ✓ Silence your phone before you drive
- ✓ Pull over to safe parking spot to make a call
- ✓ Don't text or call someone you know is driving



Cell Phone Law

 Holding a phone while driving is illegal. Any electronic device must be used in a hands-free manner, such as speaker or voice commands. The law applies when at a stop sign or signal.

 To use a phone while driving, it must be mounted on the dashboard, windshield (seven-inch square in lower right corner or five-inch square in lower left corner), or center console.

 When the phone is mounted, drivers can swipe or tap the screen once to activate or deactivate a feature. It is illegal to swipe multiple times, enter information or text.

 A first offense ticket is \$162, with additional offenses costing even more.

 You may use your phone while holding it for true emergencies, like calling 911.
