

Happy June, Ingleside Community! We are officially heading into summer. For many of us that means school is out, vacations are imminent, and... FIRE-WORKS. Fireworks have been the topic of many recent community concerns. Just to be clear, ALL fireworks (including those branded as "Safe and Sane") are illegal in San Francisco. SFPD is strongly urging our community members to keep themselves and their neighborhoods safe this year by refraining from the use of fireworks of any sort. That being said, despite our strongest discouragement, it is likely that there will be illegal, unsanctioned personal fireworks use to some extent. Therefore, I'd like to spend some time discussing how to report such incidents appropriately.

First and foremost, report illegal fireworks only if you see the person lighting them, can describe them, and can give an exact location or address. If the circumstances observed meet this threshold, please call 311 and provide the aforementioned information.

In regards to reporting noise from fireworks, please know that SFPD is aware of the noise generated by fireworks and how that impacts many in our communities. SFPD will be out in the field mitigating these complaints. If you feel it is necessary to call, complaints about noise should also be directed to 311.

During the holidays when fireworks are prevalent, namely the Fourth of July, SFPD receives a high volume of fireworks-related calls requiring our Dispatch to triage based on the severity of the call. Therefore, SFPD may not be able to respond to every firework-related call unless fires or injuries are involved. In these latter instances of fire and/or injury, please immediately call 911.

As always, please keep 911 available for people with police, fire, or medical emergencies.

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Captain's message continued:

The Captain's Tip of the Month for June 2021 is: WHEN YOU ARE DESCRIBING A VEHICLE INVOLVED IN ANY SORT OF CRIME, REMEMBER THE WORD "CLAMMY." We have a good variety of crimes that occur in the Ingleside District that involve vehicles. We also have many witnesses that observe such incidents and thankfully notify the police regarding their observations. A very astute community member suggested that it might be a good idea to discuss what we are looking for in vehicle descriptions when a crime is witnessed. Specific and accurate vehicle descriptions make a huge difference to police when responding to incidents. They truly do help us solve crimes. CLAMMY is a good prompt for what to try to commit to memory.

C = Color of the Vehicle.

L = License Plate Number (or whether the car may be missing a front and/or rear plate or have dealership or temporary paper plates).

A = Auto Type (the style of the vehicle such as a sedan, SUV, van, truck, etc.).

M = Make / Manufacturer (Ford, Honda, Toyota, Infiniti, etc.).

M = Model (Accord, Camry, Explorer, Tahoe, etc.).

Y = Year of Manufacture (give an estimate if you are unsure or try to discern whether the car is newer or older).

Another final key piece of information is whether the vehicle has any IDENTIFYING FEATURES such as damage (a dent, scratch, broken window, etc.), decals or bumper stickers, or heavily tinted windows.

Your assistance in describing vehicles as thoroughly and accurately as possible is greatly appreciated.

Continuing on from last month, I asked my seven year old, Finn, if he had any additional crime tips for the Ingleside Community. I'd like to call this "Finn for the Win." A direct quote from him: "You should lock your car doors cuz... duh." Also, "If you see someone breaking into your house, call Godzilla." I'd like to add that you should also call the police should Godzilla be unavailable.

On a final note, we wanted to share some helpful information from our "Park Smart" campaign to help prevent auto break-ins. Always remember to stop, check, and take all of your valuables with you!

In this section of our newsletter, we want to take time to highlight the excellent work being done by our officers. We want to bring attention to these incidents and extend some well-deserved appreciation to the officers involved in these notable incidents.

06-14-21 / 02:40 p.m. / Robbery Arrest at Geneva Ave. and Mission St.

Officer Lama responded to Geneva Ave and Mission St. regarding a report of a possible robbery. Dispatch notified the responding officers that a witness had observed two unknown subjects possibly rob a victim, and that the victim and witness were following the suspects. Dispatch also broadcasted the description of the suspects, provided by the witness, along with additional information that the suspects were now at a bus stop. Officers Siracusa and Quinlan were first to arrive on scene, and they were immediately flagged down by another victim and a witness, both of whom directed the officers to the two suspects. Both suspects were detained without incident.

Officer Lama arrived on scene and initiated her investigation, during which time the victim informed Officer Lama that her cell phone had been stolen. Officer Lama was able to assist the victim in tracking her cell phone to where it had been discarded after she was robbed. Officer Quinlan recovered the victim's cell phone and provided it to Officer Lama.

The victim informed Officer Lama that she was riding aboard a MUNI bus, and that when the bus came to a stop, one of the suspects took the victim's cell phone out of her hand, and exited the bus. The suspect then exited the bus, and the victim followed him, asking for her phone back. The victim was able to identify the recovered phone as her stolen property.

Officer Lama also spoke with a second victim, who stated that he attempted to intervene on behalf of the robbery victim, but that the second suspect threatened him in an attempt to dissuade him from helping the victim.

Both detained subjects were identified by the victims and witness as the suspects in the robbery, and they were subsequently arrested and booked for the robbery. Report number 210370730.

Robbery

Officers Wise and Zandanel were dispatched to the area of 28th and Church Sts. on the report of a robbery, and that involved citizens were chasing after the suspect. Officers arrived on scene and met with the victim. The victim told the officers that she was walking home when she was approached from behind by a suspect who demanded her purse. The suspect pushed the victim and took her purse from her shoulder. Some bystanders heard the victim's calls for help, and intervened by chasing after the suspect. Although the suspect was able to get away, the citizens were able to recover the victim's purse and cell phone. Report number 210370809.

Officers Siracusa and Quinlan responded to a report of a robbery. The victim stated that while she was walking along the street, an unknown subject approached her, grabbed hold of her shoulder bag, and forcibly tried to take it from her. The victim and suspect struggled for control of her bag, but the suspect overpowered the victim, and was able to take her bag and cellphone. The suspect ran to a waiting vehicle and fled the scene in possession of the victim's property. Report number 210368199.

Stunt Driving Event

Officers Jensen and Fogarty were dispatched to the call of a stunt driving event at the intersection of Mission and Randall Sts. Along with additional Ingleside units, and officers from the Stunt Driving Response Unit, officers arrived on scene and were able to safely disperse an estimated crowd of two hundred onlookers and the associated vehicles. 06:50 p.m. 5200 Block of Mission St.

Robbery

Officers Hernandez and Ramirez responded to a report of a robbery involving the use of a gun. When officers arrived on scene, all the involved parties had already left the scene. A witness who asked to remain anonymous told the officers that he observed two vehicles box in a third vehicle. Suspects exited from the two initial vehicles and pointed firearms at the victim vehicle. Another suspect broke out the back window of the suspect vehicle and took what appeared to be a rolling suitcase. All the involved parties then fled the scene, and the witness called 911 to report what they had witnessed. Report number 210366400.

11:00 p.m. Mission St. & Mt. Vernon Ave. Robbery

Officers Quinlan and Siracusa responded to a local hospital to meet with the victim of a robbery. The victim told officers that he was walking along the street when he was physically assaulted. The victim fell to the ground, at which time he was kicked and punched multiple times. After the suspects had fled the scene, the victim realized that his wallet and cell phone were gone. The victim walked to a friend's home and later responded to a local hospital to seek medical treatment for possible injuries. Report number 210367997.

Warrant Arrest

Officers Espinoza and Villalobos were dispatched to a store regarding a report of a possible shoplifter. Officers met with store security personnel, who stated that a known shoplifter was acting incoherent inside the store, and left without paying for a bottle of wine. Officers were able to track down the subject, and returned him to the store, where he paid for the bottle of wine. The officers determined that the suspect had outstanding warrants for his arrest, and he was subsequently arrested and booked for the warrants. Report number 210364545.

The officers discovered the front door of the residence forced open. Upon conducting a walkthrough of the home, the officers observed that interior doors had been forced open. The officers spoke with residents of the home, and determined that several items had been stolen from inside the residence. Report number 210363155.

Officers Joseph, Green, and Taylor responded to meet with the victim of a robbery. The victim advised officers that he was jogging in McLaren Park when he crossed paths with a subject riding a bicycle. The subject stopped his bike and blocked the victim's path. The subject then produced a weapon and held it in a threatening manner. In fear for his safety, and believing he was being robbed, the victim handed some of his possessions over to the suspect, who then rode away from the scene. Report number 210364391.

Burglary

Officers Fyles and Taylor were dispatched to a call of a residential burglary. The officers arrived on scene and met with the victim, who was home at the time of the incident. The victim reported hearing noises coming from the front of his residence. As the victim was going to investigate the noises, the home's alarm started sounding, which prompted the victim to call 911. The victim reviewed footage from their security cameras, which captured footage of the incident. The victim and the officers determined that the unknown subjects arrived in a vehicle, began forcing entry into the home, and then fled in the vehicle. Report number 210361870.

Officers Miller and Wheelock responded to a local store regarding a report of a physical assault. The officers were informed that a customer known to store staff had physically assaulted an employee. The victim stated that the suspect asked for money and became angry when the employee was unable to give him any. The suspect kicked a display case, and began throwing items at the employee, striking the victim once. The suspect then fled the scene on foot prior to the officers arriving on scene. Vandalism

Officers Suguitan and Hornstein responded to a report of someone vandalizing a Muni bus. The bus driver told the officers that a passenger was exiting the bus when he became frustrated that the doors got stuck. The suspect then smashed the glass on the door, and fled the bus. Officers Wise and Zandanel located the suspect nearby, and he was subsequently detained and identified by the Muni operator as the vandalism suspect. The suspect was subsequently arrested and booked for charges related to the vandalism, possession of an illegal knife, and an active arrest warrant. Report number 210358695.

Burglary

Officers Parker and Wong responded to a report of a residential burglary. The victim reported hearing a loud noise in the garage area, and upon going to investigate, discovered that cabinet doors and the garage door were open. The victim reviewed his surveillance video, which captured footage of the incident, including the apparent theft of the victim's garage door opener from inside their vehicle. The resident looked out through their window and saw a suspect running away carrying unknown items. The suspect then fled the scene in a waiting vehicle. Robbery

Officers Joseph and Espinoza responded to a store regarding a report of a shoplifter. A store security guard told the officers that a known and frequent shoplifter filled a cart with store merchandise, and left the store without paying for the items. The guard attempted to stop the suspect, who then simulated having a weapon. The guard was able to retain the stolen items, and the suspect fled the scene in a waiting vehicle. Stolen Vehicle

Officers Hidalgo and Kosta were on patrol when they observed a vehicle travelling in front of them. A registration check of the vehicle's license plate revealed that the vehicle was reported stolen. Upon activating their emergency lights in order to effect a traffic stop, the vehicle fled from the officers. The officers did not pursue the vehicle, and it was lost in the area. A short time later, the officers observed the same vehicle parked on the street, and unattended. With the owner of the vehicle unable to respond to pick up his vehicle, the officers arranged for a tow truck to retrieve the vehicle. While waiting for the tow truck to respond, the officers heard the locking mechanisms on the stolen vehicle being activated. Believing that the driver of the stolen vehicle might be in the immediate area using a key fob to activate the door locks, the officers began searching for the suspect. The officers observed a subject a few doors away standing behind a doorway. The officers recognized the subject from prior arrests, contacted him, and observed that he was holding a key fob for the same vehicle make as the stolen vehicle. The subject was subsequently detained and the officers secured the key fob they saw him holding. The officers were able to use the key fob to operate the door locks of the stolen vehicle, and also to turn on the ignition. Additional evidence was located tying the subject to the stolen vehicle, and he made statements to the same effect. The subject was arrested and booked for multiple charges related to possession of the stolen vehicle. Report number 210354552.

Burglary

Officers Najarro and Ramos responded with numerous other officers to a report of a possible residential burglary in progress. Upon arrival, the officers established a perimeter around the building. The officers observed signs of forced entry on an open second-story window that appeared to be accessible by a large tree in front of the home. The victim stated that he was inside his home with his family when he heard noises coming from the room with the open window. The victim went upstairs to check, and he observed an unknown subject standing in the room. After ordering the subject to leave the house, the victim ran downstairs, secured his family members outside in a vehicle, and called 911. Multiple officers conducted a search of the home for the suspect, but he had already fled the premises prior to police arrival. Report number 210357114.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Post Street Stabbing

On Wednesday June 16, 2021, at approximately 10:15 a.m., San Francisco Police officers from Central Station responded to the 800 block of Post Street for a report of a stabbing. Officers arrived on scene and located a 94-year-old Asian female victim suffering from multiple stab wounds. Officers rendered medical aid to the victim and summoned medics to the scene. The victim was transported to a local hospital where she is expected to survive.

Investigators obtained a photo of the suspect and circulated it to all sworn SFPD members. The suspect was identified as 35-year-old Daniel Cauich. Less than two hours later, at approximately 11:45 a.m., officers located Cauich on the 1300 block of Clay Street and took him into custody without further incident. Officers also located a knife near the crime scene believed to have been used in the commission of the stabbing.

Cauich was booked on the following charges: attempted homicide (664/187 PC), battery with serious injury (243(d) PC), elder abuse (368(b)(1) PC), committing a felony while on bail or OR release (12022.1(a)(1) PC), great bodily injury enhancement (12022.7(a) PC), and probation violation (1203.2(a) PC).

While an arrest has been made, this incident remains active and open investigation. At this time investigators believe the attack was unprovoked and are working to determine if race was a motivating factor in the incident.

Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct a Traffic Safety Enforcement Operation on June 18th with a focus on distracted driving, especially through the use of handheld cell phones and texting. Distracted driving is anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road, or your hands off the steering wheel. These are some of the most dangerous things we do behind the wheel that many people do not think about because these actions are so common.

It is important to recognize the dangers of distracted driving. In California, cell phone laws were enacted to help prevent distracted driving and make roads safer. The law prohibits driving while holding a cell phone in your hand. If the cell phone is used in a hands-free manner, such as voice command or the use of a mounting device, it is completely legal. While driving, you can single swipe or tap the screen to activate or deactivate a feature or function, but you cannot text, scroll or tap multiple times. The law allows using your cell phone for emergency purposes, including, but not limited to, an emergency call to a law enforcement agency, health care provider, fire department, or other emergency services agency or entity.

Any driver under the age of 18 cannot use a cell phone or any other electronic wireless device at all (not hand-held, hands-free, Bluetooth, speaker phone, or any other means) except for the above emergency purposes.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on June 18th, 22nd and 29th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past four years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these non-motorized means of transportation. In 2019, California witnessed 972 pedestrians and 133 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 30 percent of all traffic fatalities. In 2020, 29 people were killed in crashes on city streets. The top three causes of fatal traffic collisions in the city are failure to yield to pedestrians: unsafe speed, and not stopping at a red light signal.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

San Francisco Police Arrest Wanted Suspect with Multiple Arrest Warrants

As part of their efforts to identify and arrest suspects wanted in connection with crime in San Francisco, SFPD investigators regularly circulate crime alert bulletins containing photos and identifying features of suspects. On June 7, 2021, a member of SFPD's Southern Police Station authored a crime alert containing a photograph and identifying information about a known and wanted burglar.

On June 10, 2021, at approximately 6:04 p.m., two officers assigned to Southern Police Station were on patrol in the area of 6th and Clara Streets when they saw this suspect and recognized him from the email crime alert. The officers placed 39-year-old San Francisco resident Jamal Davis under arrest and later booked him at SF County Jail on the following warrants.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Mid-Market Shooting Homicide

On Thursday, June 10, 2021, at approximately 10:10 a.m., San Francisco Police officers assigned to the Mid-Market Foot Beat (MMFB) were patrolling the area of Market and Jones Streets when they heard several gunshots. The officers responded to the scene and located an adult male victim suffering from gunshot wounds. Officers immediately rendered aid and summoned medics to the scene. Medics arrived on scene and transported the victim to a local hospital with life-threatening injuries. Despite life-saving efforts the victim succumbed to his injuries and was declared deceased. The victim is identified as 43-year-old Howard Dixon of San Francisco.

The SFPD Homicide Detail took over the investigation. A Crime Alert to locate and identify the homicide suspect was disseminated to SFPD officers.

Through the course of the investigation on June 10, 2021, at approximately 11:55 p.m. SFPD officers assigned to the Narcotics Detail made contact with the suspect at 8th and Howard Streets. The suspect, identified as Leonard Lee Colvin, 49, of San Francisco is on active California Department of Corrections (CDC) Parole for voluntary manslaughter (192(a) PC). SFPD Homicide investigators developed probable cause to arrest Colvin. Colvin was later booked at the San Francisco County Jail for murder (187(a) PC).

While an arrest has been made, this incident remains active investigation and is being led by the SFPD Homicide Detail. Anyone with information is asked to call the SFPD 24-hour Tip Line at 1-415-575-4444 or Text a Tip to TIP411 and begin the text message with SFPD. You may remain anonymous.

SFPD Patrol Officers Recognize Stabbing Suspect from Crime Alert Bulletin, Team Up with Investigators to Make Arrest

On June 2, 2021, at approximately 10:03 a.m., SFPD officers from Northern Station responded to a store on the 1500 block of Franklin Street regarding a stabbing. Officers located the victim (shop keeper) a 72-year-old male San Francisco resident who was suffering from apparent stab wounds to his face and upper body. The victim told officers that he got into an altercation with the suspect who then stabbed him before fleeing his store. The victim was transported to ZSFGH for life-threatening injuries and has since been discharged. SFPD officers conducted an investigation which included surveillance video. A crime alert bulletin including images of the suspect obtained from surveillance video was circulated to law enforcement.

On June 7, 2021, at approximately 9:45 a.m., SFPD officers from Central Police Station responded to 3rd and Stevenson Streets regarding a physical altercation. Officers determined that the suspect, Donovan Cole Catron, 30, no known address, attempted to rob the victim, a 56-year-old male, San Francisco resident of his duffel bag. Officers arrested Catron for attempted robbery (664/211 PC) and possession of narcotics paraphernalia (11364 HS).

One of the officers on scene recalled seeing the crime alert for the June 2nd stabbing incident and recognized Catron from the photos on that bulletin.

The officer contacted the investigator from the Northern Station SIT team who developed probable cause to arrest Catron for the June 2nd stabbing incident. In addition to the charges listed for the June 7th incident, Catron was also booked at the SF County Jail for assault with a deadly weapon, other than firearm (245(a)(1) PC), aggravated mayhem (205 PC), battery resulting in serious bodily injury (243(d) PC) and elder abuse (368(b)(1) PC).

The efforts of the officers in these cases are a snapshot of the work done every day by San Francisco Police members. SFPD officers are active in the communities they serve, continuously building relationships with people who live, work, and visit their areas of

In addition to working on patrol, Officer Parker has been a Field Training Officer (F.T.O.) for three years. As an F.T.O., Officer Parker enjoys teaching new officers and guiding them through the field training process.

Whether meeting the demands of a critical incident, or interacting with members of the community, Officers Parker and Wong are exemplary representatives of the SFPD and Ingleside Station, and it's a privilege to work with them.

Ingleside Citizen of the Month / June 2021

The Citizen of the Month for June is Barb Cornejo. For the past seven years, Barb has been the lead pastor of "Daring Faith Celebration Centre," the church located at 355 Ocean Ave. She moved from the Midwest and has made the Ingleside/Mission Terrace her home for the past thirty-five years.

While serving as pastor, Barb has led the church in numerous ways to support the community, neighboring schools, and businesses with resources, donations, and volunteers. Some key events include partnering with the Red Cross to provide emergency services for a neighborhood fire, and working with the SF Neighborhood Empowerment Network to host the Resilient Cayuga Shake Tank event. This event organized roughly fifty local stakeholder organizations to provide training to implement disaster response plans. She also worked with the members of Ingleside Police Station to host the Faith and Blue 2020 event, which is an initiative to build bridges and strengthen connections between law enforcement professionals and the communities they serve.

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Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Ingleside Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Ingleside Station has foot beat officers assigned to the Geneva, Leland and Cortland corridors.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community
 Meetings are held continuously. Station personnel also attend
 meetings with merchant groups, business groups, development
 authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed
 through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Ingleside Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



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Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

The following are some examples of Suspicious Activity that are "In progress" crimes, which demand an immediate call to 9-1-1:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

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Crime Definition

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm and <u>battery</u> is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.


Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.





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Preventing "Keyless" Auto Break-ins & Thefts

Nationwide, auto break-ins and auto thefts continue to be a common occurrence due to the opportunistic nature of the crime, the speed at which the incident can occur, and the potential for rewards. As motorists and passengers, we've all had to become proactive in preventing this type of crime by adopting basic measures, such as securing all vehicle doors and windows, keeping all valuables and other property out of view, not leaving a vehicle running and unattended, and using steering wheel locking devices, alarms, ignition locking devices, etc.

As vehicle technology has advanced (remote entry/unlocking/starting, keyless fobs, vehicle ignitions, etc.), so have the methods used by thieves to enter vehicles to take property, or the vehicle itself. Law enforcement agencies have seen a rise in "keyless" auto break-ins and auto thefts, involving the use of electronic devices designed for the purpose of defeating wireless unlocking technology. As these types of incidents become more common, we all need to do our part to help prevent these crimes.

How does it work? In short, auto thieves are using a variety of electronic devices to intercept radio signals transmitted through key fobs and remotes. These signals include "rolling codes" which change with each press of a button, and "fixed pin codes" commonly used in older technology, such as garage door openers. Many of these devices are small, easily concealable in a pocket, and can be used to exploit signals from key fobs and remotes in order to easily unlock vehicle doors, start the vehicle ignition, and open electronic garage doors, without damage or use of force. Of further concern, is the hacking of mobile apps that allow a driver to unlock car doors through the aid of their phone.

So, how can you best prevent keyless car theft? Here are some basic habits you can practice to keep from becoming a victim:

- After locking your doors remotely, check for alarm indicator lights to be illuminated, and check to see that your car doors are locked.
- Consider storing keys and key fobs that transmit wireless signals in a small signal-blocking
 protective pouch. These pouches are available online and in stores, and work like the protective
 pouches and wallets that store passports, credit cards, and other forms of indicia that utilize
 radio signal technology.
- Some key fobs can be turned off. Find out if yours can, and do so when you're away from your vehicle, or at home.
- Use technology to your advantage! Tracking devices are available which can help to monitor
 activity with your vehicle, and track it if stolen. Also, update any software installed on your
 vehicle.
- Consider placing lighting and security cameras in front of your home which not only serve as a
 deterrent to home burglaries, but are also positioned so as to make your vehicle readily visible
 and less attractive to thieves.

Keep in mind that a thief's first instinct is to get away as soon as they've committed a crime, so calling in as soon as you observe suspicious activity will provide officers with added valuable time to respond. This not only helps to prevent crime, but increases the likelihood of making an arrest, and making your neighborhood safer from criminal activity.

Stay vigilant, and safe!

What is a Robbery

Robbery is the felonious taking of personal property in the possession of another, from his/her person or imm diste presence, and against his will, accomplished by means of force or fear (section 211 California Penal

212 pc The Fear mentioned in Section 211 may be

1. The fear of an unlawful injury to the person or property of the person robbed, or of any relative of his or member of his family, or, 2. The fear of an immediate and unlawful injury to the person or property of anyone in the company of the person robbed at the time of the robbery.



Did You Know?

Robbers and thieves are targeting people that are on their iPhone or iPad as they exit the public transportation. Try to avoid displaying or using them in public. To maximize your personal safety, take time to plan and prepare at home to for your safety before leaving. Your worth it!

Here are a few tips you can follow to make yourself safer

- Digital music players and cell phones are a common target of thieves and robbers. Wearing headphones and ear buds greatly reduce your ability to hear and distracts you from potential dangers.
- Limit your valuables by carrying only what you need.
- When on the street, be ALERT and AWARE at all times. Keep "GOOD EYE" contact with the people around you.
- Walk with confidence and purpose. Most victims are targeted because they appear not to be paying attention to their surroundings.
- A handbag or book bag with a strap should not be worn across the body. It should be carried under that arm and released if grabbed.
- If taking public transportation, have your money or your Fast Pass ready in hand. Do not fumble with your wallet; you might draw attention to a pickpock-
- While on public transportation (MUNI Bus) be aware that most robberies occur when the bus stops and happens to the people that are seated by the back
- Trust your instincts! If you feel uncomfortable of threatened by another person(s), seek help immediately. A whistle is a great. device to have when need to call attention to yourself.


- When going home, call ahead, let someone know where you are and the route you are taking.

Protect your laptop

The majority of electronic property that is stolen is because the thieves can see it! Carry your laptops in non descript bags. Standard cases for laptops clearly portray the contents making it easier for thieves to spot in a crewd.

Safety in your car

Close the Door!

People usually feel safe when they are within a mile radius of their home so they let their guard down. Thieves know this and usually watch for people coming home that are distracted with groceries or packages. If you are like most people, you really don't check the area prior to opening your garage close. In San Francisco some garages are not attached to the home. Here are some general tips for your safety.

- Check the area visually for suspicious persons lurking or trying to conceal themselves.
- Follow your instincts drive around the block if you see someone suspicious
- When unloading your car, if possible, close the gar-age door before getting out of the car.
- For a detached garage, have someone come out from the house and help.
- Never leave the ear unattended in the garage while
- Never leave the keys in the ignition or trunk.
- Keep shrubs trimmed low so persons cannot hide.
- Install a motion light outside the garage and an auto-
- Make sure your remote and door are working proper-

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Good Car Safety Habits to Adopt

- Never leave your car running unattended.
- Lock your doors when you get in your car.
- If you see a motorist in distress, call 9-1-1 rather than stopping to help.
- If you are being followed, drive to the nearest police or fire station.

- Keep your vehicle and tires in good condition to prevent breakdowns – stranding you in a dark or unfamiliar place.

As vehicle break-ins continue to be problematic in San Francisco, SAFE's role in the community is more important than ever. Your role is critical, too. You may be able to minimize the chance of a vehicle break-in, theft or carjacking. Don't become a victim! Use common sense. It's your best defense.

6 Theft and Break-in Safety Tips When Your Car Is Parked

- Trunk: Never leave valuables in your car unattended. If necessary, place valuables in your trunk before you park.
- Car Lock: Always lock your vehicle, close windows/sunroof completely, and take the keys.
- Glove Box: Remove all papers with your personal information from your vehicle including mail, bills, checkbook, etc. Keep your vehicle title (pink slip) safe at home.



- Street Light: Park in a well-lit area that's busy with foot traffic and/or has a parking attendant. Note where you parked.
- Car Key: Never keep a spare key in or on your vehicle. Give parking attendant only your car key. Keep your other keys with you.
- Garage Door Opener: When parking outside your home, never leave your garage door opener in your vehicle.

If You Become a Victim of Vehicle Theft or Break-In

The best way to prevent vehicle theft or break-in is to always lock doors, close windows/sunroof, and never leave valuables in your car. If a theft or break-in occurs, report immediately to the police. Provide detailed information that can help identify your vehicle or stolen items:

- · License plate number and VIN number
- Any identifying features that make your vehicle distinctive (stickers, window decals, dents, etc.)
- Any special items of value (phone, radio, GPS, CD player, tire brand and size)

Avoid carjacking by staying alert when you stop. If carjacked, do not resist. Give up your car and go to a safe place to dial 9-1-1.



Safety Tips Inside **Your Building**

- 1. Stay alert in areas such as the garage, laundry room, elevators, stairwells and hallways
- 2. Shared areas should be well-lit and painted in white or a light color

- Ensure your mailbox is secure to prevent identity theft: list only your first initial and last name

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

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

Residential Safety 7



- Garage: When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy
- Car: Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- Spare Key: Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.
- O Door Buzzer: When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- Security Cameras & Alarm Systems: Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- Light Timers: Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows: Always keep doors and windows locked.

Keep property in good repair. Maintain visibility to your neighbors for increased safety.

Door and Window Safety

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- · Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- · Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- · Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- · Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- · Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

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PREVENT GARAGE DOOR BREAK-INS

Garages can sometimes be the most vulnerable area of the home and they are often the entry point most targeted by thieves because of the easy access to the home. Here are some tips to help secure your garage and protect it from theft.





ALWAYS CLOSE YOUR GARAGE DOOR

This may seem obvious, but just drive through any residential neighborhood and you'll likely see a few wide-open garage doors. This is an invitation to burglars and at the very least, you're allowing passersby to easily view the contents of your garage.



INSTALL MOTION-SENSITIVE LIGHTS

Homes and garages with poor exterior lighting become more appealing targets for burglars. Ensure all entry points are well-lit. Constant lighting supplemented by motion sensitive lighting is best.



REINFORCE THE GLASS ON THE GARAGE DOOR

Add vinyl adhesive to reinforce garage windows. You can also opt for a frosted or translucent glass design to allow sunlight in while obscuring contents inside.



DON'T LEAVE GARAGE DOOR REMOTE IN YOUR CAR

A garage door remote is basically another key into your home and thieves won't hesitate to use it if they find it. Opt to use a remote on a keychain.



INSTALL AN INTERIOR MANUAL GARAGE DOOR LOCK

When leaving on a vacation or for extended periods of time, disconnect automatic door motor and install a manual lock.



TIE EMERGENCY RELEASE CORD

Tying your emergency release cord into a small ball will make it more difficult to reach by thieves who manage to break the garage windows.



INSTALL SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS

There should be at least 1 exterior mounted camera facing the street and registered with the D.A.'s office.



SECURE ANY VALUABLES

Keep all tools in cabinet systems with locks and be sure to hang and lock any bicycles. As much as possible, try to avoid keeping valuable items in the garage or inside vehicles.



HAVE A QUALITY, FUNCTIONING GARAGE DOOR

Garage doors should be as secure, sturdy, and well-built as your front door and should remain in good condition and tight fitting. Deadbolts should also be added to the garage-to-house door.



INSTALL INTERIOR MAIL SLOT HOOD COVER


If the garage door is equipped with a mail slot, a hood cover will prevent any view into the garage and its contents, eliminating enticement to enter.

PACKAGE THEFT PREVENTION GUIDE

WON'T BE HOME?

Use the "Hold Package" option at USPS.com to have packages held at location post office for pick up. You can also arrange for neighborhoods to pick up any packages that might be delivered.

USE SPECIAL SERVICES

Use USPS special services like Signature Confirmation or Registered Mail to add a layer of security.

REQUEST NONDESCRIPT **PACKAGING**

When completing your online order, opt for packaging that conceals the item or select the 'gift' option to ensure package arrives in a plain box especially when ordering from a high-end store.

NETWORK WITH NEIGHBORS

Neighborhood groups on social media or community apps can provide a system for reporting suspicious activity. This is also a good way to keep your deliveries and neighborhood secure.

PORCH AREA VISIBILITY

Keep the porch area clear and visible. The more likely a would-be thief is to be seen, the more likely they are to choose another target.

CUSTOMIZE DELIVERIES

Customize deliveries by adding specific delivery instructions using USPS.com and your tracking number. You can also schedule packages to arrive when you are home or reroute packages.

DELIVER TO SECURE LOCATIONS

Send packages to secure locations such as Amazon Lockers, FedEx and UPS locations, P.O. Boxes, and local post office.

USE MODERN ALTERNATIVES

Take advantage of contemporary options like smart lockers, lockboxes, cameras, motion detection lighting, alarms like Package Guard, and services like Doorman.



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YOUR BIKE HAS BEEN STOLEN. NOW WHAT?

Here's what you should do next to increase your chances of recovering your bike.

File a Police Report

You can do this in one of three ways:

- Online at sanfranciscopolice.org/reports
- Via phone by calling (415) 553-0123
- In person by going directly to your district police station

(a) Call or Email SF SAFE

Give us a call so we can list your bike as stolen on our database. You can reach us at (415) 553-1984 or info@sfsafe.org.

→ Register

If you haven't done so already, register your bike at nonprofit bike registry, bikeindex.org. If you are already registered, take action to flag your bike as stolen.



(A) Read Up

SF SAFE recommends ready "What to Do After Your Bike Has Been Stolen" on Medium. The article has a multitude of gems about where and how to post about your bike on social media to increase chances of recovering it.

Create a Google Alert

By creating a Google alert for bikes being sold that match the make and model of your bike, you increase your chance of finding it.

∂ Don't Recover Your Bike Yourself

If you see your bike for sale on Craigslist or OfferUpNow.com, don't try to recover it yourself. Contact SFPD directly.

If the police contact you to return your bike or if you recover it, please let us know! That, way, SF SAFE can keep our files updated.

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SHARING THE ROAD WITH CYCLISTS

When it comes to safely sharing the road with cyclists it's paramount for drivers to learn how to coexist.

Share the Road

When out and about, drivers need to be evermindful of sharing the road with cyclists.

(a) Follow the 3 Foot Rule

Maintain a distance of 36 inches from cyclists whenever passing them. If possible, keep an even wider berth if there's bad weather or if in a higher speed limit zone.

Be Cautious with Kids

Kids can be unpredictable since their motor skills and decision-making faculties aren't fully developed. Be on alert when driving near schools and residential areas.

(A) Stay Off the Horn

Sudden hoking might startle a cyclist and can cause them to swerve into traffic or off the road.

Mind Your Blind Spots

Drivers should double-check their mirrors when changing lanes, making turns, and especially before opening their car door after parking.

Be Patient

Don't tailgate a cyclist. When you need to pass one, patiently wait until it's safe to do so.

Don't use it near vehicle doors, during station stops or when exiting the station. If your cell is stolen, please notify BART Police or a BART Station Agent.





Follow these important safety tips to help protect your phone:

First and foremost, always be aware of your surroundings.

Before you arrive at the station.

- · Register your device if possible
- Keep a detailed description of your phone that includes serial number, color and make
- · Password protect your phone

At the station...

- . Don't lend your phone to strangers
- Don't play devices too loudly
- Don't use your phone near train doors while boarding trains
- Don't use the phone while leaving the station
- Warn your travel companions to protect their phones too
- Make phone calls discretely to avoid the attention of would-be thieves

If your phone is stolen, please report it by calling BART Police at (510) 464-7000.

For emergencies, call 911.







If you witness a crime or think you see a suspicious behavior or item:

- Call BART Police immediately at 1-877-679-7000, or if you are onboard a train, use the intercom located at the end of the car to call the Train Operator.
- Provide as much detail as possible about the incident or activity: what, where and when it happened, who was there, and any vehicle information you can recall.
- If you are a witness to a crime, make sure you are safe before calling BART Police. Tell them where to find you and wait for police to contact you.
- Never follow a suspect away from the crime scene.
- If you think an unattended item is suspicious, ask yourself if it is H.O.T.: Hidden, Obviously suspicious and not Typical for the location.

Gender, height, weight, skin color, hair color/style, clothing color/style and any unique marks like tattoos or scars.

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How to Describe a Suspect

Providing a detailed description of a criminal suspect can help solve crimes in San Francisco. Suspects can easily change their appearance with a hat, jacket or glasses. It is important to be mindful of unique characteristics such as body markings, tattoos, shoes and specific clothing markings, like logos.

Note the Following Unique Characteristics:

Race	Sex Eyes	AgeComplexion_	_Height	Weight	
------	-------------	----------------	---------	--------	--

- Physical Characteristics (slight or heavy build, scars, marks, tattoos, manner of walk, mustache, glasses)
- Clothing (type and color, logos or brand names, shoes, jewelry, accessories)
- Weapon (type of weapon used by the suspect: rifle, shotgun, automatic, revolver, knife)
- · Remarks (note anything the suspect says, accent, any names used)
- Means of Escape (vehicle or foot, license plate number, year, make, model, color, traveling in which direction)

If it's safe, take a photo of the suspect, vehicle, license plate number, etc.

What to Do During an Emergency



How to Call 911 in an Emergency

- Remain Calm and Dial 911 Immediately
 - · WHEN to Dial 911
 - · If a crime is posing an immediate threat to you or others
 - · If there is a medical emergency
 - · If the incident is in progress
 - · If the incident just occurred and you know where the suspect is
- ☑ State the following information:
 - WHERE the incident is happening and WHAT is occurring, for example: "I'm at 1234 Market Street and I've just been robbed"
 - · Tell the operator if you are in immediate danger or are being threatened
 - · Be brief, clear and accurate
- ☑ As long as it is safe, stay on the line and answer the operator's questions
- ☑ Describe each suspect separately from head to toe (see more information on the back of this card)

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer civilian disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in various tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities throughout the year.

Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco. ALERT volunteers must pass a basic DOJ/FBI background check and complete two, 8-hour classes to graduate.

Active members must participate in one 4-hour drill in each calendar year to remain active but may also donate more time during various Station support and outreach activities throughout the year. ALERT members have many opportunities to work alongside Officers and to support the community throughout the year.



The San Francisco Police Department is committed to ensuring that all of our officers and civilian staff provide unbiased, quality service to our City's diverse communities. Toward that goal, the SFPD and the City of San Francisco provide several ways to file a complaint.

The Department of Police Accountability is charged with impartially investigating complaints against SFPD officers and making policy recommendations regarding police practices. You can also call the DPA at 1-415-241-7711 (the TTY line is 1-415-241-7770) or visit the Department of Police Accountability website to file a complaint at https://sfgov.org/dpa/.

The DPA is located at 1 South Van Ness, 8th Floor, San Francisco, CA 94103

You may also contact a department supervisor at any SFPD police station. Each station is open 24 hours a day. SFPD personnel are required to receive complaints courteously and to assist you with filing them.

Please be aware that:

- The San Francisco Police Commission investigates all complaints forwarded by the DPA and makes recommendations for discipline by the Chief of Police.

Rights and Responsibilities under California Whistleblower Laws (Re-issue DB 12-028)

The existing Whistleblower Law (California Labor Code Section 1102.5, et seq.) prohibits employers from preventing an employee from disclosing violations of a state or federal statute, or a violation or noncompliance with a state or federal regulation to a government or law enforcement agency, or from retaliating against an employee who makes a disclosure. A violation is punishable as a misdemeanor.

The law extends protections to employees who report a violation of a state or federal statute, or a violation of or noncompliance with a state or federal rule or regulation, or who exercised these rights in former employment.

The law prohibits an employer from retaliating against an employee for exercising any of these rights, including those provided under existing law, provides an additional civil penalty for violations, and establishes the evidentiary burdens of the parties participating in a civil action or administrative hearing involving an alleged violation.

The law also established a "Whistleblower Hotline" within the Attorney General's office. The Hotline Number is 1-800-952-5665. Calls made to the hotline will be reviewed and forwarded to the appropriate government authority.
