I think the meeting allowed many community members to express their concerns and feelings regarding the recent deaths in the neighborhood and it also allowed community members to express their concerns for their wellbeing and that of their neighborhood.

We also had our first Park Station clinic on Wednesday Feb 28th where community members were invited to come speak to me about issues and concerns they had regarding their neighborhood. Many people came and many perspectives were presented.

What I can say after these meetings is that Park Police station will continue to do everything we can to ensure the safety of our community and also increase the community's sense of safety. We will continue to respond to concerns as we see them and as they are brought to our attention. This will include traffic enforcement throughout the district. We are paying special attention to the Panhandle and immediate surrounding areas. This will mean that you will see more officers both on foot, on motorbikes and in patrol cars in the area.

I encourage community members to report crimes as they see them. Call 911 when you see a crime in progress. Please continue to email me regarding on-going issues that you think need to be addressed in a more comprehensive way. Please continue to send videos and photos of what your concerns are.

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

Each week I would like to include a tip of the week to help prevent or solve crime.

Tip: Video surveillance equipment installation:

If possible all residents and business owners should install video surveillance equipment outside their home or business. Video evidence is probably the biggest investigative tool we have in the police department. It provides rock solid proof/evidence of what is happening. We have used video footage to get convictions on burglars, assaults, drug dealing, trespassing. As they say a picture paints a thousand words. Many times we can identify the suspect via video footage. Video on a house can not only monitor what is happening at that house but can be used to track the path taken by a suspect and or the vehicle used by the suspect. It also allows community members to monitor who comes to your door. We recently broke a burglary ring because of video cameras installed in and outside a home. Using the video camera the victim was able to surveil the suspect, call the police and relay to us every move the suspect was making in real time, including a description of the vehicle involved. The burglar in this case was arrested for numerous burglaries in addition to the one in our district. I cannot speak enough on what a great tool these surveillance cameras are.

After 4 years at Southern Station, Lt. Maron transferred to the Special Operations Group where after being there for 10 years, he was promoted to Sergeant and was assigned to Ingleside Station where his duties for 5 years involved a mix of patrol and investigations. Lt. Maron was then promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and assigned to Park Station as one of the 2 night Lieutenants.

Lt. Maron, like all police officers finds his job challenging and rewarding, but what he enjoys the most about being a police officer is the interaction with the public where he is in a position to make a positive impact. For Lt. Maron, the key for that impact is the initial first impression. Be professional always, and treat people with respect - whether they are a victim, a witness, or even a perpetrator as you gain more with honey than you do with vinegar.

PARK STATION'S OFFICERS OF THE MONTH FOR FEBRUARY 2018

It's a proven fact that police presence brings down crime, however, we know it is impossible to have police presence everywhere 24/7. Captain Bailey dedicated Officers Jeffery Sung, Ashley Slomowitz, and Michael Reilly as Park Station's homeless outreach officers. These three officers have been tasked with providing outreach to the homeless population within the Park district, with a focus on the parks in the district as well as high-traffic areas. The team performs well-being checks and attempts to engage individuals into services and other resources as identified by the community and their own daily observations. These officers are tasked with teaming up with Richmond Police Station Officers, the Department of Public Works, the Recreation & Parks Department, the Park Rangers, and SF HOT to reduce the number of calls for service and to improve the quality of life for everyone within the community. These officers are out on a daily basis maintaining a high-visibility police presence in providing admonishments, issuing citations, and making arrests when deemed appropriate. Their high-visibility and efforts to identify as many people as possible makes suspects think twice about committing crimes while visiting our neighborhoods.

Captain Bailey nominated these officers as officers of the month because of their outstanding work and attention to detail.

Larry Rosenfeld was born in Southern California and acquired an appreciation for San Francisco and the Bay Area quite young. Larry had his eighth birthday in Cuernavaca, Mexico where his family lived during much of that year. After high school, Larry migrated around California attending different colleges, the last one being Stanford University, where he did his graduate work in Electrical Engineering. Larry spent the bulk of his professional career in Santa Rosa with Hewlett-Packard Company and its spin-off, Agilent Technologies. It was in Santa Rosa that his daughter was born.

Upon his retirement from Agilent in 2006, Larry and his wife moved to the Inner Sunset and he busied himself doing volunteer work at All Saints' Episcopal Church in the Upper Haight. Larry's daughter, son-in-law, and granddaughter live quite near him (although in the Taraval District). In 2009, Larry became treasurer and a board member of Inner Sunset Park Neighbors, and soon after, when then-Chief George Gascón, and then-Captain David Lazar asked all the district commanding officers to implement Community Police Advisory Boards at their stations, Larry became the representative from the Inner Sunset to Park Station.

In 2011, Larry took over from Richard Magary as representative from Park to the City-wide CPAB committee.

Captain Bailey and Park Station would like to thank Larry for his dedication, and generosity he has shown to the community, and all the officers at Park Station.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Weekly Email Updates: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES*Definitions*

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony battery**) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

LIST OF CRIMES**Incidents:****Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—Area of Oak St. /Masonic Ave.—02/22/2018 8:28 pm**

Officers working uniformed patrol detained a homeless subject for a misdemeanor warrant. The subject became agitated, began to struggle, disobey orders, and kicked his legs towards the officers. Once the subject was placed inside the patrol vehicle, he began to bang his head on the partition and sustained an injury to his forehead. Medics arrived on scene and transported him to SFGH for treatment. The subject was treated then released and booked for his outstanding warrants and resisting arrest.

Burglary/Hot Prowl/Unlawful Entry—800 block of Ashbury St.—02/23/2018 7:06 pm

Officers were dispatched to the above address regarding a possible burglary in progress. Upon arrival, officers met with the victim who stated that someone had stolen her bicycle from her garage. She was advised by her neighbor that an unknown suspect carrying a duffel bag rode out of her garage on a bike. Nothing else appeared to be stolen or missing, and there were no signs of forced entry into the garage.

Bicycle Theft—2600 block of Geary Blvd.—02/23/2018 6:47 pm

Two officers responded to the scene regarding a theft. Officers spoke with the reporting party who stated that he observed an unknown suspect steal his bicycle from the parking lot where he had left it. Officers obtained video surveillance of the suspect who rode away with the bicycle.

False Personation to Receive Money or Property/ Fraudulent Use of Access Card—Unit block of Masonic Ave.—02/24/2018 10:09 pm

Victim walked into Park Station to file a fraud report. She stated that she attempted multiple times to use her credit card but it was declined. Numerous unauthorized charges were made using her account by an unknown suspect.

Driving License Suspended or Revoked/Traffic Violation Arrest—Area of Twin Peaks Blvd. /Clayton St.—02/25/2018 12:22 am

Officers on patrol in the above location observed a vehicle fail to stop at a red light. Officers effected a traffic stop on the vehicle, and it was discovered that the subject's driver's license was suspended. The subject was cited for the violations.

Driving License Suspended or Revoked—Area of Shrader St. /Fulton St.—02/25/2018 1:01 pm

Officer was dispatched to the area regarding a non-injury traffic collision. Upon arrival, the officer made contact with both parties involved who refused medical attention. It was discovered that one of the subjects had a suspended license and expired registration, and the officer cited him for his violations.

Stolen Property/Possession with Knowledge—1600 block of Mission St.—02/25/2018 4:45 pm

Victim contacted officers and stated that her bicycle that had been stolen earlier in the month was being sold on an online website. Officers arranged to meet at the above address regarding the stolen bicycle. Upon arrival to the scene, the subject was in possession of the bicycle and had narcotic paraphernalia on his person. Officers returned the bicycle to the owner's home and the subject was booked at Park Station for the possession of stolen property and narcotic paraphernalia.

LIST OF CRIMES**Incidents cont...****Burglary/Forcible Entry—300 block of Warren Dr.—02/26/2018 1:35 pm**

Officers responded to the above address regarding a burglary. Upon arrival, officers met with the owner of the residence who stated that her front door had been opened and tampered with. The inside of her home was left in disarray and multiple items were missing. Officers checked for surveillance cameras in the area with negative results.

Driving License Suspended or Revoked—Area of Masonic Ave. /Waller St.—02/27/2018 6:11 pm

Officers observed a vehicle driving with no front or rear license plates. Officers conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle and made contact with the driver, advising him of his violation. A computer query revealed that the subject had two suspensions on his driver's license and an expired registration. Officers cited the subject for his violations.

Resisting Peace Officer/Warrant Arrest—Unit block of Beaver St.—02/28/2018 8:40 am

An officer observed a subject sleeping on the sidewalk in violation of the Civil Sidewalks Ordinance and contacted him regarding his violation. The officer attempted to arrest the subject but he became uncooperative and began to walk away from the scene. While the subject continued to resist arrest, he sustained an injury to his head and hand and the officer also sustained an injury to his hand. Several Park Station units responded to the above listed area to assist placing the suspect in handcuffs. Medics responded to the scene to treat the subject and injured officer. The officer was transported to the hospital for further treatment and later cleared. The subject refused to be transported to the hospital and was later transported to Park Station. In the subjects backpack, officers located uncapped needles, miscellaneous tools, keys, garage openers, and two plastic bags containing a substance suspected to be methamphetamine. It was discovered that the subject had an outstanding felony warrant out of San Mateo and he was booked for the warrant and his violations.

Municipal Code Violation/Warrant Arrest—1300 block of Fell St.—02/28/2018 8:41 am

Officer was dispatched to the area regarding two subjects sitting in the entrance way of the parking lot. Upon arrival, the officer made contact with the subjects and informed them of their violation. It was discovered that one of the subjects had a warrant for her arrest. The officer placed her in handcuffs and transported her to Park Station.

Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—1400 block of Fell St.—02/28/2018 9:40 am

Officers observed a vehicle parked in the area with an occupant who appeared to be living inside. The officers made contact with the occupant and advised her of her violation. It was discovered that she had an outstanding bench warrant, and officers transported her to Park Station.

Victim walked into Park Station to report that his rental vehicle had been broken into. The passenger front window was smashed out and multiple items were stolen. He was not aware of any cameras in the area.

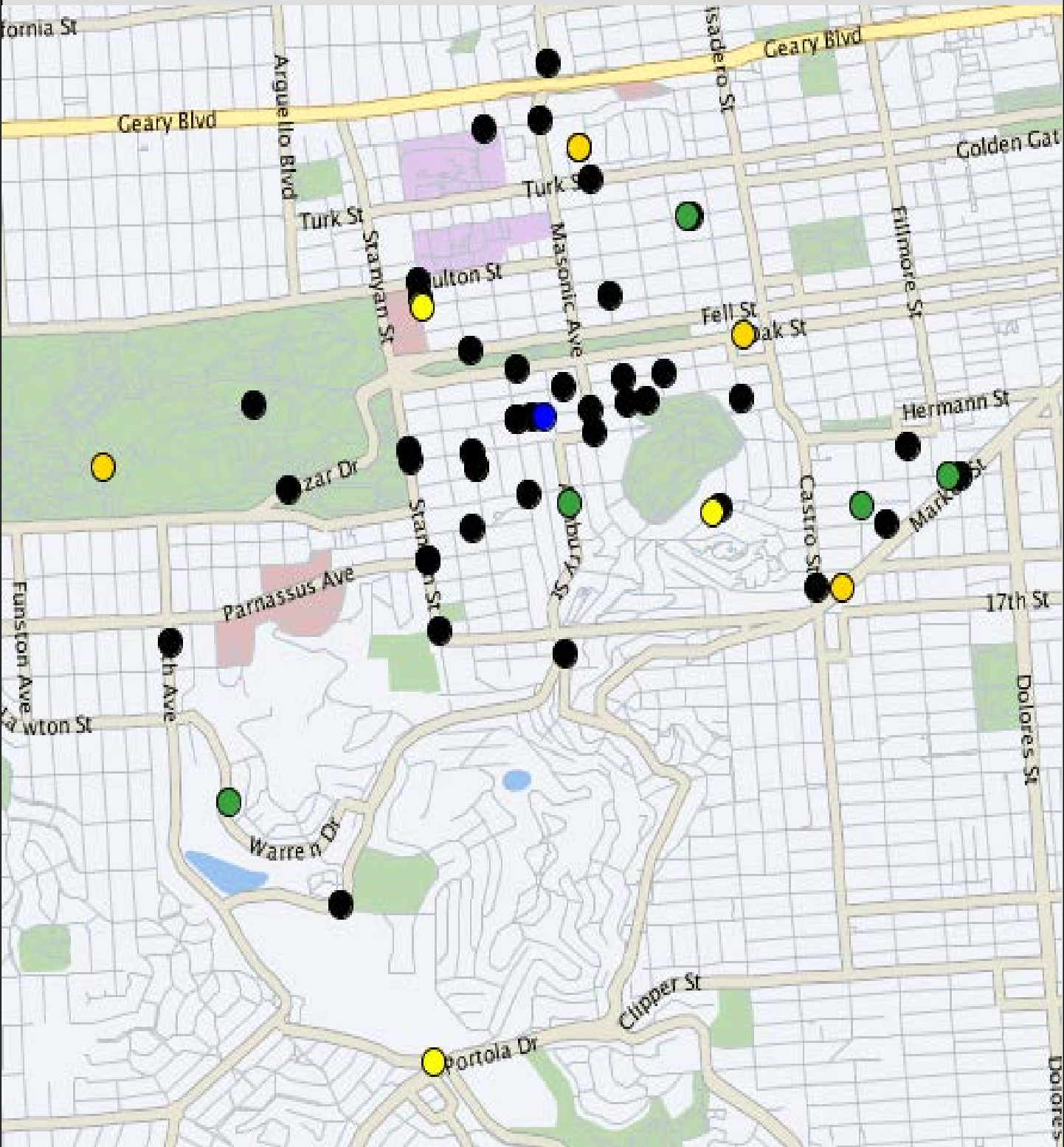

MAP OF CRIMES

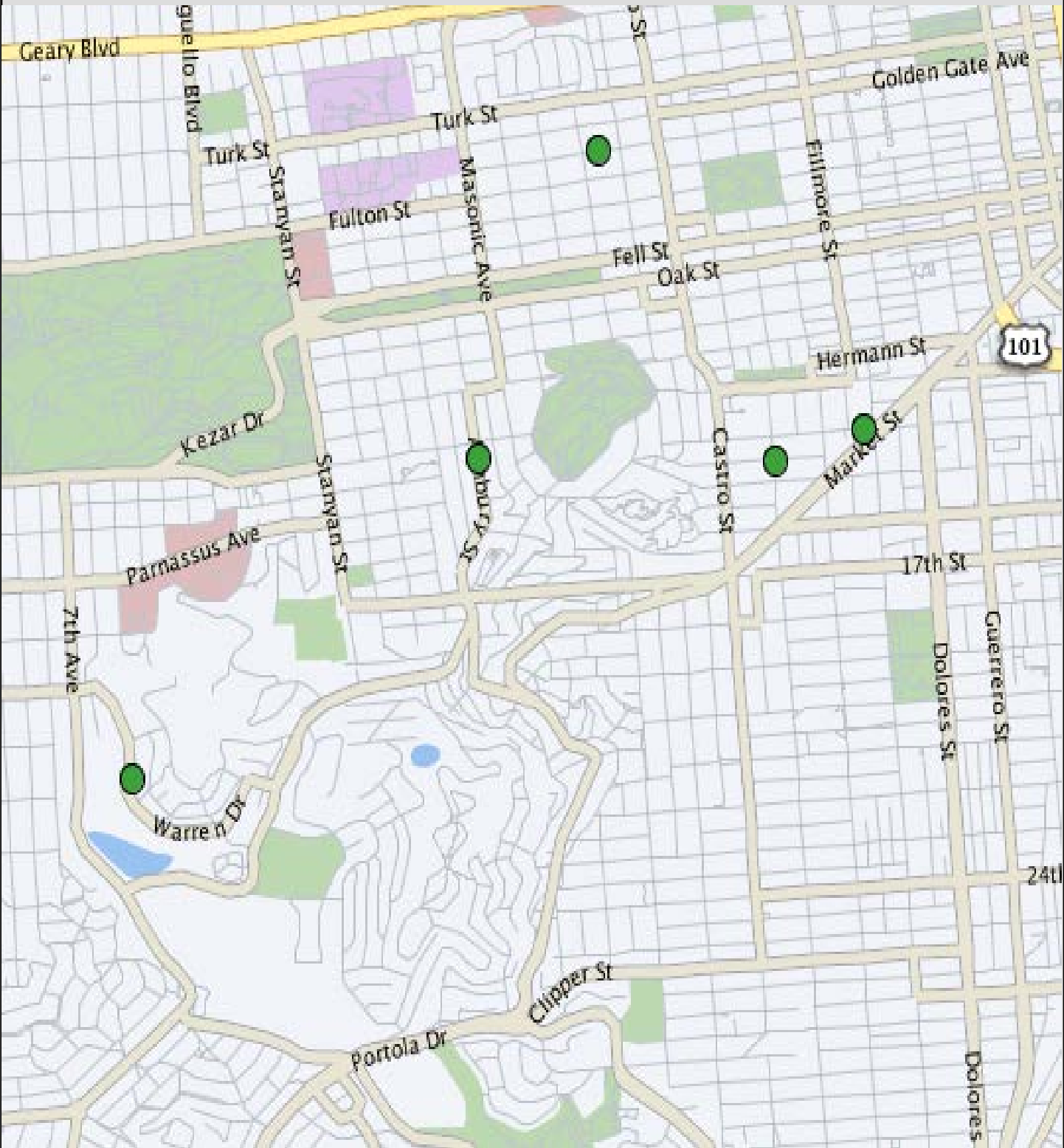

(55 Reported incidents occurred from 2/22/18 to 2/28/18)



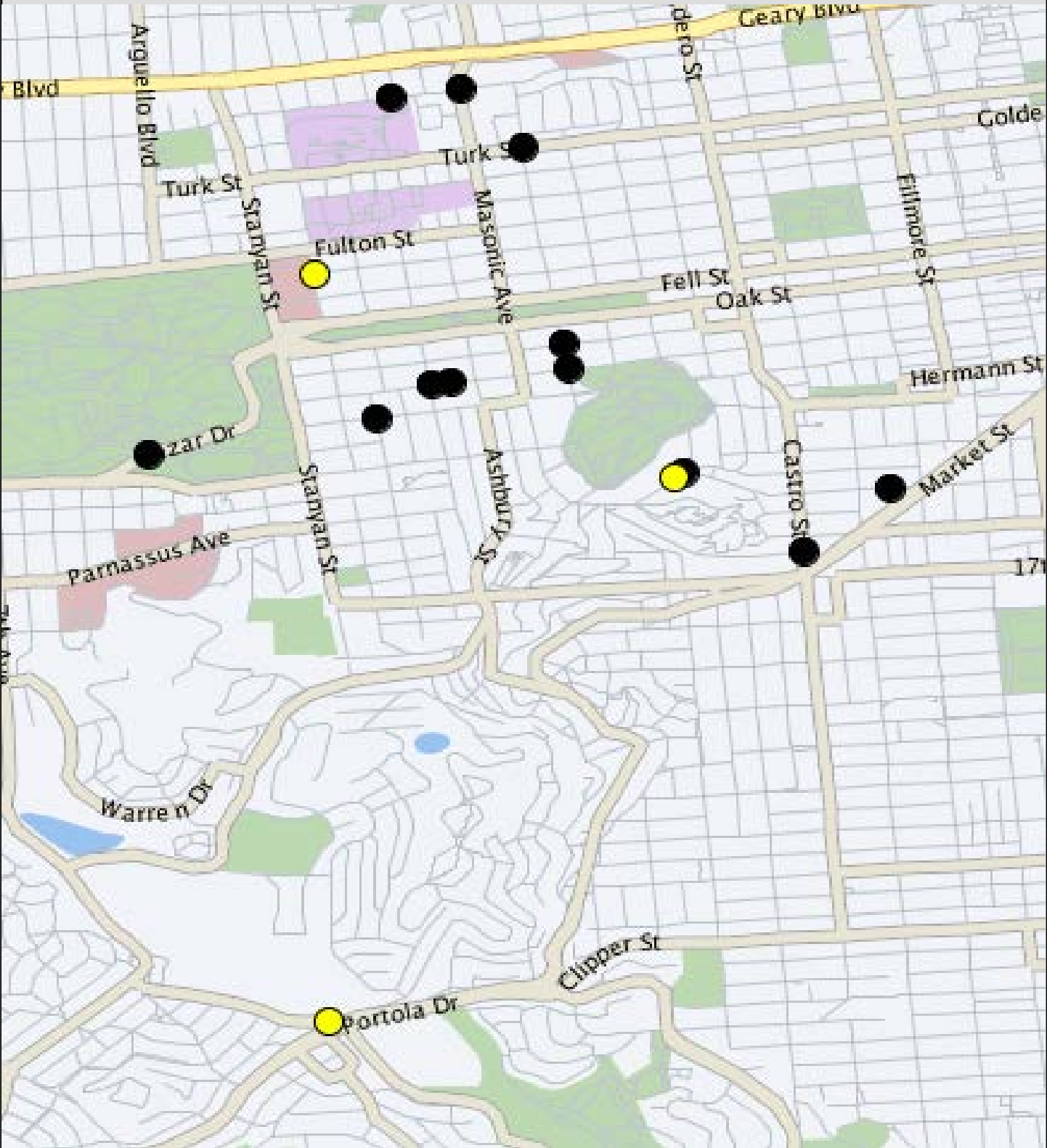

Burglaries: (5 Report incidents of burglaries occurred from 2/22/18 to 2/28/18)



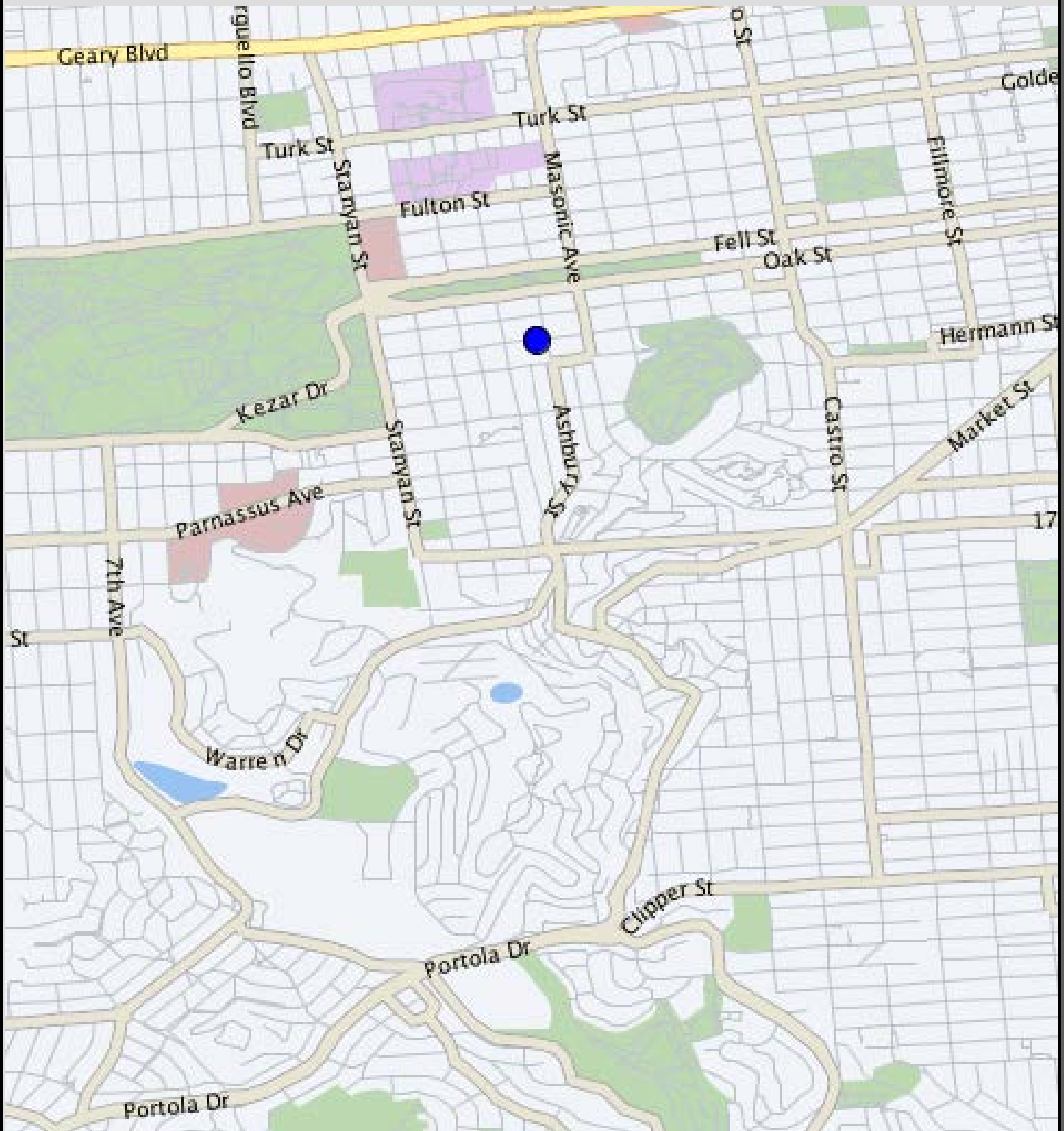
MAP OF CRIMES— VEHICLE INCIDENTS

HELPFUL TIPS**DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!**

1. When placing an online or phone order, **request signed confirmation upon delivery**
2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
9. **Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep**; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

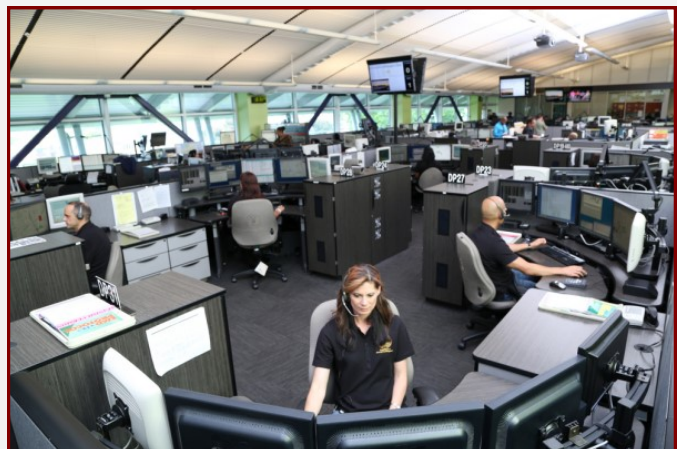
3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Please call the non- emergency dispatch line **(415-553-0123)** when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. **The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.**

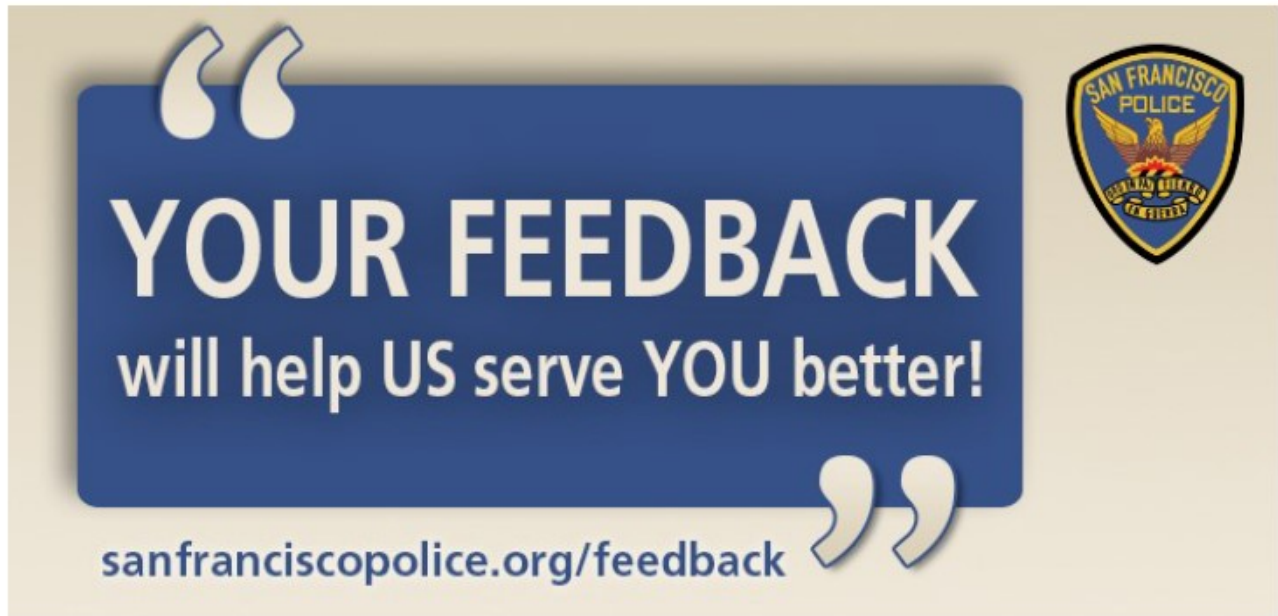
9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1.**

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our quarterly ALERT training classes as follows:

1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.
