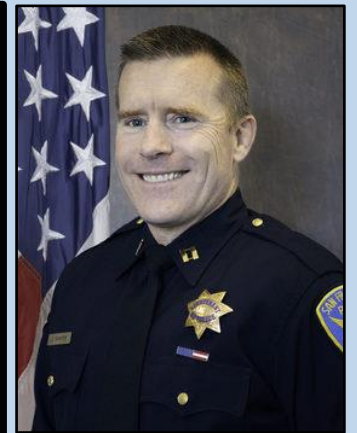
Northern District,

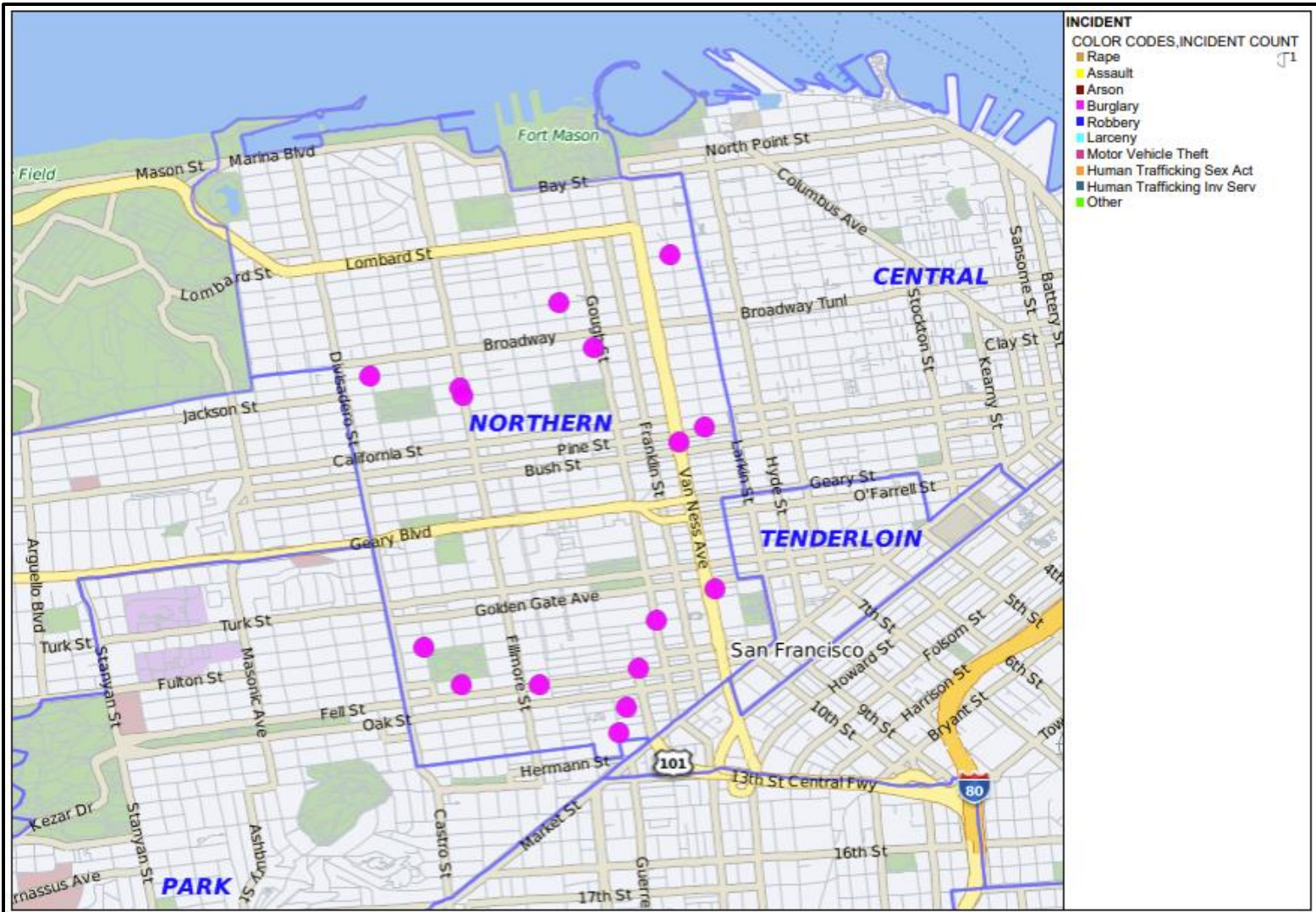

230-594-772: Robbery w/ Gun

08.21.2023 @ 1145 hours, Mel's Diner (2165 Lombard)

(S1 – S5) Unknowns

Victim was a security guard patrolling the parking lot when he was confronted by five suspects. One of the suspects pointed a rifle at the victim so that the others could burglarize a car. Victim feared for his life and he did not intervene. The suspects fled in two different vehicles. No one was injured during this incident.

230-602-836: Robbery w/ Gun, Auto-Burglary

08.24.2023 @ 0930 hours, 723 Steiner St (Alamo Square Park)

(S1 – S3) Unknowns

Victim witnessed S1 breaking into their vehicle and removing bags from the passenger compartment. Victim grabbed the bags causing them and S1 to fall to the ground next to the getaway vehicle. S2 pointed a firearm at the victim and demanded they let go. Victim feared for their safety and complied. All suspects fled in a vehicle. No one was injured during this incident.

Follow up to 230-609-183 (Strongarm Robbery Series)

230-609-531: Robbery, Conspiracy, Possession of Loaded Firearms, Firearms Seized

08.26.2023 @ 1630 hours, Church & 14th St

S.F.P.D. Robbery Unit sent a department wide email regarding a black Infiniti involved in multiple strong-arm'ed robberies that included two along the Van Ness Avenue corridor. Northern Plainclothes coordinated with plain clothes units from around the city after the Infiniti was spotted. The teams surveyed the vehicle through multiple districts witnessing several attempted robberies and a successful robbery. A pursuit ensued and ended at Pier 29 and the occupants were taken into custody. During the arrest, two firearms were seized from the suspects' persons.

230-610-776: Robbery w/ Gun and Pepper Spray

(S1 and S2) Unknowns

Victims were walking on the street when they were accosted by S1 and S2. S1 pointed a firearm at V1's head while S2 pepper sprayed both victims. Suspects then stole both victim's property and fled the area on foot.

Tenderloin District Officer-Involved Shooting

SAN FRANCISCO (August 29, 2023) — On August 28, 2023, at approximately 10:22 P.M., uniformed officers with the San Francisco Police Department responded to the 300 block of Jones Street regarding a person armed with a knife and threatening people. Officers arrived on scene and made contact with the subject. During the encounter an officer involved shooting occurred. The male who was armed was struck by gunfire. Officers rendered aid and summoned paramedics to the scene, who had been staged nearby. The male was transported to the hospital with life-threatening injuries.

This incident is being investigated by the San Francisco District Attorney's Office; the San Francisco Police Department Investigative Services Division (ISD); the San Francisco Police Department Internal Affairs Division (IAD); and the Department of Police Accountability (DPA).

All information is preliminary and could be subject to change. This remains an open and active investigation. Additional information will be released as it becomes available. As part of SFPD's commitment to transparency and accountability, a town hall meeting regarding this officer-involved shooting will be held within ten days.

San Francisco Police Department Auto Break-in Enforcement Operations

The San Francisco Police Department has launched a new and intensive strategy to combat auto burglaries and to hold accountable the perpetrators who callously prey on the city's residents and visitors, Police Chief Bill Scott announced Thursday.

Effective immediately, the SFPD has increased visible uniformed police patrols in areas of the city where these crimes are most pervasive, including, but not limited to, the Palace of Fine Arts, Alamo Square and Fisherman's Wharf.

Our world-class sites draw visitors from around the world, but unfortunately, organized criminals also converge on these areas to victimize people. With more visible patrols, we will work to deter and arrest these criminals.

The increased uniformed patrols will supplement the work of our plainclothes teams who are consistently making arrests in these cases.

Thanks to budgetary support from Mayor London Breed, the public and our other elected officials, the SFPD is staffing these new uniformed patrols using overtime funding from our recently approved budget for this fiscal year.

The Police Department is currently short some 600 officers from our recommended staffing levels, and we plan to use more on-duty officers to staff these units as we graduate more academy classes. The SFPD's 279th Academy Class is set to graduate in September, and the 280th Academy Class -- the largest since before the pandemic -- is set to graduate in February.

The SFPD is also taking new steps to crack down on the perpetrators of these crimes. Investigators will be using a variety of investigative techniques, including bait cars, to identify and arrest suspects. Our investigators are also building cases against the larger criminal

enterprises that often operate from outside the city and involve numerous fencing schemes to sell stolen property.

"Our message to these criminals is clear: If you come to San Francisco to break into cars or commit other crimes, we will arrest you," Chief Scott said. "I'm disturbed every time I see these crimes on social media or the local news. Auto break ins are devastating to residents and visitors who should be having a joyous experience in San Francisco rather than the nightmare of losing their valuable personal belongings."

Auto break ins have been a pervasive problem and remain a significant challenge in San Francisco. As the city continues to rebound from the pandemic and our tourism industry is beginning to return, we've unfortunately seen a rise in the number of these crimes compared to the years of the pandemic. The number of reported crimes is currently lower than the years before the pandemic, which obviously comes as no comfort to anyone who's been victimized.

"As we work to build back our police staffing, we must continue to prevent, detain, and prosecute people who are committing auto break-ins in this City. This includes the investigative work necessary to break up organized rings that target specific areas of San Francisco where they are preying on our residents and visitors," said Mayor London Breed. "People should not fear having their cars broken into, whether they are running down the street for errands or visiting our incredible City for the first time. San Francisco can and should be a safe and welcoming place for all."

District Attorney Brooke Jenkins joined Chief Scott at a press conference at the Palace of Fine Arts announcing the new strategy on Thursday.

"I am hopeful that the San Francisco Police Department's new strategies to address auto burglaries and vehicle break-ins will deter many from coming to San Francisco to commit these crimes that deeply impact residents, workers and visitors across the city," Jenkins said. "In addition to deterring these kinds of crimes, the Police Department's new operations will provide invaluable evidence to prosecutors so that we are able to ensure there is accountability and consequences when crimes are committed, and arrests are made."

District 2 Supervisor Catherine Stefani welcomed the SFPD's efforts during the press conference in her district.

"I'm grateful to the San Francisco Police Department for answering our call for more resources with increased foot patrols and sustained coverage for the area," Stefani said. "I will continue to work with SFPD, District Attorney Jenkins, and Mayor Breed to make certain that this iconic destination and neighborhood in District 2 has the resources necessary to ensure that all feel safe and secure".

SFPD Investigates 3rd Street and Egbert Avenue Death

****SFPD provides update on the investigation****

On Monday, July 3, 2023, San Francisco Police officers responded to the area of 3rd Street and Egbert Avenue for a report of an assault. When officers arrived on scene, they located a 63-year-old female victim down on the sidewalk. Officers rendered medical aid and summoned medics to the scene. The victim was transported to a local hospital with life-threatening injuries. On Wednesday, July 5, 2023, the victim succumbed to her injuries.

Through the course of the investigation, SFPD investigators interviewed witnesses, obtained video footage of the incident, and detained and interviewed a person of interest. Based on evidence gathered by investigators, and after exhausting investigative leads, this incident has been deemed an accidental death. Unless new evidence emerges, this case will remain closed.

SFPD Investigates Harrison Street Homicide

On August 18, 2023, at approximately 3:03 PM San Francisco Police assigned to Mission Station responded to the 2400 block of Harrison Street to investigate a reported shooting. When officers arrived on scene, they located a victim suffering from apparent gunshot wounds. Officers rendered aid and summoned medics to the scene. Medics transported the victim to a local hospital for life-threatening-injuries. Despite the lifesaving efforts of officers, emergency responders, and hospital staff, the victim was declared deceased at the hospital. No arrests have been made at this time.

Investigators from the San Francisco Police Department Homicide Detail arrived on scene and are leading this open and active investigation.

PREVENT GARAGE DOOR BREAK-INS

Garages can sometimes be the most vulnerable area of the home and they are often the entry point most targeted by thieves because of the easy access to the home. Here are some tips to help secure your garage and protect it from theft.



ALWAYS CLOSE YOUR GARAGE DOOR

This may seem obvious, but just drive through any residential neighborhood and you'll likely see a few wide-open garage doors. This is an invitation to burglars and at the very least, you're allowing passersby to easily view the contents of your garage.



INSTALL MOTION-SENSITIVE LIGHTS

Homes and garages with poor exterior lighting become more appealing targets for burglars. Ensure all entry points are well-lit. Constant lighting supplemented by motion sensitive lighting is best.



REINFORCE THE GLASS ON THE GARAGE DOOR

Add vinyl adhesive to reinforce garage windows. You can also opt for a frosted or translucent glass design to allow sunlight in while obscuring contents inside.



DON'T LEAVE GARAGE DOOR REMOTE IN YOUR CAR

A garage door remote is basically another key into your home and thieves won't hesitate to use it if they find it. Opt to use a remote on a keychain.



INSTALL AN INTERIOR MANUAL GARAGE DOOR LOCK

When leaving on a vacation or for extended periods of time, disconnect automatic door motor and install a manual lock.



TIE EMERGENCY RELEASE CORD

Tying your emergency release cord into a small ball will make it more difficult to reach by thieves who manage to break the garage windows.



INSTALL SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS

There should be at least 1 exterior mounted camera facing the street and registered with the D.A.'s office.



SECURE ANY VALUABLES

Keep all tools in cabinet systems with locks and be sure to hang and lock any bicycles. As much as possible, try to avoid keeping valuable items in the garage or inside vehicles.



HAVE A QUALITY, FUNCTIONING GARAGE DOOR

Garage doors should be as secure, sturdy, and well-built as your front door and should remain in good condition and tight fitting. Deadbolts should also be added to the garage-to-house door.



INSTALL INTERIOR MAIL SLOT HOOD COVER

If the garage door is equipped with a mail slot, a hood cover will prevent any view into the garage and its contents, eliminating enticement to enter.

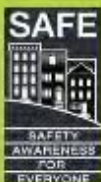

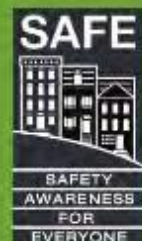
