Every February, Americans celebrate the achievements and history of African Americans as part of Black History Month.

National Geographic has put these facts together on Black History Month.

In 1915, in response to the lack of information on the accomplishments of Black people available to the public, historian Carter G. Woodson co-founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History.

In 1926, Carter G. Woodson’s group declared the second week of February as “Negro History Week” to recognize the contributions of African Americans to U.S. history.

in 1976, U.S. president Gerald Ford extended the week-long recognition to “honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history.” Black History Month has been celebrated in the United States every February since.

Black History Month was created to focus attention on the contributions of African Americans to the United States. It honors all Black people from all periods of U.S. history, from the enslaved people first brought over from Africa in the early 17th century to African Americans living in the United States today.

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PICKPOCKETS

Remember the three “C’s”: **CROWD**, **COVER**, and **CONTACT**. Pickpockets occur under **crowded** conditions. The thief will use the **cover** of a pressing crowd to get next to the victim and make the physical **contact** necessary for the theft. A pickpocket always does two things: They look down because they are looking for a “pocket” (purse) to pick. They use an object (jacket, newspaper, garment bag) to conceal the pocket or purse and then remove the wallet.

GENERAL TIPS

- When boarding public transportation, be aware of pushing and jostling.
- If you see a pick pocketing incident, report it to the bus driver.
- Watch out for strangers who strike up a conversation. This may be a trick to distract you.
- When shopping, don’t leave wallets or purses in dressing rooms, or on top of counters.
- Never carry more money or credit cards than you will need that day.
- Be careful about displaying large sums of money in public.

HOW TO PROTECT YOUR WALLET

- Carry your wallet in your inside jacket pocket, not in your back pocket.
- If you are not wearing a jacket, place your wallet in a pocket which can be buttoned.

HOW TO PROTECT YOUR PURSE

- If you carry a shoulder bag, place your arm around the outside of the bag. Make sure the bag is in front of you, not behind your back.
- When carrying an armload of packages, keep your purse between your body and the packages.
- If you put your wallet in a jacket pocket, make sure it is zipped up or if a loose pocket, use a safety pin on the inside of the garment to secure it.
- Keep purse and keys separated.
- Place your purse on your lap when seated in public places (buses, BART, theaters, etc.). Do not put your purse under the chair.
- When you are in restaurants, never hang your purse on the back of a chair.

HOW TO PROTECT YOUR BACKPACK

- When riding public transportation, wear your backpack in front of you. This prevents the thief from getting into your backpack. Also, you are not pushed by passengers trying to get to the back of the bus because your backpack is in the way.
- Do not store valuables such as wallets and cell phones in the front pockets of your backpack.

IF YOU ARE VICTIM

- Make a police report.
- Notify the police and your credit card companies.
- Don’t be fooled by a call saying that your credit cards have been found and are being mailed back to you. Often this is done by the thief to prevent you from reporting the loss and allows the thief more time to use your credit cards.
- Only by reporting the theft can the police help.

Richmond Station supports the Department's Community Policing Vision and Values and is committed to creating a safe, healthy, and vibrant community. Our spirit is guided by a guardian mindset, and we recognize that our role as protectors is rooted in empathy, understanding, and mutual respect.

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities. Richmond Station uses the following methods to engage with the community:

- **Homeless Outreach:** Officers coordinate with multiple city agencies to provide assistance and offer city services. Officers address quality of life issues and find programs for willing individuals.
- **Foot Patrol:** Richmond Station has dedicated foot patrols on Clement Street, Geary Blvd, and Laurel Village/Sacramento Street corridors.
- **Community Meetings:** Community Meetings are held once a month for the public and residents of the Richmond District to attend. People can voice their questions or concerns about issues in the Richmond District.

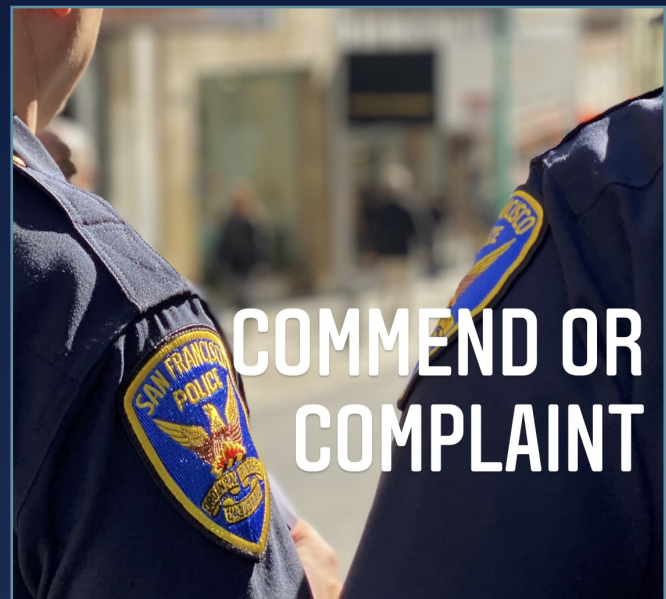

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW THIS MONTH

I think I have been a victim of a scam! What do I do?

Financial crimes include phone scams, counterfeit money, identity theft, and embezzlement. Scammers often target the elderly, low-income people, and business owners. In some cases, scammers have posed as IRS, courts, or utility representatives to cheat victims out of their money. In all of these cases, your first step is making a police report in person at your local district station or online [here](#). Next, preserve what evidence you may have. Evidence includes eyewitness accounts and/or documents. Useful documents include account statements, receipts and canceled checks. Finally, contact all your banking services and credit bureaus to notify them of the incident, as you may need to close your account or put a hold on your credit. CASE NUMBERS: 230037578

ASSAULT, ATTEMPTED HOMICIDE, CATALYTIC CONVETER THEFTS, CONSPIRACY

01/17/2023 0422 hrs

4600 block California

Richmond midnight units responded to a Catalytic Converter theft in progress, suspect vehicle used was observed while enroute to 911 call-for-service. Richmond unit, driving a marked black and white patrol car, spotted suspect vehicle and attempted a traffic stop, to no avail. Suspect vehicle took off on unit who then lost visual and a grid search was began. Additional unit searching, spotted the suspect vehicle driving recklessly with the head lights off then come to a stop near sidewalk. As the 2-man Richmond unit got closer to the suspect vehicle, three suspects were seen exiting the vehicle. The suspects then began running in two different directions.

Officers followed the two suspects fleeing, which led to foot a pursuit where the two suspects split off again, in separate directions. During the foot pursuit, one of the unknown suspects raised his hand to a head high level and fired several shots at the officers. The officers heard the shots and saw the muzzle flash. The gun was discarded to the ground and recovered. The suspect continued running from police while being given lawful commands to stop, until he grabbed a rock, smashed an access window with it, then jumped down 20 feet to the subbasement level of large building.

A perimeter was set up. SFPD declared a critical incident which brought specialist's teams, tactical teams and a hostage negotiator team to the scene along with a multitude of officers and Investigators. Officers shot at had no injuries and were taken to a safe staging area where all available resources were available for them.

One of the suspects was detained, identified and later arrested after through investigation. The suspect vehicle was recovered with 5 cut-off catalytic converters, a floor jack, and cutting tools inside. No collateral damage to any persons or vehicles were observed or reported. Case assigned to Investigative Unit.

ASSAULT, AGGRAVATED, W/ FORCE, ELDER ABUSE

01/26/2023, 1058 hrs

600 block 47th Ave

The victim is a 91-year-old female, who was gardening outside in front of her house. Security video of the incident shows the suspect (unprovoked and without speaking) walk up to victim from behind (victim is crouched down, tending to her garden with her back to suspect). The suspect then punched the victim in the head with a right fist and then walked away. The victim fell forward to the ground sustaining a two-inch cut above her right eye requiring several stiches as the injury began swelling, turning red and purple. Investigating Sgt assigned to case, reviewed video and canvased area. While in area of incident, the Sgt notices and immediately recognizes the suspect from security video walking on the sidewalk. Suspect detained, identified, and arrested after through investigation and follow up. Suspect was wearing most of the same clothing from vicious assault. In interview, suspect mentioned using drugs, being up for 5 days, hitting victim in order to go back to jail, and that he did not feel bad.

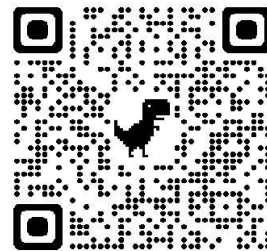

San Francisco Police Release Burglary Awareness Crime Prevention Video

The San Francisco Police Department would like to remind the public to stay safe and help protect yourself from vehicle and home burglaries. Below are some simple steps you can take to help prevent your home or vehicle from being burglarized.

- Do not leave valuables in your vehicle
- Remove garage door opener from your vehicle if parked outside your garage
- Lock the door from your garage leading inside your home
- "Block the cord" – garage door openers have an emergency release cord that, when pulled, disconnects the door from the mechanism thereby making it easy for burglars to enter your garage

**CITY LAUNCHES COMMUNITY IMPACT SURVEY TO HELP
SECURE STATE AND FEDERAL ASSISTANCE
FOR ELIGIBLE SAN FRANCISCANS**

Businesses, property owners and renters who experienced damage from winter storms are urged to complete the survey to help inform the City's recovery efforts

San Francisco, CA—Mayor London N. Breed today announced the launch of a storm damage [survey](#) for residents and businesses who experienced damages to their property as a result of the storms that began on New Year's Eve. The survey will help inform the San Francisco Department of Emergency Management (DEM) about the extent and range of damages caused by the storms to private property. Once the survey is completed, findings will be considered for eligibility from state and federal agencies overseeing storm relief assistance programs.

These programs, such as disaster assistance grants from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and low-interest disaster loans from the Small Business Administration (SBA), can offer much-needed help to San Franciscans recovering from storm damages.

"We know there are a lot of people that need financial help as a result of recent severe storms," said Mayor Breed. "Together with state and federal partners, we are working to secure every available relief program for eligible business owners and residents. This is why we are urging anyone who experienced damages to their businesses and homes to complete the survey."

"These winter storms were unlike any we have seen and many residents and business owners experienced damage from storms," said Mary Ellen Carroll, Executive Director, San Francisco Department of Emergency Management. "If your home, business, or any other property was damaged, we urge you to complete this survey to support San Francisco's post-storm recovery."

Last week, preliminary estimates for storm-related costs to City infrastructure within San Francisco totaled nearly \$17 million, in addition to at least \$25 million in damages to City infrastructure located in Alameda, Tuolumne, and San Mateo Counties. Prior to the community impact survey, initial estimates for private property damages were approximately \$10 million, but local, state, and federal representatives must first verify estimates to determine San Francisco's eligibility for available state and federal funding assistance.



“In the wake of the heaviest series of storms we’ve had in over 200 years, we’re calling on all San Franciscans who love their city to take this impact survey and help be our eyes and ears on the ground,” said Board President Aaron Peskin. “By understanding the damages we’ve sustained, we can get San Francisco moving more quickly toward recovery and resilience.”

This community impact survey will capture information for all storm-related property damages, including impacts from flooding, land and mudslides, sinkholes, and fallen trees or power poles. The information gathered will provide necessary details to inform the City’s understanding of the overall impacts of the storms on private property and will support the request for state and federal assistance programs to be granted to San Francisco.

While residents and business owners are strongly encouraged to complete the survey, survey submission does not guarantee that an individual or business will be eligible or receive assistance from state or federal programs.

IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING...

Suspicious activity is any observed AND articulable behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or is about to be committed. Articulable means you are capable of expressing, explaining, or justifying to our dispatchers and/or officers that you believe a person violated a law or regulation. Race, gender, religion, socio-economic status, style of dress, choice of hairstyle, etc. should NEVER be a factor in classifying someone as suspicious. Some examples of suspicious activity:

- Individual(s) peering into vehicles to try and locate any valuables left unattended.
- Individual(s) trying door handles to vehicles and/or residences to gain access.
- Individual(s) following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

While this isn't an exhaustive list, nor absolute confirmation of a crime, we hope these examples will assist you should you ever need to call the police.

What is the SFPAL? What is the Law Enforcement Cadet Program?

Fifty-five years ago, two policemen decided they wanted to do something about “the growing juvenile delinquency problem” in San Francisco. They courageously took out personal loans and started what has grown into the San Francisco Police Activities League. From this meager beginning and a handful of kids, SFPAL has grown to serve thousands of San Francisco youth – reaching every San Francisco neighborhood and block over the past half-century. Today, almost 1,200 kids participate in PAL healthy activities with the help of over 100 civilian and police volunteers every year.

The SFPAL Law Enforcement Cadet Program is a collaborative effort of SFPAL and the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD). The PAL Cadet Program has provided opportunities for growth, leadership, and career experiences for thousands of San Francisco youth — including many who have chosen to pursue law enforcement or public service careers. SFPAL Cadets receive training modeled after the basic training academy for new police recruits and are taught by SFPD Police Academy training staff. The program is designed to provide hands-on job skills training and leadership development through proper preparation and training.

CRIME DEFINITIONS

HOMICIDE: Murder and non-negligent manslaughter is the willful killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, and accidental deaths are excluded. Manslaughter by negligence is the killing of another person through gross negligence. Deaths of persons due to their own negligence, accidental deaths not resulting from gross negligence, and traffic fatalities are not included in the category of manslaughter by negligence.

RAPE: Penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim. Attempts or assaults to commit rape are also included; however, statutory rape and incest are excluded.

ROBBERY: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.

BURGLARY: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempted forcible entry is included.

LARCENY (aka THEFT): The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles, motor vehicle parts and accessories, shoplifting, pickpocketing, or the stealing of any property or article that is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, check fraud, etc., are excluded.

MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self-propelled and runs on land surface and not on rails. Motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment are specifically excluded from this category.

ARSON: Any willful or malicious burning or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.



PREVENT GARAGE DOOR BREAK-INS



Garages can sometimes be the most vulnerable area of the home and they are often the entry point most targeted by thieves because of the easy access to the home. Here are some tips to help secure your garage and protect it from theft.



ALWAYS CLOSE YOUR GARAGE DOOR

This may seem obvious, but just drive through any residential neighborhood and you'll likely see a few wide-open garage doors. This is an invitation to burglars and at the very least, you're allowing passersby to easily view the contents of your garage.



INSTALL MOTION-SENSITIVE LIGHTS

Homes and garages with poor exterior lighting become more appealing targets for burglars. Ensure all entry points are well-lit. Constant lighting supplemented by motion sensitive lighting is best.



REINFORCE THE GLASS ON THE GARAGE DOOR

Add vinyl adhesive to reinforce garage windows. You can also opt for a frosted or translucent glass design to allow sunlight in while obscuring contents inside.



DON'T LEAVE GARAGE DOOR REMOTE IN YOUR CAR

A garage door remote is basically another key into your home and thieves won't hesitate to use it if they find it. Opt to use a remote on a keychain.



INSTALL AN INTERIOR MANUAL GARAGE DOOR LOCK

When leaving on a vacation or for extended periods of time, disconnect automatic door motor and install a manual lock.



TIE EMERGENCY RELEASE CORD

Tying your emergency release cord into a small ball will make it more difficult to reach by thieves who manage to break the garage windows.



INSTALL SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS

There should be at least 1 exterior mounted camera facing the street and registered with the D.A.'s office.



SECURE ANY VALUABLES

Keep all tools in cabinet systems with locks and be sure to hang and lock any bicycles. As much as possible, try to avoid keeping valuable items in the garage or inside vehicles.



HAVE A QUALITY, FUNCTIONING GARAGE DOOR

Garage doors should be as secure, sturdy, and well-built as your front door and should remain in good condition and tight fitting. Deadbolts should also be added to the garage-to-house door.



INSTALL INTERIOR MAIL SLOT HOOD COVER

If the garage door is equipped with a mail slot, a hood cover will prevent any view into the garage and its contents, eliminating enticement to enter.

STOREFRONT VANDALISM RELIEF GRANT



Get a grant of up to \$2,000 for vandalism related costs. Make sure you gather all required information and documents before you apply. Check out our website for more information.

- Have a storefront

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

HOW DO I ADD INFORMATION TO A COMPLETED POLICE REPORT?

There are two ways to add information to a completed SFPD Police Incident Report:

1. **In Person**— You may go to any police station in San Francisco and request to complete a Supplemental Report. Please be prepared to provide your original case number.
2. **Online** — Using our online portal is the most convenient way to document additional property loss to the initial report, additional details that may assist the investigation, and/or additional details to describe stolen property, such as a serial number. You can access the online portal here: [SFPD Online Reporting System](#).

HOW DO I REQUEST A COPY OF MY POLICE INCIDENT REPORT?

There are three ways to obtain a copy of your SFPD Police Incident Report:

1. **In Person** — You may request a copy in person ONLY at SFPD Police Headquarters Crime Information Services Unit at 1245 Third Street during normal business hours (Monday - Friday, 8 am-5 pm, and Closed on Holidays). Reports are NOT available through the district stations.
2. **In the Mail** — Download the [Request for Incident Report Form](#) and mail it to the address listed on the form.
3. **Online** — Using our new online portal is the most secure and convenient way to request and receive incident reports from the San Francisco Police Department. Visit the portal here: [Request a Police Incident Report Copy](#)
