Happy June, Ingleside Community! We are officially heading into summer. For many of us that means school is out, vacations are imminent, and... FIREWORKS. Fireworks have been the topic of many recent community concerns. Just to be clear, ALL fireworks (including those branded as "Safe and Sane") are illegal in San Francisco. SFPD is strongly urging our community members to keep themselves and their neighborhoods safe this year by refraining from the use of fireworks of any sort. That being said, despite our strongest discouragement, it is likely that there will be illegal, unsanctioned personal fireworks use to some extent. Therefore, I'd like to spend some time discussing how to report such incidents appropriately.

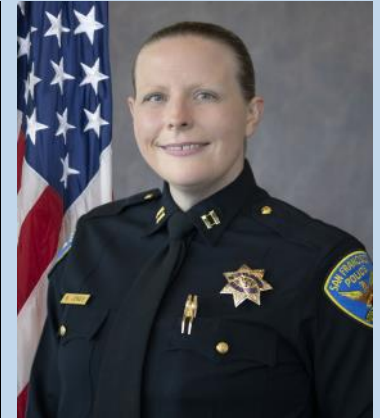
First and foremost, report illegal fireworks only if you see the person lighting them, can describe them, and can give an exact location or address. If the circumstances observed meet this threshold, please call 311 and provide the aforementioned information.

In regards to reporting noise from fireworks, please know that SFPD is aware of the noise generated by fireworks and how that impacts many in our communities. SFPD will be out in the field mitigating these complaints. If you feel it is necessary to call, complaints about noise should also be directed to 311.

During the holidays when fireworks are prevalent, namely the Fourth of July, SFPD receives a high volume of fireworks-related calls requiring our Dispatch to triage based on the severity of the call. Therefore, SFPD may not be able to respond to every fireworks-related call unless fires or injuries are involved. In these latter instances of fire and/or injury, please immediately call 911.

As always, please keep 911 available for people with police, fire, or medical emergencies.

Captain's message continued:

The Captain's Tip of the Month for June 2021 is: WHEN YOU ARE DESCRIBING A VEHICLE INVOLVED IN ANY SORT OF CRIME, REMEMBER THE WORD "CLAMMY." We have a good variety of crimes that occur in the Ingleside District that involve vehicles. We also have many witnesses that observe such incidents and thankfully notify the police regarding their observations. A very astute community member suggested that it might be a good idea to discuss what we are looking for in vehicle descriptions when a crime is witnessed. Specific and accurate vehicle descriptions make a huge difference to police when responding to incidents. They truly do help us solve crimes. CLAMMY is a good prompt for what to try to commit to memory.

C = Color of the Vehicle.

L = License Plate Number (or whether the car may be missing a front and/or rear plate or have dealership or temporary paper plates).

A = Auto Type (the style of the vehicle such as a sedan, SUV, van, truck, etc.).

M = Make / Manufacturer (Ford, Honda, Toyota, Infiniti, etc.).

M = Model (Accord, Camry, Explorer, Tahoe, etc.).

Y = Year of Manufacture (give an estimate if you are unsure or try to discern whether the car is newer or older).

Another final key piece of information is whether the vehicle has any IDENTIFYING FEATURES such as damage (a dent, scratch, broken window, etc.), decals or bumper stickers, or heavily tinted windows.

Your assistance in describing vehicles as thoroughly and accurately as possible is greatly appreciated.

Continuing on from last month, I asked my seven year old, Finn, if he had any additional crime tips for the Ingleside Community. I'd like to call this "Finn for the Win." A direct quote from him: "You should lock your car doors cuz... duh." Also, "If you see someone breaking into your house, call Godzilla." I'd like to add that you should also call the police should Godzilla be unavailable.

On a final note, we wanted to share some helpful information from our "Park Smart" campaign to help prevent auto break-ins. Always remember to stop, check, and take all of your valuables with you!

Notable Ingleside Arrests & Incidents

Although every arrest and incident occurring in the Ingleside District isn't mentioned in our weekly newsletter, our officers are out there every day, working to make the Ingleside District a safer place. In this section of our newsletter, we want to take time to highlight the excellent work being done by our officers. We want to bring attention to these incidents and extend some well-deserved appreciation to the officers involved in these notable incidents.

06-03-21 / 01:31 p.m. / Robbery Arrest at 30th and Dolores Sts.

Officers Zandanel and Wise responded to a report of a group of individuals fighting, and possible shots fired. Upon arrival, the officers observed no fight and they located no evidence of shots fired. Their observations were corroborated by an uninvolved bystander, who saw no evidence of either a fight or shots fired. Prior to leaving the scene, Officer Zandanel recognized a subject at the scene from a previous robbery incident. The subject in question was in the company of four other individuals, and Officer Wise recognized one of these other subjects as a suspect wanted in a different robbery. The officers contacted the investigating sergeant, and they were directed to detain the group of individuals as part of the ongoing robbery investigation.

The investigating sergeant arrived on scene and took over the investigation. As a result of the on-scene investigation, three of the subjects, including the two subjects recognized by Officers Zandanel and Wise, were arrested and booked for robbery and conspiracy charges related to the robbery mentioned in the crime bulletin.

Of particular note in this arrest, the initial robbery incident occurred in an outside district. Despite this fact, Officers Zandanel and Wise were able to rely on their experience, job knowledge, and their attention to city-wide crime in order to help locate and identify subjects that were wanted for a serious crime. As such, these officers deserve congratulations for a job well done and for their dedication to keeping our communities safe. Report number 210319807.

Warrant Arrest

At the start of their shift, Officers Anderson and Archilla were advised of a subject wanted for a serious crime that occurred in an outside jurisdiction. The officers were also informed that the subject was known to reside in the Ingleside district, and they were provided with pertinent information to help in identifying and locating the subject. Officers Anderson and Archilla responded to the subject's address and observed him standing in front of a residence. The officers contacted the subject, advised him of the warrant, and placed him under arrest without incident. The subject was subsequently booked for his warrant. Report number 210353338.

Aggravated Assault

Officers Vargas and Flores responded to a report of a physical dispute. The officers arrived on scene to find the victim and her neighbor in a verbal dispute, and they separated both parties. The victim stated that while she and her neighbor were in a verbal argument, her neighbor's boyfriend intervened and also began arguing with the victim. Soon after, the neighbor's boyfriend took an object he was carrying and used it to strike the victim multiple times. The officers attempted to locate the suspect, but he had already fled the scene, and his girlfriend was unable to provide further information regarding the incident. Report number 210352324.

Robbery

Officers Tatlow and Valdez responded to a call of an auto burglary. The victims stated that while they were patronizing two businesses on the block, their vehicle was burglarized. Two witnesses provided the victims with suspect information, and upon seeing the suspect vehicle drive back around, one of the victims confronted the suspects in their vehicle. Two suspects exited the vehicle, one of them pointed a firearm at one of the victims, and then attempted to rob him. The victim was able to run away, and the suspects then fled in their vehicle. Warrant Arrest

Officers Henderson, Marshall, and Peralta responded to a report of a verbal dispute. The reporting party stated that a subject prohibited from being on the property had arrived at the residence, and was attempting to gain entry to the premises. The officers determined that the identified subject also had an active warrant for his arrest. Upon arrival, the officers located the subject, and they placed him under arrest for his warrant, without incident. The subject was subsequently booked for his warrant. Report number 210350936.

Vandalism

Officers Zhao, Fogarty, Lozano, and McCall responded to a report of two people attempting to break into a commercial establishment. The manager of the business stated that she was inside the business after closing when she heard loud banging at the front doors. The manager checked her surveillance cameras and observed two subjects at the entrance, kicking the front doors several times. The suspects left soon after in a vehicle. The officers observed damage to the front doors, and the manager felt the incident was suspicious because she did not recognize the subjects as customers at her business. Report number 210350306.

Aggravated Assault

Officers Church and Lewis responded to a report of an assault. The victim stated that she had been physically assaulted by someone, and that the suspect had already fled in a vehicle. The victim further advised the officers that the incident stemmed from a verbal dispute between her and a friend who she was helping by providing him with a temporary place to stay. The victim received medical attention for her minor injuries, and the incident remains under investigation at this time. Report number 210351401.

D.U.I. Arrest

Officers Wheelock, Miller, and Green responded to a report of a vehicle collision. Involved parties and witnesses to the incident directed officers to the driver of the vehicle that had collided with multiple parked and moving vehicles, and the driver was detained at the scene. The driver in question presented symptoms consistent with being under the influence of alcohol, and the officers initiated a "D.U.I." investigation. As a result of their findings, the driver was booked for driving under the influence of alcohol. Report number 210349785.

Stolen Vehicle

Officers Vargas and Flores were dispatched to a report of a reported stolen vehicle parked in front of someone's home. The reportee stated that he had contacted the sole occupant of the vehicle earlier and inquired as to why she was parked in front of his home, at which time she exited the vehicle and walked away. The reportee directed the officers to where the subject was standing, and the officers were able to detain her without incident. The subject was determined to have multiple active warrants for her arrest, and she was arrested and booked for her warrants and charges related to the stolen vehicle. Report number 210348975.

Officers Zhao and Fogarty responded to a report of a residential burglary. The victim informed the officers that he was home when he heard sound coming from his garage. The victim closed his garage door and then went out front to investigate further, at which time he observed three unknown subjects riding away on three bicycles that had been stolen from inside the victim's garage. Officer Vargas and Sergeant Springer were on patrol when they responded with other officers to a report of a wanted subject out in public. While officers were responding, a witness provided dispatch with the subject's direction of travel, and officers were ultimately able to locate and detain the subject. The officers confirmed the subject's identity and his warrant, and he was then arrested and booked for the warrant. Report number 210034588.

Burglary

Officers Artiga and Starks responded to a report of a burglary investigation being conducted by Officers Flores and Jensen, who had arrested a subject for being in possession of a bicycle reported stolen in an earlier burglary. Officer Artiga observed that the arrested subject was in possession of property belonging to someone Officer Artiga recognized by name, and upon inquiring with that individual, he learned that this individual's home had been burglarized as well. As part of the follow-up investigation, the officers located video footage showing the arrested subject burglarizing the home of the victim Officer Artiga had contacted. Already under arrest for his part in the initial incident being investigated by Officers Flores and Jensen, the subject was also booked on charges related to the burglary being investigated by Officers Artiga and Sparks. Possession of a Firearm

Officers Naser and Downs were on patrol when they observed a vehicle displaying a mechanical violation. The officers conducted a traffic enforcement stop, approached the vehicle, and contacted the driver, who stated that he did not have any form of identification on his person. Officer Naser recognized the two passengers as subjects who were wanted for outstanding warrants. All three subjects were detained as part of the investigation, during which Officer Downs located a loaded and illegal firearm on one of the passengers. The armed subject was subsequently booked for charges related to possession of the illegal firearm. Report number 210347212.

Warrant Arrest

Officers Vargas and Cvetovac were on patrol when they observed a vehicle traveling in front of them, with a visible mechanical violation. The officers conducted a traffic enforcement stop, and when asked for a driver's license, the driver informed the officers that he did not have a driver's license issued to him. A computer inquiry revealed that in addition to being an unlicensed driver, the subject also had an active warrant for his arrest. The driver was booked for his warrant, and also charged for driving without a license and for the initial mechanical violation. Report number 210342820.

Robbery

Officers Naser and Barajas responded to a report of a person with a gun. The officers were informed by the dispatcher that the caller had witnessed their vehicle being broken into, and when he intervened, one of the suspects pointed a firearm at the victim. Upon arrival, the officers met with the victim, who corroborated his earlier statement and provided further information. The victim stated that he was in line to enter a local business, when he observed an unknown vehicle double-parked next to his. The victim then observed an unknown subject reaching into a broken window on the victim's vehicle. The victim ran across the street to intervene, and the driver of the unknown vehicle then pointed a firearm at the victim. The subjects then fled in the suspect vehicle, with two suitcases belonging to the victim and his brother. Report number 210344638.

Discharging a Firearm

Officers Wheelock and Miller responded to a report of shots fired. Shortly after arrival, the officers located evidence consistent with a gun having been fired at the scene. The officers also observed what appeared to be fresh gunshot damage to a nearby fence and an unoccupied vehicle. The officers searched the area for victims, suspects, and witnesses, with negative results. The incident remains under investigation at this time. Report number 210344967.

Burglary

Officers Yu and Johnson responded to a report of a residential burglary. The victim informed the officers that her boyfriend found their garage door open, and upon checking the garage, they discovered numerous items missing from inside their garage. In reviewing recordings taken by their security cameras, the victims observed footage of the initial incident, and they also determined that one of the subjects returned a little over three hours later to take more items from the garage. Battery

Officers Zhao and Flores responded to a report of a battery aboard a MUNI bus. The victim, a MUNI bus driver, stated that a passenger approached him and demanded that the driver stop the bus. When the driver asked the passenger to wait until the next stop, the passenger became angry and began yelling at the driver. The passenger returned to the rear of the bus and attempted to open an emergency window. In an effort to de-escalate the incident, the driver stopped the bus and opened the doors to allow the passenger to exit. Rather than exiting the bus, the passenger returned to the front of the bus, began to bang on the driver's safety partition, and then spat in the driver's face before leaving the bus in an unknown direction. Burglary

Officers Peregrina and Najarro responded to a report of a burglary in progress at a commercial establishment. A witness was able to provide dispatch with a description and direction of flight for the suspect, and this information was relayed to the responding officers. A second witness was able to provide further information, stating that the suspect had boarded a MUNI bus. Additional officers responded to the area, were able to locate the bus in question, and detained an individual matching the description of the burglary suspect. The officers observed that the subject was in possession of two bags containing merchandise consistent with items sold at the store that was burglarized. The officers also determined that the detained subject had four active warrants for his arrest. A witness at the scene was able to positively identify the detained subject as the same individual that he saw burglarizing the store minutes earlier. A store employee was able to identify the property recovered in the subject's possession as merchandise belonging to the store. The subject was arrested and booked for the burglary. Report number 210337928.

Theft From Vehicle

Officers Lama and Plascencia responded to a report of a theft from a vehicle. The victim stated that he parked his vehicle while he went to a local business, and upon his return, he discovered that one of the vehicle windows had been broken. The victim checked inside his vehicle and discovered that two backpacks with miscellaneous contents had been stolen from inside the vehicle. Report number 210338891.

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San Francisco Police Arrest Suspect in Attempted Homicide

On June 1, 2021, at approximately 9:38 p.m. San Francisco Police officers responded to the 2400 block of Chestnut Street on reports of gunfire. Multiple 911 callers advised dispatch a possible vehicle involved was a black sedan with no headlights and was last seen speeding away from the area. The victim was able to make it to Francisco Street and Divisadero Street, where he flagged down officers.

Officers ascertained the shooting was related to a shoplifting incident that occurred at a convenient store/pharmacy close by. Police were also able to obtain a suspect description and vehicle description from multiple sources, and that information was broadcasted over the police radio. Northern Station units responded to the area to assist with the investigation.

As information continued to develop, an SFPD unit discovered a parked unoccupied vehicle matching the suspect description on the 2400 block of Bay Street. Officers also located an individual matching the suspect description on the 3300 block of Broderick, just around the corner from where the vehicle was located. The individual was detained without incident and a firearm was recovered from his waistband.

After further investigation, officers placed Ryan Beardsley, a 27-year-old San Bruno resident under arrest. Beardsley was booked into San Francisco County Jail on the following charges:

- 664/187 PC: Attempted Homicide
- 245(a)(2) PC: Assault with a Firearm
- 529(a)(3) PC: False Impersonation
- 246 PC: Shooting at an Occupied Vehicle
- 29800(a)(1) PC: Possession of a Firearm by a Felon
- 25850(a) PC, two counts: Carrying a Loaded Firearm
- 25850(a) PC: Convicted Person Carrying Loaded Firearm

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- 25850 (a) PC: Unlawful Possession of Firearm by Prohibited Person
- 25850(a) PC: Not Registered Owner of Concealed Firearm
- 25400 (a)(2) PC, two counts: Concealed Firearm on Person

- 25400 (a)(2) PC: Unlawful Possession of Concealed Firearm
- 25400 (a)(2) PC: Not Registered Owner of Concealed Firearm

SFPD Narcotics Investigation Leads to Arrests, Seizure of Nearly 30 pounds of Dangerous Drugs and Ghost Guns

Amount of fentanyl seized in SFPD's Narcotics operation is "enough lethal overdoses to wipe out San Francisco's population four times over," Chief Scott says

On Thursday, June 3, 2021, San Francisco Police Department Narcotics officers served three search warrants in Oakland, California on the 1700 block of 28th Avenue, the 2900 block of 35th Avenue, and the 9800 block of MacArthur Boulevard. These warrants were part of an ongoing investigation initiated by San Francisco Police Department Narcotics Detail to intercept deadly drugs that were earmarked for the Tenderloin.

During the search, officers recovered two semi-automatic, unregistered, un-serialized firearms also known as ghost guns, over 45 thousand dollars in U.S. Currency, a "kilo press" and nearly 30 pounds of drugs which equates to more than 13 kilos, including more than 16 pounds (over 7 kilos) of fentanyl.

At the MacArthur Boulevard location, Narcotics officers found a large quantity of unpackaged fentanyl. The officers contacted the Oakland Fire Department (OFD), who declared the location a Hazardous Materials (HazMat) scene and rendered the scene safe.

Officers took into custody 5 adult male suspects whose ages range from 23 to 45 years old. The suspects were booked on various narcotics related charges at Santa Rita Jail.

In the first five months of 2021, SFPD officers have booked 248 people for sales or possession for sale of dangerous drugs, seized over \$104,000 in US Currency, and seized over 17 pounds (7.7 kilos) of fentanyl, over one pound (0.5 kilos) of cocaine, almost five pounds (2 kilos) of crack cocaine, over seven pounds (3 kilos) of heroin and over ten pounds (4.5 kilos) of methamphetamine.

"The amount of fentanyl seized in this single operation is enough lethal overdoses to wipe out San Francisco's population four times over," said Chief of Police Bill Scott. "Fentanyl remains the primary chemical culprit in the record-shattering number of fatal overdoses plaguing our City, and the recovery of semi-automatic ghost guns along with this haul of deadly drugs most likely intended for the Tenderloin is ominous. SFPD's Narcotics Detail and patrol officers have done heroic work in this operation and on the street every day to seize these deadly drugs and bring these increasingly dangerous drug dealers to justice."

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San Francisco Police Arrest Suspect in Aggravated Assault on an Elderly Victim

On May 14, 2021, at approximately 7:03 a.m. San Francisco Police officers responded to the Embarcadero Waterfront on report of an 73-year-old woman who was walking and abruptly knocked down by a suspect. The suspect was seen sprinting away from the scene, leaving the elderly woman unconscious on the sidewalk and bleeding from her head. Witnesses came to the victim's aid, and she was ultimately transported to the Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital (ZSFGH). Medical staff later advised police the victim suffered a concussion, several cracked ribs, and significant bruising from the incident.

Witnesses provided police with a suspect description, including the suspect wearing distinct athletic attire. Police were also able to obtain video evidence depicting the suspect intentionally running towards the victim and knocking her to the ground.

Members from SFPD's Central Station Investigations Team sent out a crime bulletin to department members including videos and photos of the suspect.

On May 25, 2021, at approximately 8:00 p.m. an off-duty San Francisco Police officer was jogging along the Embarcadero Waterfront and saw an individual who matched the suspect description and was also wearing a similar outfit shown in the crime bulletin's photo. Upon confirming the individual's identity, police released him pending further investigation. Shortly after, SFPD investigators were able to obtain an arrest warrant for the suspect.

On June 1, 2021, at approximately 5:15 p.m. SFPD officers working the San Francisco Giants baseball game recognized the suspect from the crime bulletin, which was updated to advise officers there was an active warrant for his arrest.

Continued:

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Toure Clark, a 34-year-old San Francisco resident, was arrested without incident. Clark was booked into San Francisco County Jail on three felony charges of battery with serious bodily injury (243(d) PC), aggravated assault causing great bodily injury (245(a)(4) PC), and elder abuse causing great bodily injury (368(b)(1) PC).

While an arrest has been made, this incident remains an open and active investigation. Central Station Investigators also believe there may be other similar, yet unreported incidents like this assault. Anyone with information on similar incidents is encouraged to contact Sgt. Despite having the seniority to work a different shift, Officers Wong and Parker elect to work the midnight shift. Officers Wong and Parker have worked as partners for three years. When asked how they came to work together as partners, they both politely laughed and explained that they have a lot in common, and just really work well together.

Officer Parker has been an officer in the San Francisco Police Department for seven years. Prior to becoming an officer, he was a collegiate volleyball coach at Skyline College, City College, and San Francisco State University. In addition to working on patrol, Officer Parker has been a Field Training Officer (F.T.O.) for three years. As an F.T.O., Officer Parker enjoys teaching new officers and guiding them through the field training process.

Officer Wong has been an officer in the San Francisco Police Department for eight years. Officer Wong is also a Technical Sergeant in the Air Force Reserve. Officer Wong has been enlisted for the last fifteen years, and he just committed to what he says will be his last 5 years in the Reserve.

Supervisors and fellow officers alike will attest to Officers Wong and Parker being experienced and self-motivated individuals who lead by example and who are also the "go-to" officers for mentorship of other officers. Officers Wong and Parker have the demeanor and competence to complete any task given to them. Whether meeting the demands of a critical incident, or interacting with members of the community, Officers Parker and Wong are exemplary representatives of the SFPD and Ingleside Station, and it's a privilege to work with them.

Ingleside Citizen of the Month / June 2021

The Citizen of the Month for June is Barb Cornejo. For the past seven years, Barb has been the lead pastor of "Daring Faith Celebration Centre," the church located at 355 Ocean Ave. She moved from the Midwest and has made the Ingleside/Mission Terrace her home for the past thirty-five years.

While serving as pastor, Barb has led the church in numerous ways to support the community, neighboring schools, and businesses with resources, donations, and volunteers. Some key events include partnering with the Red Cross to provide emergency services for a neighborhood fire, and working with the SF Neighborhood Empowerment Network to host the Resilient Cayuga Shake Tank event. This event organized roughly fifty local stakeholder organizations to provide training to implement disaster response plans. She also worked with the members of Ingleside Police Station to host the Faith and Blue 2020 event, which is an initiative to build bridges and strengthen connections between law enforcement professionals and the communities they serve.

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Ingleside Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Ingleside Station has foot beat officers assigned to the Geneva, Leland and Cortland corridors.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Station personnel also attend meetings with merchant groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Ingleside Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

The following are some examples of Suspicious Activity that are “In progress” crimes, which demand an immediate call to 9-1-1:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

Crime Definition

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

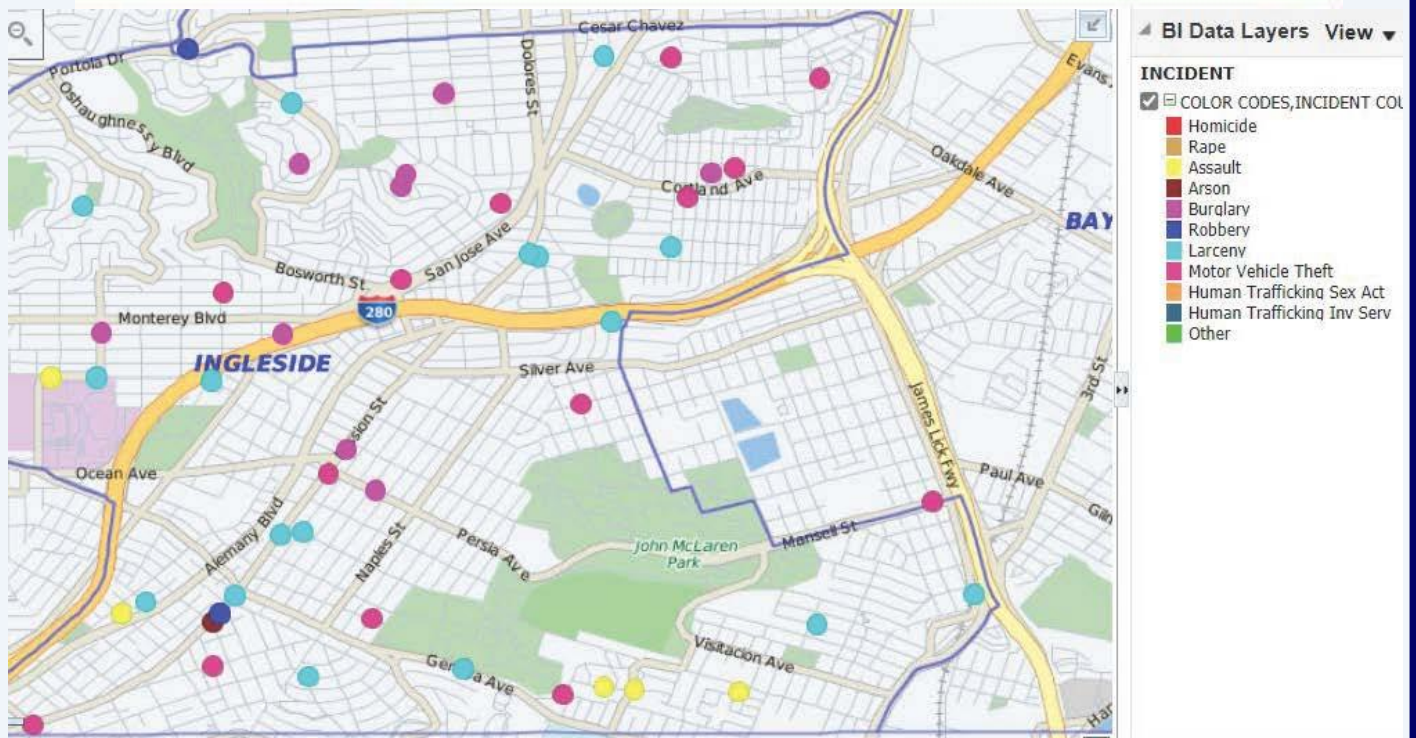
Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

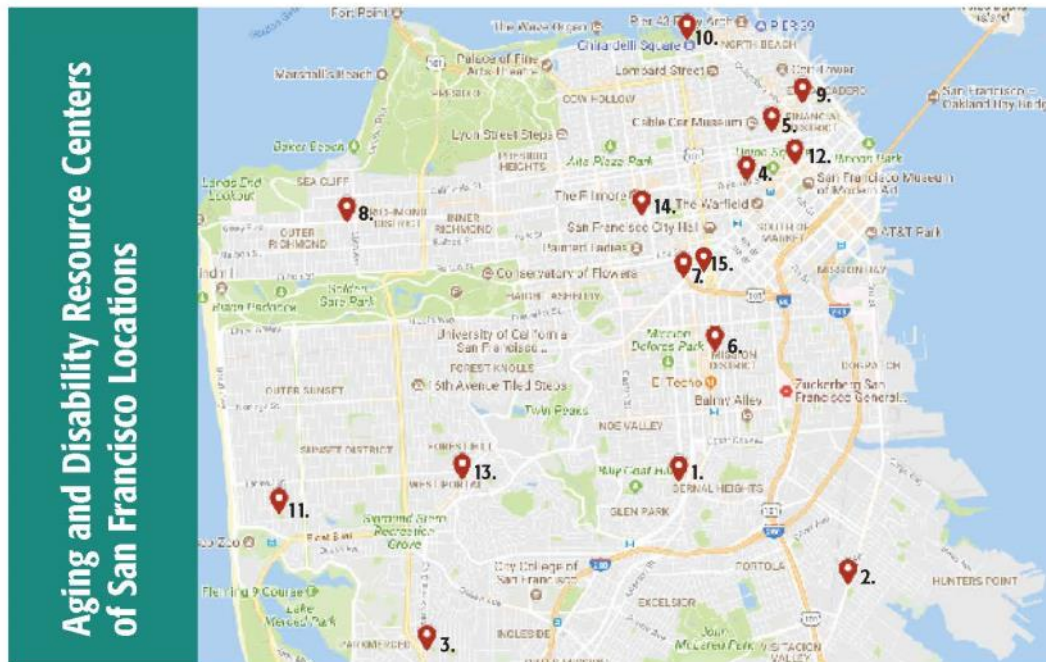

San Francisco is providing expanded COVID-19 testing for anyone who lives or works in the city.

All essential workers can get tested regardless of symptoms. For anyone else, you must have at least one of the COVID-19 symptoms, such as fever or cough, or had recent contact with someone with COVID-19.

- Testing is free at various sites throughout the City.
- You do not need a doctor's note to schedule a test or need medical insurance to get tested.
- Appointments are required and can be made online or by phone.
- Results are available in 1 to 3 days.

Call 311 to schedule a test at one of the following sites if you are uninsured.

Preventing “Keyless” Auto Break-ins & Thefts

Nationwide, auto break-ins and auto thefts continue to be a common occurrence due to the opportunistic nature of the crime, the speed at which the incident can occur, and the potential for rewards. As motorists and passengers, we’ve all had to become proactive in preventing this type of crime by adopting basic measures, such as securing all vehicle doors and windows, keeping all valuables and other property out of view, not leaving a vehicle running and unattended, and using steering wheel locking devices, alarms, ignition locking devices, etc.

As vehicle technology has advanced (remote entry/unlocking/starting, keyless fobs, vehicle ignitions, etc.), so have the methods used by thieves to enter vehicles to take property, or the vehicle itself. Law enforcement agencies have seen a rise in “keyless” auto break-ins and auto thefts, involving the use of electronic devices designed for the purpose of defeating wireless unlocking technology. As these types of incidents become more common, we all need to do our part to help prevent these crimes.

How does it work? In short, auto thieves are using a variety of electronic devices to intercept radio signals transmitted through key fobs and remotes. These signals include “rolling codes” which change with each press of a button, and “fixed pin codes” commonly used in older technology, such as garage door openers. Many of these devices are small, easily concealable in a pocket, and can be used to exploit signals from key fobs and remotes in order to easily unlock vehicle doors, start the vehicle ignition, and open electronic garage doors, without damage or use of force. Of further concern, is the hacking of mobile apps that allow a driver to unlock car doors through the aid of their phone.

So, how can you best prevent keyless car theft? Here are some basic habits you can practice to keep from becoming a victim:

- After locking your doors remotely, check for alarm indicator lights to be illuminated, and check to see that your car doors are locked.
- Consider storing keys and key fobs that transmit wireless signals in a small signal-blocking protective pouch. These pouches are available online and in stores, and work like the protective pouches and wallets that store passports, credit cards, and other forms of indicia that utilize radio signal technology.
- Some key fobs can be turned off. Find out if yours can, and do so when you’re away from your vehicle, or at home.
- Use technology to your advantage! Tracking devices are available which can help to monitor activity with your vehicle, and track it if stolen. Also, update any software installed on your vehicle.
- Consider placing lighting and security cameras in front of your home which not only serve as a deterrent to home burglaries, but are also positioned so as to make your vehicle readily visible and less attractive to thieves.

Keep in mind that a thief’s first instinct is to get away as soon as they’ve committed a crime, so calling in as soon as you observe suspicious activity will provide officers with added valuable time to respond. This not only helps to prevent crime, but increases the likelihood of making an arrest, and making your neighborhood safer from criminal activity.

Stay vigilant, and safe!

What is a Robbery

Robbery is the felonious taking of personal property in the possession of another, from his/her person or immediate presence, and against his will, accomplished by means of force or fear (section 211 California Penal Code.)

212 pc The **Fear** mentioned in Section 211 may be either:

1. The fear of an unlawful injury to the person or property of the person robbed, or of any relative of his or member of his family; or,
2. The fear of an immediate and unlawful injury to the person or property of anyone in the company of the person robbed at the time of the robbery.

213 (a) Robbery is punishable as follows:

(1) Robbery of the first degree is punishable as follows:

(A) If the defendant, voluntarily acting in concert with two or more other persons, commits the robbery within an inhabited dwelling house, a vessel as defined in Section 21 of the Harbors and Navigation Code, which is inhabited and designed for habitation, an inhabited floating home as defined in subdivision (d) of Section 18075.55 of the Health and Safety Code, a trailer coach as defined in the Vehicle Code, which is inhabited, or the inhabited portion of any other building, by imprisonment in the state prison for three, six, or nine years.

(B) In all cases other than that specified in subparagraph (A), by imprisonment in the state prison for three, four, or six years. (2) Robbery of the second degree is punishable by imprisonment in the state prison for two, three, or five years.

(b) Notwithstanding Section 664, attempted robbery in violation of paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) is punishable by imprisonment in the state prison.

Did You Know?

Robbers and thieves are targeting people that are on their iPhone or iPad as they exit the public transportation. Try to avoid displaying or using them in public. To maximize your personal safety, take time to plan and prepare at home to for your safety before leaving. Your worth it!

Here are a few tips you can follow to make yourself safer

- Digital music players and cell phones are a common target of thieves and robbers. Wearing headphones and ear buds greatly reduce your ability to hear and distracts you from potential dangers.
- Limit your valuables by carrying only what you need.
- When on the street, be ALERT and AWARE at all times. Keep "GOOD EYE" contact with the people around you.
- Walk with confidence and purpose. Most victims are targeted because they appear not to be paying attention to their surroundings.
- A handbag or book bag with a strap should not be worn across the body. It should be carried under that arm and released if grabbed.
- If taking public transportation, have your money or your Fast Pass ready in hand. Do not fumble with your wallet; you might draw attention to a pickpocket.
- While on public transportation (MUNI Bus) be aware that most robberies occur when the bus stops and happens to the people that are seated by the back doors.
- Trust your instincts! If you feel uncomfortable or threatened by another person(s), seek help immediately. A whistle is a great device to have when you need to call attention to yourself.



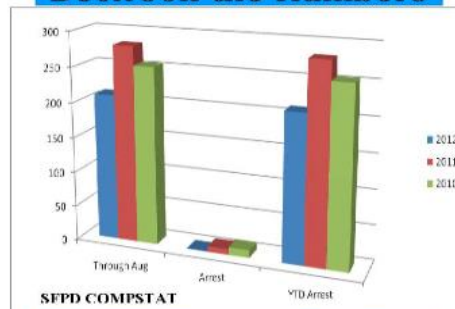

Protect Yourself

- When going home, call ahead, let someone know where you are and the route you are taking.
- There is safety in numbers walk home with another person or a group, never alone.
- Always use well lit streets, and never take short cuts.
- Have your house/car keys in hand ready to use before you get to the door.

Protect your laptop

The majority of electronic property that is stolen is because the thieves can see it! Carry your laptops in non-descript bags. Standard cases for laptops clearly portray the contents making it easier for thieves to spot in a crowd.

Safety in your car

Close the Door!

People usually feel safe when they are within a mile radius of their home so they let their guard down. Thieves know this and usually watch for people coming home that are distracted with groceries or packages. If you are like most people, you really don't check the area prior to opening your garage door. In San Francisco some garages are not attached to the home. Here are some general tips for your safety:

- Check the area visually for suspicious persons lurking or trying to conceal themselves.
- Follow your instincts drive around the block if you see someone suspicious.
- When unloading your car, if possible, close the garage door before getting out of the car.
- For a detached garage, have someone come out from the house and help.
- Never leave the car unattended in the garage while unloading.
- Never leave the keys in the ignition or trunk.
- Keep shrubs trimmed low so persons cannot hide.
- Install a motion light outside the garage and an automatic light inside.
- Make sure your remote and door are working properly.

Good Car Safety Habits to Adopt

1. Never leave your car running unattended.
2. Lock your doors when you get in your car.
3. If you see a motorist in distress, call 9-1-1 rather than stopping to help.
4. If you are being followed, drive to the nearest police or fire station. A populated area is a good default.
5. Keep your vehicle and tires in good condition to prevent breakdowns – stranding you in a dark or unfamiliar place.

As vehicle break-ins continue to be problematic in San Francisco, SAFE's role in the community is more important than ever. Your role is critical, too. You may be able to minimize the chance of a vehicle break-in, theft or carjacking. Don't become a victim! Use common sense. It's your best defense.

6 Theft and Break-in Safety Tips When Your Car Is Parked



- 1 **Trunk:** Never leave valuables in your car unattended. If necessary, place valuables in your trunk before you park.
- 2 **Car Lock:** Always lock your vehicle, close windows/sunroof completely, and take the keys.
- 3 **Glove Box:** Remove all papers with your personal information from your vehicle including mail, bills, checkbook, etc. Keep your vehicle title (pink slip) safe at home.
- 4 **Street Light:** Park in a well-lit area that's busy with foot traffic and/or has a parking attendant. Note where you parked.
- 5 **Car Key:** Never keep a spare key in or on your vehicle. Give parking attendant only your car key. Keep your other keys with you.
- 6 **Garage Door Opener:** When parking outside your home, never leave your garage door opener in your vehicle.

Cars are less likely to be broken into when they appear empty - never leave valuables in your vehicle.

If You Become a Victim of Vehicle Theft or Break-In

The best way to prevent vehicle theft or break-in is to always lock doors, close windows/sunroof, and never leave valuables in your car. If a theft or break-in occurs, report immediately to the police. Provide detailed information that can help identify your vehicle or stolen items:

- License plate number and VIN number
- Any identifying features that make your vehicle distinctive (stickers, window decals, dents, etc.)
- Any special items of value (phone, radio, GPS, CD player, tire brand and size)

Avoid carjacking by staying alert when you stop. If carjacked, do not resist. Give up your car and go to a safe place to dial 9-1-1.

Safety Tips Inside Your Building

1. Stay alert in areas such as the garage, laundry room, elevators, stairwells and hallways
2. Shared areas should be well-lit and painted in white or a light color
3. While in the elevator, stand close to the control panel: if accosted, press the buttons of all floors
4. Ensure your mailbox is secure to prevent identity theft: list only your first initial and last name

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Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- 1 **Garage:** When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- 2 **Car:** Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- 3 **Spare Key:** Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.
- 4 **Door Buzzer:** When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- 5 **Security Cameras & Alarm Systems:** Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- 6 **Light Timers:** Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- 7 **Doors/Windows:** Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

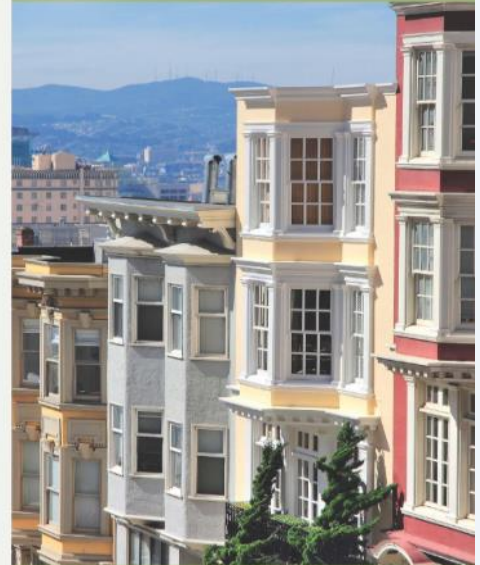

1. **車庫**：進入或離開車庫時，注意車庫門務必完全關上。收納自行車時，請鎖在牢固的車架上。

門窗安全

門：

- 應以實心木或金屬材質製成
- 有一個單圈固定栓鎖和一個一英寸的螺絲

窗：

- 如果窗戶玻璃有裂縫要更換，並且應更換所有缺損的鎖
- 地面樓層的窗戶應具有防盜功能：考慮購買含有強化金屬絲、層壓板或強化玻璃的窗戶
- 可在現有的地面樓層窗戶上加裝聚碳酸酯膠或金屬材質的格柵
- 地面樓層以上的窗戶並不安全：如果用來通風，請將它鎖好並且不要打開超過3英寸

PREVENT GARAGE DOOR BREAK-INS

Garages can sometimes be the most vulnerable area of the home and they are often the entry point most targeted by thieves because of the easy access to the home. Here are some tips to help secure your garage and protect it from theft.



ALWAYS CLOSE YOUR GARAGE DOOR

This may seem obvious, but just drive through any residential neighborhood and you'll likely see a few wide-open garage doors. This is an invitation to burglars and at the very least, you're allowing passersby to easily view the contents of your garage.



INSTALL MOTION-SENSITIVE LIGHTS

Homes and garages with poor exterior lighting become more appealing targets for burglars. Ensure all entry points are well-lit. Constant lighting supplemented by motion sensitive lighting is best.



REINFORCE THE GLASS ON THE GARAGE DOOR

Add vinyl adhesive to reinforce garage windows. You can also opt for a frosted or translucent glass design to allow sunlight in while obscuring contents inside.



DON'T LEAVE GARAGE DOOR REMOTE IN YOUR CAR

A garage door remote is basically another key into your home and thieves won't hesitate to use it if they find it. Opt to use a remote on a keychain.



INSTALL AN INTERIOR MANUAL GARAGE DOOR LOCK

When leaving on a vacation or for extended periods of time, disconnect automatic door motor and install a manual lock.



TIE EMERGENCY RELEASE CORD

Tying your emergency release cord into a small ball will make it more difficult to reach by thieves who manage to break the garage windows.



INSTALL SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS

There should be at least 1 exterior mounted camera facing the street and registered with the D.A.'s office.



SECURE ANY VALUABLES

Keep all tools in cabinet systems with locks and be sure to hang and lock any bicycles. As much as possible, try to avoid keeping valuable items in the garage or inside vehicles.



HAVE A QUALITY, FUNCTIONING GARAGE DOOR

Garage doors should be as secure, sturdy, and well-built as your front door and should remain in good condition and tight fitting. Deadbolts should also be added to the garage-to-house door.



INSTALL INTERIOR MAIL SLOT HOOD COVER

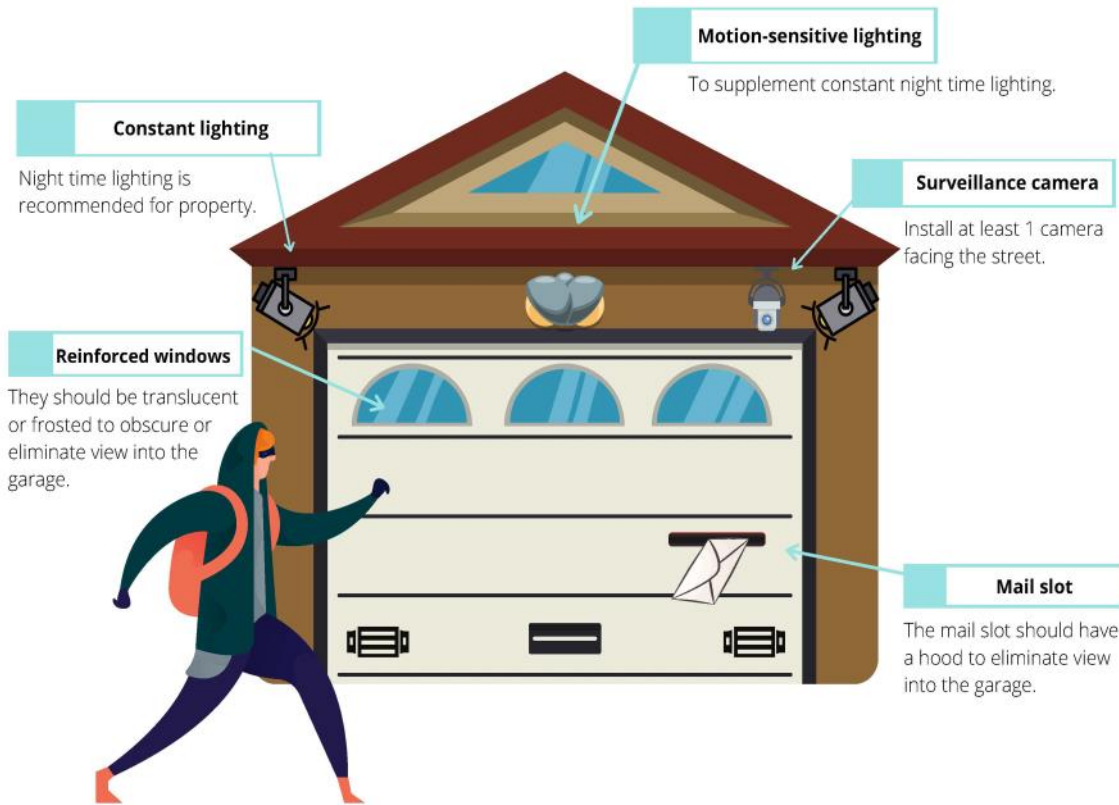
If the garage door is equipped with a mail slot, a hood cover will prevent any view into the garage and its contents, eliminating enticement to enter.

PACKAGE THEFT PREVENTION GUIDE

One rarely falls in love without being as much attracted to what is interestingly wrong with someone as what is objectively healthy

✉️ WON'T BE HOME?

Use the "Hold Package" option at USPS.com to have packages held at location post office for pick up. You can also arrange for neighborhoods to pick up any packages that might be delivered.

✉️ USE SPECIAL SERVICES

Use USPS special services like *Signature Confirmation* or *Registered Mail* to add a layer of security.

✉️ REQUEST NONDESCRIPT PACKAGING

When completing your online order, opt for packaging that conceals the item or select the 'gift' option to ensure package arrives in a plain box especially when ordering from a high-end store.

✉️ NETWORK WITH NEIGHBORS

Neighborhood groups on social media or community apps can provide a system for reporting suspicious activity. This is also a good way to keep your deliveries and neighborhood secure.

✉️ PORCH AREA VISIBILITY

Keep the porch area clear and visible. The more likely a would-be thief is to be seen, the more likely they are to choose another target.

✉️ CUSTOMIZE DELIVERIES

Customize deliveries by adding specific delivery instructions using USPS.com and your tracking number. You can also schedule packages to arrive when you are home or reroute packages.

✉️ DELIVER TO SECURE LOCATIONS

Send packages to secure locations such as Amazon Lockers, FedEx and UPS locations, P.O. Boxes, and local post office.

✉️ USE MODERN ALTERNATIVES

Take advantage of contemporary options like smart lockers, lockboxes, cameras, motion detection lighting, alarms like Package Guard, and services like Doorman.





YOUR BIKE HAS BEEN STOLEN. NOW WHAT?

Here's what you should do next to increase your chances of recovering your bike:

➔ File a Police Report

You can do this in one of three ways:

- Online at [sanfranciscopolice.org/reports](https://www.sanfranciscopolice.org/reports)
- Via phone by calling (415) 553-0123
- In person by going directly to your district police station

➔ Call or Email SF SAFE

Give us a call so we can list your bike as stolen on our database. You can reach us at (415) 553-1984 or info@sfsafe.org.

➔ Register

If you haven't done so already, register your bike at nonprofit bike registry, [bikeindex.org](https://www.bikeindex.org). If you are already registered, take action to flag your bike as stolen.



➔ Read Up

SF SAFE recommends reading "What to Do After Your Bike Has Been Stolen" on Medium. The article has a multitude of gems about where and how to post about your bike on social media to increase chances of recovering it.

➔ Create a Google Alert

By creating a Google alert for bikes being sold that match the make and model of your bike, you increase your chance of finding it.

➔ Don't Recover Your Bike Yourself

If you see your bike for sale on Craigslist or OfferUpNow.com, don't try to recover it yourself. Contact SFPD directly.

➔ Keep in Touch

If the police contact you to return your bike or if you recover it, please let us know! That way, SF SAFE can keep our files updated.

SHARING THE ROAD WITH CYCLISTS

When it comes to safely sharing the road with cyclists, it's paramount for drivers to learn how to coexist.

➔ Share the Road

When out and about, drivers need to be ever-mindful of sharing the road with cyclists.

➔ Stay Off the Horn

Sudden honking might startle a cyclist and can cause them to swerve into traffic or off the road.

➔ Follow the 3 Foot Rule

Maintain a distance of 36 inches from cyclists whenever passing them. If possible, keep an even wider berth if there's bad weather or if in a higher speed limit zone.

➔ Mind Your Blind Spots

Drivers should double-check their mirrors when changing lanes, making turns, and especially before opening their car door after parking.

➔ Be Cautious with Kids

Kids can be unpredictable since their motor skills and decision-making faculties aren't fully developed. Be on alert when driving near schools and residential areas.

➔ Be Patient

Don't tailgate a cyclist. When you need to pass one, patiently wait until it's safe to do so.

Protect your phone.

Don't use it near vehicle doors, during station stops or when exiting the station. If your cell is stolen, please notify BART Police or a BART Station Agent.

Follow these important safety tips to help protect your phone:

First and foremost, always be aware of your surroundings.

Before you arrive at the station...

- Register your device if possible
- Keep a detailed description of your phone that includes serial number, color and make
- Password protect your phone

At the station...

- Don't lend your phone to strangers
- Don't play devices too loudly
- Don't use your phone near train doors while boarding trains
- Don't use the phone while leaving the station
- Warn your travel companions to protect their phones too
- Make phone calls discretely to avoid the attention of would-be thieves

If your phone is stolen, please report it by calling BART Police at (510) 464-7000.

For emergencies, call 911.

Keep an eye out



for suspicious behavior.

We count on your help to report crimes, suspicious behavior or items in BART stations, trains and parking lots. Use these simple tips to give BART police officers the information they need to do their job effectively.

If you witness a crime or think you see a suspicious behavior or item:

- Call BART Police immediately at 1-877-679-7000, or if you are onboard a train, use the intercom located at the end of the car to call the Train Operator.
- Provide as much detail as possible about the incident or activity: what, where and when it happened, who was there, and any vehicle information you can recall.
- If you are a witness to a crime, make sure you are safe before calling BART Police. Tell them where to find you and wait for police to contact you.
- Never follow a suspect away from the crime scene.
- If you think an unattended item is suspicious, ask yourself if it is H.O.T.: Hidden, Obviously suspicious and not Typical for the location.

Some things to remember when describing a person:

- Gender, height, weight, skin color, hair color/style, clothing color/style and any unique marks like tattoos or scars.

How to describe a vehicle:

- License plate number, make, model, year (estimate), color, body description.

For emergencies, call 911.





How to Describe a Suspect

Providing a detailed description of a criminal suspect can help solve crimes in San Francisco. Suspects can easily change their appearance with a hat, jacket or glasses. It is important to be mindful of unique characteristics such as body markings, tattoos, shoes and specific clothing markings, like logos.

Note the Following Unique Characteristics:

Race _____ Sex _____ Age _____ Height _____ Weight _____

Hair _____ Eyes _____ Complexion _____

- Physical Characteristics (slight or heavy build, scars, marks, tattoos, manner of walk, mustache, glasses) _____
- Clothing (type and color, logos or brand names, shoes, jewelry, accessories) _____
- Weapon (type of weapon used by the suspect: rifle, shotgun, automatic, revolver, knife) _____
- Remarks (note anything the suspect says, accent, any names used) _____
- Means of Escape (vehicle or foot, license plate number, year, make, model, color, traveling in which direction) _____

If it's safe, take a photo of the suspect, vehicle, license plate number, etc.

What to Do During an Emergency



How to Call 911 in an Emergency

- Remain Calm and **Dial 911** Immediately
 - **WHEN** to Dial 911
 - If a crime is posing an immediate threat to you or others
 - If there is a medical emergency
 - If the incident is in progress
 - If the incident just occurred and you know where the suspect is
- State the following information:
 - **WHERE** the incident is happening and **WHAT** is occurring, for example: *"I'm at 1234 Market Street and I've just been robbed"*
 - Tell the operator if you are in immediate danger or are being threatened
 - Be **brief, clear** and **accurate**
- As long as it is safe, stay on the line and answer the operator's questions
- Describe each suspect separately from head to toe (*see more information on the back of this card*)

What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer civilian disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in various tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities throughout the year.

Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco. ALERT volunteers must pass a basic DOJ/FBI background check and complete two, 8-hour classes to graduate.

Active members must participate in one 4-hour drill in each calendar year to remain active but may also donate more time during various Station support and outreach activities throughout the year. ALERT members have many opportunities to work alongside Officers and to support the community throughout the year.

Rights and Responsibilities under California Whistleblower Laws (Re-issue DB 12-028)

The existing Whistleblower Law (California Labor Code Section 1102.5, et seq.) prohibits employers from preventing an employee from disclosing violations of a state or federal statute, or a violation or noncompliance with a state or federal regulation to a government or law enforcement agency, or from retaliating against an employee who makes a disclosure. A violation is punishable as a misdemeanor.

The law extends protections to employees who report a violation of a state or federal statute, or a violation of or noncompliance with a state or federal rule or regulation, or who exercised these rights in former employment.

The law prohibits an employer from retaliating against an employee for exercising any of these rights, including those provided under existing law, provides an additional civil penalty for violations, and establishes the evidentiary burdens of the parties participating in a civil action or administrative hearing involving an alleged violation.

The law also established a "Whistleblower Hotline" within the Attorney General's office. The Hotline Number is 1-800-952-5665. Calls made to the hotline will be reviewed and forwarded to the appropriate government authority.
